To be eligible to compete in the 2012 U.S. Olympic Trials Marathon, runners were required to meet the following qualifying standards between January 1, 2009 and December 11, 2011, or at the 2008 USA Men's Marathon Championship (2008 Medtronic Twin Cities Marathon, October 5, 2008). Runners were able to qualify for the Trials in one of three races: marathon, half-marathon or 10,000M.



Born in Asmara, Eritrea, Keflezighi (Ka-FLEZ-gee) and his family left the city when he was only three months old, living in remote villages to escape warfare between the Eritreans and Ethiopians. Famine and drought sometimes led the boy to eat dirt ... In 1981, his father fled to Khartoum for political reasons, ending up in Italy and sending for his family. They moved to San Diego in 1987, and Meb became a U.S. citizen in 1998 ... One of 11 children ... He and his wife, Yordanos, have three daughters: Sara, Fiyori and Yohana ... In 2004, became the first American man to win an Olympic medal in the marathon since Frank Shorter's silver in 1976 Montreal ... 

Since 1968, the U.S. Olympic marathon team has been selected at the Trials race. The top three earned coveted spots on the team (in recent Olympics, provided Olympic "A" standards were met). Before 1968, the U.S. Olympic marathoners were selected based on a series of marathon races. The history of the U.S. Olympic Marathon Trials, albeit short, is rich and storied. 1972 Olympic gold medalist and 1976 Olympic silver medalist in the marathon, **Frank Shorter** is the only man to finish first in consecutive U.S. Olympic Marathon Trials. In 1984, **Pete Pfitzinger** had the lead, lost the lead in the last mile and reclaimed the lead to win. At the 1988 Trials race, **Mark Conover** pulled a major upset with a stunning victory, while in 1996, **Bob Kempainen** won the race and a berth on his second Olympic team despite throwing up several times in the latter stages of the race. At the 2000 Trials race, the winner, **Rod DeHaven**, only had the Olympic Marathon "B" time standard (2:20 or faster) and thus, because the Trials champion was guaranteed an Olympic berth, he was the only U.S. male representative for the Olympic Marathon (the first time that the U.S. did not field a full marathon team). At the 2008 OMT held in 2007 in New York City's Central Park, **Ryan Hall** produced a sublime 2:09:02 against one of the best U.S. fields in the marathon.
