## Keepers:

- Richard Stiles was appointed Keeper in 1856. It is not known when he left.
- Sylvanus Corson was appointed Keeper on 17 January 1862 and was discharged on 3 November 1883.
- Charles D. Stephens was appointed Keeper on 10 November 1883 and resigned on 23 October 1897.
- Reuben S. Godfrey was appointed Keeper on 6 November 1897 and resigned for physical reasons on 2 February 1908.
- Cornelius L. Nickerson was appointed Keeper on 29 January 1908 and was still in service when the USLSS merged with the USRCS in 1915.
- CBM (L) Edward Norton was OIC in 1929.
