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Shamy: The sun never sets on the Winooski legacy

In China, Onion City is the Land of the Giant Umbrella

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Chen Bai lives in Shanghai, China. That's a port city of nearly 20 million people, vast beyond comprehension.

It is also very far from Winooski — pretty much on the direct opposite side of the planet.

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This makes things difficult for Chen Bai, mythbuster.

Bai was reading in a sixth-grade school textbook all about Winooski, the remarkable Vermont city with a canopy covering the entire community. Included with the text is even an illustration, the billowing canopy anchored to an 11-story building that towers over the Onion City.

Reaching Chen Bai via e-mail proved futile, so we don't know — among other things — whether Chen Bai is the father or mother of the sixth-grader and in which class (geography? fantasy?) the Winooski item was included.

Bai was kind enough to translate the textbook entry into English. Here is an excerpt: "Wi'nooski City is a small town in the state of Vermont, U.S. It is located at the junction of the Northeast U.S. and Canada. The local popula'tion is less than 20,000. It is harsh climate with biting wind and heavy snow every winter there. But in 1980, a giant umbrella was launched in the sky of Winooski, all the urban constructions, such as hous'ing, roads, bridges, squares, green spaces, etc., with the area about 36 million square meters of, were under the giant um'brella. With this canopy, residents are no longer afraid of the harsh winter....The city under the giant umbrella is so famous in the United States and around world. Winooski becomes a new hot spot for tourist. Every winter visitors from everywhere come and meet together under the canopy of the Giant Umbrella."

Chen Bai, eager to learn if this Giant Umbrella over Winooski was legit, on Wednesday fired an e-mail query around the globe to www.virtualvermont.com, a Web site hosted out of Richford by Matt Wills. Wills describes the site as an Internet magazine, and it contains information about every single Vermont munici'pality including the City of the Giant Umbrella.

Wills explained to Chen Bai that the story is rooted in a tiny grain of truth.

In 1979, three or four energy crises ago, Winooski applied to the U.S. Department of Energy for a grant to study the construction of a huge clear

Four hundred homes would be fitted with solar panels or weatherized. The Winooski Golden Onion Dome Club was formed. Inquiries poured in from around the globe, and R. Buck'minster Fuller, the visionary engineer and father of the geodesic dome, visited St. Michael's College to talk about

> By May 1980, the feds had told Winooski to take a hike — there would be no grant money forthcoming. After Ronald Reagan took office in January 1981, a flurry of activity aimed at res'urrecting the dome application was greeted from D.C. with an even more stern don't-even-think-about-it.

The dome died prematurely, but its legacy had grown legs in China and stubbornly lingers to this day.

"You may not know that the story is very popular around main'land China," Chen Bai wrote to Wills in Richford.

It fell to Wills to burst Bai's bubble — everything you read in a textbook isn't necessarily true. Nothing against Chinese text'books. Same surely goes here stateside.

"There is no giant umbrella, never has been," Wills wrote back.

"No tourists come to see anything (Winooski has been under going changes in its downtown area; it's a decent place, but there's no tourist attraction of that sort)," he wrote. "Residents deal with winter the same as everyone else

And their electronic exchange ended with Bai's vow: "Now I will try to clean the fake story."

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. But no, Chen Bai, there's no Giant Umbrella over Winooski.
