# National Survey Results: Federal Vote Intention

March 20, 2012



### Methodology

- Telephone survey of 2,000 adult Canadians, 18 years of age and over.
- Interviewing was conducted March 6-18, 2012
- In the survey, 1,647 people (82%) were decided eligible voters (3% will not vote, 6% refused to say, 8% undecided)
- Margin of error for a sample of 1,647 is plus or minus
   2.4 percentage points (at the 95% confidence level).
- Some charts may not add to 100% due to rounding

### **Demographic Highlights**


- The ruling Conservatives are locked in a dead-heat nationally with the opposition New Democrats (30% each). Liberals trail with 20%. Support is growing for the BQ (8%), Greens (7%) and other parties (5%).
- Conservatives have stronger support among men, older people, those with lower levels of education and those with higher incomes.
- NDP is stronger among women, younger people, those with higher levels of education and those with lower incomes.
- Some Liberal strength among highly educated, high income voters.

### Regional Highlights

- The Conservatives are very dominant in Alberta and to a lesser extent in Manitoba and Saskatchewan. They also lead in a very competitive three-way race in Ontario.
- The New Democrats lead in Atlantic Canada and in British Columbia.
- The New Democrats narrowly lead the Bloc Quebecois in Quebec, where the Liberals and Conservatives lag far behind.



#### **Vote intention – By gender**



#### **Vote intention – By age**



#### **Vote intention – By region**




