Report on Humanist Digital Humanities, Oulu, 2008

Summary

In its 21st year of operation, since the last report, Humanist gained a significant number of new members, growing by 113, the largest gain by far since I began tracking the yearly figures. The number of messages is up by 70, continuing what now looks to be a fairly regular sinusoidal pattern. Available data is summarized in the accompanying spreadsheet. The extensive repair of Humanist's ageing mechanisms of publication, and its move from Princeton and Virginia to an ADHO server, was not accomplished as promised but is definitely now underway and should be accomplished by this Autumn.

Management

Humanist is tended by one person, the Editor, with occasional help from the Assistant Editor (David Gants). In previous years the average amount of time spent daily on running Humanist was ca. 30 minutes per day, 365 days per year. During 2007-8 the workload has gone up for three reasons:

- (1) A dramatic increase in spam through the Virginia account caused an unsupportable amount of manual work, as a result of which I suspended trawling through rejected messages for the few genuine items falsely classified as spam. Consequently members have had to watch for the appearance of their postings, resubmitting as necessary.
- (2) The increasing habit of pasting formatted text from Word into postings has required an increasing amount of manual editing.
- (3) A breakdown in the archiving mechanism at Virginia now means that I must archive messages manually.

The refurbishment of Humanist (for which see below) and its move to an ADHO server promise to reduce the workload to a reasonable level once again.

Until Humanist's move, technical support is supplied by Shayne Brandon (IATH, Virginia), who once again is to be commended for his help at crucial points throughout the year. No help this year has been required from the Office of Information Technology (OIT, Princeton). IATH maintains mail relaying, message digesting and archiving functions, OIT the Listserv software.

Humanist's refurbishment

The refurbishment of Humanist now has a history.

At DH2006 both the ACH and ALLC gave strong support to an initiative for repairing Humanist's ageing mechanisms of publication and for moving these mechanisms from their current institutional homes to an ADHO server. (The problems then visible were summarized in the report for 2005-6.) During 2006-7 a survey of members was carried by Stephen Ramsay, Stéfan Sinclair and Vika Zafrin to discover if Humanist's idiosyncratic style of publication needed to be changed along with the lower-level mechanisms. Members overwhelmingly voted for continuing the current style. With the financial support of ADHO, a programmer was then engaged to carry out the work but did next to nothing, despite repeated enquiries. He resigned in early February 2008. Later that month, after consultation with ADHO, Malgosia Askanas, known widely for her efficiency and skill, was hired. She drew up a detailed plan after consultation with AHDO, began chargeable work 1 May and has been showing steady progress since then. Completion by Autumn seems highly likely.

Both Malgosia's proposal and milestone documents are attached, below. Her estimate for the work is 100 hours at a reduced fee of US \$60/hour (€40, £31) for a total of US \$6000 (€4000, £3100).

Membership and messages

Statistics regarding membership and messages are given in the accompanying Excel file, Humanist 200807.xls, as follows:

- (1) Membership data for 2002-3 to 2007-8
- (2) Number of messages per year from 1993-4 to 2007-8
- (3) Chart of membership from 2002-3 to 2007-8 from (1)
- (4) Chart of messages per year from (2)

It is, as usual, difficult to know what these statistics indicate other than the steady, perhaps even accelerating growth in membership in the U.K., U.S. and perhaps Canada (which continues to show the highest rate of membership per capita. The chart of messages per year continues to show a puzzling sinusoidal pattern, as noted above. I can shed no further light on this variation.

Publication

Humanist is a publication of the Alliance for Digital Humanities Organizations and the Office for Humanities Communication (King's College London). Since 1995-6, when Stanley N. Katz was its President, Humanist has also been an affiliated publication of the American Council of Learned Societies, relations with which continue to be cordial but otherwise inconsequential.


Coda


