- I. General Statement:
- A. Architectural Character: Ashleigh is a fine example of a Greek Revival country house.
 - B. Condition of the Fabric: Excellent.
- II. Description of the Exterior:
- A. Over-all dimensions: The one-story three-bay gable-end main block is flanked by a one-story two-bay wing to the east and the west. The house is set into the slope of the hill so that the basement becomes a full story under the main block and the west wing on the south side.
 - B. Foundations: Stone
- C. Wall construction and finish: Stone covered with stucco painted yellow.
- D. Structural system: Stone masonry walls with wood framing.
- E. Porches: A one-bay Greek Doric portico, with four columns and two pilasters and with a shallow pediment, is at the level of the main floor. Wooden steps ascend to the porch. A cast-iron balcony surrounds the porch and is also found under each of the long windows on the south side of the main level.
- F. Chimneys: An interior-end chimney is found at either end of the main block. Each wing has a center chimney.
 - G. Openings:
- 1. Doorways and doors: The doorway at the entrance has architrave trim and crossets. A rectangular four-pane transom, three-pane sidelights and symmetrically molded trim with corner blocks frame the six-paneled door.
- 2. Windows: Architrave trim surrounds the windows. Wooden double hung windows retain the original six-over-six sash. Two triple-hung large windows are in the south wall of the drawing room. French windows open on the gound level of the south side.
- H. Roof: The low gable roof has a pedimented end with a simple molded raking board and cornice. The gable roofs on the wings have a similar cornice and short returns.
- III. Description of the Interior:
- A. Floor plan: A long entrance hall stretches across the north end of the main block. The parlor south of the entrance hall occupies the rest of the main block and was at one time divided into two rooms. The first floor of the wings is three steps lower than that of the main block. A hall runs north-south in each of the wings and two rooms open to one side off each hall. The kitchen and boiler room are under the west wing. The main block has a plan similar to the first floor, although retaining the two rooms. The lower level east wing is partially unexcavated; the remainder incorporates storage space.
 - B. Stairway: A two-run stair descends to the lower

level in the northeast corner of the west wing.

- C. Wall and ceiling finish: Most of the plastered walls are covered with wallpaper. Plaster ceilings are painted.
- D. Doorways and doors: Doorways have a wide architrave trim, crossets and a second architrave trim around the opening. The soffits are paneled. The doors have two narrow vertical panels.
- E. Trim: A wide baseboard is topped by a series of moldings in most of the rooms. The lower level southeast room is pine-paneled with a full cornice. Pilasters frame the French doors leading to the terrace.
- F. Heating: Although central heating is currently employed, fireplaces in every room formerly provided warmth. In the drawing room, the fireplaces at each end of the room have a molded surround, crossets, bolection molding, band of egg and dart trim and a wide shelf. The unchanged fireplaces in the wings and on the lower level have simple pilasters and a pentagonal frieze. The mantel in the northwest room of the west wing is a later addition taken from an early Valley house and features a central sunburst, a blossom motif and fluted pilasters. The mantel in the pine room matches the paneling and features fluted pilasters and a bolection molding.

IV. Site:

- A. General setting: Ashleigh faces north, is set on a hill, surrounded by about one hundred acres of farmland, and has a magnificent view in all directions. The westward vista to the mountains is especially noteworthy. Boxwood highlight the yard which is enclosed by post and split rail fences.
- B. Outbuildings: A yellow clapboarded building set on a high stone base serves as the garage-apartment and is west of the main house.

Ashleigh is a striking Greek Revival country house built for Margaret Marshall, granddaughter of Chief Justice John Marshall. Well conceived and skillfully executed, the house exhibits unacademic proportions and pleasing simplicity of detail. Basically unaltered, Ashleigh remains one of the most

distinctive ante-bellum homesteads of northern Virginia.

Margaret Marshall received a portion of the Marshall family's Oak Hill estate and had Ashleigh built about 1840. She designed the house herself, and a man by the name of Sutton, who built many other houses in the area, was the builder. A tradition is that Margaret Marshall received ideas about the plan on a trip through the deep South, and indeed the house is more reminiscent of the Greek Revival villas of Alabama and Mississippi than any house in Virginia. In 1845, Miss Marshall married her cousin, John Thomas Smith. They lived at Ashleigh until 1860 when the place was sold to Gray Carroll, a relative of the Marshalls. Most of the payment was made in Confederate money, and thus the Smiths never received full value for the house. Carroll sold the property in 1870 to Samuel P. Bayly.

Mrs. Katharine G. Ingersoll owned Ashleigh in the first part of the twentieth century, but Dr. Edmund Horgan purchased and renovated the house in 1929. During the renovation, Dr. Horgan obtained pine paneling removed from the White House during the Hoover Administration, and installed it in Ashleigh's lower southeast room.
