## Extra-Curricular Activities

### Sixth Form Leadership Award

Every Year 12 student will be asked to give 50 minutes of their time per week to contribute to the school. ### AS / A2 Art & Design

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

In Year 12 students will complete one unit of work. This is called a personal portfolio. In the first half of he term students will study a foundation course which will equip them with the knowledge, skills and understanding to undertake a more independent research project in half term two. Here students will be given a choice of starting points and will explore ad develop their own ideas towards an outcome. This will continue until February and will e assessed at regular intervals with constructive feedback along with self and peer assessment. Unit 2 is an 'Externally Set Assignment' which is set by AQA, the examination board. Students will once again be given a choice of starting points to develop their own ideas. This will be completed by May, and students will sit a 5 hour Controlled Assessment in March where the will be asked to produce a piece of preparation work in controlled conditions. Students then continue towards the completion o an outcome. Each unit of work i worth 50% of he overall AS level. The AS grade counts towards 50% of the final A Level grade.

In Year 13 students will work to complete one unit of work. This is called a 'Personal Investigation'. The theme is set by the students and e can choose to research and create work based on an area of Art, Craft and Design they are especially interested in. This will continue until February and will be assessed at regular intervals along with constructive feedback and self peer assessment. Unit 2 is an 'Externally Set Assignment' which is set by AQA. Students will once again be given a choice of starting points to develop their own ideas. This will be completed by May, and students will sit a 15 hour Controlled Assessment where they must create a final outcome for Unit 2. Each unit of work is worth 25%, with the other 50% coming from AS.

Homework tasks will be set of weekly basis and will be important to the completion of unit 1 and 2. In order to produce a strong body of work, it is expected that students commit themselves to attending extra sessions other than those on their timetable.

#### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You should have a good imagination and be able to have creative fun with your work. A good grade at GCSE Art is essential.

However, it is important to remember that a lot of work will need to be completed not just in lessons but in your own time too. Both AS and A2 involve one unit of coursework, and an externally set assignment. Visits to galleries and museums are strongly recommended to enhance units of work.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

Art combines with any subject but could enhance Performing Arts and Media courses.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

A Foundation Art course which is usually required before studying for any Art based degree or any Art based course. This can lead to careers in fine art, illustration, photography, design or teaching.

### AS / A2 Biology

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

This biology course will be taught through real-life biology for the 21<sup>st</sup> century. You will learn a wide range of experimental and investigative skills needed by modern biologists, including the ability to make judgements about the quality of scientific evidence. You will be challenged to engage with ideas and evidence both as individuals and in groups. You will participate in practical's, simulations and animations, interactive IT tutorials, reviews, tests and develop other computing skills. #### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You should have at least C's in most of your GCSE subjects and must have  $A^*$ , A or B in Biology or Core, and Additional Science and A-C in Maths and English. Both AS and A2 have exams and coursework and A2 includes a fieldwork study.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

Biology benefits from also studying Sport Science, Chemistry, Maths, Physics or Geography.

### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

Biology can be studied on its own at University or as an essential part of degrees in Medicine, Veterinary Science, Physiotherapy, Ecology, Environmental Sciences or Nursing Studies.

You will have BB at GCSE Core and Additional or GCSE Chemistry. Each section of each topic is supported by

self-study materials so you will need to be committed to working at a good pace and you should be methodical and well-organised.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

Useful combinations with Chemistry are Biology, Physics, Maths or Geography.

### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

Further University study in any field related to chemistry such as Medicine, Pharmacology, Veterinary Science, Biochemistry, Forensic Science or Chemical Engineering or work in a science-based industry, the Medical field or agriculture.

# AS / A2 English Language

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

AS provides an introduction to the study of language. You will study language in a variety of social contexts and will develop your own original writing style.

A2 involves investigating language, developing editorial skills and producing a media text and looking at the development of language in two key areas: language acquisition and language change.

Exam Board: AQA, English Language Specification B, 1706 2706

### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You will need to have passed GCSE English easily at grade C or above.

You will need to be self-motivated and hardworking and interested in studying the English language as a tool for better communication and understanding.

There is one examination and one piece of coursework at AS level and one examination and one piece of coursework at A2 level. Examinations are usually held in January and June.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

English Language combines well with any subject.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

English on its own or in combination with any subject at degree level. Degrees in Law and Journalism usually ask for English Language A2.

#### WHO SHOULD I ASK TO FIND OUT MORE?

### AS / A2 English Literature

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

Studying in depth a wide variety of drama, prose and poetry texts. Exam Board: AQA, English Literature Specification B

#### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You will need to have passed GCSE English Literature preferably at grade B or above. You will need to understand different narrative styles and techniques. You will have the opportunity to discuss a wide variety of interesting texts in depth and explore the motivation and history behind each text and writer. You will be expected to visit places associated with famous writers and/or visit theatres to see productions of relevant drama. Students in Year 12 study 4 texts for examination and complete coursework on two Drama texts. In Year 13 students study a range of gothic literature for the examination. Students also choose their own texts for coursework study.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

English Literature combines well with any subject.

### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

English Literature on its own or in combination with any subject at degree level.

### AS / A2 French

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

This course aims at developing students' knowledge of the French language and the culture of French-speaking countries. It also encourages students to develop their speaking, listening, reading and writing skills in French.

AS - The course offers the opportunity to gain understanding of other cultures, and prepares students to become well-informed and effective communicators. Throughout the study of authentic materials, as well as extensive opportunity to work with a native French speaker, students will learn to communicate in speech and writing in issues relating to the following topics:

Youth, Culture and Concerns, Lifestyle, Health and Fitness, Travel and Tourism and the French-speaking world, Education and Employment. Competence and confidence are developed by rigorous study of grammar and vocabulary.

A2 - Building on the A5 French course, the A2 features a greater emphasis on advanced personal research. This allows you to explore aspects of French culture of personal interest including literature, film, history and current affairs.

Exam Board: Edexcel, 8FR01, 9FR01

#### HOW WILL I BE ASSESSED?

There are two exams each year:

Unit 1 - Spoken Expression and Response in French	30%
Unit 2 - Understanding and Written Response in French	70%
Unit 3 - Understanding and Spoken Response in French	30%
Unit 4 - Research, Understanding and Written response in French	70%

There is no coursework element for this course.

### **ENTRY REQUIREMENT?**

The minimum requirement for this course is GCSE Grade A in French. Students should also have a good knowledge of French grammar and a varied vocabulary. It is important to have good organisational skills and a positive approach towards self study and research work. Students must show an interest in cotemporary social issues and curiosity towards France and French speaking countries.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

The AS French qualification alone is highly valued by all universities as part of applications for a wide range of arts, humanities and science based courses. Knowledge of another language is a life-skill and increases your employability.

### AS / A2 Geography

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

The A Level course covers both physical and human geography. In each area of study, students will consider their own attitudes and values, and will develop a variety of geographical skills which they will be encouraged to use with a greater degree of independence.

There are two units of study in AS Level and two units in A2.

If students are ready, some exams may be taken in January instead of June. This helps to spread the workload and reduce the pressure in summer.

#### WHO CAN TAKE THIS SUBJECT?

You do not need to have done Geography at GCSE, but you should have a range of good GCSE passes.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

This A Level combines well with most subjects as it can be classed as an Arts or Science subject.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

Geographers are multi-skilled people, and enter a wide variety of professions: - university degrees in various types of Geography (leading to either a BA or BSc), Town and Country Planning, Conservation Work, any type of environmental work, civil service or local council e.g. housing, retail, ICT, management and many others.

### Health and Social Care BTEC Level 3 Diploma

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

Health and social care is a vast service sector undergoing rapid change, with new government initiatives giving it a higher profile than ever. Priorities on the healthcare agenda include being more responsive to patient needs, and preventing illness by promoting a healthy lifestyle. The focus in frontline health and social care is on giving service-users more independence, choice and control. These developments mean there's greater demand for well-trained and multi-skilled people across a range of rewarding employment opportunities. This course will give you the opportunity to develop a range of skills and techniques, personal skills and attributes essential for successful performance in working life.

#### Your BTEC will be divided into 2 sections: -

The Diploma consists of 8 mandatory units providing 80 credits plus optional units that provide for a further 40 credits.

#### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You should have achieved a BTEC Level 2 in Health and Social Care or a standard of literacy and numeracy supported by a general education equivalent to four GCSE's at  $A^*-C$ . Over the two years you will be expected to take a full and active part in all learning activities including class work, independent learning and work experience in a Health and Social Care setting. A commitment to doing your best in and out of class is essential.

Studying the BTEC Level 3 in Health and Social Care will also give you the opportunity to develop an understanding of spiritual, moral, ethical, social and cultural issues as well as an awareness of citizenship, environmental issues, European developments, health and safety considerations and equal opportunities issues.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

The BTEC Level 3 in Health and Social Care will prepare you for employment in the sectors and in higher education.

### AS / A2 History

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

AS Unit 1 Russian History	Focuses on Russian history from 1855-1917. The course looks at why the Russian monarchy collapsed after over 300 years of rule and the events leading to the Communist Revolution of 1917.
AS Unit 2 German History	Focuses on life in Nazi Germany 1933-1945. The course covers the Nazi consolidation of power between 1933-1934, Nazi propaganda and mass indoctrination, Nazi organisations and the coordination of German society and the impact of war on the German people 1939-1945.
A2 Unit 3 British History	Focuses on life in Britain 1951 - 2007. The course examines the legacy of World War 2 on Britain and the post-war consensus, the economic problems of the 1970's, the impact of Margaret Thatcher on Britain in the 1980's and the reasons for 'New Labour's' 1997 election victory and their subsequent record in office.
A2 Unit 4 Personal Study	All pupils will complete a 3,500 word personal enquiry into an area of historical interest. This will be a taught unit with individual preparation time supported by staff mentoring.

Exam Board: AQA, HIS 1H, HIS 2M, HS5U and HS6X

### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You must have at least a grade B at GCSE History. In exceptional circumstances it may be possible to study A Level History if you have not taken the subject at GCSE but this must be through negotiation with the department.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

History combines well with most subjects but is particularly popular with students studying English, Geography and RE. History is also useful to those studying Maths and Sciences as it develops different skills.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

History develops many skills that are essential for all types of further education such as essay writing and research skills. At University it can be studied by itself and is particularly useful as part of business and law degrees.

### ICT Level 3

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

Level 3 - OCR Level 3 Nationals are suited to 16-19 year olds who want to study a subject in a particular vocational area. ICT is an attractive practically-based qualification. It is a follow on from the Level 2 course that all Yr 11 students are currently following. Students can achieve a Certificate equivalent to 1 A Level or the Diploma equivalent to 2 A Levels. There are no timetabled exams for this qualification as all units are centre assessed and externally moderated.

#### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

Level 3 - You need to have achieved at least a Pass on the Level 2 course. Your attendance needs to be excellent (as it is all coursework assessed). Committed to completing coursework to set deadline dates. For the certificate you will need to complete 6 Units of work and for the Diploma it will be 12 Units of work.

### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

Level 3 - ICT combines well with all subjects.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

Level 3 - You have a few choices: firstly you can use the qualification to gain UCAS points and go to further education to continue your studies in either ICT or another subject area. You could move straight into employment choosing a career in ICT.

### AS / A2 Mathematics

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

At AS there are 3 units or modules to study. There are 2 Units of pure maths called C1 and C2. These build upon the work you have done at GCSE particularly algebra and trigonometry. They also introduce ideas that will be new to you such as differentiation and integration. There is also 1 Unit which is an application of maths, called D1 (Decision Maths)

In A2 there are 3 more Units to study. There are 2 more Units of Pure Maths called C3 and C4 which extend and develop the work done at A5. There is also 1 Unit which is an application of maths called S1 (Statistics).

#### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You will need to have sat Higher papers at GCSE and achieved at least a grade B or above.

AS - 3 examinations: in June of Year 12.

A2 - 3 examinations; two in January and 1 in June.

Re-sits of units are possible in January and June of Year 13.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

Maths combines well with all the Sciences, Geography, Arts and Languages.

### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

University courses concerning or leading to Accountancy, Actuarial Services (Statistics/ Insurance), Investment Banking, Civil Service, Teaching, Diplomatic Service, Health Service, Government, Public Health, Management, Software Design, Telecommunications, Environmental, Consultancy, Medical Research, Surveying, Engineering, Cryptography (Code writing/breaking), Financial Computing, Medical Statistician, Weather Forecasting, Defence Analysis, Operational Research, Business Management, Mathematical/ICT Sciences, Electronic & Electrical Engineering, Micro-technology.

## AS / A2 Media

#### WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

Are you influenced? Media combines practical work in video production with the study of a range of issues, theories and debates concerning the role of media in society and media organisations. The principal media covered are film, television, radio, newspapers, magazines and the advertising industry. You will learn to decode media texts, how media institutions work and how you and society are influenced by them. Exam Board: Edexcel, 8771 & 9771

There are 3 equally weighted units:

- 1. Industries, Texts and Audiences
- 2. Skills for Media Production
- 3. Media Production Brief

Visits to see media professionals in action such as Border TV or CFM are included.

#### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF ME DURING THE COURSE?

You should be keen on working with technology and have an interest in the world around you and how society can be influenced by the media. Multimedia GCSE is a completely different course so it is NOT essential that you have any previous experience in this subject, just an enthusiasm for team-based practical work.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

Media combines with most subjects but particularly with Psychology, Performing Arts and English.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

Many Colleges and Universities offer courses and degrees in Media Studies and related subjects such as Advertising, Marketing, Publishing, Broadcasting or Film Production. Courses with English, Performing Arts or Psychology components are also progression routes for students with media qualifications.

You will also be responsible for attending workshops by guest professionals both at school and on educational visits.

#### WHAT CAN I COMBINE THIS SUBJECT WITH?

This course can be combined with any other course. However, skills developed in Art and Media are particularly desirable.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS QUALIFICATION?

You can use this qualification to move on to study a degree at University in your specialist subject (ie. Drama, Music, Dance) or a BTEC Higher National Diploma in Performing Arts (as offered by Stage Schools). Even if you plan on not entering a career in Performing Arts, other careers benefit from the skills that you have developed (e.g. Law, Medicine, Education, etc).

- Unit 2 is internally assessed through compiling a portfolio of four different tasks which need to be presented on your own student CD-ROM/DVD. This will then be externally verified by the exam board.

The A2 course is also assessed over 2 units.

- Unit 3 is externally assessed through a 2 hour exam paper.
- For Unit 4 you will submit four completed coursework tasks on your CD-ROM/DVD. This will
  then be externally verified by the exam board.

#### WHAT CAN I DO AFTER I HAVE COMPLETED THE COURSE?

Physical Education combines with many AS and Advanced GCSE subjects. It supports applications for a wide variety of University courses like sports sciences, physiotherapy, recreation and leisure studies and many other new and exciting courses related to sport throughout higher education.
