Home Again

Marie Lucienne Charles stands proudly in her new home, one of hundreds of transitional shelters constructed by CRS and local partner Hospice St. Joseph in the earthquake-stricken neighborhood of Christ Roi.

After the quake, CRS found a natural partner in Hospice St. Joseph, a ministry of the Diocese of Norwich, Connecticut, working with Haitian people to provide health care, education and hospitality services. Twenty-one hospice organizers work with CRS staff every day, verifying land rights for families so they can rebuild on their original home sites.

CRS has provided hundreds of tools that Hospice St. Joseph lends out so people can demolish their damaged homes and prepare their home sites for new shelters. More than 100 Christ Roi residents are enrolled in a CRS cash-for-work program to clear rubble from the streets and public spaces. Residents are also crushing rubble into sand, which they sell back to CRS for use in the concrete flooring of transitional shelters in Port-au-Prince.

CRS has received \$165 million for Haiti relief and rebuilding. Of this, \$127 million came from private donors, including \$50 million received from special collections for Haiti in Catholic dioceses across the United States.



An additional \$33 million* from special collections taken by the bishops of the United States will be used for reconstruction of Church structures in Haiti.



*This funding is being managed by PROCHE, the Haitian Church organization that will oversee the reconstruction of Church property, which includes places of worship as well as clinics, community centers and schools.



Commitment to Haiti

Haiti is just beginning a slow recovery from

the 7.0-magnitude earthquake on January 12, 2010, that killed more than 230,000 people and displaced 2 million more from their homes. When you consider that, even before the quake, Haiti was one of the poorest countries in the world, you can begin to imagine the scope of this disaster.

Yet, thanks to your overwhelming generosity, there is tremendous hope and opportunity for Haiti. We were able to rush food, water and shelter supplies to Port-au-Prince within days of the quake. HIGHLIGHTS OF OUR WORK IN HAITI'

Thanks to **your** generosity, CRS has:

- **Delivered** food to nearly 900,000 people and continues to provide monthly food rations to more than 100,000 children.
- **Provided** emergency shelter materials to more than 274,000 people and has built more than 1.300 transitional shelters with plans to build 8,000.
- Supported more than 900 emergency operations and 64,000 outpatient consultations and continues to provide support as Haiti rebuilds its medical system.
- **Installed** more than 600 latrines and bathing stations, and has provided an average of 375,000 gallons of clean water per month.
- **Created** short-term jobs for more than 10,000 people.
- **Distributed** vouchers to 6,000 families for the purchase of seed and fertilizer.
- Registered more than 300 children for family reunification, and provides them interim care and support.
- Worked to reduce the spread of cholera in camps, including water purification and sanitation efforts, and supported health centers to manage the influx of patients.

AREAS OF FOCUS

Some key areas of work you help make possible as we assist the people of Haiti in their recovery.

SHELTER

CRS provided emergency shelter materials immediately after the quake. Now we are building transitional, hurricane-resistant shelters, locating them near original home sites whenever possible. We are also building structures that will serve as temporary classrooms and community centers. With our partners, we are developing plans for permanent structures, including housing, schools and clinics.

HEALTH

CRS is working with eight Haitian hospitals to help them meet the tremendous need and rebuild their capacity. CRS continues to provide services to people with HIV, formerly our largest program in Haiti.

LIVELIHOODS

CRS provides jobs, training and identifies market opportunities to help people earn a living and revitalize local economies.

WATER AND SANITATION

CRS provides clean water, toilets, bathing areas, hand-washing stations and the means for sanitation in camps and health care facilities. Through cash-for-work projects, we have cleared canals of pollution and debris, and we promote good hygiene to prevent the spread of disease.

VULNERABLE CHILDREN

CRS has a long history of providing monthly food rations, education and support to orphans and vulnerable children in Haiti. We continue that work, and, since the earthquake, have set up safe spaces for children to learn and play. We are also working to reunify families who are separated and support and protect those who are migrating.

CHURCH PARTNERSHIPS

The Catholic Church in Haiti is at the center of community life and at the forefront of responding to humanitarian needs. We recognize the incredible potential for Catholics around the world to come together with the people of Haiti, and we will work to enhance these relationships in Haiti and here at home.

In addition, CRS is working in partnership with the Catholic bishops of Haiti and the United States on a process to rebuild churches, community centers, seminaries, hospitals, orphanages and schools devastated by the earthquake. Details about how Church projects are funded and managed, are included in the financial section of this brochure.
