



Romney Builds Delegate Lead

Latest victories keep him on pace to take the GOP nomination


Washington

No, it's not over yet. But at this rate Mitt Romney's rivals won't catch him unless they pull off an unlikely fight at the Republican National Convention in August.

Romney is on a delegate-winning pace to secure the nomination in June, and at their current rate none of his GOP foes will reach even half the number needed.

The former Massachusetts governor's six victories on Super Tuesday netted him more than 200 delegates to the party's convention — more than twice as many as any other candidate. And to date, Romney has won 55 percent of the delegates at stake in primaries and caucuses.

At that pace, Romney won't reach the 1,144 delegates needed to clinch the Republican nomination until summer. That provides a lot of opportunities for slip-ups and intrigue — and plenty of incentive

for Rick Santorum and Newt Gingrich to stay in the race and try to make up ground.

Romney projected confidence on Wednesday on CNBC. He said he was "prepared to fight all the way" to the convention if needed.

The delegate math is worse for Santorum and Gingrich, despite Santorum's three victories on Tuesday.

At their current rate, they won't come close to catching Romney — unless something catastrophic happens to him. Their only hope is to stop Romney from reaching the victory threshold, then wrestle the nomination from him at the convention — a scenario that many GOP insiders see as far-fetched.

In the overall race for delegates, Romney gained the most, with 212 of the 419 at stake, including endorsements from Republican National Committee members who attend the convention and can support any candidate they choose. Santorum picked up 84 delegates and Gingrich gained 72. Texas Rep. Ron Paul netted 22 delegates.

Santorum campaign spokesman Hogan Gidley acknowledges that Super Tuesday's results could feed a growing math problem for Santorum, but he also says the former Pennsylvania senator is determined to fight on.

"If we all go to the convention with a certain amount of delegates and we have to figure something out at the convention, then so be it," Gidley said. "But that's democracy and that's the way the party structure is set up." STEPHEN OHLEMACHER (AP)



A Sharper, Faster iPad

Apple's newest tablet touts modest updates to screen, processor

San Francisco

Apple gave the new iPad a bunch of new features, but no new name.

When it goes on sale March 16 in the U.S. and several other countries, it will be "the iPad" or perhaps "the new iPad" — not "iPad 3" or "iPad HD," as some had speculated. The lack of a new name could cause confusion for buyers, particularly since the older model, the "iPad 2," will still be sold.

But the naming practice is consistent with Apple's practices for the iPod. New models were simply called "iPod," and consumers were left to figure out which generation they were looking for.

The new iPad revealed Wednesday has, as expected, a sharper screen and a faster processor. Apple

said the new display will be sharper than the high-definition television set in the living room and will show more saturated colors than previous models. A graphics chip with four processing "cores" will drive the screen.

Apple is updating some of the software on the tablet to take advantage of the new features. For example, it's introducing a version of the Mac's iPhoto photo organization and manipulation program for the iPad.

At the launch event in San Francisco, Apple Inc. CEO Tim Cook said, "We are taking it to a whole





Solar Storm May Disrupt Power, Airplane Flights


Washington

The largest solar storm in five years is racing toward Earth, threatening to unleash a torrent of charged particles that could disrupt power grids, GPS and airplane flights.

The sun erupted Tuesday evening, and the effects should start smacking Earth between 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. EST Thursday, according to forecasters at the federal government's Space Weather Prediction Center. They say the storm, which started with a massive solar flare, is growing as it speeds outward from the sun.

"It's hitting us right in the nose," said Joe Kunches, a scientist for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The solar storm is likely to last through Friday morning, but the region that erupted can still send more blasts our way, Kunches said. That means for North America the "good" part of a solar storm — the one that creates more noticeable auroras or Northern Lights - will peak Thursday evening.



A solar flare heads toward Earth Tuesday. The storm may affect plane flights.

But there is potential for widespread problems. The magnetic part of the storm has the potential to trip electrical power grids.

Solar storms can also make global positioning systems less accurate. There also could be GPS outages.

The storm also can cause communication problems and added radiation around the north and south poles, which will probably force airlines to reroute flights. Some already have done so, Kunches said. SETH BORENSTEIN (AP)



Officials Survey Damage in Syria

U.N. authorities say section of Homs is deserted after battle

Beirut

The U.N. humanitarian chief toured the shattered Syrian district of Baba Amr on Wednesday but found most residents had fled following a bloody military siege, while activists accused the government of trying to cover up evidence of atrocities there.

The visit by Valerie Amos, the New York-based undersecretary-general for humanitarian affairs, was the first by an independent outside observer since the Syrian military began its monthlong assault of the rebellious neighborhood. A key stronghold of the uprising to oust authoritarian President Bashar Assad, it was wrested from rebel control on March 1.

Amos made no statement, but a spokesman for the International Committee of the Red Cross said she entered the ravaged neighborhood with a team from the Syrian

Red Crescent that had been waiting nearly a week to be allowed in to deliver aid.

"The Syrian Arab Red Crescent stayed about 45 minutes inside the neighborhood," Red Cross spokesman Hicham Hassan said in Geneva. "Volunteers say that most inhabitants have fled Baba Amr."

The Syrian regime has kept the neighborhood sealed off over the past six days, saying it was too dangerous for humanitarian workers to enter. But activists accused the government of engaging in a "mopping-up" operation to hide their atrocities.

"They haven't let anyone in for a week, and now they are going to let them in?" Homs activists Tarek Badrakhan told The Associated Press. "Today it's simple: They finished their crimes and hid all the proof. Now they think they can show that everything is normal."

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton lashed out at the delays.

"The regime's refusal to allow humanitarian workers to help feed the hungry, tend to the injured, bury the dead marks a new low," she said. "Tons of food and medicine are standing by while more civilians die and the regime launches new assaults."

Amos said the aim of her twoday visit to Syria was "to urge all sides to allow unhindered access for humanitarian relief workers so they can evacuate the wounded and deliver essential supplies." (AP)



Iran Images a Concern

Officials: Satellite may have captured cleanup of nuke test

Vienna

Satellite images of an Iranian military facility appear to show trucks and earthmoving vehicles at the site, indicating an attempted cleanup of radioactive traces possibly left by tests of a nuclear-weapon trigger, diplomats told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

The assertions from the diplomats, all nuclear experts accredited by the International Atomic Energy Agency, could add to the growing international pressure on Iran over its nuclear program, which Tehran insists is for peaceful purposes.

While the U.S. and the EU are backing a sanctions-heavy approach, Israel has warned that it may resort to a pre-emptive strike against Iran's nuclear facilities to

Backstory

U.S. intelligence officials say they generally stand by a 2007 intelligence assessment that asserts Iran stopped comprehensive secret work on developing nuclear arms in 2003. But Britain, France, Germany, Israel and other U.S. allies think such activities have continued past that date, a view shared by the IAEA, which says in recent reports that some isolated and sporadic activities may be ongoing. Iran vehemently denies allegations that it conducted any research and development into atomic weapons and says the totality of its nuclear activities is meant purely to generate power or for research. (AP)

prevent it from obtaining atom-

Two of the diplomats said the crews at the Parchin military site may be trying to erase evidence of tests of a small experimental neutron device used to set off a nuclear explosion. A third diplomat could not confirm that but said any attempt to trigger a so-called neutron initiator could only be in the context of trying to develop nuclear arms.

The diplomats said they suspect attempts at sanitization because some of the vehicles at the scene appeared to be haulage trucks and other equipment suited to carting off potentially contaminated soil from the site.

The images, provided by member countries to the IAEA, the U.N's nuclear watchdog, are recent and constantly updated, one of the diplomats said. The diplomats all asked for anonymity to discuss sensitive information.

The IAEA has already identified Parchin as the location of suspected nuclear weapons-related testing. (AP)

No Rescue Effort After Congo Blast

At least 246 people were killed when a fire in an arms depot set off a series of catastrophic explosions on Sunday. Officials say no rescue effort has been launched.

6 Troops Killed In Afghanistan

Kabul, Afghanistan

Six British soldiers were killed after an explosion hit their armored vehicle in southwestern Afghanistan, Britain's Ministry of Defense said Wednesday. It was the biggest loss of life for British forces in the country since a plane crash in 2006.

The soldiers were on patrol in Helmand province at the time of the blast Tuesday evening. British Prime Minister David Cameron said the deaths marked a "desperately sad day for our country."

The attack is certain to fuel calls for the acceleration of a planned withdrawal of all U.S.-led coalition troops by the end of 2014. (AP)

Is D.C. Peyton's Place?

The Redskins make plans to lure the star QB after he parts ways with the Colts

The Redskins

The Redskins are poised to make an aggressive effort in the coming days to sign quarterback Peyton Manning, who became perhaps the highest-profile free agent in NFL history with the announcement of his release by the Indianapolis Colts Wednesday.

Manning and the Colts ended their successful partnership with a tearful goodbye in Indianapolis, where team owner Jim Irsay released the star quarterback rather than pay a whopping \$28 million bonus while there are lingering questions about his health.

"We all know that nothing lasts forever," Manning said. "Times change, circumstances change, and that's the reality of playing in the NFL."

Manning and Irsay each paused frequently, fighting tears and their voices shaking, as they appeared together at a news conference at the Colts' team complex. It was an unusual and awkward scene, two men whose NFL lives have been so closely intertwined, standing side by side in jackets and ties as they told the world they were splitting up.

The 35-year-old Manning will become a free agent and is expected to generate interest from a half-dozen or so NFL clubs, provided he's healthy. Manning is coming off a series of operations to his neck and missed all of last season while his team's record, not coincidentally, plummeted to 2-14.

Several people familiar with the Redskins' plans said the team is comfortable with the risks associated with signing Manning, who won four MVP awards with the Colts. The team will pursue him intently, they said. Redskins officials declined to comment.

But it's not clear how seriously Manning would consider an offer from the Redskins. Opinion around the league

Despite questions about his neck, Manning said that he's intent upon resuming his NFL career but isn't sure where he'll do that. "I don't want to retire," Manning said. "No, I don't feel like I have anything to prove. But nobody loves their job more than I do. ... I love playing quarterback." (THE WASHINGTON POST/AP)



Manning is a short-term answer at best - and would come with such a cost that the Redskins would pass on going after the Heisman Trophy winner whose tantalizing mix of skills makes him a sound bet for a team that needs young offensive weapons. Silver Line Public Meetings Set

Fairfax wants input on second phase of Dulles rail project

Transportation

The Fairfax County Department of Transportation has set four public meetings and an online discussion to talk about the second phase of the Dulles Metrorail project.

This is in addition to the survey now under way by Fairfax County and Metro to get suggestions on the names for the Silver Line stations. In fact, the project, one of the biggest public works programs in the U.S., has been in the news a lot. The Washington Post reported Tuesday that the cost estimate for phase two, the part from Reston to Dulles International Airport and



Loudoun County, is down slightly. It's still a very impressive \$2.7 billion.

Project managers expect the first phase, the part that's under construction now from the Falls Church area out

through Tysons Corner and on to Wiehle Avenue in Reston, will cost \$2.8 billion, though it could come in about \$150 million higher than budgeted.

The first phase is scheduled to be done in late 2013. A staff report scheduled for presentation to the Metro board on Thursday indicates that revenues of \$1.1 million from the Silver Line during the fiscal year that starts in July 2013 and will jump to \$2.2 million from full operations during the following year, fiscal 2015.

Somewhat more fun to consider than Metro's money problems is the survey about naming the Silver Line stations. More than 10,000 of the online surveys have been completed.

How much the public's suggestions will count for is unclear. The final decision is up to the Metro board, but Fairfax County leaders, and those who influence them, will have a lot to say. People are starting to get real about the Silver Line. ROBERT THOMSON (THE WASHINGTON POST)

Va. Gov. McDonnell Signs **Ultrasound Bill Into Law**



Gov. Bob McDonnell signed into law Wednesday a controversial bill that requires women to have abdominal ultrasound exams before undergoing

abortions. The Republican governor's signature means the mandate takes effect in July for abortion providers across Virginia. The bill sparked protests by women's rights groups and others that led to 30 arrests at the Capitol on Saturday. (AP)

Gray Addresses Federal Raids

D.C. mayor defends dealings with people under investigation

Washington

Mayor Vincent C. Gray on Wednesday made his most definitive comments to date on last Friday's federal raids that targeted key city contractor and political fundraiser Jeffrey E. Thompson.

In the days since, multiple media outlets have raised questions about Thompson's role in giving money order donations to Gray, a Democrat, and other city candidates.

The Washington Post previously reported that the Gray campaign accepted cash donations in excess of the \$25 legal limit and then converted them to money orders.

Agents also raided the home and offices of Jeanne Clarke Harris, a public relations consultant who was paid \$20,000 by the Gray campaign and who is also an associate of Thompson's.

At a news conference Wednesday, Gray reiterated that he had no knowledge of illicit activities on the part of his campaign, including the use of money orders and cash.

"I never had any money orders; I never had any cash," he said. "Those things I actually brought

in were checks.

He added that he became aware of allegations only in the "aftermath of the campaign" and denounced any illegality that might have occurred.

In an earlier interview, Gray

blamed a "truncated campaign" for a lack of oversight. "It was very chaotic," he said.

Gray also said it has been "a couple of months" since he last saw Thompson, at a social occasion.

After the news conference ended, he told reporters that he was "absolutely shocked" upon hearing news of the raids on Thompson's home and offices.

"I've acknowledged all along the way that he was a fundraiser for me," Gray said, also calling Thompson a "prolific fundraiser" and prominent businessman who has also raised money for many other local and federal candidates. MIKE DEBONIS (THE WASHINGTON POST)

That can include such varied works as high-art films and contributions from contemporary German directors, such as Wim Wenders' Oscar-nominated documentary "Pina." The venue serves as a screening location for film festivals, such as D.C.'s annual Environmental Film Festival.



Photographic Memories

On Monday, Goethe concludes its PhotoFilm! series, which explores the cinematic use of still photography to emphasize the power of image over action. The final installment, "The Plasticity of the Moment," looks at the fleeting nature of time

through films including British documentarian Sirkka-Liisa Konttinen's 1991 work "The Writing in the Sand," which pieces together snapshots taken on beaches in North England over a 10-year period. Also screening is Maki Satake's 2009 film "Kurashi Ato (Vestige of Life)," left, in which the Japanese director traces her family's history through personal photos while visiting her grandparents' former home. The galleries often hold fests that focus on one particular country, showcasing filmmakers whose work is hard to see in the States.




Looking East

At the National Gallery of Art, the biggest draw is often who's behind the camera. The NGA invites what film program director Peggy Parsons calls "artist filmmakers" — often those working in avant-garde cinema — to lead discussions after screenings. Series can come from across the world — or sometimes from just across the street. "We borrow from the Library of Congress; we borrow from archives in Norway, Sweden," Parsons says. And film buffs can rest assured that these aren't DVDs being FedExed from place to place. "If a film was made in 1935 and in 35 millimeter, we show it in 35 millimeter."

Yes, he's that wiseacre from VH1. But there's so much more to the man best-known for his work with sketch troupe the State and for hosting multiple editions of the "I Love the [insert decade here]" pop-culture flashback series. Black's new book, "You're Not Doing It Right: Tales of Marriage, Sex, Death, and Other Humiliations," is filled with humor, pathos and poetic prose — revealing Black, 40, to be both an empathetic observer of the human condition and an excellent writer.

Why write a semi-serious memoir now?

It came from feeling increasingly misunderstood professionally and, sometimes, personally. I was so shrouded in my own persona that I didn't give people the opportunity to see me as anything other than an [expletive] on VH1. I am an [expletive] on VH1, but I can be an [expletive] on many other networks, too.

Was it hard to not end every chapter on a punch line?

For a comedian, it's hard to let go of being funny all the time because so much of that is how you define yourself. I have often felt very constrained by that.

What was the biggest hurdle to writing such an honest book?

It's learning to trust that me, as myself, am enough. Even talking to you now, I have to resist the urge to be self-effacing or glib—it's not easy for me. I've built up these expectations for who I am, and I'm now in the process of tearing those down.

Art in Another Dimension

Get lost in the colors and lights of Hirshhorn's 'Suprasensorial' show

Exhibits

Museums generally discourage their guests from interacting with the art. But Hirshhorn senior curator Valerie Fletcher arranged the pieces in "Suprasensorial: Experiments in Light, Color, and Space" to increase participation, not only because that made design sense, but because the Latin American artists featured were populists whose abstract work was geared toward

everyday people. (The term "suprasensorial" refers to multimedia activeart spaces, constructed with low-cost materials.) But how does one become immersed among a crowd in a museum environment?

"Patience is helpful," Fletcher said.
"The Hirshhorn is a round building, and people tend to go cruising through. Being able to experience [the works] in peace and quiet is something that's helpful."

Fletcher also suggests viewing the installations a second time. "With the first work [in the exhibit], by Julio Le Parc, people come through and clear out — and I go back in," she said of the

Paris-based artist Carlos Cruz-Diez coined the term "suprasensorial" to describe his philosophy of experiential art. His 1965 work "Chromosaturation." above. is featured in the show: it's actually three rooms doused in hues that change as the viewer moves in the space.

1962 piece "Light in Movement," which features metal squares hanging against a wall of mirrors and illuminated by two spotlights. "When there's just one or two people in there ... the circulating reflections that move around the space on the walls slow down." When more people come through, the metallic squares move more and the reflections speed up.

"Suprasensorial" also presents Jesus Rafael Soto's 1999 work, "Blue Penetrable BBL" - made of hundreds of suspended nylon strings that guests can walk through — and the hippy-pad happening that is Hélio Oiticica and Neville D'Almeida's 1973 work "Cosmococa No. 1: Trashiscapes," which features projected photographs and psychedelic music in a room filled with blue mattresses that patrons can flop down on. The final piece is Lucio Fontana's 1951 piece "Neon Structure for the IX Triennial of Milan," a swirl of light that hangs above the Hirshhorn's escalators and seems to move as viewers ascend and descend.

Some of these immersive ideals are manifest now in video games. And Fletcher said the works in "Suprasensorial" are a precursor to games "in the sense that [they require] a slightly heightened sensibility." But unlike fast-paced video games, Fletcher said these installations' "very nature invites you to [slow down and] appreciate their subtleties." CHRISTOPHER PORTER

About a Boy (and His Dad)

Paul Weitz sketches a family history in his new film, 'Being Flynn'

Screen

Based on Nick Flynn's 2005 autobiography "Another Bull***t Night in Suck City," "Being Flynn," opening here Friday, tells the story of Nick, an aimless young man (Paul Dano) who drinks and does drugs too much. He finds a job at a homeless shelter, where he comes face to face with the father who abandoned him and his mother nearly 20 years ago. Nick has to decide whether to allow his father, who suffers from alcoholism and mental illness, into his life.

The film also tells the parallel story of his father, Jonathan Flynn (Robert De Niro). He is (at least in his own mind) a great undiscovered writer, a sought-after dinner guest, a raconteur and a cabdriver who reconnects with his son while staying at a homeless shelter to gather research for his to-bepublished novel, for which he has already received a hefty advance.

That's what he says, anyway.

The two characters fight over who gets to tell this story, often in voice-over. "The story happens to be about two writers. And early on, I had this thought that the movie is about identity, and whether you're fated to become your dad or not," says director Paul Weitz, who also adapted the screenplay. "I like the idea of these two guys who were trying to pull

the movie from each other. Each of them felt it was their story."

Weitz used multiple voice-overs in his 2002 film "About a Boy." "Through trial and error on 'About a Boy,' I kind of figured out my approach to narration," he says. "When it's two characters, the danger is you feel there are two movies going on. And having one voice throughout helps sew it together."

He also had a very firm idea coming in about how he wanted this film to look. "When I arrived on the set, I not only had the script, but I had a 200-page book of the shots I was going to use," he says. "I knew what the end of each scene would be, where the actor would be. If it was Paul Dano walking out of a shot I knew that I would want, [I'd get] Bob walking in from the same

Backstory

Robert De Niro plays Jonathan Flynn, a man who says that America has produced three classic writers: Mark Twain, J.D. Salinger and himself. That line from "Being Flynn" does not exaggerate the real-life Flynn's sense of his own importance, says writer-director Paul Weitz. "When we went to visit Jonathan, instead of being intimidated by De Niro, Jonathan said, 'So, do you think you're going to be able to pull this off?" When Jonathan's son Nick pointed out that De Niro is, well, De Niro, Weitz says Flynn responded with, "Yeah, I hear you're good. But can you play me?"

part of the frame," giving the film a visual bridge between the two narrators.

Life Can Be a Funny Thing

Comic Todd Glass gets serious, but don't worry — it's temporary

Comedy

Two months ago, Todd Glass' life changed. A stand-up comic since he was in high school, Glass, 47, has a résumé any comedian would envy. He tours regularly as a headliner, has two albums under his belt, is a "Last Comic Standing" alum and hosts his own podcast.

But there was one thing Glass hadn't done, and it had nothing to do with comedy. This was about his life, about something that his family and close friends knew but the world didn't: Glass is gay, and he was finally ready to come out with it.

Glass turned to his friend Marc Maron, host of the popular "WTF" comedy podcast, and told the world his story in an intense and deeply affecting hour on the air. The broadcast wasn't always what you'd call funny, but it was exactly what Glass needed after a lifetime of guarding his personal life — years of making jokes about "girlfriends" — in a business that makes so much public.

"I always knew inside I was healthy," Glass says. "From a young age — I remember saying this at 22 — it wasn't making me feel like a bad person. I just knew that I was

a 100 percent fine person in a world that was having trouble with this, so I chose to hide it."

Two months later, after being met with lots of support by fans, Glass says it feels like a weight has been lifted. He's turned his full attention back to funnier matters, onstage (he opened for Jim Gaffigan when he taped a soon-to-air special at the Warner Theatre last month) and on his own, with his weekly podcast, "The Todd Glass Show."

Glass has such a wide appeal because he has the ability to riff on pretty much anything: infomercials, department stores, bad hygiene. But one of his greatest talents is his knack for deconstructing his own work. On his podcast, Glass will often begin a bit by explaining what the bit is going to be. Then, midstream, he'll break character, tell listeners what's going wrong, then abandon it all only to analyze its failures. It may sound a bit meta on paper, but in your earbuds, it's hilariously brilliant.

"My theory is that you can't go off the beaten path unless you have a beaten path," Glass says. "So, while we do have an agenda, we just let it go wherever it goes. If we go out there and we get silly, sometimes it's going to get so silly you're going to fall off your treadmill." RUDI GREENBERG (EXPRESS)

Fourth-Planet Problems

A NASA expert says 'John Carter' would face a losing battle on the real Red Planet

Screen

"John Carter," based on Edgar Rice Burroughs' "John Carter of Mars" stories, is an epic about a Civil War veteran who is transported to Mars and fights for freedom — mostly while shirtless, because that's what happens when you cast Taylor Kitsch. Wardrobe choices aside, how sound is the "sci" part of this sci-fi film, which opens Friday? We asked Dr. Jim Garvin, chief scientist at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, to assess John Carter's fighting chances on "real-world" Mars.

PROS

The surface gravity on the fourth rock from the sun is about 38 percent of Earth's, an advantage for a fighter (and a possible explanation for how a shirt might float away). WEIGHT: "You'll lose about 30 percent of your body weight and be a lot stronger," Garvin says. That is, if you can keep all your muscle mass — which Carter does, having skipped the five years it would take a spacecraft to get him to Mars. AGILITY: "You'd be able to move around faster. You'd be more effective as a fighting machine."

Carter fights monsters in the film, but in real life they would be the least of his worries. "There's a lot of things in space that can kill you," Garvin says.

ATMOSPHERE: "The atmosphere [of Mars] is not breathable," so

he'd be suffocating "in a matter of minutes, depending on how out of shape [he is]."

WEATHER: While Mars can be pleasant, with surface temperatures in the summer hovering in the 50s or 60s, it can get really cold. "In an average place on Mars, we expect the temperature to be zero to minus 10 degrees Celsius," Garvin says.

WATER: "All the water is hidden, so it's a really dry place," Garvin says. "If Captain Carter is a thirsty man, he'll have to work harder to get his water."

DUST: There's a lot of dust, and "we don't know if it's toxic," Garvin says.

"There could be places on Mars that could be poisonous."

SUNBURN: If you're going to Mars, keep your shirt on. "The ionizing radiation of UV rays from the sun — well, there's no ozone layer, so you'd be getting cooked really quickly." And the radiation in space can lead to sarcoma, Garvin says.

So, Martians should probably look elsewhere for their fighting machines, as human beings may not be cut out for the Red Planet. "We're a bad organism in deep space," Garvin concedes. "There's a lot of ways you can go, let's face it." KRISTEN PAGE-KIRBY (EXPRESS)



Warmed Welcomes

Complimentary bread service is a hospitable way for restaurants to get a meal rolling

"I am here for 12 hours a day," Ashley Soto says of the Pearl Dive Oyster Palace, where she's the pastry chef. "This place is like my house. And when you come to my house, I am going to give you something to eat."

That "something" is a breadbasket. Sure, there's a risk that it might go unappreciated — breadbaskets are something many diners think very little about — but some area restaurateurs see bread service as a hospitable way to set the tone for the entire meal.

Soto creates two breads for Pearl Dive's basket: jalapeño corn muffins and the Parker House roll-like "Addie's rolls." The rolls got their name from chef Jeff Black's late grandmother, whose recipe served as the basis for Soto's creation. After



Spread the Word

What's bread without a little butter? Restaurant Eve is unique in that it uses only Kerrygold Irish butter for its breadbasket (and anything else that needs it). "Years and years ago we did a blind tasting at the restaurant with all the top butters at the time, and everybody picked Kerrygold," says chef and owner Cathal Armstrong. Ireland's unique geographical location keeps it green year-round, meaning Irish cattle never have to stop eating grass. Even though Armstrong is Irish, he swears that national pride didn't affect his choice. "I'm proud that it's good. That part is Irish pride. But if it wasn't good, we wouldn't use it." к.р.к.

her first taste, Soto said she thought, "These things are going to be like crack. I mean, I was like, 'Oh ... my ... God." Which seems to be most people's assessment of the buttery, yeasty rolls dusted with a touch of salt. Pearl Dive offers them as a take-out service for the holidays, and last Thanksgiving it sold 150 dozen in addition to those served at the restaurant.

A Cuban Twist

Cuba Libre takes the traditional idea of bread service and "gives it more of a Caribbean feel," says Amnon Pick, general manager of the Cuban-inspired restaurant. Its bread is similar to a baguette, but just before serving, it's spread with butter and salt and then pressed and grilled, so when it arrives it's a combination of crunchy and chewy. To add a beachy touch, the bread is served with a spread made of mango puree, butter, "hints of cinnamon, to balance the sweetness" and a proprietary spice blend, Pick says.

Pick, too, sees bread service as a welcoming gesture. "It's the





most basic of hospitality steps — bread and water. Even if you go back to biblical times, bread and water is something you have to have." He also views it as a way to taste the restaurant, in a sense. "Here, you come in, look around, see what's on the walls, see that we want you to have fun, and we want to represent the same thing on the palate."

Southern-Spiced

Jeff Tunks, chef and owner of Acadiana, also took inspiration from tradition: Acadiana's breadbasket includes biscuits served with a Creole cream cheese and a pepper jelly. "That's the staple of any cocktail party in the South," he says. "A log of cream cheese with pepper jelly and Triscuits or something." Tunks had planned on serving thinly sliced baguettes, but "people wanted more of a warm bread," so he switched to the dense, pleasantly tangy biscuits. "It sets the bar for the rest of the meal. We're a Southern restaurant, and the biscuits really reinforce that."

Acadiana's biscuits are free, but servers make sure you actually want them first. "We were seeing all these untouched baskets come back," Tunks says. "So now we're asking people if they'd like bread service." Tunks himself finds the biscuits too tempting: "When I eat at the restaurant, they know not to bring me biscuits. Out of sight, out of mind." Other customers can't get enough. "We're right near the convention center, [and] when the Army convention is in town, our biscuit consumption goes way up. Those people can eat some biscuits." KRISTEN PAGE-KIRBY (EXPRESS)

Sticking With It

The skewered meats at Sabzi make it easy to overlook any flaws

Kebabs are as omnipresent around Washington as hot air. Beef simmered in pomegranate sauce with ground walnuts, or what Iranians know as khoreshtefesenjan, is a rarer commodity, which makes the arrival of Sabzi in Fairfax something to salute.

The small Persian restaurant brings together Pyman "Mike" Nassari and his brother, Amir, both of whom come from hotel backgrounds, as well as a cast of relatives, foremost their mother, Marjan.

Some of the stews at Sabzi are based on her recipes. A taste of her gheymeh bademjan — beef cooked with eggplant, split peas and dried lime — makes me think her sons led a charmed childhood.

Traces of the modest Indian restaurant that preceded Sabzi ("green" in Farsi) have been dispatched. Gone are curtains and carpet. These days, hardwood floors and Persian artwork, including hand-sewn wool rugs, create a pleasant backdrop for a meal that should begin with stuffed grape leaves or minted, pureed eggplant—or even better, with both appetizers. (And, yes, those are the Gipsy Kings singing in the background.)

Pyman Nassari is the guy who picks up the phone and asks whether you have a table preference when you call for a reservation. Nice. Amir, an alumnus of Amoo's House of Kabob in McLean, Va., is the one who specializes in the kebabs that

dominate the short menu. Skewered lamb is the best of the bunch, big bites of meat enhanced by their time in a marinade of rosemary, thyme and saffron.

A busy night can catch the place off guard: The cocktail you ordered never makes its way to your lips, and the food is slow coming to the table. "I'm trying to hire more servers," says an apologetic Pyman Nassari.

If you think food-tasting events can

be stuffy and snobby (as I do), then you might like the open-minded, international spirit of the Embassy Chef Challenge (7:30 to 10 tonight at the Ronald Reagan Building; tickets \$250 at Culturaltourismdc.org). It's an annual event in which embassy chefs compete to pre-



pare the tastiest food. Winners are chosen by the crowd of about 400 and a panel of chefs and critics.

The 14 embassy chefs (who normally don't cook for the public) will serve foods that

aren't common in D.C. Moroccan Embassy chef Nazha Kasraoui is preparing a "milk pastilla" dessert with almonds. South Korean Embassy chef Young A. Byeon Lee is making a traditional "gujeolpan," or "platter of nine delicacies," containing veggies, meats and seafood. And Kazakh Embassy chef Yerlan Abdrakhmanov is presenting shrimp tartlets (pretty novel, since landlocked Kazakhstan isn't known for its seafood).

The competition's first round occurred in February, with a "Top Chef"-style contest in which chefs made a dish with a "secret ingredient" chosen by last year's winner, Danish Embassy chef Lars Beese, above. He said he picked beets to get everybody out of their comfort zones. Mission accomplished! "The chef from Japan had never worked with beets before," Beese says. "The chef from Jamaica was, like, 'Beets—what are those?""

To me, that sort of eye-opening experience is what a food-tasting is all about. If you're attending tonight, I wish you a similarly baffling (and enlightening!) time.



All or Nothing

Terps are a long shot to win the ACC and reach the Big Dance

Terps Men's Hoops

A season of low expectations is rapidly wrapping up in College Park and, if nothing else, those expectations were met.

The expectations were set last spring, when graduation and defections had stripped Maryland's roster to the bone and the head coach's office in Comcast Center was vacated by the only resident it had ever known.

It Takes Two to Dominate

The official name is the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament, but Duke and North Carolina have turned college basketball's hallowed postseason shindig into nothing more than an exclusive showcase for the Big Two. The ACC's powerhouse programs have divvied up 14 of the last 15 tournament titles, with Duke winning 10 of them. This season, No. 4 North Carolina (27-4, 14-2 ACC) captured the regular-season title, routing sixth-ranked Duke (26-5, 13-3) last weekend. But the Blue Devils have been the king of the tournament, winning three in a row and 19 times overall — two more than North Carolina. (AP)

New coach Mark Turgeon began his tenure at the one-time ACC power by acknowledging the inherent shortcomings. He managed to convince only one of the team's existing recruits, Nick Faust, to remain committed to the program and then set himself to building a team from the remaining disparate parts.

That the Terrapins finished the regular season 16-14 and 6-10 in the conference is disappointing

only in that they came so close to overachieving. Maryland opens the ACC tournament Thursday in Atlanta as a No. 8 seed with an openinground game against ninth-seeded Wake Forest (13-17, 4-12).

Any hope of qualifying for the NCAA tournament rests solely on the long-shot possibility that Maryland wins the tournament and earns the automatic bid. Turgeon, a realist, doesn't seem to hold out hope for such an unlikely finish.

"As long as they continue to fight, continue to get better and be together, that's really what's important," he said.

A win on Thursday would propel Maryland to a quarterfinal matchup with North Carolina. The Terrapins fought gamely before losing to the Tar Heels in their first meeting, but endured a pummeling in Chapel Hill last week.

"I'd love for the guys to taste victory one more time or two more times or whatever it is down the stretch here," Turgeon said. "They've worked hard. It's not easy to win games, but I'd like to see that."

Throughout the season, the Terrapins narrowly missed opportunities to beat four of the top five ACC teams. They did notch wins against the No. 6 and No. 7 teams. Had they converted victories over just two of the top-tier schools, they'd be .500 in the conference and entering the weekend as a potential "bubble" team, needing a strong performance but not necessarily a tournament title to make the NCAA field.

Instead, it's all or nothing. "You know, there's still a lot of basketball to be played," senior Sean Mosley said. "We have to look forward to the ACC tournament and try to do our best down there and win some games, and, hopefully, win the whole thing." DEREK TURNER



Caps Frustrated by 'Easy Goals'

Players sound off on suspect defense as the losses pile up

The Capitals

After the Capitals' 4-3 overtime loss to Carolina on Tuesday night, Brooks Laich made an unprompted comment about the nature of the goals and chances they have been giving up too many of recently.

"I'm sick and tired of giving up easy goals," Laich said. "We're giving up goals that they don't have to work to score. It's killing us."

Easy goals, as Laich defines them, are when the Capitals allow breakaways and odd-man rushes that greater increase their opponents' odds of scoring. Washington — which faces the Tampa Bay Lightning on Thursday — hasn't offered enough resistance in its own zone to make it tougher for foes to get those scoring chances, Laich said.

"If you're going to give up goals, you want to make them work for it, drive through guys and have to scramble to score a goal," Laich

"I think we're just making mental errors," said Dennis Wideman, who accepted responsibility for mistakes that led to the third and fourth goals by the Hurricanes on Tuesday night. You can play your best game all night, play solid, and one mistake that costs you a hockey game."

With TV-themed cookbooks, fans can eat like Don Draper and Tony Soprano

Andy Griffith always saved room for Aunt Bee's rhubarb pie. The Brady bunch couldn't wait for Alice's meatloaf. It's not Sunday in Tony Soprano's house without gravy. And everyone knows that Don Draper enjoys an old-fashioned now and then.

What you probably didn't know is just how robust an industry has been cooked up around helping fans eat like TV characters.

Because for about as long as viewers have been sucked into the lives of the Bradys, the Sopranos and the "Will-they-won't-they?" ups and downs of Rachel and Ross, a surprising number of them also have hankered for the characters' on-screen eats. And cookbook publishers have been happy to oblige.


Fans have responded. Ken Beck's 1991 "Aunt Bee's Mayberry Cookbook" has sold 900,000 copies. Michele Scicolone says her 2002 book, "The Sopranos Family Cookbook," has sold 10 times as many copies as her other cookbooks. Publisher John Wiley and Sons' 2007 "Sesame Street"-branded "C is for Cooking" flew off the shelves.

"Those books do really well for us, especially during holiday season," says Jessica Goodman, associate publisher at Wiley, which offers several TV tie-ins, including





Television-inspired cookbooks likely trace back to the movies. Tie-in books have been around at least since the Pebeco Toothpaste company published the "Gone with the Wind Cook Book" in 1940.

Some TV-inspired cookbooks feature well-thought-out recipes created by experienced culinary professionals, such as Scicolone (who is better known for cookbooks dedicated to Italian home cooking). Others are essentially community cookbooks that are untested or barely tested. But none of that seems to matter to fans.

"A lot of good people are brought on to produce them from time to time, but people buy them because it's a lark," says Matt Sartwell, manager of the New York store Kitchen Arts and Letters. "Most of the time people don't even think about the recipes. Most people understand we're talking about fictional characters." MICHELE KAYAL (AP)






