Spring Itinerary:

Spring drills are scheduled to run from March 19 through April 11. Coach Dave Wannstedt has scheduled 15 practice sessions. The Annual Blue-Gold Game is scheduled for Saturday, April 11, at Heinz Field. All spring practices are open to the media.

Interviews:

POSITIONAL BREAKDOWN

THE OFFENSE

OUARTERBACK

WHO'S BACK: Senior **Bill Stull** was Pitt's starter in 2008, completing 57% of his passes (188 of 330) for 2,356 yards with nine touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He was part of four come-from-behind victories in the final quarter, including what might have been his finest outing, a nationally televised Thursday night win at No. 10 USF when Stull threw for 228 yards (16-of-27 passing) and a TD with no interceptions.

Junior **Pat Bostick** was the primary backup last season, appearing in six games and making one start when Stull was out due to injury (a 36-33 four-overtime victory at Notre Dame). Bostick completed 22-of-41 passes for 270 yards with one TD and four interceptions on the year. He made eight starts as a true freshman in 2007. **Tino Sunseri** enters his first active season after redshirting as a true freshman. Sunseri was an all-state performer at nearby Pittsburgh Central Catholic as a high school senior. Sophomore walk-on **Andrew Janocko** also returns.

WHO'S GONE: Greg Cross, who appeared in two games in specialized packages last season, will move to wide receiver for his senior year.

NOTABLE: Pitt signal callers will be under the tutelage of new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Frank Cignetti, a 20-year coaching veteran who held similar posts at Cal, North Carolina and Fresno State.

RUNNING BACK

WHO'S BACK: One of the most watched position battles of the offseason figures to be at Pitt's tailback spot, where LeSean McCoy starred the past two seasons before departing for the NFL.

Competition in the spring will include redshirt freshman **Chris Burns**, junior **Kevin Collier**, sophomore **Shariff Harris** and freshman **Dion Lewis**, a December high school graduate (New Jersey's Blair Academy) who enrolled at Pitt in January. Only Collier and Harris have carried the ball on the collegiate level.

Sophomore **Henry Hynoski** will look to elevate into the starting full-back role after lettering as a reserve last season. Also vying for time will be sophomore **Brandon Lindsey**, who lettered at linebacker last year, and junior walk-on **Joe Capp**, a transfer from Texas Tech in his first active season at Pitt.

WHO'S GONE: LeSean McCoy will go down as one of Pitt's all-time best after rushing for 2,816 yards and scoring 36 touchdowns in two collegiate seasons. The unanimous All-Big East selection was the nation's second-leading scorer last year (9.69 points/game) and ranked 10th in rushing (114.46 yards/game). Also gone is dependable LaRod Stephens-Howling, a productive complement to McCoy, and Conredge Collins, a three-year starter at fullback.

NOTABLE: LeSean McCoy is the first Pitt tailback to declare early for the NFL Draft since Curtis Martin in 1995.

WIDE RECEIVERS

WHO'S BACK: The top two producers at split end last year are back in sophomore Jonathan Baldwin and senior Oderick Turner, both big targets who can go up and get the ball in traffic. Baldwin averaged a teambest 22.4 yards per catch (18 rec. for 404 yards) and tied for the team lead with three receiving touchdowns. Turner had 21 catches for 298 yards (14.2 avg.) and one TD. Sophomore Aaron Smith and redshirt freshman Mike Shanahan will push for time at this spot. Redshirt frosh Caleb Wilson is also in the mix at split end.

Competition for the starting flanker job will revolve around a trio of returning lettermen, including seniors **T.J. Porter** and **Cedric McGee** as

well as sophomore **Aundre Wright**. Porter (25 rec., 357 yards) might be the receiving corps most explosive athlete, while McGee (23 rec., 201 yards) has been lauded as the unit's toughest and most dependable performer. Wright distinguished himself on special teams last year and also earned increased time in multiple-receiver packages. Additionally, redshirt freshman **Cameron Saddler** will battle for time at flanker. New to the receiving corps will be senior **Greg Cross**, who played quarterback as a first-year junior-college transfer last season. The athletic Cross will work at both receiver positions this spring.

WHO'S GONE: Derek Kinder, a past All-Big East honoree, finished his career as one of the most productive receivers ever at Pitt, ranking in the top 10 in all-time receptions (131) and receiving yards (1,646).

NOTABLE: As a true freshman last year, Jonathan Baldwin was responsible for two of the top three longest touchdown receptions by the Panthers, a 60-yard touchdown catch at Navy and 52-yard score at USF. (Senior Derek Kinder had the longest scoring catch of the year, a 61-yarder at Connecticut.)

TIGHT ENDS

WHO'S BACK: Pitt boasts a deep and experienced group at tight end with the return of three senior lettermen. Nate Byham returns as one of the country's best at the position after earning first team All-Big East last year. Byham led Pitt's tight ends with 20 catches for 260 yards (13.0 avg.) and a TD. John Pelusi (five rec., 37 yards) is a tough blocker with good hands, while the athletic Dorin Dickerson (13 rec., 174 yards and two TDs) is capable of stretching the field like a wide receiver. Additionally, Mike Cruz and Justin Virbitsky enter their first active seasons following freshman redshirts.

POSITIONAL BREAKDOWN

WHO'S GONE: Pitt returns each of its tight ends from last season.

NOTABLE: Nate Byham is the first Pitt tight end to earn first-team All-Big East honors and just the third to be honored on the all-conference team overall. The Panthers' last honoree at tight end was Kris Wilson, a second-team pick, in 2003.

OFFENSIVE LINE

WHO'S BACK: Four starters return on the offensive line, making this one of Pitt's most promising units.

The tackle spots will again be manned by junior **Jason Pinkston** on the left side and senior **Joe Thomas** on the right. Pinkston enters his second year as a starter, while Thomas has 27 career starts on Pitt's offensive front.

Senior **John Malecki** enters his second season as the starter at right guard after making a highly successful transition last year from defensive tackle. Also back is senior center **Robb Houser**, who started the season's first seven games before suffering a season-ending ankle fracture.

Leading candidates to fill the vacant left guard spot are sophomores **Chris Jacobson** and **Greg Gaskins**. Vying to provide depth at right guard are junior **Jared Martin** and redshirt freshman **Ryan Turnley**. Senior walk-on **Josh Novotny** will also take reps at guard.

Junior letterman **Alex Karabin** will push for time at center behind Houser. Sophomore **Wayne Jones** will also look to be a factor at this position.

Promising sophomore **Lucas Nix**, who lettered as a true frosh last year, will provide strong competition and depth at tackle. Also challenging for time at the tackle spots will be sophomores **Jordan Gibbs**, **Dan Matha** and **John Fieger**.

WHO'S GONE: All-Big East performer C.J. Davis was a four-year fixture on Pitt's offensive line, making 43 consecutive starts. In addition to durability, Davis also provided versatility, moving from left guard to center for the final six contests of the 2008 season when injuries struck. Dom Williams, who emerged as a starter at guard with Davis' switch, has also departed.

NOTABLE: Pitt's offensive line helped departed tailback LeSean McCoy produce back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons in 2007 and '08. The last time the Panthers had a 1,000-yard rusher in consecutive years was 1993-94.

THE DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE

WHO'S BACK: This is Pitt's deepest and perhaps most talented defensive front in recent memory.

The Panthers' defensive end tandem of juniors **Greg Romeus** and **Jabaal Sheard** should receive consideration as one of the nation's best. Romeus was an All-Big East pick after compiling 51 tackles, 15.5 TFLs and a team-high 7.5 sacks. He additionally blocked three extra points. Sheard was extremely productive as well last season with 45 tackles, 10.5 TFLs and 5.5 sacks. An exceptional pass rusher, he had a team-high 11 QB hurries and deflected seven passes.

Pitt boasts excellent depth behind its standout ends. Junior **Tyler Tkach** and sophomore **Tony Tucker** have both lettered in primary reserve roles. Also providing depth is sophomore letterman **Justin Hargrove** and redshirt freshman **Shayne Hale**. Senior **Doug Fulmer** will seek a healthy return to active duty after missing the past two seasons due to injuries.

The Panthers are equally strong on the interior with a pair of seniors anchoring the starting spots. **Mick Williams** is a returning starter at defensive tackle, while **Gus Mustakas** mans the nose tackle position. Compet-

ing behind Williams are senior lettermen **Craig Bokor** and **Tommie Duhart**. Pushing for time at the nose will be sophomores **Myles Caragein**, who saw significant action as a backup last year, and **Chas Alecxih**. Two walk-ons, senior **Derrell Jones** and redshirt frosh **Keith Coleman**, are also in the tackle mix.

WHO'S GONE: Rashaad Duncan, Pitt's Most Valuable Defensive Lineman, was a three-year starter at nose tackle.

NOTABLE: Greg Romeus concluded his all-star sophomore campaign by being selected the Sun Bowl's Most Valuable Lineman. Romeus had four tackles, two quarterback sacks (for minus 20 yards) and another QB hurry in helping to limit Oregon State to just three points.

LINEBACKERS

WHO'S BACK: This unit will need the most retooling with the loss of two highly productive starters.

The biggest hole is in the middle, where All-America Scott McKillop must be replaced. Potential candidates include senior **Steve Dell** and redshirt freshman **Joe Trebitz**. Dell boasts the most experience, having earned three letters as a reserve at both the Mike and Sam positions.

Pitt must also fill a vacancy at Will linebacker. Senior **Shane Murray** was a starter at this position in 2007 before being sidelined for all but one game last year with a knee injury. Expected to make a healthy return, Murray has the skills and smarts to also contribute at middle linebacker. With Murray's possible switch, look for the Will competition to revolve around sophomore lettermen **Max Gruder** and **Tristan Roberts** and redshirt freshman **Manny Williams**.

The linebacker unit's lone returning starter is sophomore **Greg Williams**, who had a solid debut season at the Sam. Williams, a converted tailback, took over the starting role in the second game of the year for injured senior **Adam Gunn** (neck) and went on to compile 47 tackles, 6.5 TFLs and 3.5 sacks. He additionally had two interceptions, including one returned for a TD. Pitt received good news just prior to spring drills when Gunn was granted a sixth year by the NCAA. A starter at Sam in 2007, Gunn could contribute at middle linebacker as well this year. Junior letterman **Nate Nix** will push for time behind Williams. Also competing at the Sam is redshirt freshman **Jonathan Taglianetti**.

POSITIONAL BREAKDOWN

WHO'S GONE: Pitt loses its top two tacklers from a year ago in middle linebacker Scott McKillop and Will linebacker Austin Ransom. The highly decorated McKillop was one of the country's most productive defenders his final two years, leading the country in total tackles in 2007 (12.6 avg.) and ranking third in solo stops last year (6.31 avg.).

NOTABLE: Pitt boasts two first-team All-America linebackers in the past three years. Scott McKillop (2008) and H.B. Blades (2006) were both named to the Football Writers All-America Team and selected the Big East Defensive Player of the Year following their senior seasons.

SECONDARY

WHO'S BACK: The Pitt secondary returns virtually intact. Three cornerbacks with starting experience return, including senior **Aaron Berry**, an All-Big East performer last year. From his field corner spot, Berry had a team-high 10 pass breakups and was second with three interceptions. He could be poised for national accolades this year.

Senior **Jovani Chappel** returns as the starting boundary corner. Chappel made one of the biggest plays of the 2008 season when he intercepted West Virginia's Pat White, leading to two Panther touchdowns in the final eight minutes in a 19-15 Pitt victory.

Junior **Ricky Gary** gives the secondary excellent versatility with starting experience at both corner positions.

Other returning lettermen at cornerback include sophomores **Antwuan Reed** and **Buddy Jackson**. Both will work at boundary corner. **Jarred Holley** enters his first active season following a freshman redshirt and will vie for time behind Berry at the field spot.


Also back is senior walk-on **Dan Cafaro**, a special teams letterman last year, and redshirt freshman walk-on **Jeremiah Davis**.

Junior **Dom DeCicco** returns as the starter at strong safety. DeCicco led the team with four interceptions and tied for second with seven PBUs. He also was strong in run defense, collecting 56 tackles. Providing depth behind DeCicco will be redshirt freshmen **Marco Pecora** and **Ronald Hobby**.

Junior **Elijah Fields** is a leading candidate to earn the starting free safety job. Fields saw prominent time at the strong spot last year to letter. He will be pushed by senior **Irvan Brown** and sophomore **Andrew Taglianetti**. Brown is a three-year letterman, while Taglianetti distinguished himself as a true frosh by blocking three punts and seeing time in specialized secondary packages. Redshirt freshman walk-on **Justin Edwards** is also in the mix at free.

WHO'S GONE: Eric Thatcher, who finished his career with 25 consecutive starts at free safety, was lost to graduation.

NOTABLE: Pitt intercepted 16 passes in 2008, the second-highest total for the Panthers since 1996. Only the Panthers' 2004 Fiesta Bowl team had more picks (17) during that span.

THE SPECIALISTS

WHO'S BACK: Pitt will be breaking in two new specialists at place-kicker and punter this year.

Candidates at placekicker include redshirt freshman **Kevin Harper**, junior **Dan Hutchins** and junior **Luke Briggs**, who lettered as a kickoff specialist last year. Harper will be a closely watched prospect following his redshirt year. He was considered one of the country's top 10 kickers coming out of high school.

In addition to vying for the kicking duties, Hutchins could also surface as Pitt's starting punter. Contributing as a backup last year, he averaged 41 yards on two punts with a long of 47. Redshirt freshmen **Aaron Hassett** and **Pat Costello** will also compete at punter.

The Panthers also return their top return men this year. **T.J. Porter** averaged a Big East-best 11.5 yards per punt return last season, while **Aundre Wright** averaged 21 yards as Pitt's primary kickoff returner.

WHO'S GONE: Conor Lee graduated as the most accurate placekicker in Pitt history, converting 83% of his field goals and 100% of his PATs during his career. The first-team All-Big East performer handled every placement for the Panthers during the past three seasons. Also gone is Dave Brytus, a two-year starter at punter.

NOTABLE: Pitt led the country with a school-record 10 blocked kicks last year. Defensive end Greg Romeus and defensive back Andrew Taglianetti led the Panthers with three blocks each.

HEAD COACH DAVE WANNSTEDT



The 2008 season served notice that Dave Wannstedt's Pitt football program is on the rise.

Using a blueprint Wannstedt began cultivating four years ago upon taking over as head coach of his alma mater, the Panthers ascended to a 9-3 regular-season mark and second-place finish in the Big East Conference. The reward was a trip back to the postseason as Pitt received an invite to El Paso for the 2008 Sun Bowl.

All indications are that last season's success is just the beginning. With Wannstedt's recent string of strong recruiting classes, and the infusion of a winning culture at Pitt, the Panthers will look to take another significant step this year.

Winning football and postseason berths are nothing new to Wannstedt. The 34-year coaching veteran has been part of 11 bowl teams as a collegiate coach, including two undefeated national champions — the 1976 Pitt Panthers and 1987 Miami Hurricanes.

On the professional level, Wannstedt was part of six NFL playoff teams and a Super Bowl champion (the 1992 Dallas Cowboys).

Although his professional travels have taken him all over the country, Wannstedt has always considered Pittsburgh his home.

When Wannstedt speaks about Pitt and Pittsburgh, there is an unmistakable strength of conviction. He owns not one but two degrees from the University of Pittsburgh. He is a living, breathing example of a Pitt education and Pitt football.

"There might be no other coach in the country who knows the very soil beneath him better than 'Wanny,'" CBS Sportsline.com senior writer Dennis Dodd said. "Wannstedt's blood and sweat literally stain the grass at his alma mater."

"I wouldn't want to do this job anywhere else," Wannstedt said. "I love Pitt and I love the

city of Pittsburgh."

The scene outside of Wannstedt's office windows in the Pitt football practice facility provides a view that is uniquely Pittsburgh and totally fitting for the Panthers' head coach.

The immediate view is to the east, where in the foreground the Panthers' lush grass practice fields capture the eye.

Just beyond the green fields sit steel mills, a reminder of the city's industrial heritage and, for decades, the economic lifeblood of the region.

A gaze back to the west and one can soak in Pittsburgh's breathtaking skyline. The skyscrapers now symbolize the "new Pittsburgh," the former steel city that has evolved into a thriving center for corporations, medicine and higher education.

Although he spent most of the last three decades residing outside of Pittsburgh, these views still remain familiar and comforting for Wannstedt.

He, too, once worked during the summers in the mills that inhabited a stretch of land located off Pittsburgh's Second Avenue. Wannstedt would labor alongside his father, Frank, and then head to old Pitt Stadium to pump a different kind of iron in the Panthers' weight room in preparation for the upcoming season.

Each of these scenes — the football fields, steel mills and the city — are embedded in Wannstedt. "Pittsburgh never really left me," he said. "It's always been a special place in my heart."

That is why, more than 30 years after captaining the Panthers' 1973 Fiesta Bowl team, Wannstedt was the perfect choice to lead the University of Pittsburgh's football program. He was named Pitt's 34th head coach on December 23, 2004.

A rugged offensive tackle for the Panthers from 1970-73, Wannstedt returned to his alma mater with three decades of highly accomplished coaching experience on the collegiate level and in the National Football League. His career has produced three championship rings, including a Super Bowl title and two national collegiate championships.

These days, Wannstedt only wears his Pitt 1976 national championship ring. "Our players and prospects should know that I was part of the greatest team Pitt ever had," he said. "I take pride in that."

"This opportunity is something I have dreamed about since my early coaching days at Pitt," said Wannstedt, who is a native of Baldwin, Pa.

Wannstedt is the ninth graduate of the school to lead the Panthers' football program.

A "Pitt Man" through and through, Wannstedt has served as a bridge to the program's past

— the visits by former players and alumni have reached unprecedented levels — as he is driving the Panthers strongly into the future.

"Dave is a Pitt guy," said Mike Ditka, an All-America end for the Panthers before he went on to a Hall of Fame playing and coaching career in the NFL. "Dave has a commitment to this university. The excitement created since Dave came back probably hasn't happened in, what, 20 years? Dave is the right guy to lead this program. He's a young guy with a lot of enthusiasm and he's really proud to be a Pittsburgh guy."

In 2006, Wannstedt and his wife Jan gave a \$250,000 gift to the University of Pittsburgh to endow a football scholarship.

"As a high school senior growing up in Baldwin, I was provided with the life-changing opportunity to receive an outstanding education and play major-college football due to a scholarship," Wannstedt said. "We want to be able to help provide those same opportunities for both current and future generations of student-athletes."

Wannstedt's passion and conviction have created a buzz about Pitt football in Western Pennsylvania and beyond. Not content to stay in Pitt's traditional backyard, Wannstedt embarks on annual tours of alumni functions and high schools throughout the commonwealth. The Panther boss causes quite a stir while meeting and greeting coaches, principals, high school superintendents, Pitt grads and future Pitt grads.

"The reception we've received has been overwhelming," Wannstedt said of his travels. "I have received nothing but the utmost respect from the coaches, players and administrators at all of the schools that we've visited. It's a tremendous feeling. I'm excited because I'm selling something I believe in — the University of Pittsburgh.

"I think people sense my enthusiasm and hopefully that makes them want to become a part of something special that we are building at Pitt."

Wannstedt rejoined the college ranks after spending the prior 16 years in the NFL. Eleven of those years were as a head coach, including six with the Chicago Bears (1993-98) and five with the Miami Dolphins (2000-04). Including 2005-08, his 18 years of collegiate coaching experience include 12 winning campaigns and a 137-71-4 record.

It all began, though, in Pittsburgh, where first he was a star at Baldwin High and later played a key role in Pitt football's resurgence in the 1970s.

"Dave was such a leader," said Jim Gilloolly, his high school football coach. "Dave would scramble up the side of the hill on all fours, in the weeds and the brush, to get in shape. He

made a big W-A-N-N in the side of the hill. That became part of our drill, the Wannstedt Drill. Even after Dave was gone."

Wannstedt was a three-sport star for Baldwin in football, basketball and track and field. He earned all-state in football and played in the prestigious Big 33 Classic all-star game.

Wannstedt captained both the Highlanders' football and basketball squads before graduating in 1970.

Earning a scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh, he played on the freshman team during the '70 season (freshmen were then not eligible for varsity competition) and earned a starting job as just a sophomore.

John Majors took over as head coach at Pitt for Wannstedt's senior year and led the team to a 6-4-1 regular season and Fiesta Bowl berth. The '73 campaign was the

launching pad for Pitt's juggernaut success the rest of the decade that included a 55-15-1 mark (.782), a national championship and five bowls over the next six years. Wannstedt was one of the '73 team's unsung heroes, providing tough blocking from his left tackle spot. His efforts helped a young back named Tony Dorsett rush for 1,686 yards.

Although he was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 1974 draft, a neck injury cut short Wannstedt's pro aspirations. He returned to Pitt and started his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Majors in 1975 and 1976.

"I knew he had big things ahead of him," Majors said. "You could see it and sense it. He was self-motivated and tough. He was fierce, and everyone around him respected him. He did things the right way, with hard work and dedication. I never had to worry about him. I also saw other players watching how he conducted himself and gravitating to him. That's why he is a great football coach — people see how much the game means to him, how hard he works."

When Majors departed following the undefeated '76 national title season, Wannstedt served under Jackie Sherrill at Pitt in 1977 and 1978, coaching receivers and special teams.

His four years on the Panthers' staff witnessed three Top 15 national rankings, a combined 37-10-1 record (.781) and bowl invites each season. "You knew he had the talent to be a coach," Sherrill said. "Just the way he handled himself, the confidence he had, the way he handled other players."



The talent evident at Pitt launched Wannstedt into a coaching career that took him from his hometown to destinations all over the country, including a pair of NFL head coaching jobs.

During Wannstedt's head coaching tenure with the Dolphins, Miami was one of just three NFL teams from 2000-03 to record nine or more victories each year.

The Dolphins' 41-23 mark during that span tied for the club's best four-year record in nearly 20 seasons. Miami captured the AFC East Division championship in 2000 with an 11-5 record.

The Dolphins' defense that season ranked third in the NFL in points allowed (a franchise-low 226 points) and led the league with 28 interceptions. He joined the Dolphins in 1999 as assistant head coach under Jimmy Johnson.

Johnson, now an NFL analyst with FOX, and Wannstedt first teamed up together at Pitt. (Johnson was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator under Sherrill before moving on as head coach at Oklahoma State.) The pair became fast friends at Pittsburgh and Johnson ultimately would tap Wannstedt as a top lieutenant at four stops, including Oklahoma State, the University of Miami, the Dallas Cow-

boys and with the Dolphins.

Wannstedt concluded his Chicago Bears tenure as the third-winningest coach in the franchise's history with 41 victories. In 1994 he was named the NFC Coach of the Year by UPI and *Football News* after directing Chicago back to the playoffs following a three-year hiatus.

Wannstedt additionally was among the top three finishers for NFL Coach of the Year honors that season by The Associated Press, Pro Football Writers, The Sporting News, Pro Football Weekly and Football Digest. The Bears were the NFL's least-penalized team for two consecutive (1994-95)seasons under his watch.

From 1989-92, Wannstedt was part of a dramatic revitalization of the Dallas Cowboys as defensive coordinator and, in his final season, assistant head coach. His tenure witnessed Dallas' transformation from

a 1-15 team to Super Bowl champions in just three years. Wannstedt's 1992 defense was the NFL's youngest but went on to lead the league in total defense, allowing just 245.7 yards per game. The '92 season was punctuated with the Cowboys' 52-17 demolition of Buffalo in Super Bowl XXVII as his defense forced nine turnovers. In 1990, Wannstedt's role in Dallas' revival earned him NFL Assistant Coach of the Year honors.

Prior to Dallas, Wannstedt spent three years as the defensive coordinator of the Miami Hurricanes. From 1986-88, Miami went 34-2 (.944) and won the 1987 national championship with a 12-0 record. During his tenure, the Hurricanes held opponents to just 2.2 yards per rush, gave up only 10.9 points per game and averaged 48 sacks per year. Wannstedt's defenses produced 11 NFL draft selections, including five taken in the initial two rounds.

Wannstedt's other collegiate stops included Southern California (1983-85) and Oklahoma State (1979-82). As defensive line coach at USC, he helped the Trojans capture the 1984 Pacific-10 championship and a subsequent 20-17 win over Ohio State in the Rose Bowl. Wannstedt was also the defensive line coach at Oklahoma

State his initial three years before elevating to defensive coordinator in 1982.

Wannstedt is a 1974 graduate of the University of Pittsburgh. He also earned his master's from Pitt in 1976. The Pitt Varsity Letter Club in 1999 named him an Awardee of Distinction for his professional and personal accomplishments following his graduation from the university. In 1990 Wannstedt was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame, becoming the youngest person to receive the honor.

Wannstedt and his wife Jan have two daughters, Keri and Jami, and a grandson. Keri and her husband Mike Drew welcomed a son, Connor David, on Sept. 28, 2007.





GREG GATTUSO, ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/DEFENSIVE LINE

Under the guidance of **GREG GATTUSO**, Pitt's defensive line has emerged as one of the team's major strengths.

Heading into the 2009 season, the Panthers boast one of the finest defensive end tandems in the country with the return of All-Big East performer Greg Romeus and Jabaal Sheard. The pair combined for 26 tackles for loss and 13 sacks last year. Romeus was honored as the Sun Bowl's Most Valuable Lineman.

Named to Dave Wannstedt's original staff in 2005, Gattuso has made invaluable contributions to the Pitt football program on and off the field. As a result, he was promoted to assistant head coach in 2008. This year marks Gattuso's fifth season overall at Pitt and his fourth coaching the defensive line.

Gattuso initially joined the Pitt staff as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. In his first season, he helped the Panthers sign a recruiting class rated the nation's 10th best by Scout.com.


A Western Pennsylvania native, Gattuso owns a winning resume as a coach and player on both the collegiate and high school levels. Before joining Pitt, Gattuso spent 12 years building neighboring Duquesne University into one of the elite I-AA football programs in the country. The winningest coach in school history, the Dukes went 97-32 (.752) under his direction, won eight Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) titles, made five bowl appearances and captured the 2003 consensus Mid-Major Division I-AA national championship.

Gattuso was twice named the national Mid-Major I-AA Coach of the Year and was a seven-time MAAC Coach of the Year. The Dukes dominated the MAAC during his tenure, going 66-7 (.904) in league play, including a 33-game winning streak.

Gattuso was an assistant coach at Duquesne in 1992 before taking over the head coaching post the following year. He previously served as head coach at his high school alma mater, Seton-LaSalle, from 1989-91. Taking over a team that went 6-34 during the four seasons prior to his arrival, Gattuso led the Rebels to a 28-10-1 mark (.731), including three WPIAL playoff berths, a WPIAL championship and Parkway Conference title.

A 1980 graduate of Seton-LaSalle High, Gattuso was named the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*'s Class AA Player of the Year his senior season and went on to a standout career at Penn State, where he was a two-time All-East defensive lineman and a member of the Lions' 1982 national title team.

Gattuso is a 1983 graduate of Penn State with a bachelor's degree in administration and criminal justice.



FRANK CIGNETTI, OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS



Pittsburgh native **FRANK CIGNETTI**, whose coaching resume includes two decades of experience on both the collegiate and NFL levels, was named offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Pittsburgh in February by Dave Wannstedt.

Cignetti joins Wannstedt's staff after spending the 2008 season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of California. The Bears averaged nearly 33 points per game en route to a 9-4 record and victory over Miami (Fla.) in the Emerald Bowl. In 2007 Cignetti was the San Francisco 49ers' quarterbacks coach.

His Pitt appointment marks a return to the place where he landed his first coaching position as a Panthers graduate assistant in 1989.

Cignetti's family has deep ties to Pitt and Western Pennsylvania football. His father, Frank Sr., was a Pitt assistant from 1966-68 and later the head coach at both West Virginia (1976-79) and Indiana University of Pa. (1986-2005). His brother Curt was also a Pitt assistant (1983-84 and 1993-99) who is now at Alabama.

"Frank Cignetti is quite simply a great football coach from a great football family," Wannstedt said. "Frank owns tremendous knowledge of the game and is also highly skilled in teaching it. He is going to be a major asset for our players and staff alike.

"Not only is he coming back to Pitt but he is also coming back home. Frank won't need any road maps to find all the outstanding high school players in this area. He's lived Western Pennsylvania football his entire life. We are excited for him to get started."

"It is a great honor to be rejoining the University of Pittsburgh," Cignetti said. "Pitt's tradition of excellence, both academically and athletically, is second to none. As great as our history is, I think the future can be even better. I'm excited to be back in my hometown and I can't wait to start working with Coach Wannstedt and his staff."

Prior to his 49ers post, Cignetti was the offensive coordinator at North Carolina (2006) and Fresno State (2002-05). In 2004 Fresno State averaged 52.8 points over its final six games and became just the sixth team in NCAA history to score 50 or more points in four consecutive contests.

The Bulldogs twice finished among the nation's top 10 in scoring and third-down conversions during Cignetti's tenure. They were also a perennial postseason team, advancing to four consecutive bowls, including victories over Georgia Tech (2002, Silicon Valley), UCLA (2003, Silicon Valley) and Virginia (2004, MPC Computers).

From 2000-01, Cignetti served as quarterbacks coach with the New Orleans Saints, where he helped Jeff Blake to a career-best passer rating and also helped Aaron Brooks produce some of the best statistics of his career en route to a Pro Bowl alternate selection. Cignetti landed his first NFL appointment in 1999 as a quality control assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs.

From 1990-98, Cignetti was on his father's staff at IUP, where he was an all-conference safety before earning his bachelor's degree in 1988. He served IUP as receivers, secondary and quarterbacks coach before elevating to offensive coordinator for his final two seasons. During his tenure, IUP twice advanced to the NCAA Division II national title game and earned a berth in the semifinals four times.

Cignetti additionally has served on the coaching staffs for the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine all-star games. He and his wife Ellen have three daughters: Alyssa, Gabrielle and Ella.



PHIL BENNETT, DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



Nationally known as one of college football's finest defensive coaches, **PHIL BENNETT** enters his second season at Pitt.

The three-decade coaching veteran came to Pittsburgh last year and put his own imprint on the Panthers' defense. Behind the play of such all-star performers as linebacker Scott McKillop, end Greg Romeus and cornerback Aaron Berry, Pitt ranked among the country's top 30 in both total and rushing defense. Moreover, Pitt intercepted 16 passes during the 2008 season, the second-highest total for the Panthers since 1996.

Pitt was playing some of its finest defense during its drive to the postseason. Over the final five games of the year, the Panthers yielded just 12.6 points per game.


Bennett joined the Panthers after serving as head coach at Southern Methodist University from 2002-07. Prior to SMU, he oversaw some of the country's top defensive units while at such schools as Texas A&M, Kansas State and Louisiana State.

While rebuilding the program at SMU, Bennett improved the Mustangs' win total for three consecutive seasons, including his 2006 team that reached bowl eligibility and achieved the program's highest victory total in a decade. That squad also received the American Football Coaches Association's (AFCA) 2006 Academic Achievement Award after SMU earned a 100% graduation rate for its freshman class of 2000-01.

Prior to SMU, Bennett was the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Kansas State for three years (1999-2001). During his tenure, the Wildcats finished among the nation's top five in total defense each season, including second in 1999 (235.0 yards/game), fourth in 2000 (270.54) and third in 2001 (262.36).

Bennett's secondary units were equally impressive, finishing in the top 10 in pass efficiency defense each year. The 1999 Wildcats led the entire country in pass efficiency defense with an impressive 65.7 rating. They also topped the nation in turnover margin (1.55 margin/game), collecting 21 interceptions and 17 fumbles.

Two of his standouts in the secondary, Dyshod Carter and Jerametrius Butler, became just the second pair of KSU teammates to record 10 or more career interceptions. Both went on to play in the NFL.



In 1998, Bennett served as secondary coach and co-recruiting coordinator at Oklahoma as he helped the Sooners finish sixth nationally in total defense. In 1997, he was the defensive coordinator at Texas Christian and helped the Horned Frogs earn their highest defensive rankings in five years.

Bennett was the defensive coordinator at Texas A&M from 1995-96. American Football Quarterly named him its 1995 "Defensive Coordinator of the Year" after the Aggies ranked in the nation's top 10 in every major defensive category, including total defense (third), scoring defense (third) and pass efficiency defense (second).

From 1991-94, Bennett served at LSU, including his final three seasons as assistant head coach. In 1994, he was the Tigers' defensive coordinator. That season, LSU led the Southeastern Conference in every major defensive category and finished eighth nationally in total defense. Bennett's positional focus was the outside linebackers his first three seasons and the secondary his final year in Baton Rouge.

Prior to LSU, Bennett held defensive coordinator posts at Purdue (1987-90) and Iowa State (1983-86). In 1982 he coached TCU's tight ends and tackles. Bennett began his coaching career at Texas A&M as a part-time defensive ends coach from 1979-80 before assuming a full-time position in 1981.

Bennett is a 1978 graduate of Texas A&M with a B.S. in education. He was an All-Southwest Conference defensive end for the Aggies, helping them earn invitations to the Sun, Bluebonnet and Liberty bowls during his career.

BRIAN ANGELICHIO, TIGHT ENDS



BRIAN ANGELICHIO enters his fourth year on Pitt's coaching staff working with the tight ends, a positional group that has become an annual strength for the Panthers.

Last year under Angelichio's watch, Nate Byham was selected first team All-Big East, an unprecedented achievement by a Pitt tight end. Whether it is in the pass or run games, Byham is one of the country's best all-around performers at the position. He enters his senior year as a viable All-America and John Mackey Award candidate.

Angelichio also oversaw the development of former Pitt tight end Darrell Strong, who spent last season with the Oakland Raiders. Strong was invited to the 2008 Hula Bowl, the first Pitt tight end to play in that historic all-star game since 1981.

Angelichio joined Pitt as a well-rounded football coach following his 10-year tenure at Ithaca College (1996-2005). Named Ithaca's offensive coordinator in 2000, Angelichio molded a highly productive unit that set or tied 30 team and individual records over his final five seasons. The Bombers averaged nearly 40 points per game in 2005 to

rank 18th nationally on the NCAA Division III level.

Angelichio oversaw the development of seven All-Americans at Ithaca, which advanced to the postseason in seven of his 10 years. His offenses averaged more than 30 points per game in six of his final eight seasons. Before elevating to his offensive coordinator post, Angelichio coached Ithaca's linebackers (1996-97) and receivers (1998). He oversaw the offensive line from 1999-2005.

In addition to football, Angelichio was a member of Ithaca's baseball staff for nine years, helping the Bombers to the NCAA playoffs each season.

A 1995 graduate of St. Lawrence with a bachelor's in physical education, Angelichio was a member of the Saints' football and baseball teams. He was a three-year starter at outside linebacker and also was a captain and four-year starter on the baseball team. Angelichio spent a season as secondary coach at Brockport (1995) before coming to Ithaca. He earned his master's from Ithaca in 1997.



BRYAN BOSSARD, WIDE RECEIVERS



BRYAN BOSSARD enters his second year at Pitt as wide receivers coach. Bossard joined the Panthers after serving in the same capacity at Maryland from 2005-07.

Bossard previously worked under Dave Wannstedt in a pair of NFL summer coaching internships with the Chicago Bears in 1996-97.

Pitt's receiving unit is one of exciting potential in 2009. Five lettermen return, including four with starting experience.

Working with a young Terps receiving corps in 2007, Bossard oversaw the development of Freshman All-America wideout LaQuan Williams. He coached another Frosh All-American in Darrius Heyward-Bey during the 2006 campaign.

Prior to his Maryland tenure, Bossard coached the receivers at perennial I-AA power Delaware, his alma mater, from 2002-04. He also was on the Blue Hens' coaching staff from 1994-98 in the same capacity.

Bossard helped Delaware win the 2003 Division I-AA national title with a 15-1 mark. During that championship season, the Blue Hens had three different receivers catch 50 passes or more, an unprecedented achievement at UD. Delaware made three consecutive playoff berths from 1995-97, advancing to the national semifinals each year.

A native of Dover, Del., Bossard was an outstanding player himself for the Blue Hens from 1985-88. An All-Yankee Conference defensive back, he helped Delaware to two I-AA playoff berths. In his final collegiate season he collected 122 tackles and was selected the team's outstanding senior defensive player by the Blue Hen Touchdown Club.

Bossard broke into the collegiate coaching ranks as a graduate assistant at Delaware in 1990. He then coached defensive backs at Morehouse College (1991), West Chester University (1992) and Bucknell (1992-93).

In 1999, Bossard coached the receivers at Army before moving on to a defensive back coaching post at Wyoming during the 2000 and '01 seasons.

He is a 1989 graduate of Delaware with a bachelor's degree in agricultural business management.



JEFF HAFLEY, SECONDARY



JEFF HAFLEY enters his second year as Pitt's secondary coach and fourth season overall on Dave Wannstedt's staff.

One of the Big East's up-and-coming young coaches, Hafley previously served as Pitt's defensive graduate assistant in 2006 and '07 with a specific focus on the cornerbacks. He was promoted to his current capacity during the 2008 offseason and delivered with a strong year on both the playing field and recruiting trail.

Pitt intercepted 16 passes during the 2008 season, its second-highest total since 1996. Strong safety Dom DeCicco had a team-high four picks while All-Big East cornerback Aaron Berry had three. Both players enter the upcoming season as strong all-star candidates.

Hafley was also instrumental in Pitt's 2009 recruiting class, helping the Panthers sign five highly regarded prospects from New Jersey — Pitt's most signees from the Garden State since the mid-1980s.

Prior to Pitt, Hafley served at the University of Albany for four seasons (2002-05), including his final two as defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator. In his initial two years Hafley was a graduate assistant who coached Albany's defensive tackles and outside linebackers.

While at Albany, Hafley oversaw the development of cornerback/roverback Kurt Campbell, who went on to become the first player in school history to be selected in the NFL Draft. Campbell was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in 2005 before going on to play with the Tennessee Titans.

Hafley served as the running backs coach at Worcester Polytechnic Institute during the 2001 season. In addition to overseeing the running backs, he also worked significantly with WPI's special teams and coached the kickers.

Hafley was a four-year wide receiver at Siena College from 1997-2000. He began his coaching career at his alma mater while recovering from three separate surgeries that kept him off the field. Hafley is a 2001 cum laude graduate of Siena with a bachelor's degree in history. He earned his master's from Albany in 2003.



JOE TUMPKIN, LINEBACKERS

JOE TUMPKIN oversaw an aggressive and productive group of linebackers in 2008, his first season at Pitt.

Middle linebacker Scott McKillop was selected a first team All-American and the Big East Defensive Player of the Year. McKillop was one of the country's most prolific tacklers, ranking third nationally in solo stops (6.31 solos/game), 10th in total tackles (tied, 10.54 tackles/game) and 22nd in tackles for loss (tied, 1.35 TFLs/game).

A pair of first-year starters also thrived under Tumpkin's tutelage. Austin Ransom elevated from special teams performer to starting Will linebacker and finished as the team's second-leading tackler (89 stops). Additionally, Sam linebacker Greg Williams was named the Big East's Top Defensive Freshman by Rivals.com.

Tumpkin joined the Panthers after spending three seasons (2005-07) coaching linebackers at Southern Methodist University, where he served under then-SMU head coach Phil Bennett, now Pitt's defensive coordinator.

While at SMU, Tumpkin oversaw the development of All-Conference USA linebacker Reggie Carrington. During the 2006 season, SMU earned bowl eligibility behind a defense that ranked 24th nationally against the run (107.5 yards/game).

In 2007, Tumpkin earned a coaching fellowship with the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers. As part of the fellowship, he worked with Tampa Bay's coaching staff during the team's July training camp.

From 2002-04, Tumpkin served at Sam Houston State, where he coached the linebackers (2002-03) and secondary (2004). He was instrumental in the development of Sam Houston State linebackers T.J. Dibble, a two-time All-Southland selection, and Paul Donelson, who earned All-America honors. In 2004, the Bearkats captured a share of the Southland Conference championship, advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs and reached as high as No. 3 in the national rankings.

Tumpkin was the defensive coordinator at Lakeland College during the 2000 and '01 seasons. From 1998-99, he was the linebackers coach and

recruiting coordinator at Southern Illinois, where he helped mold Bart Scott, who went on to be a Pro Bowl performer for the Baltimore Ravens. (Scott was signed by the New York Jets as a coveted free agent this past offseason.) In 1996 Tumpkin coached the linebackers at Defiance College.

Tumpkin's additional experience includes graduate assistantships at Lakeland (1994), Northern Michigan (1995) and Western Michigan (1997).

As a collegian, Tumpkin was a team captain and four-year letterman at Michigan Tech. He earned his bachelor's degree from Michigan Tech in 1994.



DAVID WALKER, RUNNING BACKS



DAVID WALKER enters his fifth season as running backs coach at Pitt and has been instrumental in helping the Panthers develop a potent, game-changing rushing attack.

Walker has been lauded as an outstanding teacher of the finer points of running back play. As a result, the Panthers have enjoyed some of their finest production at the position in recent memory.

LeSean McCoy, expected to be one of the top running backs chosen in this year's NFL Draft, was a major beneficiary of Walker's influence. In just two collegiate seasons, McCoy rushed for 2,816 yards and scored 36 touchdowns, both Pitt records for production as a freshman and sophomore.

A unanimous All-Big East selection and the media's Big East Offensive Player of the Year, McCoy last season ranked second in the nation in scoring (tied, 9.69 points/game) and 10th in rushing (114.46 yards/game). He finished with 1,488 yards to become only the third Pitt running back to achieve multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

Walker additionally oversaw the development of fullback Conredge Collins, who is also considered a viable NFL prospect in April's draft.


Before joining Pitt, Walker tutored four 1,000-yard rushers in his last five years as running backs coach at Syracuse. He served with the Orange from 1995-2004 and shaped an exceptional record of producing top-flight running backs. He counts among his SU protégés six backs who played in the National Football League.

The Orange boasted a potent 1-2 punch in the backfield in 2004 with All-Big East running backs Walter Reyes and Damien Rhodes combining for 1,673 yards and 17 touchdowns. Reyes finished his career as SU's second all-time leading rusher with 3,424 yards.

Walker oversaw four consecutive 1,000-yard rushers from 2000-03, a Syracuse record. In '03, Reyes rushed for 1,347 yards, the second-highest single-season total in school history. His 21 touchdowns set an Orange record. Overall, Walker coached three of the Orange's top seven all-time leading rushers.

A 1993 graduate of Syracuse, Walker was an outstanding running back himself, twice earning All-Big East honors. He captained the 1992 team, leading it to a No. 6 national ranking, 10-2 overall record and 26-22 victory over Colorado in the Fiesta Bowl. Walker remains the sixth-leading rusher in Orange history with 2,643 yards.

Following a year as an assistant coach at Miami's Carol City High School in 1994-95, Walker rejoined his alma mater and helped the Orange

TONY WISE, OFFENSIVE LINE



TONY WISE, an accomplished 36-year coaching veteran of collegiate and professional football, enters his second season as Pitt's offensive line coach.

Under Wise's guidance, the Pitt offensive line is a source of exciting optimism and potential in 2009. Last year's unit paved the way for the nation's 10th-leading rusher in LeSean McCoy (1,488 yards and 21 touchdowns). Offensive guard C.J. Davis was selected first team All-Big East and invited to February's NFL Combine.

Wise's Pitt appointment reunited him with Dave Wannstedt, who he coached with on six prior occasions, and returned him to a place where he received one of his first college coaching positions.

Wannstedt and Wise first worked together on Jackie Sherrill's Pitt coaching staff during the 1977 and '78 seasons. Wannstedt coached receivers and special teams under Sherrill, while Wise was the Panthers' assistant offensive line coach. They would go on to serve on the same staffs with Oklahoma State, the University of Miami, the Dallas Cowboys and during Wannstedt's head coaching tenures with the Chicago Bears and Miami Dolphins.

Prior to his 2008 return to Pitt, Wise spent 18 years coaching offensive lines in the National Football League, including the 2006 and '07 seasons with the New York Jets. From 2001-04, he spent four seasons at Miami, where his offensive lines helped produce the two highest individual single-season rushing totals in franchise history. During the 2002 season, the Dolphins rushed for 156.4 yards per game to rank first in the AFC and second in the NFL.

From 1999-2000, Wise served with the Carolina Panthers. During the '99 season, Carolina averaged 4.3 yards per rush to rank fifth in the NFL. Wise served on Wannstedt's Chicago staff from 1993-98. In four of those six seasons, the Bears ranked in the top 10 of the NFL in fewest sacks allowed, including a league-low 15 in 1995. Wise added the duties of assistant head coach his final four seasons in Chicago.

Wise's NFL career began in 1989 with the Dallas Cowboys, where he coached the offensive line for four seasons (1989-92) under Jimmy Johnson. Wise's line paved the way for Emmitt Smith, who claimed back-to-back NFL rushing titles in 1991 and 1992. Smith rushed for 1,563 yards during the '91 campaign and 1,713 during the Cowboys' Super Bowl championship season in '92.

Dallas rolled past Buffalo, 52-17, in Super Bowl XXVII, the Cowboys' first NFL title in 15 years. Wise's offensive front was vital to the champion-ship run, allowing the second-fewest sacks in the NFL (23). He coached a pair of 1992 Pro Bowlers in center Mark Stepnoski, a former Pitt standout, and guard Nate Newton.

Wise also served under Johnson while with the Miami Hurricanes from 1985-88. His UM tenure witnessed the Hurricanes' emergence as a national power. Miami went 34-2 during Wise's final three seasons there, including a 12-0 mark in winning the 1987 national championship.

A native of Newtonville, N.Y., Wise was an offensive lineman at Ithaca College from 1969-72. He also lettered in lacrosse at Ithaca and played on the school's hockey team. Wise began his coaching career in 1973 at Albany State, where he worked with the outside linebackers. He later coached the offensive lines at Bridgeport (1974), Central Connecticut (1975) and on Jackie Sherrill's staff at Washington State (in 1976 as assistant offensive line coach). Wise's additional collegiate stops include Oklahoma State (under Jimmy Johnson from 1979-83) and Syracuse (1984).



BUDDY MORRIS , STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



During Pitt's 2008 Sun Bowl campaign, the Panthers won five contests in the fourth quarter or overtime. Players and coaches alike readily credited **BUDDY MORRIS'** strength and conditioning program as a vital reason behind those victories.

Game-changing strength and conditioning levels are what Dave Wannstedt envisioned two years ago when he lured Morris back to Pitt to oversee the Panthers' physical development. His arrival infused the Pitt weight room with a new sense of purpose and dedication, resulting in elevated performance on the field.

Morris owns an accomplished history of training elite players at both the collegiate and NFL levels. The 1980 Pitt graduate previously served as the football team's strength and conditioning coach from 1980-89 and 1997-2001.


"Buddy Morris has trained some of the greatest names in college and professional football," Wannstedt said. "He knows what it takes to make a football player — and a football team — reach his highest potential in strength train-

ing and physical conditioning."

His workout regimens are highly regarded and include a focus on strength training, speed development, conditioning, agility training and flexibility. Morris' take on football strength and conditioning was featured in a February 2009 issue of *Sporting News*.

Morris rejoined Pitt after serving at the University of Buffalo in 2006 as its director of sports performance and was directly responsible for training the Bulls' football team. Prior to Buffalo, he was the head strength and conditioning coach for the Cleveland Browns from 2002-05, serving under head coach Butch Davis.

In his prior Pitt training stints, Morris' pupils included such legendary figures as Jim Covert, Bill Fralic, Russ Grimm, Dan Marino and Mark Stepnoski among others. He additionally trained latter-day Pitt stars Ruben Brown and Curtis Martin, two of the NFL's most accomplished players over the past decade.



A former Pitt student-athlete himself, Morris was a four-year letterman in track and field for the Panthers from 1977-80. In addition, he helped create the familiar moniker of the Panthers' weight room, "The Pitt Iron Works."

CHRIS LASALA, ASSISTANT AD/FOOTBALL OPERATIONS



CHRIS LaSALA is in his 13th year as director of football operations at the University of Pittsburgh. LaSala is in his 10th year as an assistant athletic director.

A native of nearby Aliquippa, Pa., LaSala is truly the Panthers' master of multi-tasking. He coordinates and oversees travel accommodations, including Pitt's trip to the 2008 Sun Bowl, as well as youth summer camps, the annual coaches clinic, preseason camp arrangements and all day-to-day administration for the Pitt football team. LaSala also serves as the football program's liaison to numerous campus offices and within the athletic department.

In 2004 he was named a recipient of the prestigious Chancellor's Award for Staff Excellence in service to the University of Pittsburgh. In 2006 LaSala was recognized as an "Outstanding Graduate" of Temple University's sport/recreation administration program.


LaSala was a chief coordinator and planner for Pitt's move to its state-of-the-art practice facility, the UPMC Sports Performance Complex. He has been instrumental in the planning of Pitt's trips to the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta

Bowl, 2003 Continental Tire Bowl, 2002 Insight Bowl, 2001 Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl, 2000 Insight.com Bowl and 1997 AXA/Equitable Liberty Bowl.

LaSala's career in athletics began at Temple, where he served as a graduate assistant. He then came to the University of Pittsburgh as an athletic department intern in 1989.

Prior to his 1997 Pitt appointment he served three years as the director of football operations at Boston College (1994-96), where he handled all the administrative duties for the football program, including overseeing the travel arrangements and organizing BC's youth camps.

During his BC tenure, the Eagles captured the 1994 Aloha Bowl and participated in the 1995 Kickoff Classic.



Before Boston College, LaSala spent four years at Temple (1990-93) as recruiting coordinator and ultimately was elevated to assistant athletic director. He initially joined Temple as a graduate assistant in 1988 and then returned to the Owls' football staff in 1990 as the administrative assistant.

LaSala graduated from West Virginia in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in accounting. He earned his master's degree in sports administration from Temple in 1991.

BOB JUNKO , DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL RELATIONS AND PROGRAM ENHANCEMENT



After spending nearly four decades in the coaching ranks, **BOB JUNKO** moved to the administrative side of college football in 2007 as Pitt's director of football relations and program enhancement.

Junko is a natural for the role given his tremendous football acumen and contacts. In his second year in that capacity, he assists in the daily operations of the program and also has a focus on the Panthers' extended family of football alumni.

One of the best-known football figures in the tri-state area, Junko has been a highly valuable figure within the Pitt program. He played a major role in the Panthers' recent recruiting successes and in 2006 was named one of the nation's top 25 recruiters by Rivals.com.

The 2009 season marks the 13th year of Junko's second tour at Pittsburgh. He initially coached at Pitt from 1982-85, serving as defensive coordinator under head coach Foge Fazio. He returned in 1997 as defensive tackles coach under Walt Harris and was elevated to assistant head coach in 2000.


Prior to returning to Pittsburgh, Junko was the defensive coordinator at Kent State from 1995-96. Junko also served as the associate head coach and defensive coordinator for seven years at Akron (1988-94). He additionally held similar positions at Northwestern, TCU and Tulsa, his alma mater.

In his first stint with the Panthers, the 1982 team received a Cotton Bowl bid and finished ninth in the country. The 1983 Panthers earned a Fiesta Bowl berth and ranked 19th in the final polls.

Among the standouts on those defenses were tackle Bill Maas, defensive end Chris Doleman and defensive backs Tim Lewis and Tom Flynn, all of whom went on to careers in the NFI

As a collegian, Junko starred at Tulsa as an inside linebacker and was an Honorable Mention All-American in 1967. He also was named to the All-Missouri Valley Conference team twice and served as team captain.

Junko earned a bachelor's degree in history education in 1968 and his master's in educational administration in 1970 at Tulsa. He was inducted into the University of Tulsa Sports Hall of Fame last year.



ROB BLANC , HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER/DIRECTOR OF ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE



ROB BLANC is in his 22nd year as head football athletic trainer and clinical instructor at Pitt. With his exceptional sports medicine knowledge and experience, Blanc is a tremendous resource for the entire Pitt athletic department.

Since his appointment as head athletic trainer in 1993, he has been responsible for overseeing all of the clinical medical services for Pitt. Blanc additionally has led Pitt's Performance Team the last nine years. The Performance Team is a unique blending of the university's numerous resources to serve the total well being of Pitt student-athletes

Blanc coordinates sports coverage, budget, inventory, drug testing and counseling. Additionally, he is an adjunct clinical instructor for Pitt's undergraduate athletic training curriculum, approved by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA).




