INTRODUCTION

Worldwide, UFO reports increased in 1965. The British Gordon Creighton, writing in respect to South America UFO phenomenology for 1965, described it as a "vast flap" (1). Nevertheless, contemporary records provide a different perspective. According to Larry Hatch's *UFO* database, one of the two largest in the world, in 1965 UFO cases doubled the yearly average for the period 1961-1964. However the decade of sixties had its peak year in 1967, when incoming events in turn doubled the number of reports generated in 1965 (2).

As far as photographic UFO incidents are concerned, we also find a strong elevation in the number of cases between 1965 and 1968, as authenticated by the latest FOTOCAT records (3).

Coincidentally, my preparation of a specific catalogue of UFO photography in Argentina met with the interest of the current issue of *La Gazette Fortéenne* to commemorate the 40th anniversary of year 1965, and I gladly accepted the king invitation from the editor to write what it is now the second technical report of the FOTOCAT project.

At the scale of the (photographic) UFO reporting micro universe, year 1965 in Argentina meant a huge augment with regard to the precedent years of the decade. An average of 3 cases per year increased to none less than 45! It then went down drastically and it did not reach a similar level until wave year 1968 (4).

Therefore, 1965 has a special meaning in Argentina, and we can call it "the year



of the photos".

Moreover, Argentina has another feature of its own. Out of 6,700 actual cases in the FOTOCAT census, after the United States it is precisely Argentina the country which more reports contributes, exactly with 718 cases, almost 11% of the total input (4). This is due to the intense effort we have invested to review all informative sources of the Argentinean ufology, as well as by the outstanding cooperation we have received from local researchers.

The following catalogue has a structure resembling to the report previously released on 1954 (5), yet we have provided more data per case, reflecting the full content of the FOTOCAT database, and adding a brief description of the observed phenomena. When the photographer works for the press, the media is identified, so highlighting the need to consult the image archives of these publications in order to recover photographic documentation of potential value. Also, when the camera person did not saw anything at the time of the

photograph, this odd feature is noted, because it suggests keys for a possible explanation.

Always when a photograph is available we have included it in the catalogue. I expect we will not infringe any active copyright, by the large number of years passed and by the fact that the author of the takes is always mentioned, as well as the newspaper or magazine where it was originally issued. As to the references, we are listing all information sources we know.

Basically I have played here the compiler's role, yet I have not excluded the analyst's role when there seemed to be obvious or probable explanations for the sightings. In fact, 16 out of 23 solved reports were concluded by the team of author's collaborators.

I make a call to UFO researchers, either from Argentina or any other country, to let us know any further information that serve to improve this catalogue to follow, or any comment on the nature of the UFO observations.







Special Photo Features: The photographs failed because the low sensitivity of the film, the dark, the distance and because the strong wind made it impossible to set up the camera for time exposure photography.

UFO Description: A round and oval shaped object of solid appearance with a red center and ill defined edges of changing colors (yellow, green, orange, blue and white). Moving al low speed during 62 minutes, including halting, oscillating, shining, disappearing and reappearing. Like a brilliant iridescent star, it was more brilliant than a first magnitude star. It was also noticed above the *stratus* clouds and below a cloud layer of *cirrus*, finally disappearing in altitude and distance. Initial azimuth

of 340° (NNW) and 30° elevation over the horizon, final azimuth of 335° (NNW) and 35°, estimated distance 20-30 kilometers.

Explanation: Probably astronomical. In that area of the sky there were three bodies subject to be the stimulus for a misinterpretation: planet Mars (magnitude 0.8, azimuth 322° and 22.5° elevation) and stars Spica (magnitude 0.98, azimuth 340° and 36.5° elevation) and Arcturus (magnitude -0.04, azimuth 357° and 7.5° elevation). By position and general color, Mars could perfectly match, yet Spica is relatively closer. Other observers who were present during the sighting did not view anything beyond normal. The main witness, Hugo Stanich, had already watched an unidentified light for a few seconds in the same position on June 8th. In the epoch, this sighting was fully minimized and discredited by the national Space Commission, Research the Hydrographic Institute, as well as by astronomers from Argentina and Chile, who explained it as the observation of natural or astronomical phenomena.

Remarks: This was the last in a series of 7 sightings in the area starting June 7, 1965.

At 17,03 hours in the nearby South Orkney Islands Argentinean Navy post, two magnetometers recorded sudden disturbances of the magnetic field. Scientists from the Condon Committee examined the magnetograms and concluded that the magnetic deviation recorded was well within normal daily fluctuations.

Carlos Demaría affirms it all was a mistake on the part of the military personnel, one that was never disclosed by fear of ridicule. Jan Aldrich recalls a summary of an intelligence report in Blue Book files which said "Chilean astronomers thought that stars and planets were responsible for the sightings". Indeed, reports from the British Antarctic Survey and from the Catholic University of Chile's Astronomical Observatory indicated that observations were made by untrained persons which should be taken with reservations.






He climbed on his pick-up truck to take his camera on his brother's house, then the two were pursuing the UFO until it gained speed, when they stopped the car and Mr. Taboada took one picture with a Siletti camera, 35 mm, 2.8 focused to the infinite and with 3 seconds exposure. Then he returned home in order to process it in his laboratory. To his surprise what the film showed was "something similar to a TV screen, this is a rectangle with perpendicular stripes"

Explanation: The consensus researchers like Guillermo Roncoroni and Roberto Banchs points to a fraud, being the photograph of a TV screen.




Figure 7 Bahía Blanca (Buenos Aires), July 4, 1965. Up in the right it is visible the "on" pilot light of a TV set of the Zenith type. (Courtesy Carlos Ferguson).

It was a luminous object of changing colors, yellow, blue and reddish, with the apparent size of a first magnitude star, placed in the SW (some press sources erroneously mention SE) and slowly moving to South. It was viewed for 20 minutes until it was occulted behind some clouds.

Explanation: At that time and sky zone there was visible the Canopus star (the second most bright star in the night sky), with -0.72 magnitude and precisely moving in South direction.



luminosity F 2.5, Kodak Plus X film, diaphragm 2.5 and distance to infinite. One picture was taken with a 30-sec exposure, the rest at 1/15 sec. The Director of the Bahía Blanca Astronomical Observatory reported that "the track left by the UFO displacement registered by the first photograph might correspond to the rotation of the Earth", although he discarded then the possibility it is due to planet Venus because "it needs a minimum exposure of 40 seconds".

This photographer will take several more UFO pictures in the days to come.

Object was equal to that seen on the previous day: "luminous, changing colors yellow, blue, red and white" and moving from the Southwest to the South. However, what the pictures show is a big object shaped like a half circle.

Explanation: Was it the Moon, half-covered by clouds, what Mr. Palma photographed this time? The Moon, practically in full phase, was visible at that time in the East with an elevation of 17°.




Figure 10Bahía Blanca (Buenos Aires), July 15, 1965 (Courtesy *Así* magazine, July 27, 1965).

UFO Description: After taking the prior pictures, José Palma drove to the State Gas Plant in Puerto Galván (4 km from Bahía Blanca), where he took 12 photographs over one hour, until 22,00 hours when the object vanished after some clouds. The UFO emitted intermittent luminosities of colors red, blue, violet and yellow.

Explanation: As the July 14 event, it seems to be produced by the sighting of Canopus star (5° elevation in the SSW), yet in this occasion more emphasis has been given to the apparition of a lens flare in two of the pictures.

Remarks: The released photograph is one of the two where, in addition to the observed light point, a translucent, whipping top-shaped body appears above it, probably due to a lens flare, one which was not seen by the photographer. The pictures were taken with a *Cannon* camera of 35 mm with a teleobjective of 135 mm.

Explanation: Again, the picture shows a huge body, now fully circular in shape. It does not seem unreasonable to think that it was the Moon, in full phase, which at this time was evident high in the NNE sky (69°).

and since then "half city witnessed the apparition" of an object "of big size and mainly reddish-colored" which was visible in the evening sky. 50 employees of El Mundo newspaper reached the building's tower to see an object "suspended motionless in the sky" (yet the pictures revealed two). It was three or four times brighter than a star, a "clear rotation movement was perceived and, its light grew intensity intermittently". It was static for 15 minutes to later move towards the Northwest, getting lost then



by the buildings around (descending). The newspaper's photographer, with a *Speed Graphic* 10X12 ½ camera, with a teleobjective of 38 cm, took three pictures in 4 minutes, 10 seconds (a doubtful statement, by the way), with time exposures of 70, 80 and 100 seconds. In one of the plates it was evident the stroke left by the movement of two luminous objects.

Explanation: Analyst Juan Carlos Victorio has established it was the observation of planet Venus, on the right, lower and much brighter (angular height 2° 39', magnitude -3.8, azimuth 292°) and the emergence of Mercury, on the left and higher (elevation 4° 30′, magnitude 0.4 and azimuth 290°). Remarks: Naturally, the eyewitness misinterpretation was due to a notoriously brilliant planet Venus and the long-exposure plates noted the presence of Mercury as well. The planets' astronomical setting was at 19,05 (Venus) and 19,14 (Mercury). By reasons that escape to us, the newspaper released the 3 photos in an erroneous sequence. As Larry Robinson has wisely advised, the first published photograph is in reality the third in the sequence and the third published photo was actually the first one taken.




Figure 13.2Buenos Aires City (Federal Capital), July 16, 1965, second picture by Carlos Díaz, exposed 100 secs (Courtesy *El Mundo*, July 17, 1965).




Figure 13.4Buenos Aires City (Federal Capital), July 16, 1965, enlargement of the first picture by Carlos Díaz (V.J. Ballester Olmos archives).






Figure 17.1Resistencia (Chaco), July 17, 1965. How the pictures were originally published (Courtesy *Así*, July 30, 1965).









Figure 20.2 Villa Rosa, Bahía Blanca (Buenos Aires), July 19, 1965 (Courtesy *Crónica*, September 18, 1968).






Figure 20.3Villa Rosa, Bahía Blanca (Buenos Aires), July 19, 1965, rotated 180°, as it was originally published in *Crónica*, July 25, 1965 (V.J.Ballester Olmos archives).








Figure 33.1September 5, 1965, Buenos Aires City (Federal Capital). (Courtesy *Crónica*, September 11, 1965).





Reyna, personal communication to V.J. Ballester Olmos, May 28, 1969). The telescope optics is unknown.

UFO Description: Jesuit Priest Segundo Benito Reyna, director of the Adhara observatory informs: "some calls (according to another version from him, it was only one call) asked if we have noted something unusual over the Moon, as they were seeing dark spots passing over it. We responded that the telescope ocular was busy as Luis Ferro was taking pictures. After processing the first five pictures nothing strange appeared, all neat and beautiful pictures, but in the sixth this UFO flotilla emerged. Photos were being taken every 4 minutes, with 35 mm panchromatic film, at a speed of 1/50 secs". The photograph shows 3 dark shadows over the Moon surface ("three very clear UFOs in the low atmosphere, one is deformed by diffraction"). For father Reyna, in addition to these 5 more could be seen, two in couples and one isolated, objects that were not over the Moon but objects that crossed between the telescope and the Moon while they were flying in the Earth' s atmosphere. **Explanation:** The UFOs appeared only

after processing the photograph and probably a fault in the processing or a



flaw in the negative produced the dark of the Lunar topography (from up to down): (1) *Mare Frigoris*, over the crater

Remarks: The shadows over the Moon surface are placed in the following areas

of the Lunar topography (from up to down): (1) *Mare Frigoris*, over the crater Baillaud, one of which sides is seen through the shadow; (2) *Mare Imbrium*, above crater Archimedes and right in front of Aristilus, exactly over mounts Spitzbergensis, which are clearly visible through the shadow (while father Reyna had written to me: "the one in the center shows its helmet or upper tower, very suggestive"!), and (3) on the *Sinus Medii*, in the area called Oppolzer.

The Adhara was a private, amateur observatory owned by Luis Ferro (he who took another UFO photograph in 1967 and was witness to several other sightings), unrelated to any scientific institution, one that cannot be mistaken with the Observatory of Cosmic Physics of San Miguel, of the Jesuit Fathers. In fact, the scientific director of this institution published an open letter in an astronomy journal to state that he "does not share neither the opinions nor the methodology of this independent priest" (reference to Segundo B. Reyna). In summary, same error as to associate contactee George Adamski with Mount




Palomar Observatory because he had a telescope in the coffee shop where he worked as a cook, located in the mount's slopes.




Figure 44December 2, 1965, Lomas de Zamora (Buenos Aires). (Courtesy *La* Razón, June 22, 1968).

ANALYSIS

Overview

The 44 cases have generated 45 different series of photographs (on August 3, 1965, two friends were together when they took pictures with their two cameras at the same time). Therefore, all statistics refer to 45 events.

A general comment seems to be to military and scientific representatives

pertinent. It has to do with the artificiality of this wave, one that -in our opinion- was provoked by the media. The reporting environment was already heated by the publicity given to the events of the Chilean and Argentinean bases in the Deception Island (Antarctica) on July 3, 1965 (and previous dates), that produced Navy press releases and published interviews to military and scientific representatives



to comment upon the facts. On July 4 the Bahía Blanca photographic fake was produced, one that achieved notoriety in the popular press. At mid month, the press reporter José Palma, also from Bahía Blanca, bombarded during a few days in a row newspapers and magazines with several photographs of alleged UFOs. Local and national media gave considerable publicity to these sightings.

It is now, when planet Venus happen to bright strongly in the sky, when the press reporters from Federal Capital -as expected- jump to scene with several series of UFO pictures ("flying saucers", of course). This, in turn, unnerve to their colleagues in provinces to finalize with a festival of photos UFOs posing in the most tourist spots of Buenos Aires City, obtained by any self-esteemed professional photographer, in an agitated period reaching to mid October. In total, 90 days of a true UFO-media folly.

We still lack a number of press reports generated in Argentina in 1965, although we have collected a terrific

documentation, but we can categorically state that the press coverage was faulty. The information content on photographic events was scanty and poor, both on the sightings themselves and on the pictures achieved. Many times the photos were badly printed or carried imprecise or wrong data (we feel some times these were done on purpose). The epoch' s UFO researchers slept on the cases -or they were exceeded by them-, as there is no track record of actual field investigations or laboratory analyses, in spite of the fact that the newspapers offered the negatives to experts for study (perhaps they knew such experts really did not exist?) There is no clue neither that those cases were re-inquired in the following years.

Some of the events became international news celebrities. For example, the photographs taken over Buenos Aires City on July 16. These, duly enlarged, presented a strangeness they do not actually own, given its astronomical nature. On the specialized level, the plate obtained from a private observatory in San Miguel on December



1, thoroughly spread out by father Segundo B. Reyna, was published in all UFO journals in the world. Another fiasco. These only received due criticism by Antonio Ribera and Marius Lleget, two Spanish UFO writers, not known precisely for their skeptical stand.

Repeaters

From the ufological standpoint, 1965 was the year of the press photographers. No professional photographer wanted to be absent at the time of providing evidence of the existence of flying saucers. The list of photographic reporters is ample, compared with the pictures taken by citizens not associated to media. Out of 39 cases where the name of the photographer is known, 25 were achieved by photographers by trade (19 of them, press photographers). If more information was available, I am convinced that the proportion of press photographers would increase.

In ufology, the term *repeater* describes the person who claims to see UFOs frequently, which is regarding with skepticism. In Argentina in 1965 we have also some fortunate mortals who filmed UFOs reiteratively, defying what it is the normal standard in people who witness a strange phenomena and was lucky enough to film it: the experience is not repeated. But there are persons who bring forward series after series of photographs (or video recordings lately) with images of these elusive visitors. Generally, the worldwide consensus is to reject such images because in most cases these are created by the authors in some way or the other.

In the Argentina 1965 catalog, we find that 4 persons only were the protagonists of 16 cases and got UFO pictures more than once:

Generally generated by astronomical stimuli, several of these incidents



are still not solved due to the limited information available. If pictures of obvious heavenly bodies or simple lens flares were not recognized by the plate authors it is due to clear ignorance or to their interest to sell sensational images, we leave it up to the reader's judgment.


Monthly Distribution

Graph 1 shows the scattering by month of the 43 events where the exact occurrence date is known. Being a media-related wave, it shows an acute start and a soft declining, paralleling the extenuation of the popular interest and the stories are news no more.

Graph 2 compares the number of reports by month, depending if they are considered solved (IFO) or not solved (UFO). Most of the July month events are solved, but this is not true for the following cases, probably because of missing data for a proper evaluation.

Time Distribution

Graph 3 presents the classical distribution of cases by time of the day, for 33 events where the hour is known,




plus a comparison between 18 solved and 15 unsolved cases. The hourly curve of explained events shows a significant peak in the 18-21 hour period (night-time misidentifications due to astronomical stimuli), while UFO reports show a much more imprecise distribution, yet also centered on evening and night hours.

Explained and Unexplained Cases

Graph 4 shows, by type, the number and proportion of cases that have been solved to date (23) with regard to those cases which remain a mystery (22). From the various classes of explanations, astronomical confusions hold the best part (16), being Venus the typical culprit (9), which is no surprise to us at this stage.

The Bright of Venus

Graph 5 shows the transit of Venus on the 15th day of every month this planet was visible from Buenos Aires, at 18,45 hours. We have plotted its elevation (angular height), an uprising curve until November, and its magnitude (bright). Venus was outstandingly luminous in




the sky between July and November. In the graph the 9 times when a UFO sighting was explained as Venus are also plotted.
