

■ 1. Introduction

This profile has been prepared for stakeholders attending the 2007 Regional Bus Planning Forum for Bus Contract Region 5. There are 15 Bus Contract Regions across the Sydney metropolitan area (see appendix 1, page 14).

This profile outlines some background geographic and demographic information, and provides details of transport services (bus, train) and existing travel patterns from, to and within Contract Region 5. The data comes from a variety of sources (see explanatory notes on page 18).

Bus services in Contract Region 5 are provided by Punchbowl Bus Company. This profile has been prepared by the Ministry of Transport to assist stakeholders in preparing suggestions on issues which they may wish Punchbowl Bus Company to take into account in designing a new bus network in the Region.

2. Location

The above map illustrates the location of Contract Region 5, its major facilities and some land use features.

Overview

Region 5 is located in southern Sydney. It has the smallest land area of all the Contract Regions, covering approximately 5,900 hectares (by comparison, the largest Contract Region in Sydney is Region 1, with an area of 121,900 hectares).

Region 5 is roughly situated in an area between the major centres of Burwood/Strathfield, Bankstown and Hurstville, and includes suburbs such as Punchbowl, Lakemba, Mortdale and Roselands. A list of the suburbs within Region 5 is provided on page 2.

Adjoining Contract Regions

Contract Region 5 borders Region 13 to the north-west and Region 6 to the north-east. Directly to the south of Region 5 is the Georges River, while Region 10 adjoins it to the south-east and south-west.

Local Government Areas (LGA)

Region 5 covers part of the Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Bankstown, Burwood, Canterbury, Hurstville, Kogarah and Strathfield. The population breakdown by LGA in the following table shows that most people living in Region 5 reside in the Canterbury LGA.

3. Community Facilities

The section discusses the major facilities in Contract Region 5, and many of them are shown on the map on page 1. Unless stated otherwise, this information was sourced from the Transport & Population Data Centre (TPDC) of the NSW Department of Planning.

Retail Facilities

There are approximately 12 retail centres located in, or closely adjoining, Contract Region 5:

Educational & Learning Facilities

There are a number of educational and learning facilities in Contract Region 5.

Schools

There are 65 government and non-government schools in Region 5. By type of school there are:

- 1 infants school
- 42 primary schools
- 12 high schools
- · 6 combined primary and high schools
- 4 special schools

A list of the schools in Contract Region 5 is provided in Appendix 3. It should also be recognised that in addition to these schools, many students travel to schools in neighbouring Regions.

Libraries

Contract Region 5 has libraries located in the suburbs of:

- Oatley
- Penshurst
- Riverwood

Health Facilities Hospitals

There are two private hospitals in Contract Region 5:

- · Alwyn Rehabilitation Hospital, Strathfield
- Hurstville Community Private Hospital, Hurstville

There are also two public hospitals located in close proximity to Region 5 that service its residents:

- Bankstown-Lidcombe Hospital, Bankstown
- Canterbury Hospital, Campsie

Aged Care Facilities

There are approximately 25 Aged Care Facilities in Contract Region 5 including "low care" hostels, and "high care" nursing homes. Appendix 3 provides a list of low care facilities in the Region.

4. Centres

The NSW Government's Metropolitan Strategy identifies a number of strategic centres in Sydney. Centres are concentrations of employment, retail facilities and services, and generally well serviced by public transport. Centres relevant to Contract Region 5 are described below:

Major centres: major shopping and business centres for their surrounding areas with a full scale shopping mall, council offices, taller office and residential buildings, central community facilities and a minimum of 8,000 jobs.

- Bankstown partly located in the central-eastern area of Regions 5, and across Regions 10 and 13
- Burwood located in the extreme north of Region 5, as well as in Region 6
- Hurstville located in south-eastern area of Region 5 and Region 10

Town Centres: contain a large group of shops and services, including 1-2 supermarkets, some community facilities, a medical centre and a variety of specialist shops.

Canterbury LGA – Roselands

Employment Lands: areas containing factories, warehouses and associated offices, high tech manufacturing, transport logistics and major storage operations.

- Canterbury LGA Riverwood/Punchbowl
- · Hurstville LGA Peakhurst
- Strathfield LGA South Strathfield/Enfield



5. Demographics

This section describes the characteristics of the population in Region 5, and makes some comparisons with the rest of the 15 Contract Regions across Sydney.

Population

The estimated resident population of Contract Region 5 in 2001 was 197,800. Region 5 is ranked at number ten out of the fifteen bus Contract Regions in terms of population size.




Population change over time

Between 1996 and 2001 the population of Region 5 increased from 190,000 to 197,800, an increase of 4%, compared with an average of 6% for all Contract Regions. The suburbs in Region 5 that experienced significant population growth between 1996 and 2001 include: Beverly Hills, Hurstville, Riverwood, Strathfield and Strathfield South.

The population of Region 5 is predicted to rise to 230,400 by 2031, an increase of 16% in total. Across the 15 Sydney Contract Regions as a whole, the population is forecast to grow by 29%, over the same period.

Population by LGA

Some 40% of Contract Region 5's population lives in Canterbury LGA, with 29% residing in Hurstville LGA, and around 11% living in each of the LGAs of Bankstown and Kogarah. A further 5% live in Strathfield LGA and 3% in Burwood LGA.



Population by Age

In 2001 20% of people living in Contract Region 5 were aged 5 to 19 years, the same proportion as for the Contract Regions as a whole. However, there was a slightly higher proportion of people aged 55 years and over in Region 5 (23%) compared to the Contract Regions overall (20%). These population groups are traditionally higher users of public transport.

The highest concentrations of people aged 5 to 19 years in Region 5 included the suburbs of Punchbowl, Riverwood, Oatley and Mount Lewis. The suburbs with the greatest share of people aged over 55 years were: Strathfield, Peakhurst, Narwee and Riverwood.

Languages other than English (LOTE)

There is a higher proportion of people living in Contract Region 5 with little or no English language skills compared to the other Contract Regions overall. At the time of the 2001 Census, over 9% of the

population in Region 5 either did not speak English well or not at all, compared to 5% for the Contract Regions as a whole.


The proportion of people with little or no English speaking skills living in Contract Region 5 by LGA are presented in the table above right, revealing some interesting variations within Region 5. The area of Canterbury LGA in Region 5 has the highest proportion of residents with limited English language skills, whilst Kogarah LGA has the lowest proportion.

Average Household Size

In 2001 the average household size in Contract Region 5 was 2.9, the same as the average for all Regions. Within Region 5, the average household size in the Burwood, Hurstville and Strathfield LGAs was 2.8, compared to 2.9 for Canterbury and Kogarah LGAs, increasing to 3.4 for Bankstown LGA.

Household Incomes

The average weekly household income (including multi-employee households) for Region 5 in 2001 was \$800-\$999, whilst the average for all Regions was \$1,000-\$1,199.



Like the other demographic characteristics already discussed, there were some interesting variations in average weekly household income by each of the LGAs in Region 5. The highest average incomes were in Kogarah and the lowest were in Canterbury.

Socio-Economic Disadvantage

The Australian Bureau of Statistics produces the "SEIFA" index (Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas 2001) of relative advantage and disadvantage. The index covers all areas in Australia and has been designed to have an average of 1,000. Low values indicate areas of disadvantage, and high values indicate areas of advantage. It takes into account variables such as the proportion of families with high incomes, people with a tertiary education, and employees in skilled occupations.

The index for Bankstown and Canterbury LGAs is under 1,000, and these are two of the most disadvantaged LGAs in Sydney, based on this index. Burwood and Strathfield have the highest indexes in Region 5, but only small areas of each of these LGAs are located in the Region.

Disability

Information on the proportion of the population in Contract Region 5 with a disability was sourced from the Australian Bureau of Statistics' National Regional Profile for 2003. According to this data, an average of 13% of the residents of the six LGAs received either an Aged Pension or a Disability Support Pension. This could mean that across Region 5 there are around 25,500 people with some form of disability.

Workforce

In 2001 the estimated resident workforce of Contract Region 5 was 80,700 – around 41% of the total population.




Most of Region 5's working population of Region 5 lived in Canterbury and Hurstville LGAs, as shown in the following table.

The areas of Region 5 with the highest numbers of resident workers were Mortdale, Lugarno, Belfield, Punchbowl and Oatley.

Employment

In 2001 the total employment (number of jobs) in Contract Region 5 was approximately 48,600, ranking it eleventh among the 15 Contract Regions.




Between 1996 and 2001 employment grew in Contract Region 5 by only 1.4%, significantly lower than the average growth for all Regions of 9%. Over the period 2001-2031 employment in Contract Region 5 is expected to decline by 9% to around 44,400 jobs, whilst employment across all Regions is forecast to grow by 24%.

Of Contract Region 5's total employment:

34% is in Canterbury LGA


14% is in Strathfield LGA

- 31% is in Hurstville LGA
- 10% is in Bankstown LGA
- 6% is in Kogarah LGA
- 5% is in Burwood LGA




Industry Profile

Manufacturing is the largest employment industry in Region 5 (20% of jobs), followed by Retail Trade (16%), and Property and Business Services (9%).



Self Containment of Employment

In 2001 there were 80,700 workers living in Region 5 and 48,600 jobs. The self containment rate, or percentage of the workforce employed in the Region, was 18% - the lowest of all 15 Regions, and much lower than the average rate of 32%.



Work related travel patterns to, from and within Region 5, are discussed in Section 8.

6. Transport Services

There are currently train, bus, and Community Transport services available in Region 5. A description of each service is provided in this section, and discussion of the travel patterns in Region 5 is provided in Sections 7, 8 and 9.

Current Bus Operations

Bus services in Region 5 are provided by Punchbowl Bus Company. Services from adjoining regions operated by State Transit (Region 6) and Veolia (Region 13) also operate in parts of Region 5. The map on page 7 illustrates the current bus route network in Region 5 and the table on page 6 provides a description of routes and their frequency.

Strategic Bus Corridors

Due to the location of the major centres of Bankstown, Burwood and Hurstville on the edges of Region 5 there are a large number of strategic bus corridors that service the Region:

Rail Services

There are 15 rail stations in Region 5. They are located on the following CityRail suburban and Intercity lines:

- Western Line: Richmond / Emu Plains to Berowra (via Granville, City and Chatswood)
- South Line: Campbelltown to City (via Granville)
- Inner West Line: Liverpool to Museum (via Regents Park)
- Bankstown Line: Liverpool or Lidcombe to City (via Bankstown)
- Airport & East Hills Line: Macarthur to City (via Airport or Sydenham)
- Newcastle and Central Coast Line: Newcastle to Central (via Strathfield or Chatswood)
- Blue Mountains Line: Lithgow to North Sydney
- South Coast Line: Bomaderry (Nowra) to Bondi Junction

Community Transport Services

Community Transport services are non-profit passenger transport services that cater to the needs of people who cannot use existing private or mainstream public transport systems. Community Transport operators provide services using buses, minibuses and cars driven by both paid and voluntary workers to transport clients primarily for purposes of attending medical appointments, social outings and shopping / personal business.


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Community Transport in Region 5 is currently provided by:

- Bankstown Community Transport Services services LGAs of Bankstown and Canterbury
- Inner West Community Transport services LGAs of Ashfield, Burwood, Canada Bay, Canterbury, Marrickville and Strathfield
- St George Community Transport services LGAs of Hurstville, Kogarah, Rockdale and Sutherland

During 2005 approximately 19,700 Community Transport trips originated in Region 5. The characteristics of these trips are described in Section 9.



7. Travel Patterns

This section discusses the travel patterns within Region 5 on an average weekday in 2004. The analysis presented is from the TPDC's Household Travel Survey.

Total Travel

Each weekday approximately 563,700 trips* originate in Region 5 – these include trips by residents and non-residents.

The residents of Region 5 make an average of 3.5 trips per person each weekday, and 3.2 trips per person on weekends. For the Regions as a whole, the average trip rate on weekdays is 3.8, whilst on weekends it is 3.3. Therefore the residents of Region 5 are travelling slightly less on average than the residents of the other Regions.

* A trip is defined as a journey from one activity to another.

Destination of Travel

Of the 563,700 trips starting each weekday in Region 5,50% (approx. 282,200) also end in Region 5. An additional 38% finish in the adjoining Regions of 6, 10 and 13. Only 11,100 (2%) are to the Sydney CBD.



Purpose of Travel

Trips originating in Contract Region 5 are for a diverse range of reasons. Only around 13% on weekdays are for the purpose of commuting to and from work. The majority are for activities such as social / recreational purposes (22%) and serve passenger** (20%), followed by shopping (18%). Around 8% of all trips starting in Region 5 are education related.



Compared to travel across all Regions as a whole, there are higher proportions of serve passenger and shopping trips starting in Region 5, and lower proportions of commuting and work-related business trips.



Mode of Travel

Throughout Sydney most travel is by car, no matter the reason for the trip. This is also true for travel in Region 5.



Compared to mode use across all Regions, there is a lower proportion of vehicle driver trips starting in Region 5 and a higher proportion of vehicle passenger trips. The share of trips by train is 8%, higher than the average of 5% for all Regions, reflecting the extensive rail network in the Region.

Travel to Centres

Travel for all purposes on an average weekday in 2004 is mapped to illustrate the catchment area for travel to the key strategic centres relevant to Region 5 (see following pages).

Bankstown


This centre is located across three Regions, including the eastern boundary of Region 5. Approximately 22,000 trips on an average weekday that start in Region 5 end in this centre. Most trips of these start in nearby suburbs such as Punchbowl, Lakemba, Mount Lewis and Belmore.


Burwood

A small part of this centre is located in the very north of Region 5, as well as in Region 6. On an average weekday around 15,000 trips from Region 5 go to this centre. Most of these originate in the northern suburbs of Region 5 including Enfield, Strathfield and Belfield.

Hurstville

Hurstville attracts approximately 43,000 trips from Region 5 on an average weekday. Part of this centre is located in the south-east of Region 5, as well as in Region 10. Trips to Hurstville from Region 5 are from suburbs such as Mortdale, Connells Point, Penshurst, Peakhurst and Oatley.





8. Journey to Work

Section 8 presents an analysis of the Journey to Work data collected as part of the 2001 Census. The analysis presented includes the travel patterns of the workers living in Contract Region 5, as well as the travel patterns of people employed in Contract Region 5. There is also some discussion of work travel patterns for people both living and working in Region 5.

Destination of work trips for residents of Region 5

For the 80,700 workers living in Region 5, 18% also worked in Region 5, while 19% worked in the neighbouring Region 6. The Sydney CBD employed 11% of all workers living in Region 5.

The number of workers living in Region 5 employed in other Contract Regions noticeably decreases with distance, as shown in the following table.


Travelling to work in Centres

Of the workforce living in Region 5, approximately 44% work in major centres. Of those employed in centres, most were employed in the Sydney CBD (28%), followed by Hurstville (9%).

Mode used for work trips by residents of Region 5

For the workers living in Region 5, 65% of their trips to work were by car (driver and passenger) compared to 67% across all 15 Regions, as measured by the 2001 Census.

A larger proportion of workers living in Region 5 travelled to work on Census Day 2001 by train (25%) compared to all the Regions as a whole (16%). The journey to work mode share in Region 5 for bus was 2%, compared to 7% for all Regions



Public Transport trips to work by residents of Region 5

The resident workers of Region 5 tended to travel to work by train for longer distance public transport trips, and by bus for more localised trips.

Of the approximately 17,500 residents living in Region 5 who travelled to work by train, most were employed in the Sydney CBD, followed by Regions 6 and 9 which adjoin the CBD (Region 6 also adjoins Region 5). Only 3% of train trips were to locations within Region 5.



Around 1,400 workers living in Region 5 travelled to work on Census Day by bus. Most travelled to destinations in the adjoining Region 6 (28%), followed by destinations within Region 5 (24%) and in the neighbouring Region 10 (16%).

Car ownership and mode use by residents of Region 5

The average household car ownership in Region 5 was 1.54 vehicles per household, compared to 1.57 vehicles per household for all Contract Regions. Some 58% of resident workers of Region 5 in 2001 lived in households with two or more vehicles, and only 6% lived in households without a vehicle.




The level of household car ownership and mode used by the resident workforce of Region 5 is presented in the following table. Workers living in households in Region 5 without a car are most likely to travel to work by train, whilst workers living in households with at least one vehicle are most likely to drive themselves to work.

Travelling to work in Region 5

The travel patterns for all workers employed in Contract Region 5, compared to people both living and working in Region 5, are presented in the following graph.



On Census Day 2001 72% of all people employed in Region 5 (includes residents and non-residents) travelled to work as a car driver. For people both living and working in Region 5, 64% drove themselves to work. Resident workers were more likely to be car passengers, travel by bus or use other modes, such as walking.

Mode use for work trips to all Regions is shown in the following graph – it is ordered by the share of public transport trips.



Public transport use tended to be highest to the inner Contract Regions, and lowest to the outer Regions. Region 5 is ranked eighth of the 15 Regions in the use of public transport for commuting to work.

Employment industry & mode used to travel to work in Region 5

Public transport use tends to be higher for people employed in office and centre-related employment industries. Car use tends to be higher for workers employed in industries such as manufacturing, construction and wholesale trade. These patterns of mode share reflect that office-type employment tends to be located in centres which are better

serviced by public transport than more dispersed locations where manufacturing jobs tend to be located. The following table presents mode share by industry of employment in Region 5.

9.Trips by Community Transport


The Ministry of Transport estimates that 19,700 Community Transport trips originated in Contract Region 5 in 2004. Most of these trips were provided by a bus (52%) or car (25%) belonging to the three Community Transport organisations operating in the Region. The main purposes for community transport trips were social outings trips (21%) and medical appointments/visits (20%).



Information & Coverage

The area covered by this Contract Region, while following geographical features and some local government boundaries, is largely for administrative purposes and is likely to cut across travel patterns and through some communities.

Population, employment and travel information is coded to units (travel zones), some of which straddle the Contract Region's boundaries. Other information might be coded to even larger units such as local government areas, which cut across boundaries. There will be some residents and employees of adjoining Contract Regions that will be affected by decisions relating to Contract Region 5, because they live or work or go to school close to, but outside, the boundary.

Information has been obtained from different sources, which are not necessarily completely consistent, but it provides useful background information to generally assist the bus service planning process. However, care must be taken in the use of the information and readers are referred to the source of particular information of interest for further explanation of collection methods and other possible limitations.
