Vision and innovation

Initiator of significant innovations in the global climate change regime:

- Led the effort to conceive and integrate broad based mitigation programs into the CDM with four ground-breaking publications that have shaped global thinking on programmatic CDM. Successfully negotiated the decision to include "programs of activities" in the CDM, garnering support first from the G77 and China Group and the negotiating with Annex I Parties at COP/MOP 1 in Montreal, Canada. As Member of the CDM Board, achieved consensus on the rules and procedures for the submission of programs in the CDM, in order to enhance the sustainable development impact of the CDM.
- Based on own published analysis of the link between programmatic CDM and the potential to extend the benefits of the CDM to households and small and medium enterprises, initiated the process to promote energy efficiency and distributed renewable energy in the CDM.
