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INTRODUCTION

The Paul Hoy Helms Library in Liberal Adult Education was established under a grant from the Fund for Adult Education to Syracuse University in 1957.

The grant was made by the Fund as a tribute to the memory of Paul Hoy Helms, who served on its Board of Directors for almost six years, from its establishment until his death, and as Vice-Chairman during the second. At the request of the family, the Library found its home at Syracuse University, from which Mr. Helms had graduated in 1912.

To develop a library requires an answer to the question, "What is liberal adult education?" There is a continuing debate on a definition because liberally educated persons can not fully agree, and accordingly each makes his own. In this case, it is appropriate to use a formal statement of the Directors of the FAE as follows: "Liberal education, in the Fund's definition, is primarily concerned with stimulation of basic curiosity, imagination, and the habit of critical thought as opposed to the passive acceptance of ready-made opinions. In the United States, where suffrage is universal, it must be available for the many, not merely for the few."

From the beginning, members of the faculty were involved in deciding the nature of the collected selection of books. In 1967 Dr. William Pearson Tolley, then Chancellor, wrote: "One of the unexpected outcomes of the grant was its impact on members of the faculty as well as students. Literally scores of faculty members have had a part in the final selection of volumes to be added. I know of no other library project at Syracuse that has enlisted the continuing interest and assistance of so many members of the faculty and staff."

It was decided that the collection would be limited to books. Each item bears a bookplate indicating that it is part of the Helms Library. The collection is now integrated into the recently dedicated Ernest S. Bird Library. Numbers preceding titles presented on the following pages conform to the classification scheme of

Bird Library. The E.S. Bird Library uses the Library of Congress classification system as its basic format for cataloguing the materials it receives each year. Some materials however, have been catalogued under the Dewey Decimal System, and have not been converted to the Library of Congress System.

The Fund's grant, with interest, was to be expended over a period of fifteen years. Those years are now over and this year the Fund was legally dissolved. But the Fund's influence endures in the lives of those whom its activities affected. One of those activities was the establishment of the Helms Library.

Interested people from the University and the Community have been encouraged to use the Helms Library for Independent Study, even before Independent Study became the popular expression. You, too, are invited to enter into the endless dialogue with the best minds concerning the most important question, of which one is, what it means to be a human being — a free human being.
