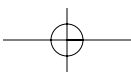

Baseball in South Florida A HURRICANE TRADITION

The University of Miami baseball program thrives as one of the best in the country as well as one of the most notable in South Florida's baseball history.

Miami's first varsity game was played at Miami Field, near Miami Senior High School, in the spring of 1940. The afternoon of March 26 saw the "Hurricane nine" defeat Newberry (S.C.) College in a 13-12 thriller. Games were actually played at UM briefly in the late 1920s and early 1930s, but were discontinued until a decade later when Jack Harding resurrected the sport at the varsity level in 1940.

Harding was the Hurricanes' football coach from 1937-42 and following World War II from 1945-47, as well as serving as UM's Athletic Director for 26 years. Baseball once again took a hiatus at Miami until 1946 when former UM football standout Eddie Dunn led the Hurricanes back onto the diamond.

From Major League Baseball, minor league organizations and top college and high school action, baseball and Miami have long been joined. Although amateur clubs were playing in Miami before the turn of the 20th century, the first official team appeared in 1912 with the minor league entry of the Miami Magicians of the Class D East Florida State League. The Magicians competed until the U.S. entered World War I.

Teams in the Florida East Coast League, including

the Miami Wahoos, Miami Beach Flamingos, Fort Lauderdale Tarpons and West Palm Beach Indians, suspended operations in 1943 until the end of the war. From 1946 through 1955, a large portion of UM's schedule was against military service teams throughout the Southeast.

Construction on Miami Stadium began in late 1948 and opened in August, 1949. At the time, the 9,000-seat stadium was hailed as one of the finest and most beautiful in baseball. The Hurricanes were still playing at Miami Field, as were numerous minor league, high school and major league exhibitions. The opening of the new state-of-the-art facility near downtown Miami gave way to games with the Hurricanes playing the likes of the Brooklyn Dodgers, Ft. Lauderdale Braves, Miami Beach Flamingos and Miami Beach Sun Sox as early as 1950.

The Marlins nickname made its first appearance in 1956 when the Triple A franchise from Syracuse, N.Y. moved south into Miami Stadium. Legendary baseball promoter Bill Veeck was brought in to run the team and one of his first hires was former Boston Red Sox Hall of Famer and UM head coach Jimmie Foxx. Foxx spent two seasons as head coach of the Hurricanes in 1956 and 1957.

The University of Miami became a major factor on the national collegiate baseball scene when the school hired Ron Fraser to guide the program in 1962. Fraser

came to Miami at a time when the nation's concerns were focused 90 miles from Key West's shores in the Cuban Missile Crisis. He was an All-American player at Florida State in the late 1950s and was the mentor of the Dutch National Team for three years before Miami lured him to Coral Gables. Over the span of 30 years, "The Wizard of College Baseball" built what many considered the model collegiate program.

The Hurricanes won big under Fraser, becoming a regular participant in the College World Series and winning two National Championships in the 1980s. It was also under Fraser that Miami made the upgrades to Mark Light Field and proved to many skeptics that college baseball could also be successful at the gate.

From Fraser to Jim Morris, the Hurricanes are still a big draw in town and annually place among college baseball's top 15. The success of the program has only escalated under Morris with two National Championships in 1999 and 2001, along with numerous All-Americans and Major League Baseball Draft selections.

The most recent renovations to Alex Rodriguez Park at Mark Light Field will undoubtedly contribute to UM's on-field success and to South Florida's rich baseball history.

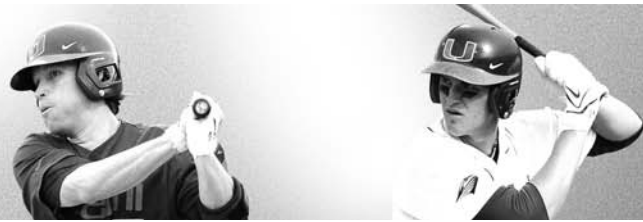

The Wizard of College Baseball

HURRICANES HEAD COACH FROM 1962-1992 - TWO NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS



There was that time when Ron Fraser received a phone call from friend and former Yankees slugger Joe DiMaggio, who had just attended a preseason Miami baseball practice a few days prior. DiMaggio had remembered a flaw in one of Coach Fraser's players swing and relayed over the phone some tips on correction. Fraser took the suggestion and began to work with the player. Future Hall of Famer Ernie Yaroshuk batted an amazing .448 during his senior season and was drafted by Philadelphia.

Then there was the time that Fraser had to call upon some old buddies to help save his team, which was rumored for contraction in its early stages. St. Louis Cardinals Hall of Famer Stan Musial and Major League broadcaster Joe Garagiola showed up and hosted a Miami baseball benefit, which in turn gained the necessary attention and support from the administration for continuing Fraser's young club's survival.

Or how about the time Fraser spent a couple of weeks in Bristol, Conn., campaigning his sports' presence with ESPN. Fraser's goal was to get the Hurricanes on TV against college baseball's biggest power, Southern California. What would become the first college baseball game ever on television was first to be just a one-game broadcast on tape delay. After the weekend series against the Trojans in Coral Gables was completed, Miami had defeated USC three consecutive games with each game broadcast live.

Did you know that a usually modest Boston Red Sox Hall of Famer Ted Williams once rode out from centerfield sitting in a giant sized glove in efforts to draw fans to Fraser's ballpark? Legendary Yankees broadcaster Mel Allen introduced him.

Fraser always seemed a step ahead of most. His early vision of the sport came when the rest started to think his way 20 years later. It is evidenced in the migration of the sports' top celebrities to Coral Gables and their teams' annual exhibitions against the Hurricanes a reflection of Fraser's baseball genius.

Ronald "Ron" George Fraser came to the University of Miami in 1962 after serving the Dutch National Team that lasted three years and produced three European

Championships. His international reputation earned him the job at Miami, succeeding Whitey Campbell. He was actually noticed by UM officials on the television show "What's My Line?" Fraser was a success on the show as he stumped the panel and unknowingly won over his future employer.

In the beginning, the support wasn't there. Fraser had nearly no money for his program and had to work days at a Coral Gables youth center. He didn't have the scholarships for his players, uniforms, nor bats or balls. Uniforms came from elsewhere, like the ones the Army program gave to Miami. Fraser recalled that the "A" and "Y" of Army were clearly visible around the freshly embroidered "Miami". Some of the first uniforms were bought from a Lucky Strike cigarette ad. Another friend of Fraser's, this one who designed Italian suits, created uniforms that were second to none with bright lime green as the dominant color.

What was first a rusty, rugged and dust-blown park soon transformed into a place where baseball was thriving. Balls and bats showed up at the park on the southwest corner of campus. The scholarships took 10 years, but you would have never known by the success of the program, nationally and abroad. Fraser received six scholarships in 1973, the team responded with 10 more victories. He got six more for 1974. His team went 51-11 and played for the national championship in its first College World Series appearance.

The Miami program really began to blossom following that first CWS appearance. Miami was annually among the leaders in attendance and eventually drew a decade-best 1.27 million in the 1980s. Two thousand to 4,000 fans were coming on average 10 years after Miami was lucky to have 100 show up for a game. Through Fraser's efforts, Mark Light Field, which was funded with the private donation largely from George and Ethel Light, was dedicated in 1973.

It was Fraser's knack for marketing and promotion that drew the masses and earned him the nickname "The Wizard of College Baseball". Miami players were wearing white shoes and colored gloves before Charlie Finley tried the same with his Oakland A's. Fraser was the first to hire batgirls and was the first to wear green gloves on St. Patrick's Day. There were incredible car and vacation giveaways, income tax night and the San Diego Chicken.

Perhaps Fraser's biggest extravaganza was the baseball fundraiser dubbed "A Night With Ron Fraser" on February 16, 1977, a \$5,000-a-plate gourmet dinner on the infield. Five-star chefs served a 10-course dinner of caviar, Alaskan king crab legs and pheasant under glass. A harpist in a white tuxedo played on the mound and violinists strolled among the tables. It was a huge success, covered by media from across the world.

His 30-year career at Miami that spanned more three decades, Fraser produced a 1,271-438-9 record with a NCAA-record 20 straight postseason appearances and 12 trips to the College World Series with national championships in 1982 and 1985. He is a 26-time coach of the year and a member of 10 halls of fame, including the inaugural class of the College Baseball Foundation Hall of Fame in 2006.

Miami Skippers HURRICANE HEAD COACHES FROM 1940-1993



EDDIE DUNN Nine Years (1946-54) 82-73-1 (.522)

The Post World War II era saw the rebirth of the University of Miami baseball program with former Hurricane football standout and eventual head coach Eddie Dunn at the helm.

Dunn was a nationally acclaimed running back for the Hurricanes from 1936-38 and later took the reins of the program from 1943-44 when gridiron coach Jack Harding left for service in the Navy. Dunn also served two seasons under Hart Morris on the men's basketball team, as well.

Over 60 years later, Dunn still remains ranked among UM's all-time top 10 in all-purpose yards (#3, 3,476), touchdowns (#5, 25), rushing yards (#8, 1,778) and points scored (#10, 160). His two football seasons saw UM go 5-1 in 1943 and 1-7-1 in '44, prior to the return of Harding to the UM sideline.

It was at that point when the Athletic Department enlisted the service of Dunn to resurrect both the basketball and baseball programs to varsity level during the post World War II era. UM had one previous season of varsity baseball in 1940 along with years of freshman class-level play.

Against teams from the state of Florida, military bases and around the Southeast, Dunn guided UM to an 82-73-2 mark over his nine seasons. His 1947 club went 11-2, followed by his second-best mark of 14-8 in '49. Dunn, who was raised in Miami, was the father of UM football All-American and Pittsburgh Steeler great Gary Dunn.



WHITEY CAMPBELL Four Years (1958, 1960-62) 69-36-3 (.653)

Former Miami four-sport star Whitey Campbell, a member of the UM Sports Hall of Fame, spent four seasons as head coach of the baseball program (1958, 1960-62). His Hurricanes were successful with a 69-36-3 combined record with highlight wins over Florida, Florida State, Jacksonville, Army, Georgia Tech and Ohio State.

Campbell, who was nicknamed "Mr. Athletics", saw action with the football, baseball and basketball programs earning 12 overall letters. He was also an assistant on the UM football coaching staff during two separate periods in the 1950's and 1960's, as well as holding assistant football coach positions at Montana, Navy and Kentucky.

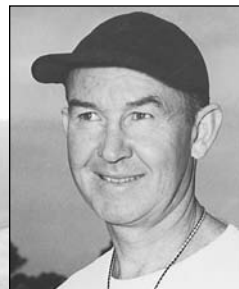
In baseball, Campbell batted .301 as a freshman, .412 as a sophomore, .328 as a junior and .428 in his senior year. In football, Campbell set numerous Miami receiving records while becoming the basketball programs' first 1,000-point scorer.



PERRY MOSS One Year (1955) 15-7 (.682)

Legendary head coach Perry Moss served one season at the helm of the Miami baseball program in 1955. His Hurricanes went 15-7, including wins over Florida and Florida State.

Moss' name is synonymous with the sport of football. Up until the 2000 season, Moss could be found pacing the sidelines of the Arena Football League's Jacksonville Tomcats. An amazing career within the sport of football, Moss has held head coach, front office and assistant coach roles in the NFL, CFL, WFL, USFL and both Arena leagues.



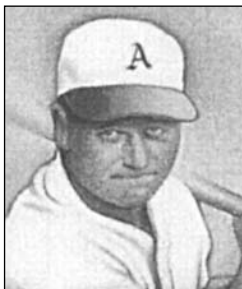
JACK HARDING Two Years (1940, 1959) 16-14-1 (.516)

Jack Harding served as head coach of the baseball program prior to World War II in 1940 and then again in 1959. His 1959 squad went 15-10-1 with big wins over Yale, Georgia Tech and Ohio State. Harding also served as Athletics Director at Miami from 1948-63 and then nine seasons as the head football coach (1937-42, 45-47).

His football teams went 54-23-3 during his tenure, including a 13-10 victory over Holy Cross in the Orange Bowl. During his stay at Miami, Harding left UM to serve in the United States Navy. The football program named its Most

Valuable Player award the Jack Harding Award, given annually since 1963.

Harding learned his football at the University of Pittsburgh, where he was a quarterback under legendary head coach Glenn "Pop" Warner. He then went on to coach at Scranton University prior to arriving in Coral Gables.

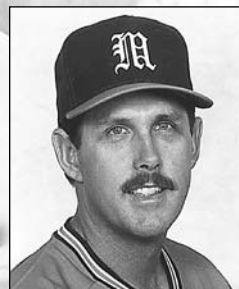


JIMMIE FOXX Two Years (1956-57) 20-20 (.500)

Major League Baseball Hall of Famer Jimmie Foxx spent two seasons in Coral Gables in 1956 and 1957. With a 20-20 combined record, Foxx's Hurricanes picked up wins over Florida State and Yale.

Foxx was inducted into the MLB Hall of Fame in 1951 after a stellar professional career that spanned 20 years with the Athletics, Red Sox, Cubs and Phillies. Foxx was the leagues' most valuable player three times (1932, '33, '38), while being selected to the all-star team from 1933-41. One of baseball's most feared batters, Foxx led the league in batting average

(1933, '38), home runs (1932, '33, '35, '39), RBI (1932, '33, '38). He was the triple-crown winner in 1933 and still holds numerous Boston Red Sox records.



BRAD KELLY One Year (1993) 36-22 (.621)

Longtime baseball assistant coach Brad Kelley served one season as the head coach in 1993, following the departure of legendary UM coach Ron Fraser.

His team went 36-22 in 1993, including wins over Long Beach State, Florida, Florida State and Rice.

Kelly served eight seasons as an assistant coach under Fraser, handling the UM pitching staff for six seasons. Kelly also served as an assistant coach on the United States national team as Fraser's top aide at the 1987 Pan American Games in Indianapolis. At the Games, the USA earned the silver medal

to World Champion Cuba's gold medal. The USA defeated Cuba three of the seven meetings at the Games.

"His Guys"

ON AND OFF THE FIELD, BASEBALL COACH RON FRASER'S LEGACY CONTINUES

After a coach's retirement people look to his won-lost record to see what kind of success he had. With over 1,200 wins, two national championships, 150 players signed to pro contracts, and more than two dozen coach-of-the-year honors, Ron Fraser, the University of Miami head baseball coach from 1963 through 1992, would impress anyone who judged on numbers alone. But reading career stats doesn't begin to cover Fraser's impact—on his sport, the University of Miami, and perhaps most of all to those who played for him. His guys.

Ron Fraser's appointment as Miami's baseball coach is a kind of foreshadowing of the public relations pizzazz he'd become so well-known for down the road. After graduating from Florida State in 1960, Fraser was hired to coach in Holland. He spent three years there, leading the Dutch national team to three straight European baseball championships.

When he returned to the U.S. Fraser was invited to appear on the popular game show, 'What's My Line?' where celebrities would try to guess which guest had a particular job. Fraser stumped them all during his turn on national television. It so happens that Jack Harding, UM's athletic director and head football coach, was watching the program. Harding decided Fraser should be the Hurricanes next baseball coach.

Back in the early 1960s, before Mark Light Field and the crowds and the promotions and that famous "Phantom" pick-off play in the College World Series, there were just day baseball games, played on a lumpy field in front of maybe a dozen people...with some very smelly baseballs.

"We didn't have much of an equipment budget," laughs Fraser. "We had to rinse practice balls in milk to make them look white and new for games!"

Those were the days when Hurricane baseball was played in wool uniforms—bought used where the previous team name could still be seen.

Jerry Reisman, a prominent Miami attorney who was an infielder on Fraser's first teams at UM, remembers those washed baseballs, along with how practices were always set up like a full game. He also remembers Fraser as the great storyteller, even in his early days.

"Except back in 1963 he wasn't much older than the players," laughs Reisman. "He would make fun of us...and vice versa!"

When the Hurricane athletic department was looking to trim costs and trying to determine which sport should go—baseball or basketball—Fraser had a PR idea he hoped would save his fledgling program.

"I was up in New York," says Fraser. "And [former major leaguer] Joe Garigiola was doing something I'd never heard of: motivational speaking. This was a new idea, athletes coming out on the banquet circuit like this. I listened to his speech and could see how fired up everyone in the crowd was. I thought, I gotta get this guy down to Miami."

Somehow Fraser not only convinced Joe Garigiola to come down and give a speech, but he also got legendary slugger Stan Musial to participate as well. Musial was part of a group which owned a hotel in Miami, and Fraser worked on Stan 'The Man' to provide the hotel's ballroom free of charge as the location. The event was a big success, leading to enough publicity, dollars, and excitement to keep the Hurricanes baseball program afloat.

Knowing how to generate interest and create publicity is a hallmark of Fraser's legacy. Among many "firsts" in college baseball, he is responsible for the first college baseball game broadcast live on television and a [male] fan favorite for the past 30 years, the first batgirls—UM's Sugarcanes. Fraser introduced his concept of co-eds acting as the pretty PR arm of the program the year before the Hurricanes made their first College World Series appearance in 1974.

A smiling Fraser will only say of the Sugarcanes, "Hey I just wanted to give people a reason to come to the ballpark every day."

Randy Olen is the Senior Vice President of Brokerage Services for C.B. Richard Ellis in Miami, and knows the sly smile of Ron Fraser well. They get together several times a year for dinner or a round of golf. Olen may be more acutely aware of Fraser's storytelling and PR skills better than most.

Olen, a catcher, played for the Hurricanes from 1969-1972. A Wisconsin native, Randy was set to play for Arizona State University when a scout told him he should take a long look at the University of Miami program.



"My mom and I flew down and checked in to a motel across from the University. Coach Fraser comes by and picks us up, and takes over to campus for a tour. We stopped by the business school, and then over to the student union (now the UC). I remember seeing that big Olympic-sized pool and being blown away—I had never seen a pool like that! Then it started raining. It was your typical South Florida summer afternoon boomer, but I didn't know that then. Fraser says, 'in 30 seconds it will stop.' He makes a point to look at his watch and sure enough, in exactly 30 seconds the rain stopped. I thought man, he really is a wizard."

Olen's tour of the UM campus stopped there. He just didn't know it at the time.

"After we walked through the middle of campus, we get back in Coach's car. It was so hot and I remember asking if he could please turn on the air. But his car didn't have air conditioning! We drove for about 10 minutes and Ron is talking about the program and who we'd be playing. Then we pull up to the most beautiful baseball field I had ever seen. He said to me, 'You'll be playing on that field soon.' I was overwhelmed. That beautiful baseball field, along with everything else UM had to offer. So I accepted a partial scholarship to UM."

Being his first visit in Miami, Olen didn't know where Fraser had taken him until he arrived that fall to go to school. Olen moved in to the dorms and prepared to start classes and play baseball. He showed up for the first practice and was surprised it was being held at a different field—this time much closer than the field the Coach showed him a few months earlier.

"You know that pretty ball field Ron drove my mom and me to?" Olen says, recalling the memory. "It was Dade South's baseball field. He drove us to [Miami-] Dade South! At that first practice I said, 'Coach, you showed me this beautiful baseball field.' And he said, 'Yeah, but I never told you it was UM's baseball field. I just said you'd be playing on that field one day soon. And you will. We play them this season.'"

In the late-1970s and early 1980s Miami baseball became a fixture on the national collegiate scene, hosting Regionals and making the College World Series year after year. With no pro basketball, baseball or hockey, and with Hurricane football still a few years from prominence, it was just the Dolphins and 'Canes baseball to capture South Florida sports fans. Fraser did everything he could to capitalize on the interest and audience. He hired college baseball's first full-time marketing director, Rick Remmert. He also hired a young man from the University of South Carolina whose college job had been playing 'Cocky' the gamecock mascot. John Routh was 'recruited' to join the Hurricane baseball family in 1982. Routh says he had two job offers upon graduation: work as a fundraiser for the Muscular Dystrophy Association or move to Coral Gables and be a college mascot. It was a no-brainer.

"Coach saw me perform the previous year in Omaha, and he thought that Miami needed its own mascot. The next season Miami played at South Carolina. During one game I sat next to Rick [Remmert] in the Gamecocks press box, and he wouldn't stop talking about what a great opportunity it was to work for Hurricane baseball. I was offered a trip down to perform at the season-ending series with FSU. I came down and after one weekend I was sold." And so the beloved Miami Maniac was born.

Fraser's continuing friendship with "his guys"—former players and staff—is apparent with one look at his datebook. Along with Remmert and many other former staffers, Routh regularly gets together with Coach. In fact, Routh was so happy that the Coach was in the inaugural induction class of the College Baseball Hall of Fame that he packed up some of his best Miami baseball memorabilia and brought it out to Lubbock, Texas, setting up a room full of "Fraser-ball" for all to see and enjoy.

It was during Fraser's tenure that the Hurricanes became among the leaders nationally in attendance, including five straight years as the #1 draw in college baseball. The 'Canes were a huge success on the field, but another reason fans kept coming night after night was because of some memorable promotions Fraser and his staff concocted. They included numerous vacation giveaways, the Miami Maniac's "wedding", and bikini day, where all the batgirls were in bikinis, fans who wore bikinis got in free, and if you brought binoculars you were charged double. From the legendary \$5,000/plate dinner (which received national and international television coverage) to the lucky numbers giveaways, all were done with a wink and a smile—Fraser's way of generating publicity and support for the game and University he loved so much.

"I just wanted to get the word out about how great college baseball was," Fraser jokes. "I don't know if in today's climate you could have things like bikini day, but we had a lot of fun and it got people talking about Hurricanes baseball. It kept us in the paper."

And what about the [in]famous promotion, the 'car an inning' giveaway?

"Well, I never said they were new cars! We had a hell of a time trying to start some of those cars and getting them moved."

With all of his personal honors and two national championship rings, it may be surprising to hear what Fraser considers the biggest thrill of his career:

"There's no doubt about it. The biggest thrill, the biggest moment for me was looking out and seeing crowds lined up, literally, around the block, to get into a game at Mark Light. I couldn't believe it," the smile apparent in Fraser's voice as he talks about it. "People were that excited to get into a college baseball game. The line was just huge."

Four-year starter Doug Shields, a fan favorite from the early 1980s, says the Coach always got his teams ready for big series. Shields loved everything about playing baseball at UM, but he's thankful for more than the chance to play baseball in the big-time atmosphere Fraser created. Shields says he also got them thinking about life after baseball, something many athletes don't want to prepare for.

"Every day when I'd show up for practice, Coach would be like 'Come here,'" Shields says. "He'd discuss the business section of the paper with me. We'd look at pork belly futures or what the stocks did that day. Every day he'd impress upon me how important it was to prepare for life after baseball. Coach Fraser told me it didn't matter if I played for the Yankees for 15 years or if I never played after my UM career ended—there was life after baseball and I better be prepared for it."

After wrapping up his illustrious 30-year UM coaching career in 1992, Fraser served as lead fundraiser for the University of Miami's Cornerstone Campaign.

Coach and wife Karen split their time between Weston, Florida and their summer home in North Carolina. Their Weston home provides ample opportunity to play golf and socialize with many former players and staff who are now considered among their dearest friends. Most important is the time spent with the three 'Fraser girls' known to so many of the Mark Light regulars: daughters Cynthia, Linda, and Liz all live close by, so Coach's five grandkids spend a lot of time with their 'Peepah.'

The street in front of the UM baseball complex is called Ron Fraser Way. The first floor of Richter Library is the setting for the Ron Fraser Reading Room. There are two national championships, dozens of civic awards and plaques, and six Hall of Fame inductions. Yet none of these truly capture all that the Coach means to his family—both the related kind and his Hurricane family. Especially to "his guys"—the players, so many of whom are still in his life.

This was never more evident than at his July 2006 induction into the College Baseball Hall of Fame. Fraser was honored to be among the inaugural class to be sure. The festivities—parade, induction ceremonies, the television coverage, and the banquet were all top-notch. But perhaps what says it all about the Coach's remarkable life were the letters...so many letters. Close to 100 letters came in, from former players telling Coach how much they learned from him and what knowing him has meant to their lives.

Over and over again the recurring theme jumping off the page was 'Coach, I want to be like you.' It is no coincidence so many former players have gone in to coaching. The players Fraser refers to as "my guys" and "my players" wrote how they use him as their role model both in coaching and in their lives.

Former assistant baseball coach Gino DiMare was a four-year starter for the 'Canes. Like a lot of players, Gino heard many of the Coach's stories over and over again.

"He gave the greatest speeches," DiMare says. You sometimes knew what story he was going to tell in a certain situation. Sometimes it was funny, sometimes it was just motivational. You might have heard it four straight years but it didn't matter—each time you heard it you were ready to run through walls for him."

DiMare realizes now just how much of an impact those speeches, and those four years spent playing for Fraser, really mean.

"Look, when you are young, between the ages of 18-21, your mind is on a lot of other things. You want to win. You're not thinking about much past baseball and your own life. When you played for Fraser you knew you were playing for a big-time coach in a major program, but it's when you're out of that for a year or two you begin to realize just what he means to the game. From coaches and ex-coaches I meet, from other people in baseball, it never ceases to amaze me how important he is to college baseball."

Ron Fraser's coaching legacy stretches past the 30 years he led the 'Canes on the field. His lessons on life, character, and baseball are continually passed down through the players' lives he touched. Annual team reunions give "his guys" a chance to touch base with the Coach who took them to the College World Series. They talk about the April Fool's gags they played on Coach each year, the ones he always fell for; his crazy superstitions, or the punishments for getting caught out after curfew on road trips. Whatever, it's a chance for yesterday's boys of summer to reconnect with the man who helped them develop into who they are today.

They will forever be "his guys."

RON FRASER
Head Coach
1963-1992

"The Wizard of College Baseball." In a career spanning 30 years, the Nutley, N.J. native won just about everything, including NCAA national titles in 1982 and 1985. He left the coaching ranks as second-winningest all-time coach with a 1,271-438-9 (.747) record. His UM teams set a NCAA record with 20 consecutive playoff appearances.

Fraser's expertise extended worldwide as well. He got his coaching start with the Netherlands that spawned three European Championships. Fraser guided the 1973 United States team that won the world title. In 1987, he led the USA to three upsets of Cuba and ultimately a Silver Medal at the Pan American Games. On the international front, his crowning glory was becoming the first Team USA coach when baseball was a medal sport at the 1992 Summer Games.

A 26-time coach of the year, he is a member of 10 halls of fame, including the first class inducted into the College Baseball Foundation Hall of Fame in 2006. Ron Fraser's uniform No. 1 was retired on April 24, 1993. Fraser still raises money for UM and has spent time in the booth as a color analyst on Fox Sports Net Florida broadcasts of Miami baseball. He and his wife Karen live in Weston.

MIKE FIORE
Outfield
1985-88

A four-year UM starter, Mike Fiore was a member of the 1988 gold medal-winning USA team. The gritty outfielder rewrote the Hurricanes' record book by setting 12 UM batting marks, including hits (341), runs (258), doubles (63), runs batted in (235) and total bases (506). Fiore earned Freshman All-American honors in leading Miami to the 1985 NCAA crown and was a consensus All-American as a senior. He is also Miami's only Dick Howser Trophy winner, earning the honor in 1987 after leading UM to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb.

Fiore completed his business degree on time in 1988, and following that season, was drafted and signed by the St. Louis Cardinals. For five seasons, he was the the Associate Director and General Manager for USA Baseball, before joining Scott Boras and Associates. He is also a member of Miami's Athletic Hall of Fame.



5
DOUG SHIELDS
Outfield
1981-84

In a stellar four-year career, Shields set a high standard for UM centerfielders for years to come. The Tampa, Fla., native set seven offensive records while leading the Hurricanes to the school's first national title in 1982.

Shields is UM's career leader in games played with 284 and ranks second in career at bats with 871. He ranks third in runs scored (238) and hits (271), and is 10th in career RBI with 165.

After graduating with a degree in marketing, Shields was signed by the Montreal Expos. However, a knee injury short circuited his pro aspirations. In 1988, Shields was one of 11 founders of the UM's Hall of Fame Locker room in the varsity clubhouse. He presently is in the roofing business with his father in Tampa.

STANLEY "SKIP" BERTMAN
Catcher 1958-60
Assistant Coach 1975-83

The first Hurricane baseball coach to have his number retired is best known for taking raw talent and transforming it into wins for Miami and a professional prospect. Bertman served as an assistant under Ron Fraser from 1975-83. He was then named the Head Coach at Louisiana State where he quickly turned that program into a national powerhouse. He played for UM as a catcher and outfielder from 1958-60.

At LSU, Bertman won five College World Series titles (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000). He retired at Louisiana State following his fifth NCAA title in 2000 to become the school's athletics director, a position he still holds. Bertman was also the head coach of the 1996 United States Olympic Baseball Team and is a member of the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame. Bertman joined Fraser as an inaugural inductee into the College Baseball Foundation Hall of Fame in 2006.

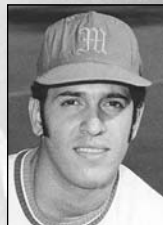

PAT BURRELL
Third Base
1996-98

Pat Burrell is the only player in the history of University of Miami baseball to win the coveted Golden Spikes Award. He finished his UM career with the best batting average in school history, hitting .442 over his three-year career and first in slugging percentage at .886. Burrell finished second in career home runs with 61, second in total bases with 465, fifth in RBI with 187 and fourth in walks with 170.

His 1996 freshman campaign was one of the greatest seasons in college baseball history, hitting .484 with 23 home runs and 64 RBI on a team that finished runner-up for the national title. Burrell's sophomore season saw him finish with 21 home runs and a .409 average to go along with 76 RBI.

He became Miami's first No. 1 overall pick in the Major League Draft in June of 1998 after hitting .432 with 17 home runs and 47 RBI in an injury-filled junior season. The 2006 season will mark his seventh year in the majors with the Philadelphia Phillies.

ORLANDO GONZALEZ
First Base
1973-74

Orlando Gonzalez's aggressive style of play at the plate and on the base paths led the Hurricanes to their first College World Series berth in 1974, a runner-up finish to Southern California. Gonzalez was named to the all-tournament team for his efforts at the CWS.

He won the 1974 Lefty Gomez Plate as the Outstanding Player in College Baseball as well as All-America honors by The Sporting News and the NCAA Coaches Association. He hit .338 with 38 stolen bases as a junior and .402 and 62 swipes as a senior in 1974. Drafted by Cleveland, he saw major league action with the Indians, A's and Phillies.

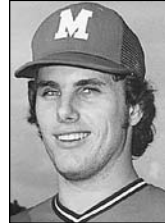

CHARLES JOHNSON
Catcher
1990-92

Charles Johnson was a three-year letterman for the Hurricanes from 1990-92 and a first-team All-American by The Sporting News in his final season.

He currently is listed in the 2005 Miami record book in four offensive categories: triples in a season (first, 9), triples in a career (fifth, 12) and home runs in a career (ninth, 38). Additionally, Johnson led the team in home runs in all three seasons in Coral Gables, as well as RBI in 1992.

He was drafted by the Florida Marlins in the first round after his junior season in 1992 and has enjoyed a solid Major League career that has spanned 14 seasons thus far.

STAN JAKUBOWSKI
Pitcher
1976-79

In 1974, as a 19-year-old sophomore, the right hander posted a 16-3 record and dazzling 1.46 ERA while being named to the AABCA All-America and All-College World Series teams. At the CWS, Jakubowski hurled a nine-hit complete game over Harvard in the Hurricanes' first CWS game ever. Miami finished runner-up to Southern California in their first College World Series.

Jakubowski finished his Miami career with a 40-14 record, 27 complete games, 432 innings pitched and 1.81 ERA. His 27 complete games is still a Miami school record. He was also a member of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Championship under Ron Fraser. Played professionally for the Pittsburgh Pirates and Texas Rangers organizations.

RANDY GUERRA
First Base/Pitcher
1976-79

"Dandy Randy" was "Mister Do-It-All for UM", excelling on the mound and at bat from 1976 to 1979. He won 20 games as a hurler, but was best known as a long-ball hitting first baseman. Guerra played professional ball in the New York Yankees chain.

Guerra's name is littered throughout the Hurricanes baseball record book. He finished his career in Coral Gables eighth on the career games played list with 238 appearances in the green and orange. That consistency also landed him fifth on the career at bats chart with 839.

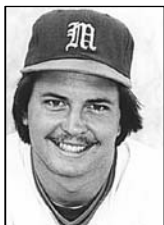
During his four-year career, Guerra flashed excellent skills at the plate, finishing sixth in Miami history with 252 hits. He also finished tied for ninth with 50 career doubles and tied for seventh with 39 career home runs. Maybe the most impressive statistic of Guerra's career was his 427 career total bases, which ranks third in Hurricane history, and 234 RBI, which ranks second.



33
J.D. ARTEAGA
Pitcher
1994-97

J.D. Arteaga established himself as one of the greatest pitchers to ever take the mound at Mark Light Field. During his four year career, Arteaga set school records for career starts (72) and career victories (43). He is second all-time in innings pitched (458.1) and fifth in career strikeouts (343). Arteaga is the all-time College World Series record holder for starts, leading the Hurricanes to four appearances in Omaha during his career. His No. 33 was retired at the beginning of the 2003 season.

Arteaga was a 28th-round draft choice of the New York Mets in the 1997 MLB draft. He pitched six productive years in the minor leagues, reaching the triple-A level for the Houston Astros organization. Arteaga retired in March of 2003 from professional baseball to become the pitching coach at his alma mater. Jim Morris went looking for an assistant coach in early March of that year and it only took a matter of hours for him to find his man in Arteaga.

NEAL HEATON
Pitcher
1979-81

Neal "The Heater" Heaton holds many of UM's pitching records, including victories in a season with 18 and strikeouts in a game with 23. He is second in career wins with 42, third in strikeouts in a season with 172 and third in career strikeouts 381.

In three years, 1979-81, Heaton was twice named an All-American and in 1981 was selected by the Cleveland Indians and made the parent club after just one year in the minors. Heaton was the first Hurricane to play in a big league all-star game and was inducted into the UM Hall of Fame in 1992.

The Grand Illusion A Play Charms The Nation

'It' was the single most talked-about play in the history of college baseball. 'It' set the town of Omaha buzzing for days, and the entire country tuned into college baseball as it never had before. 'It' caused accusations that the crowd, batgirls, umpires and TV network were in collusion.

'It' was "The Grand Illusion" a trick play devised by Miami Head Coach Ron Fraser and in the second game of the 1982 College World Series against Wichita State.

What Wichita State called it in the first few moments after its execution at Omaha's Rosenblatt Stadium will never be repeated on these, or any other family-oriented publications' pages.

Let's set the stage. Miami vs. Wichita State in round two of the NCAA College World Series in Omaha, Neb. Both teams were winners of their opening games, and the victor of this contest would advance in the winner's bracket play, while the loser would tumble into the loser's bracket.

Wichita State was the most awesome offensive machine ever assembled in college baseball history. With a team batting average of .350, more than 100 home runs, 327 stolen bases and a 71-12 record, the Shockers were expected to challenge No. 1 ranked Texas for the title with their unique brand of running and bombardment.

Miami, conversely, wasn't even supposed to be in the field for this eight-team, double-elimination tournament, suffering 17 regular season losses and owner of a pitching staff as maligned in 1982 as it had been praised in preceding years.

Everything came to a head on Monday, June 7, 1982.

It was the sixth inning, Miami leading by the eventual winning margin of 4-3. The greatest single season base stealer in NCAA history, Phil Stephenson, 86 of 91 thefts, drew a walk to open the inning.

The Play's signal, Associate Head Coach Skip Bertman sticking his finger in his ear was given, a maneuver which pitcher Mike Kasprzak repeated to clue his teammates in. Several leisurely tosses back to first base got the desired result, Stephenson diving back.

Once more Kasprzak stepped off the rubber, but this time he kept the ball and cursed the throw to first. First baseman Steve Lusby dove over the returning runner, faked his displeasure and took off for the right field bullpen in pursuit of a ball, or so it seemed.

Second baseman Mitch Seoane and right fielder Mickey Williams did likewise, converging on the bullpen where reliever Dan Smith and catcher Bob Walker leaped up as if to avoid being hit by a ball.

Shortstop Bill Wrona forlornly covered second base, looking in the distance at the bullpen commotion. Kasprzak shrugged his shoulders as if he had indeed thrown the ball away. And all the while, half the Miami dugout was stirring and pointing to the bullpen area, admonishing, "there's the ball."

First base umpire Dale Williams started down the line; the entire right field bleachers rose as one to see the commotion going on in front of it; obviously, the ball was loose.

In short it was one heck of a fake.

Stephenson fell for the ploy and lit out for second base. Kasprzak calmly pulled the ball from his mitt and tossed to Wrona, who put the tag on a very confused runner.

From that point, the momentum shifted Miami's way. Wichita State no longer in this game or the succeeding Championship Game, used reckless abandon on the base paths. In Miami's very next game, a superior running team, Texas, was so wary they shortened their leads by a step or two.

And in the semifinal, Miami pitcher Rob Souza muffed a pickoff play at second, throwing the ball into center field. But the Maine runner stayed put. As his coach, Dr. John Winkin, put it, "I thought it was another trick play. I thought Souza had thrown the rosin bag into center and still held the ball."

"That's the best," said Bertman. "But that's what a trick play will do for you, place uncertainty in the mind of the opponent."

For the play to have worked, certain factors had to be present:

- Wichita State had to use a player as first base coach
- Stephenson or one of Wichita State's other aggressive baserunners, Loren Hibbs (63 steals) or Jim Thomas (57) had to be on base
- It had to be late in the game - dusk
- The runner had to dive back to the bag on the initial toss over.

"I thought if we could put those four things together, we'd have a shot," said Bertman, who at assistant coach Dave Scott's urging, put the play in "to loosen the team up" the day before.

"The players really enjoyed practicing the play," Bertman added, "and that's what really sold me on it."



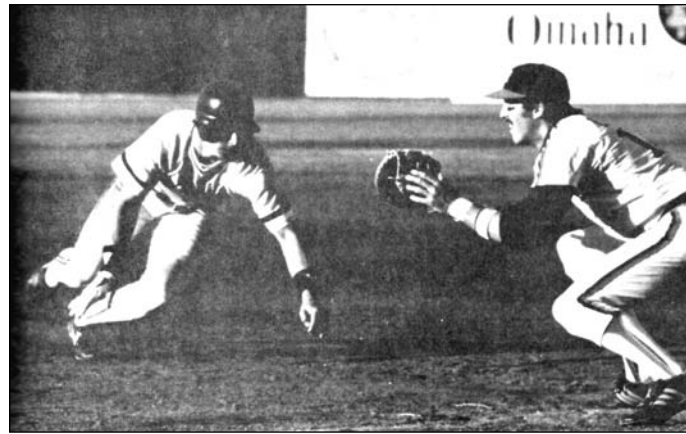
The play actually was on in both the first and third innings, but circumstances prevented it from being attempted. The time came in the sixth, when all factors meshed perfectly. History was made, in front of 10,280 in-person witnesses, millions more on live nationwide cable TV and, in days to come, tens of millions more on such shows as "This Week in Baseball," "The Baseball Bunch," and virtually every sportscast in the land.

In short, Miami had done for college baseball with one trick play, what no one previously could; bring national acclaim.

Was there any downside to the play?

"Do you know how stupid I would have looked if it hadn't worked?" asked Fraser.

For Fraser, for the University of Miami and for the good of college baseball, fortunately, it worked.

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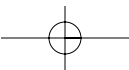
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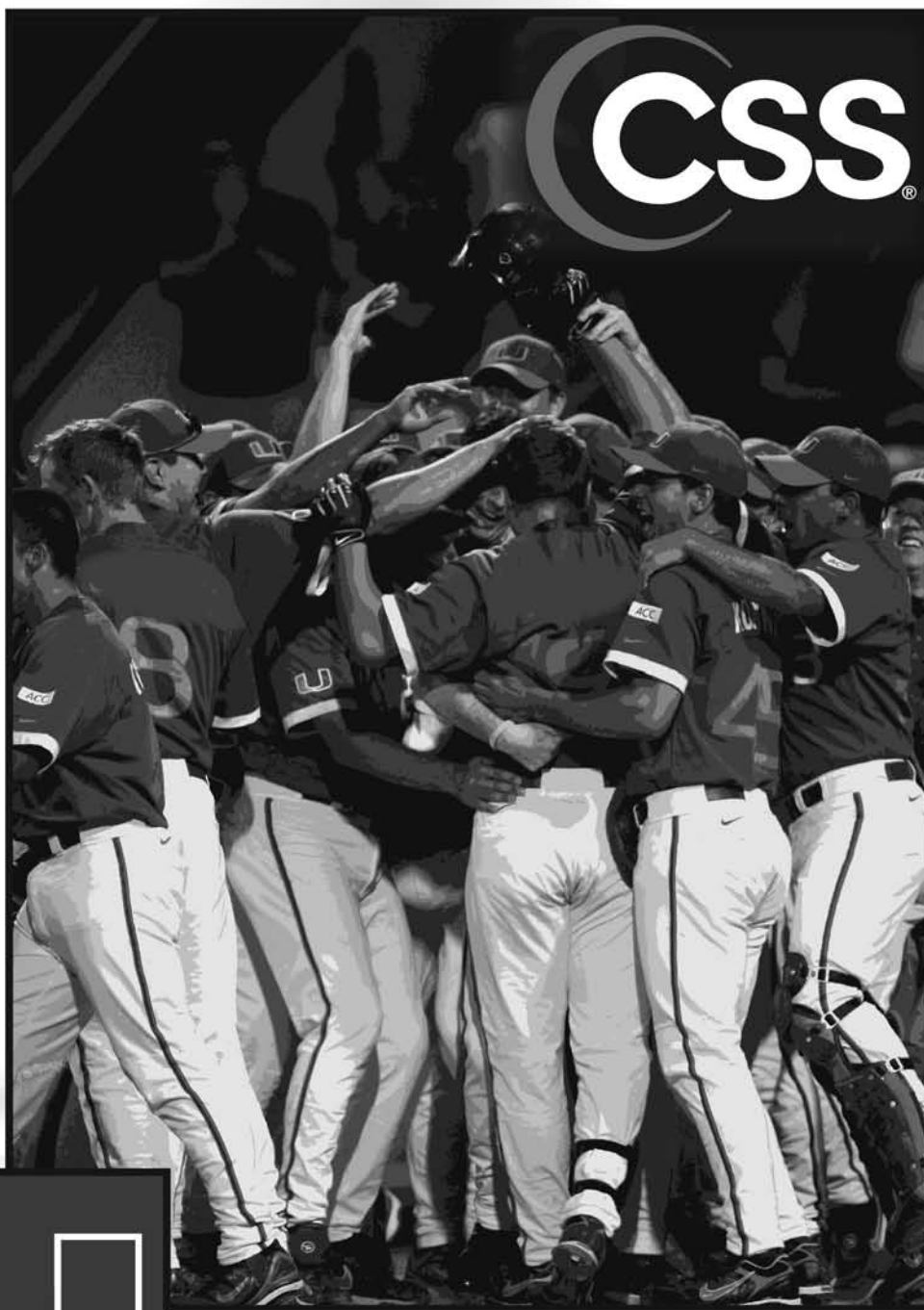
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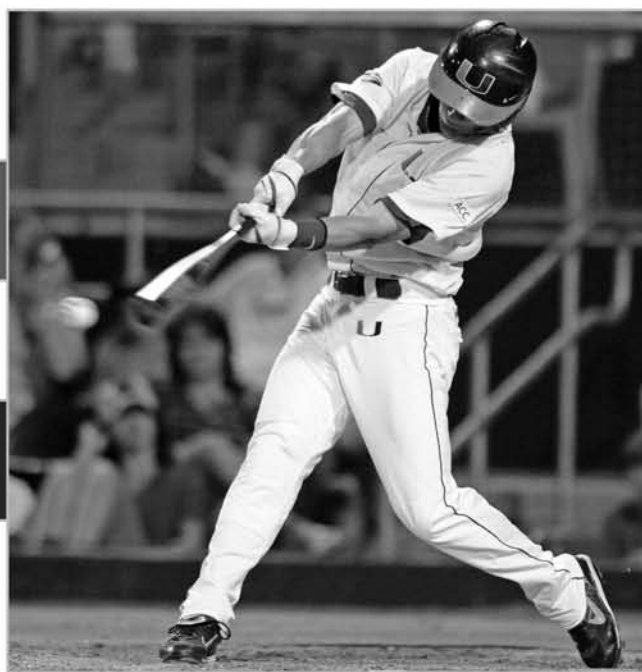
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
