

with Lucinda Williams. "That was a dream come true," says Ward, who adds that the highly anticipated Monsters of Folk album – with Mogis, Jim James and Conor Oberst – will have to wait until 2010. "Yeah, it's a strange life I have, but I can't complain."

Meet Adele, the U.K.'s Newest Soul Star

Big-voiced singer scores hit record and four Grammy nominations By Nicole Frehsée

about me, 'She's not going to get anywhere – she's a fat girl,' "says 20-year-old British soul singer Adele. "But it's obviously not an issue. I'm selling records, aren't I?"

Since its release in June, Adele's debut disc of smoky torch songs and retro-modern R&B, 19, has sold more than 270,000 copies and spawned a hit single, "Chasing Pavements." The London crooner (full name:

Adele Laurie Blue Adkins) has also scored four Grammy nods, including Best New Artist and Record of the Year. "After my publicist told me," she says, "I locked myself in the toilet for a good hour and cried."

As the latest U.K. soul bird to find success in America, Adele is often compared to Amy Winehouse and Duffy. But she's not a partyer like Winehouse, and she doesn't have Duffy's pinup looks. Adele is, however, refreshingly real—she's got a working-class London accent, a heavy Marlboro habit and a relaxed attitude about her un-pop-star body. "Whenever I've got a boyfriend, he likes it," she quips.

Adele attended the same performing-arts high school as Winehouse, Kate Nash and Leona Lewis – but she was more interested in A&R than singing. "I wanted to help other people sell records," she says. However, three demos that she recorded for a class project and posted on MySpace caught the attention of XL Recordings. "I went in thinking I could get a scouting job – then they said, 'We want to sign you.'"

As she was working on her album, Adele suffered a serendipitous case of heartbreak: She discovered that her boyfriend of six months had cheated on her. "I went to the pub [where he was] and punched him in the face," she says. "I got thrown out, and as I was running away, the phrase 'chasing pavements' came to me. I sang it into my phone, went home and got three chords together." So what became of the ex? "We're still friends," says Adele. "I'm grateful - I got a multiplatinum album [in the U.K.] out of it, and he still works at a phone shop."

She performed "Chasing Pavements" on Saturday Night Live in October for a record audience of 15 million people – thanks to Sarah Palin's surprise cameo. "I met her, and she said, 'I'm a huge fan,'" recalls Adele. "I had an Obama badge on. I felt like a backstabber."
