What's new on your musical horizon?

Sonali: I love listening to all kinds of music like club and jazz and am imbibing the techniques of singing in my new album. It's a totally new Sonali that you'll experience in the album. Lez has done the album for me and I have almost completed it. The songs are hummable, feel-good types. I just can't wait to perform them with my band, especially abroad where I can jam with jazz musicians.

Roop: From tabla player to ghazal singer and play-back artiste, I have now turned to music composition. I have my new studio and have composed for films like *Zeher*. I am working on a few more films, scheduled to release next year.

And playback singing?

Roop: Well after *Tere Liye (Veer Zaara)* I have been very busy with music composition and performances. Of course I'd love to sing any song that comes my way.

Sonali: Well I wouldn't mind singing film songs but I have never got a chance. Not that I miss singing them, especially today's film songs — I wish I lived in the era of old film music.

What do you prefer singing live or recording?

Sonali: Both have their own challenges. In live performances you get to strike a rapport with the audience and an opportunity to show off your talents as an artiste. Performing live is an art. Whereas in a recorded song, one has to sing to perfec-

to other things like looking good!

Roop: Good singing will die out if many Indian idols come into being...inhe toh kabhi riyaaz ki zaroorat hi nahi hogi! A musician's journey to perfection is what makes him. There are no shortcuts in that journey.

Roop: Yes, very much so. She has learnt piano and is right now creating her own album.
