Description and Reasons for Notification:

The site is located on a valley side in the Blackdown Hills where outcrops of both Cretaceous Upper Greensand and underlying Triassic Keuper Marls occur. A seepage line at the base of the Upper Greensand ensures the area is always very wet and the Greensand aquifer results in the groundwater being highly acidic.

The vegetation consists largely of a mire community with a patchy bryophyte cover, particularly of Sphagnum palustre, S. papillosum, S. subnitens and Aulacomnium palustre. The most abundant grass is Purple Moor-grass Molinia caerulea with sedges forming a significant part of the sward, the most frequent of which are Carnation Sedge Carex panicea, Common Yellow-sedge C. demissa, Flea Sedge C. pulicaris, Star Sedge C. echinata, Tawny Sedge C. hostiana, Common Cottongrass Eriophorum angustifolium and Many-stalked Spike-Rush Eleocharis multicaulis. The dwarf shrub species Heather Calluna vulgaris and Cross-leaved Heath Erica tetralix are also frequent but the grazing intensity prevents them and Purple Moor-grass becoming dominant species. Many herb species are found including Bog Pimpernel Anagallis tenella, Meadow Thistle Cirsium dissectum, Heath Spotted-orchid Dactylorhiza maculata, Round-leaved Sundew Drosera rotundifolia, Marsh Violet Viola palustris, Bog Asphodel Narthecium ossifragum, Lousewort Pedicularis sylvatica, Pale Butterwort Pinguicula lusitanica, Devil's-bit Scabious Succisa pratensis, Marsh Pennywort Hydrocotyle vulgaris and Lesser Skullcap Scutellaria minor. Also present are two other species which are very restricted in South West Britain, White Beaksedge Rhynchospora alba and Dioecious Sedge Carex dioica. This site is the only known location for the latter in Somerset.

An area of slightly less acidic nature on the Keuper Marls supports a different community. Here Sharp-flowered Rush *Juncus acutiflorus* is abundant and associated herb species include Ragged Robin *Lychnis flos-cuculi*, Betony *Stachys officinalis*,

Glaucous Sedge *Carex flacca* and Fleabane *Pulicaria dysenterica*. Small areas of Bracken *Pteridium aquilinum*, Bramble *Rubus fruticosus* and Gorse *Ulex europaeus* add diversity to the site.

Downy Birch *Betula pubescens*, Silver Birch *B. pendula* and Grey Willow *Salix cinerea* woodland also occurs. The bog moss *Sphagnum palustre* is abundant here and Greater Tussock-sedge *Carex paniculata*, Smooth-stalked Sedge *C. laevigata* and Remote Sedge *C. remota* also occur.

A colony of the Small Pearl-bordered Fritillary *Boloria selene* is found here.
