NFISD Snapshot

The North Forest Independent School District is located in a well-situated section of northeast Harris County that is only a few miles north of downtown Houston and just south of Bush Intercontinental Airport.

We operate an early childhood center, five elementary campuses, two middle schools, a Ninth Grade Center, one charter school campus, and one high school.

We also offer a career and technical education program with curricula in engineering, criminal justice, agricultural science, building trades, health professions and other areas of study.

The District's curriculum is aligned with the state-mandated curriculum, assessments and programs. With strong academic programs as the cornerstone, North Forest ISD also prides itself on the education of the total child by offering enrichment opportunities aimed at cultivating the artistic and creative talents of our students.

North Forest ISD serves approximately 7,600 students in grades Pre-K through 12th grade. Our students are among the best and brightest in the state of Texas and throughout the nation. NFISD graduates have gone on to attend Tier 1 universities throughout Texas and some of the best colleges and universities in the nation, receiving both academic and athletic scholarships to further their educations.

North Forest ISD is proud to employ more than 1,000 teachers, administrators, professionals, paraprofessionals and support staff members. From safely transporting students to and from school to preparing and serving nutritious meals, from keeping our buildings safe and clean to teaching a lesson in history, math or science, our employees dedicate themselves daily to serving the students of our District.

North Forest ISD is not just a collection of school buildings and facilities or a group of teachers and staff. FULL-DAY PRE-KINDERGARTEN TWO-WAY DUAL LANGUAGE IMMERSION

Now in its second year of offering a full-day Pre-K curriculum to serve 3-year-old and 4-year-old students through a challenging program that prepares them for student achievement, North Forest ISD has added another exciting element to its early childhood program.

NFISD has launched a Two-Way Dual Language Program, introducing it at the early childhood education level. The dual language program places English and Spanish speaking students in the same classroom and integrates instruction in math, science, and social studies by optimizing the use of the two languages. The program will begin in the 2010-2011 school year with Pre-K and Kindergarten students.

Dual Language provides students with a strong academic focus in two languages, a respect for different cultures, and prepares students for college and a career in a globally competitive economy.

The District's move toward incorporating a dual language program is spurred by a number of factors, including:

English Language Learners (ELLs) who participate in Dual Language programs achieve the greatest long-term academic gains through their participation.

Dual Language is the best program for ELLs that closes the achievement gap as compared to other programs.

Students in Dual Language do as well, or better, than students learning only in English on standardized tests given in English.

The children learn to respect multiple cultural heritages and languages which lead to friendships that cross class and language boundaries.

Students of Dual Language programs increase their marketable skills in a global society.

One of the most positive aspects of the Dual Language Program is an increase in parental involvement in our children's education.

North Forest High School Standard Dress Code

A standard dress code has been approved for North Forest High School. All North Forest High School students are required to adhere to the required dress code.

ID Badges

Students are required to wear ID badges at all times. Lanyards will be provided. The initial student ID badges are issued free; however, there is a \$5.00 replacement fee.

Tops

All students must wear white, black, or gold polo-style shirts. The shirt must be a three or four button pique-knit with short or long sleeves.

Bottoms

Students can wear khaki uniform slacks, khaki knee length shorts, khaki uniform skirts, or blue or black denim jeans. However, jeans or pants with outside decorative stitching or patch pockets cannot be worn. All slacks, shorts, and skirts must be worn at the natural waist height and at proper length. All clothing must fit properly and may not be excessively loose or baggy. A belt must be worn at all times.

Shoes

Students must wear shoes at all times. Due to safety consideration, students must wear closed-toe shoes. Sandals, high-heel, sling or open-back shoes are not permitted at any time during the instructional day.

Student Code of Conduct Specific Guidelines

Please refer to the Student Handbook/Code of Conduct for specific guidelines on dress code. Listed below are some specific dress code violations that are not permitted at North Forest High School:

- Tongue rings and visible body piercings are prohibited
- · Hats, caps, scarves, and hair coverings are prohibited
- Well-groomed mustaches are allowed
- · Beards are prohibited
- · Hair cut designs of any type are prohibited
- Non-natural hair colors (blue, pink, orange, purple, etc.) are prohibited
- · Eyebrows-slits/cuts into the eyebrow are prohibited
- The use of cell phones and electronic devices in the building is prohibited

Students whose dress and appearance do not adhere to North Forest High School's standard code of dress will be sent home and not allowed to return to school without a parent conference.

Health Services

Each North Forest ISD campus is served by a registered nurse. In addition to maintaining immunization records, school nurses provide emergency health services and conduct vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings. The district also operates a school-based clinic on the W.G. Smiley Career and Technology School campus.

ID Badges

Schools will issue ID badges to their students at the middle and high school levels. The ID badges MUST be worn daily. Lost ID badges MUST be replaced at a cost of \$5.

Immunizations

NFISD enforces the minimum state vaccination requirements for Texas school entrance and attendance for grades K through 12. Those requirements are:

- Diphtheria, Tetanus Toxoid and Pertussis Vaccine (DTP, DTaP, DT, Td): Five doses of any combination of DTaP/DTP unless the fourth dose was given on or after the fourth birthday. Students seven or older: three doses of any combination DTP/DTaP/DT/Td vaccine and one dose of Td required ten years after last dose of DTP/DTaP/DT.
- Polio: Four doses unless the third was on or after the fourth birthday.
- Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR): Two doses of a measles-containing vaccine with the first dose on or after the first birthday; second dose by age five or entry into kindergarten.
- Hepatitis B: Three doses required.
- Vericella: One dose on or after first birthday is required.
- Hepatitis A: Two doses on or after second birthday for grades K-3 only.

Immunization Changes for Kindergarten, 1st, 7th, & 8th Grades

Immunization requirements are changing for 2010-2011. The new requirements affect students entering Kindergarten and the seventh grade. Students must be current on immunizations to start school on August 23. Families who wait until August will experience long lines.

Parents are encouraged to have their children's shot cards evaluated by a medical provider as soon as possible.

For Kindergarten and 1st grade students the changes are:

- Hepatitis A Vaccine: All students entering Kindergarten or 1st grade will be required to have two doses of Hepatis A vaccine.
- Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR) Vaccine: All students entering Kindergarten will be required to have two doses of measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine.
- Varicella Vaccine: All students entering Kindergarten or 1st grade will be required to have two doses of varicella vaccine.

For 7th and 8th grade students, the changes are:

- Tetanus, Diphtheria and acellular pertussis-containg vaccine (Tdap): All students entering seventh grade must have one dose of Tdap vaccine. Students in seventh grade must have a booster dose of Tdap only if it has been five years since their last doses of a tetanus-containing vaccine. Students in grades 8-12 must have a booster dose of Tdap if it has been 10 years since their previous dose of a tetanus-containing vaccine. Td is acceptable in lieu of Tdap if a contraindication to pertussis exists.
- Meningococcal Vaccine: All students entering 7th or 8th grade grade will be required to have one dose of meningococcal vaccine.
- Varicella vaccine: All students entering 7th or 8th grade will be required to have two doses of varicella vaccine.

Nutrition

All NFISD campuses have cafeterias that serve tasty, nutritious meals. NFISD participates in the Texas Department of Agriculture's Provision 2 program and provides all students with free meals. The district's food service department follows the state-mandated nutrition guidelines regarding Food of Minimal Nutritional Value (FMNV). For additional information on the district's breakfast and lunch programs, call food services at 713.636.4395.

Registration

Registration for the 2010-2011 school year will begin Monday, August 9, 2010, at each of the North Forest ISD campuses. New students must bring birth certificates, social security cards, school records (including last report card) and current immunization records. Students must have required immunizations in order to enroll in school. School starts Monday, August 23, 2010.

Middle Schools: 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m.
Ninth Grade Center: 7:30 a.m. until 2:30 p.m.
YES Prep North Forest: 7:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.
High School: 7:45 a.m. until 2:45 p.m.

School Uniforms

In addition to providing parents and guardians with an economical and simple answer to clothing their children for the school year, uniforms also help bring order and discipline to the learning environment. Polo shirts refer to shirts with collars. T-shirts will not be allowed. Belts must be worn. Campuses with uniform policies allow all students to wear shorts or pants and girls to wear capri pants, skorts, jumpers or skirts. However, all uniform bottoms must be knee-length. For details on a specific school's uniform, please refer to the campus' page in this guide. Uniform policies are strictly enforced. Campus administrators reserve the right to send students that do not adhere to the dress code to SAC or in-school suspension. It is suggested that at least three sets (three bottoms and three tops) of clothing are purchased to accommodate a week's attire.

Transportation

In accordance with state guidelines, NFISD provides transportation to students who reside at least two miles away from the school they attend. Parents and guardians needing additional information about transportation should call 713-636-4390.

NORTH FOREST ISD OFFERS EDUCATIONAL CHOICES

YES Prep Public Schools and North Forest Independent School District have partnered together to open a new YES Prep school in North Forest ISD.

YES Prep North Forest is designed to provide an additional choice for North Forest ISD parents in the education of their children.

Although YES Prep North Forest is a part of North Forest ISD, it will follow the model of all YES Prep Public Schools which includes Extended School Day and Extended School Year programs. YES stands for Youth Engaged in Service and the YES Prep mission is to prepare students to compete academically in college and to be advocates in their communities. The school will be located on the former Kirby Middle School campus and will open in the 2010-2011 school year. YES Prep North Forest will be a college prep school with a focus on developing leadership skills in students. YES Prep Public Schools is a free, open-enrollment public school system in the Houston area. It combines a highly successful 6th-12th grade model along with high standards for student achievement.

HELPING OUR STUDENTS MAKE THE TRANSITION




