

#### HERITAGE CONSERVATION DISTRICTS

In order to protect and enhance the special character of groups of properties in an area, City Council is able to designate an area as a Heritage Conservation District. The character of these districts is established by the overall heritage quality of buildings, streets and open spaces as seen together.

## 1 Draper Street

Designated as a Heritage Conservation District in 1999, Draper Street extends one block between Front Street West and Wellington Street West in the King-Spadina neighbourhood. The single-lane street has 28 houses dating to 1881-1886, consisting of Second Empire cottages and Toronto Bayand-Gable rowhouses.

## 2 Harbord Village

A small district, this area was originally developed by families that played a very significant role in the history of Toronto.

### 3 East Annex

The first large-scale residential neighbourhood designated as a district. The character of the area is generally that of well maintained, late 19th or early 20thCentury buildings, with variations from street to street.

#### 4 Yorkville-Hazelton

Originally a working class suburb, this district contains a wealth of heritage character from its beginning as the rural Village of Yorkville (incorp. 1853) to its current status as a shopping mecca. Actors and artists were drawn to the area in the 1950's and 1960's when Yorkville became one of Toronto's most creative arts communities.

# 5 Cabbagetown-Metcalfe & Cabbagetown North

One of Toronto's most vibrant residential communities, Cabbagetown's 19th Century streetscapes remain relatively unchanged. Highlights include workers' cottages, row housing and single family residences. Having fallen into disrepair during the Depression of the 1930's, homes in this area have been lovingly restored over the past thirty years and the original "small town" feeling has been recaptured.

## 6 South Rosedale

This area was originally included in the Village of Yorkville and is one of Toronto's earliest suburbs. South Rosedale is an eclectic neighbourhood consisting of a broad range of architectural styles with excellent examples of residential architecture from all periods from the 19th Century to the present.

#### 7 North Rosedale

Another of Toronto's earliest suburbs, North Rosedale benefits from its architectural diversity, wooded ravine boundaries and a history of prominent citizenship.
