Georgetown Welcomes Bernard Muir



On July 1, 2005 Georgetown welcomed Bernard Muir as its 13th Director of Athletics. As the new leader of the Athletic Department, Bernard oversees the operations of all Georgetown University intercollegiate and intramunal

athletic programs, which include more than 100 coaches and staff who support more than 600 student-athletes participating in 27 sports, the majority of which compete in the BIG EAST Conference.

Before arriving on the Hilltop, Bernard served as Deputy Director of Athletics for Administration and Facilities at the University of Notre Dame, where he oversaw campus athletic facilities, game management operations and club and intramural sports and recreation. He has served as primary administrator for a number of sports and as secondary administrator for football. He also served as Senior Associate Athletic Director for Student Welfare and Development while at Notre Dame, where he handled issues related to student-athlete recruitment, integration into campus life and academic performance.

Bernard was an eight-year staff member at the NCAA and the Director of the Division I NCAA Men's Basketball Championship. He joined the NCAA staff in December 1992 as Assistant Director of the Division I Men's Basketball Championship and was promoted to Director in August 1998. While in that position, he administered all policies and procedures relating to tickets for the championship, administered the men's and women's basketball officiating programs, monitored the actions of other select committees within the NCAA governance structure as it pertained to the work of the Division I Men's Basketball Committee and served as the primary liaison to institutions participating in the Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

Before joining the NCAA, Bernard briefly worked as an Academic Affairs and Compliance Assistant at Auburn University and as Event Director for

Georgetown University President Jack DeGioia (C'79, G'95) and Director of Athletics Bernard Muir

Streetball Partners International in 1992. He also gained administrative experience at Brown, Butler and Ohio universities, as well as with the Atlanta Falcons.

A 1990 graduate of Brown University with a bachelor's degree in organizational behavior and management, the Gainesville, Fla., native was a four-year letterwinner and co-captain of the Bears basketball team. Bernard was awarded the J. Richmond Fales Trophy, presented to a member of the squad for the vast contributions he made to his team, and he also earned the L. Stanley Ward Quiet Man Award. In addition, he served as Senior Class Marshall at the '90 Brown commencement exercises.

Bernard, the recipient of an NCAA Ethnic Minority Postgraduate Scholarship for Careers in Athletics, attended Ohio University and earned a master's in sports administration and facility management in 1992. During the 1991–92 academic year, he served as class president.

The Georgetown Athletic Department is ready to enter into a new era of success on and off the field, and Bernard's leadership will only help us realize those dreams faster and more efficiently.

Kevin Kelly, Football Head Coach



Kevin Kelly was named Georgetown Football's new Head Coach on Jan. 9, 2006.

He comes to the Hilltop after four years as the Special Teams Coordinator/Linebackers Coach at the United States Naval Academy, where he helped lead the Midshipmen to tremendous success during that span. The team advanced to three bowl games and posted a 26-11 record during the last three seasons (2003–05).

Navy won three Commander-in-Chief titles during his time in Annapolis (2003-05), won the 2004 Emerald Bowl and the 2005 Poinsettia Bowl and participated in the 2003 Houston Bowl.

Prior to joining Navy, Kevin spent two years (2000–01) at Marshall, one of two coaching stints with the Thundering Herd, where he was the Defensive Coordinator. In 2000, Marshall won the Mid-American Conference Championship and the Motor City Bowl, and they followed that up with a win at the 2001 GMAC Bowl.

Kevin also worked at Marshall from 1996-98, when the team was making the transition from the I-AA level to I-A. In 1996, the team won the Southern Conference en route to the Division I-AA National Championship. They won back-to-back Mid-American Conference Championships in 1996 and 1997, reaching the Motor City Bowl in both years and winning it the second time.

Kevin spent a year at Syracuse (1999), where he was the Defensive Backfield Coach when the team won the Music City Bowl. He was also Graduate Assistant/Assistant Linebackers Coach at Syracuse from 1986-88, when the team won the 1987 Lambert Cup and reached the 1988 Sugar Bowl. Kevin's other Division I-A experience came at Tulane (1992–94), where he was the Linebackers Coach.

He also spent time at Dartmouth—where he helped the Big Green win the 1991 by League title—Northeastern (1989–90), Bowdoin (1998) and Southern Connecticut State (1984–85).

A 1982 graduate of Springfield (Mass.) College, Kevin earned a bachelor of science degree in physical education and played football for three years as an undergraduate. He earned a master's degree in physical education from Southern Connecticut State in 1986.

During Kevin's 20-plus years of experience in coaching at the collegiate level, he has recruited numerous players who have gone on to professional careers, including former Marshall quarterback and current Jacksonville Jaguar Byron Leftwich.

Kevin's winning ways and sparkling reputation will likely create a bright future for Hoya Football.

Arlisa Hagan, Volleyball Head Coach



Fresh off yet another NCAA Tournament run with the University of Florida volleyball squad, Arlisa Hagan (ARE-less) stepped into the role of Volleyball Head Coach at Georgetown on Dec. 27, 2005.

Arlisa comes to the Hilltop after a successful four-year stint as an Assistant Coach at Florida, where she helped the Gators reach two Final Fours and was the program's recruiting coordinator, bringing in two dasses that were rated among the top 10

During her four years at Florida, Arlisa was responsible for training and skill development, as well as handling recruiting duties. In her first full year as recruiting coordinator, Arlisa's class was ranked No. 2 in the country by PrepVolleyball.com, and she followed that up in 2005 with a class that was rated No. 10, quite a feat considering no other top 10 team had less than three commitments and the Gators had only two.

Arlisa helped lead Florida to its first appearance in the National Championship game in 2003, and Florida finished 33-3 in 2005, its third 30-win season in the last four years. In addition, she coached players who combined for 14 All-America honors and 19 All-Southeastern Conference honors.

Prior to her stint at Florida, Arlisa helped lead American University to the same activities, anisat helped sead American Ginesisty to an impressive 52-8 record during her two seasons as an Assistant Coach there. The Eagles went 14-0 in the Patriot League in 2001 and earned the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, after winning the Colonial Athletic Association title the previous season.

Before working at American, Arlisa served as a Graduate Assistant Coach at Virginia Tech during the 1994 and '95 seasons, earning a master's degree in education and student personnel services.

Arlisa earned a bachelor of arts degree in African American Studies Arisa earned a Daceleor of are degree in Arrican American Studies in 1993 from the University of Wisconsin, where she was a standout middle blocker. She was a three-time All-Big Ten selection (1990–92) and a two-time All-Region pick (1990–91). She set Wisconsin career records for kills (1,495) and blocks (618) during her time with the Badgers. Arlisa was a member of Wisconsin's 1990 Big Ten Championship team and was a captain in her sepicy was:

Less than six months later, on Sept. 17, the Hoya football team hosted its first home game on the new surface when lyy League opponent Brown came to town. Father Alvaro Ribeiro, 5.]. led a ceremony blessing the new facility before the game. On Oct. 22, in the first homecoming game played on the new field, Georgetown knocked off Patriot League rival Fordham in front of a raucous

The groundbreaking event included a breakfast and guest luncheon prior to the Georgetown-Rutgers men's lacrosse game. Speakers included former Interim Director of Athletics Adam Brick (8'86, L'90), parent and member of the Board

of Directors Peter Cooper, former Associate Head Women's Lacrosse Coach Bowen Holden (CO1), University President Jack DeGioia (C'79, G'95) and Vice President of Student Affairs Todd Olson. Pat Conlan Building Georgetown Softball from the Ground Up

hese days, sports are constantly broken down and dichotomized into wins and losses, runs scored and given up and errors caused and committed. For a coach to focus instead on the heart and pride of a team rather than simply statistics reminds us of the path that leads to a successful program.

Georgetown University Softball Head Coach Pat Conlan recognizes the importance of setting the tone of the program rather than concentrating solely on a win-loss record. In the groundbreaking enterprise of bringing forth a new sport to the Hilltop, Conlan focuses on the process of winning and demands a team that is competitive every minute it is on the field.

After spending the inaugural fall season working on defense and communication, Conlan will spend most of the off-season working on individual skills with the team and recruiting the upcoming class with assistant coach Kim Staehle. She sees a lot of work ahead but is excited by the team's work ethic and great attitude.

Conlan, a member of the coaching staff at North Carolina State when the Wolfpack softball program was pioneered in the 2003–04 season, has experience with starting a new program.

"I learned an incredible amount from N.C. State head coach Lba Navas that has been instrumental in helping me get this program off the ground," says Conlan, "Although it was a new program, it was very different. N.C. State did not compete until they had their first recruiting class on campus."

Georgetown, however, will be playing its first season—the team's first game is on March 2 against George Washington—with a pool of student-athletes selected from tryouts.

The goal this off-season is for the team to become students of the game, build their strength and conditioning in the weight room and transform from a club squad into a team of Division I varsity athletes.

Conlan is impressed with the sacrifices her team has made to not only participate in, but to help establish a Division I softball program. A team that started as a group who tried out because they love the game of softball is now morphing into a team representative of Georgetown. Athletics. With this, Conlan expects their best and promises nothing less in return.

"Georgetown was the place I wanted to be the minute I laid eyes on the campus," Conlan said of starting the program here. "It has a tremendous academic and athletic reputation. The bottom line—Georgetown, to me, is an easy sell ... I think the Idea of starting a new program at such a prestigious place is a dream come true."

As for her expectations, Conlan sees a year of heavy recruiting ahead and recognizes that her current team is the foundation for Georgetown Softball

"Do I expect to win every game?" Conlan asked. "No, but I do expect to be competitive. I expect these kids to be prepared, play hard and have a great deal of heart and pride. These are the trademarks of any team that I will coach. And with all that in place—win some games!"

But with Conian at the helm, the product may come sooner than anyone expected.


Having four sets of siblings on the roster probably makes that idea hard to ignore for the Georgetown men's and women's swimming 12th-year head coach.

"We swim mostly different events, but when we do swim against each other, we get competitive," Don Ball said.

Georgetown Announces 2006 Hall of Fame Dinner

The Georgetown University Alumni Association and Hoyas Unlimited will host the 18th Georgetown Athletic Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and Dinner on Saturday, February 4, 2006. Five former Hoyas will be honored at the event: Retired Head Track & Field and Cross Country Coach Francis X. Gagliano, All-America track star Raymond Humphrey (C'87, L'94), crew standout Kelley Jones (C'88), men's tennis captain H. Lynn Moore, Jr. (C'89) and women's tennis all-star Penelope Rickard (N'88). Cocktalis will begin at 6 p.m., and the dinner and ceremony will commence at 7 p.m.



Frank Gagliano

During his 16 years as Head Coach of the Hoya track & field and cross country teams, Frank Gagliano solidified Georgetown's name on the short list of the nation's best programs and branded his own on the GU athletic tradition. "Gags" earned two National Coach of the Year awards and coached Team USA at the 1993 World University Games, but a coach is more commonly judged by the accomplishments of his athletes. Coach Gagliano's tenure is teeming with such accomplishments: 140 All-America performers, three Olympians, seven individual

national champions, 23 BIG EAST championship teams, eight indoor IC4A team titles, two outdoor IC4A crowns, 58 individual IC4A champions, eight Penn Relay Championship of America titles including a world-record-breaking distance medley relay team, and 46 school records.



Ray Humphrey (C'87, L'94)

A product of the "Gags" era, Ray Humphrey built one of the most impressive careers in Hoya track history. In his time on the Hilltop, he earned five All-America honors, along with two second-place finishes in the long jump at the NCAA Championships. In four years, Ray earned 10 IC4A gold medals, 12 BIG EAST titles and four Championship of America trophies at the Penn Relays. A three-time BIG EAST MVP and MVP of the IC4As, Ray is one of the best to ever sport the blue and gray.



Kelley Jones (C'88)

Kelley Jones picked up an oar for the first time as a Georgetown sophomore, and luckily for the Hoyas, she didn't put it down until well after graduation. As a junior, Kelley grabbed a gold medal at the 1987 Dad Vail Regatta with the Open-8 crew. As a senior, she was named team MVP, earning a gold medal in the Open-4 event at the Women's National Collegiate Championship. Kelley also represented the United States, rowing for the national team from 1989 to 1992, capping her international career off by participating in the 1992 Olympic Games in Banyoles, Spain.



Lynn Moore (C'89)


From 1985 to 1989, there were two things the Georgetown men's tennis team could count on: Lynn Moore would take on the opponent's top guy and, at the end of the season, earn team MVP honors. In 1987 he reached the BIG EAST Tournament semifinals after finishing second in the Capital Collegiate Tournament in the No. 1 singles competition. One year later, he reached the BIG EAST finals in the No. 2 singles competition and won the Capital Collegiate doubles tournament. During this three-year captain's senior season, the Hoyas finished with a gleaming 16-4 record.



Penny Rickard (N'88)

Almost completely foreign to losing, Penny Rickard tore through the BIG EAST during her time at Georgetown. Nabbing two conference titles and two second-place finishes in four years, Penny never finished lower than third in any singles competition. Reaching the NCAA Tournament three times—twice in doubles, once in singles—Penny led the Hoya team to its first-ever NCAA tourney appearance. Her final four-year record at Georgetown was 122-30.

The Athletic Hall of Fame Citation is a University-wide award presented to a graduate of Georgetown or to a coach or administrator who qualifies for recognition on the basis of superior athletic achievement or contribution to athletics at Georgetown. The Georgetown Hall of Fame was established in 1953 and is located in the southwest gallery of the Leavey Student Center on GU's campus. More than 200 student-athletes and leaders from the annals of Georgetown have been enshrined.
