The Miller Center also has created educational materials, including a white paper and blog posts written by leading scholars and lessons plans that middle-school and high-school teachers can use to educate students about election issues.

"This Week with George Stephanopoulos" and the Miller Center have teamed up to produce a series of programs on the key issues of the 2012 election.

"This Week" is ABC's Sunday morning political affairs program. "This Week" has aired on Sunday mornings on ABC since 1981. The program has been anchored by David Brinkley, Sam Donaldson and Cokie Roberts, George Stephanopoulos, and Christiane Amanpour. After anchoring from 2002 to 2010, Stephanopoulos returned to the show in January 2012.
