Surrealism in Sussex PART OF THE SURREAL FRIENDS SEASON

29 May to 5 September 2010

Pallant House Gallery is delighted to present an exhibition as part of the 'Surreal Friends' season of international exhibitions inspired by the rich tradition of Surrealism in Sussex including works patronised by the famous benefactor and resident of nearby West Dean, Edward James (1907–1984), and key pieces by the photographer and model Lee Miller (1907–1977), and the painter Roland Penrose (1900–1984) who lived at Farley Farm in Chiddingly, East Sussex.

Edward James and **Roland Penrose** were pivotal in bringing the **European avant-garde** to the attention of the British public and artistic sector at a time when most public institutions in Britain pointedly ignored modern art: James through his extensive patronage, and Penrose through his curatorial and collecting activities.

Roland Penrose and Lee Miller were part of the Parisian art scene in the 1930s and forged friendships with Pablo Picasso, Paul Éluard, Man Ray, Max Ernst, Leonora Carrington and many others. Penrose with Andre Breton organised the first International Surrealist Exhibition at the New Burlington Galleries in London in 1936, to which Edward James was a key lender. 'Surrealism in Sussex' celebrates this surrealist heritage through a glimpse into lives of these three figures.

Edward James' collection, like Penrose's, was one of the most important bodies of Surrealist art in Europe. The new exhibition at Pallant House Gallery includes key pieces by many of the artists he collected such as **Leonor Fini**, **René Magritte** and **Salvador Dalí**, the first 'surrealist' he supported on a grand scale. James also created some of the most successful examples of fantasy architecture and interior decoration of the 1930s.

In London, James transformed his mid-Georgian Wimpole Street home into a highly theatrical spectacle. This exhibition features several of the pieces he included there such as Dali's 'lobster telephones, and the carpet James designed for his wife, the Viennese ballerina Tilly Losch, in which he immortalised Tilly's wet footprint by having it woven into the carpet that led from her bathroom.

In West Sussex, James transformed his family's Lutyen's designed hunting lodge, **Monkton House**, into a Surrealist hermitage. He fused traditional architectural elements and stylistic influences and integrated the past, the present and the world of fantasy in pieces such as the highly celebrated 'Mae West Lips Sofa' which he placed there, included in the show.

Roland Penrose was born into a wealthy Quaker family, and after training as an architect at Queens' College, Cambridge, he went to Paris in 1922 to study painting and began a career as a writer and surrealist painter. As well as his contribution to the International Surrealist Exhibition which proved to be a seminal marker for British surrealism Penrose also wrote the first major English biography of Pablo Picasso and with the help of a loan from James for the 1936 exhibition, was responsible for bringing the work of Picasso to the eye of the British public. Penrose's collection included masterpieces by Picasso, Miró, De Chirico, Ernst, Magritte, Tanguy, Arp, Dalí several of which are included in the show.

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In 1937 he met the photographer **Lee Miller** at a surrealist fancy dress ball and they married in 1947, the year in which he co-founded, with Herbert Read, the Institute of **Contemporary Art (ICA)** in London. Lee Miller was an American from Poughkeepsie, New York, who began her career as a top fashion model. In 1929 she became the lover, pupil and collaborator of the surrealist photographer **Man Ray** in Paris, and later ran her own studio in New York. Her surrealist images and hauntingly disturbing work as a Second World War combat photographer have earned her a key place in the history of art.

Penrose and Miller had a wide circle of artistic and intellectual friends and entertained many of them at their Sussex home, Farley Farm in Chiddingly including Max Ernst, Joan Miró, Man Ray, Pablo Picasso and Leonora Carrington. The exhibition also contains examples of Miller's photographs which document these many and various artistic friendships.
