2009 Mission & Goals

For the past two decades, our major political parties have continued to drift apart, thanks to increasingly bitter and divisive election campaigns that tend to reward sloganeering and attack ads rather than reasoned policy debate. The end result is an electorate that is divided by social issues and deeply skeptical of the ability of the two major parties to solve the biggest issues of the day.

Poll after poll shows that a majority of the American public does not feel well represented by the two party system, but ours is a system that yields only painfully to change.

It is into this context that the Independent Party of Oregon was born.

The party's approach is very different from most third party movements, which tend to involve candidates in big national elections and whose impact, if any, tends to strengthen the chances of the candidate who is least similar to the third party nominee.

Our preference is to work collaboratively with legislators within the two party system to bring some gravity back to the public-interest center. We aim to shake up the stale, partisan divisions that characterize the debate in Salem and Washington D.C.

The common theme among our candidates and the legislators we support is their support for legislation to increase citizen participation in government and reduce special interest control over our political process. We encourage those who demonstrate a willingness to work in a bi-partisan fashion, and those who place an emphasis on public-interest policy rather than on issues that divide us from one another.

In the 2009 session we pursued a narrow legislative agenda as a prelude to our longer-term goal of keeping government working for the people of Oregon.

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2009 Legislative Overview

During the 2009 legislative session, the Independent Party of Oregon worked to build a strong bi-partisan coalition to advance and protect the interests of non-affiliated candidates, minor political parties, and voters; promote government transparency and accountability; and ensure that the instruments of our democracy -- the ballot, the initiative and referendum, and the legislative process itself remain accessible to ordinary citizens.

The party focused its attention on six pieces of legislation during the session, helping to pass five We also worked with limited success to moderate or defeat legislation that was intended to restrict access to the Oregon Voters' Pamphlet and to reduce the ability of Oregonians to use the Oregon system of Initiative, Referendum, and Recall.

Most notably, the Independent Party played a central role in passing a form of fusion voting legislation that will allow candidates to list the names of up to three party nominations on the general election ballot, and helping to repeal a 2005 law that made it more difficult for non-affiliated candidates to run for public office.



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2009 Priorities & Assessment

Legislative Priorities

HB 2414 allows candidates to list the nominations of up to 3 political parties on the general election ballot. The provisions of this bill were inserted into SB 326 at the end of the legislative session after HB 2414 was gut-and-stuffed by some legislators to reverse the meaning of a "yes" or "no" vote on public referenda (a move that was opposed by the Independent Party".

PASSED *(see sb326)

SB 326 repeals a 2005 law that made it more difficult for non-affiliated candidates to run for public office in Oregon. The original provisions of HB 2414 were inserted into this bill.



HB 2386 directs Secretary of State to adopt an online voter registration system



HB 2500 makes the state budget more transparent to citizens of Oregon by creating a single web-based clearinghouse for all budget information. Kim Thatcher, Jefferson Smith, and Ben Cannon were the champions of this bill.



HB 2004 allows Oregon taxpayers to donate \$3 to the political party of their choice by checking a box on their state income tax forms.

✓ PASSED

HB 2588 would have allowed Oregon to join twelve other states in the national popular vote compact. This compact would guarantee that the Presidency would be won by the candidate who receives the most votes in all 50 states.



Scoring the House

House Leadership in both political parties was supportive of most of our legislative agenda, and Democratic leadership played an important role in amending SB 326 to allow our fusion voting bill to move forward.

Notable House members include: Vicki Berger, Scott Bruun, Peter Buckley, and Arnie Roblan, who were joined by 27 other House members in scoring a perfect 100 percent on our legislative scorecard. Meanwhile, 7 members of the Oregon House (4 Democrats, 3 Republicans) scored a 60 percent or worse, led by Jim Weidner (R- McMinnville), who voted for our legislation 20 percent of the time, and Nick Kahl (D-Portland), who used the floor of the House to attack fusion voting and the nominating process for minor political parties.

House members scoring below 80 percent were given a 10 percent bonus, if they helped move priority legislation forward.

Scoring the Senate

Senate leadership in both political parties was highly supportive of repealing a 2005 law that effectively doubled the number of signatures needed for a non-affiliated candidate to run for public office. The Chairman of the Senate Rules Committee attempted to kill our fusion voting bill, despite receiving a letter signed by a majority of his colleagues asking that the bill be sent to the floor. The Rules Committee also did not hold a work session on a bill that would have allowed Oregon to join twelve other states in signing the national popular vote compact. This compact would guarantee that the Presidency would be won by the candidate who receives the most popular votes in all 50 states.

Senators who deserve special recognition for their work include Frank Morse, Bill Morrissette, Rod Monroe, and Brian Boquist.

Senators who voted against SB 326e were given a 5 point penalty. Senators who blocked our legislation from being heard in committee were penalized 10 points.
