Big Giving Starts Small: Penny Harvest Comes to the JCC

enny Harvest – a "common cents" initiative that grew from one child's desire to feed the homeless – has come to the JCC, the first New Jersey agency to embrace the project in Bergen County. The *Penny Harvest* mission is to collect unused pennies gathering in jars and pockets all across America, and after a successful grass roots effort in New York, it is beginning to take the country by storm.

The JCC is very proud to lead the NJ effort, where children in our community are joining together to make a difference in the lives of others, including first to fifth grade students who attend the JCC after school program, Finish the Day at the J. A key mission for the JCC is to teach everyone the importance of giving back, and Penny Harvest takes this concept to a new level, as it teaches young children that they can really make a difference; that every penny – and every dollar - they collect is theirs to give away. In addition to teaching children to be charitable and to think of others, it empowers them with the knowledge that individuals can help change the world.

"Penny Harvest began when a man and his four-yearold daughter, Nora, saw a homeless man on the streets of New York, and she asked to take him home," says Dana Adler, a JCC board member, who spearheaded the local effort. "Her father explained why they couldn't, but came up with a plan that could help the homeless and empower his daughter at the same time. He encouraged her and her friends to ask neighbors for extra pennies, and once the pennies were collected, he let the children decide where to donate the money. Common Cents, the non-profit which administers the Penny Harvest, came about as a result, and for the last 16 years, it has helped thousands of people, in addition to teaching even the youngest children what philanthropy is all about. As a mother with young children, Lam

committed to teaching my kids what it means to give to others and Penny

Harvest is a perfect vehicle for this. I am so proud to help bring this effort over the bridge to Northern New Jersey and hope to see it flow through the JCC and out into the schools of Bergen County and beyond, creating a true community of caring.³

The children meet in the JCC board room on select Mondays from 4-5 pm, where they "harvest" pennies and learn about teamwork and community, generosity and moral character, leadership and responsibility, as well as important needs in the world and how they can help make the world a better place. They even created a "wheel of caring" to identify the various causes they want to support.

To collect donations, the JCC maintenance department hand-built a giant container, shaped like a Menorah in honor of Chanukah when the program was launched, and placed it in the JCC lobby so that members and visitors could deposit their "loose change" in the bin. We encourage everyone to support this project by making donations. All coins and bills will be accepted (not just pennies!)

According to Penny Harvest, there are more than \$2 billion unused or "idle" pennies in homes across America, and thousands of elementary and middle school children in New York have been going door to door collecting pennies year after year and turning those pennies into grants for community organizations, such as homeless shelters, animal rescue organizations, community gardens and senior centers. Since 1991, Penny Harvest has raised \$6.8 million in grants and its potential will undoubtedly sky rocket as major cities across America embrace the cause.

"We are very happy to have our kids participating in this program," says Michal Kleiman, director for the Finish the Day at the J program. "There are many programs that teach children about philanthropy and community service, but what makes Penny Harvest so unique is that it allows the children themselves to decide what community problems they want to tackle and how to go about getting the job done."

Last year, Penny Harvest supported more than 400 projects, which included teaching English to immigrants, replacing graffiti with inspirational murals, collecting supplies for our troops in Iraq; assisting teenage mothers and planting community gardens. The "harvest" was displayed at Rockefeller Center, where a total of more than \$1 million dollars in pennies could be seen shimmering in a gigantic pool. Message from the Executive Director



We live in amazing times; both for the good and the bad. The bad, we've become all too familiar with these days, especially on the economic front. The good, ours to treasure and appreciate, is worth exploring.

The third Monday of January (this year, the 19th), is our national holiday celebrating the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King. Dr. King's birthday is our annual reminder of a struggle that is still on-going, notwithstanding the tremendous progress we've made over the years.

As Jews, we have always been sensitive to what has been not so much a matter of equality, but rather the humanity and humandignity of all people. We've taken an infinite pride in a Jewish heritage that calls upon us to be color blind. And in fact, the Jewish People consist of Jews of all races and colors; for what unites us is a Jewish tradition of common Jewish faith and practice.

In part, therefore, one of the most disturbing aspects of the recent presidential campaign, as reported in a number of Jewish newspapers, was the apparent use of racially charged language –even by some Jews. Not only was it highly offensive, it further suggested that such Jews had a very poor grasp of the issues and personalities, compelling them to resort to deplorable stereotypes.

We should know better; knowing better would surely enable us to enjoy the monumental significance of January 20th. The inauguration of president-elect Barak Obama is a magnificent milestone in our American history – for all Americans.

Everyone, unquestionably, has differences of opinion about the substance and direction of American policies, including what the nature of the United States' relationship to our beloved Jewish State of Israel ought to be. Those differences are bound to remain with most of us; such differences are also the mark of our democratic way of life.

Overwhelming those differences, however, is the paramount joy we stand to experience when our next president assumes office. A mere one-hundred and fifty years ago, he could easily have been born and lived his life as a slave. Today, thank G-d, it is unimaginable and inconceivable!

So let us cherish, savor and celebrate the wonders and the continuing promise of America the Beautiful, even as we pray for the welfare and success of our new President, Barak Obama.

THE ABE OSTER HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE AWARD

Music Contest for High School Students

The Abe Oster Holocaust Remembrance Award was established in 2004 to honor the memory of Abe Oster. During his lifetime, Abe worked selflessly, together with his wife Ann, to encourage young people to study the Holocaust and to develop an understanding of its implications. The Kaplen Jewish Community Center on the Palisades would like to perpetuate Abe's memory by insuring that this goal continues to be fostered. It is our hope, that every year, we will identify a meaningful project to be engaged in by the youth of our community that will increase their knowledge of this horrific historical reality. We hope to elicit a personal response to the Holocaust, by high school students, that demonstrates a historical and moral understanding of the Shoah.

This award also serves as a living memorial to the six million innocent Jewish victims of the Holocaust. Among these were one and a half million children, including Abe Oster's brother Avrum and sister, Yocheved, both toddlers, murdered simply because they were Jews. Gan Hazikaron, The Avrum and Yocheved Holocaust Memorial Garden at the Kaplen Jewish Community Center on the Palisades - an area for contemplation, reflection and inspiration - was lovingly dedicated in their memories by Ann and Abe Oster.

Project for 2009:

Create an original musical composition with lyrics whose language is appropriate for all listening audiences. The piece may be melodic and/or rap, and must not be longer than 4 minutes. The song should convey the lessons you have learned from your comprehensive study of the Holocaust and how those lessons may be applied to present communal or global issues.

Contest Rules:

The contest is open to all 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students either residing in Bergen County or enrolled in a Bergen County public or private high school. Entries from students of all backgrounds are encouraged.

Applicants must list on the application form their name, address, telephone number, birth date, school name & address, grade in school, and indicate whether they are available to attend the Yom Hashoah Commemoration on Tuesday, April 21 at 7 pm at the JCC. They must state that they meet the eligibility requirements and the student as well as his or her parent or legal guardian must sign this statement. This application form must be submitted together with (a) two CD copies of the song, and (b) two typewritten copies of the lyrics.

An applicant must submit two copies (each in its own jewel case or protective sleeve) of one (1) original musical composition with lyrics, whose maximum playing time shall be 4 minutes. The submission may not display any identifying information (name, address, age, school, etc.) about the applicant. The two CD copies shall be marked/printed only with the title of the musical composition, and be submitted in separate jewel cases or protective sleeves.

The student must affirm on the application form that his/her submission is a piece of original music created solely for the purpose of submitting an entry to the 2009 Oster Contest.

All submissions will be evaluated by a panel of judges. The JCC has the right to play the student's submission at the community's Yom Hashoah Commemoration on April 21, 2009. The Kaplen JCC on the Palisades assumes no responsibility for submissions that fail to meet the contest rules, and will not be liable for any damage to the CDs or jewel cases.


