Biographical Information

Theodore D. Boal was born in 1867 in Iowa City, Iowa, the son of George Jack Boal and Malvina Amanda Buttles Boal. Boal's great-grandfather founded the town of Boalsburg, Penn and his parents were wealthy pioneer families. Boal's parents moved to Denver in 1874(?). Boal was sent to live with his uncle, Theodore M. Davis (an Egyptologist famous for his excavations in the Valley of the Kings) on Davis's 18 acre estate in Newport, Rhode Island, called the Reefs. Boal attended private schools and received a degree in architecture form Iowa State University in 1889. He then traveled extensively in Europe.

In 1891 Boal opened a practice with Charles Herbert Lee in Denver and the firm designed St. Peter's Episcopal at 126 West 2nd in Denver and the Lowell Elementary School in Colorado Springs that year. Boal appears to have spent most of his time touring Europe and the east coast, occasionally garnering commissions from the well-to-do circles in which he traveled, leaving most of the work to Lee. The firm dissolved bitterly in 1894. The same year Boal met and married Mathilde Denis de LaGarde, an aristocrat and descendant of Christopher Columbus. She and Boal lived in Tours de Chignon, France for the next four years with Boal spending his time lecturing to society and professional groups on architecture.
