Selected Grants

- A co-principal investigator in a proposal to the National Science Foundation to conduct text-mining analysis of five US presidential speeches about democratization in the Arab and Muslim world. We seek a \$54,000 external fund from National Science Foundation to collect and analyze data using text-mining techniques. The project aims at gauging the commitment of US foreign policy makers (the presidents, vice presidents, secretaries of state, secretaries of defense and their spokespersons) to issues such as democracy, human rights, and causes of freedoms in the Muslim world. The project is set to search for patterns and fluctuations in the positions of five administrations: Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, George H. Bush, Bill Clinton, and George W. Bush. The technique of text mining is a break-through in the area of text analysis. We are confident that we are filling a huge gap in both making this kind of texts available for analysis and in producing several articles and books.
- I received fund to found and direct the Arab Electronic Library (www.arabelibrary.net) which is an Arab equivalent to the JSTOR. This is an extremely prestigious and ambitious project funded by the Arab League (the initial fund is around \$700,000 for the first 5 years).
- Grant to fund a project entitled *In the Name of Allah: The Contemporary Islamic Discourse in the Arab World* by the Arab League's Arab Women Organization. The fund allocated to this project is around \$ 25,000 including conducting discourse analysis and interviews with the most influential imams and Muslim scholars in ten Arab countries. I am in the final stages of writing a book based on these findings.
