## **2004 GAME SUMMARIES**



### GAME 1 - August 28, Landover, Maryland **Black Coaches Association Football Classic** USC 24, Virginia Tech 13 Att: 91,665

TB Reggie Bush caught 3 long touchdown passes from QB Matt Leinart to propel top-ranked and defending national champion USC to a 24-13 comeback victory over unranked Virginia Tech in the collegiate season-opening Black Coaches Association Football Classic before a sold-out crowd of 91,665 fans at steamy FedEx Field in Landover, Md., and an ESPN national primetime audience. It extended Troy's winning streak to 10 games.

Bush became the 10th USC player to catch a school-record 3 TD passes in a game, but the first running back to do so. He had 258 all-purpose yards (127 on 5 receptions, 60 on 4 punt returns, 44 on 3 kickoff returns and 27 on 9 rushes). He was named the Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week.

Following an interception by LB Lofa Tatupu, USC opened the scoring late in the first quarter as Bush took a short pass over the middle and raced 35 yards up the middle for a TD. But the Hokies answered on the next series with a 35-yard field goal by PK Brandon Pace. After a missed USC field goal on the ensuing possession, Virginia Tech took the lead midway through the second quarter when QB Bryan Randall hit WR Josh Hyman on a 12-yard scoring pass.

That lead held up until late into the third quarter until Bush hauled in a 53yard Leinart bomb for a TD. But Virginia Tech pulled within 14-13 midway through the final quarter on a 42-yard Pace field goal. However, USC struck right back on the next series on a 29-yard Leinart scoring pass to a wide-open Bush. Then, following a fumble recovery by CB Ronald Nunn, PK Ryan Killeen nailed a 41yard field goal.

Leinart was 19-of-29 for 272 yards (he was 11-of-13 for 170 yards and 2 TDs in the second half, with 11 consecutive completions at one point). TB **LenDale** White ran for 78 yards on 15 carries, while WR Steve Smith had 4 catches for 68 yards

USC outgained Virginia Tech, 373 yards to 294, despite having less plays (63-58), possession time (31:31-28:29) and first downs (18-16).

The Hokies had 207 yards of total offense in the first half, but managed just 87 total yards in the second half. Randall was 14-of-29 passing for 153 yards and ran for a game-high 82 yards on 17 carries (he had 96 rushing yards in the first half), with TE Jeff King catching getting 4 grabs for 65 yards.

The Trojan defense posted 5 sacks, with DT Mike Patterson getting 2.5 (4 of his 6 tackles were for losses) along with a forced fumble. Tatupu added 8 tackles and S Darnell Bing had 7 stops.

It was USC's first meeting against Virginia Tech (playing its first game as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference) and its second-ever appearance in Maryland. The attendance not only was a FedEx Field record and the most ever to view a Virginia Tech game, but it was USC's largest road crowd since the 1994 UCLA game and its most for an opener since the 1980 contest at Tennessee.

### GAME 2 – September 11, Los Angeles Coliseum **USC 49, Colorado State 0** Att: 85,521

USC, making its first Coliseum appearance as a No. 1-ranked team since 1981, opened its 2004 home slate impressively behind 3 rushing touchdowns from TB **LenDale White** and 4 interceptions by the defense to blank first-time opponent Colorado State, 49-0, on a hot evening before 85,521 Coliseum fans and a regional ABC-TV audience.

It was Troy's first shutout in a home opener since 1973 and the first time CSU was whitewashed in 85 games (and its worst loss in 8 years). It also was USC's 11th consecutive win and its 16 straight victory at home. It was the largest crowd for a home opener since 1988.

The Trojans rushed for 322 yards, their most since getting 331 at Ohio State in 1990. White, who ran for a game-best 123 yards (the fourth 100-yard outing in his career) on just 14 carries (8.8 average per carry), scored USC's first 3 TDs (11 yards in the first quarter, then 1 and 3 yards in the second quarter). Fellow TB **Reggie Bush** then added a 7-yard scoring run just before halftime as USC opened up a 28-0 lead at intermission. Bush rushed for 84 yards on 12 tries.

QB Matt Leinart, who was 20-of-31 for 231 yards in just 3 quarters of action (he also ran for a career-high 46 yards on 7 attempts), threw a pair of thirdquarter TDs, a 5-yarder to WR Steve Smith—who caught a career-best 8 passes for 79 yards—and a 4-yarder to WR **Dwayne Jarrett**, who was celebrating his 18th

USC finished its scoring early in the fourth quarter when DE Jeff Schweiger sacked Rams QB Justin Holland and DT Manuel Wright raced 20 yards into the end zone with the recovery.

The Trojan defense forced 6 turnovers (scoring after 5 of them), with LBMatt Grootegoed picking off 2 passes (CB Eric Wright and LB Dallas Sartz also had interceptions and S Jason Leach had the other fumble recovery). Three of the turnovers came inside the USC 20-yard line.

USC had 553 total yards to CSU's 281 (the Rams had just 48 yards on the ground). The Trojans also had 32 first downs (21 in the first half), scored twice on 90-plus yard drives, held the ball 33:13 and limited CSU to 3-of-14 on third down conversions.

Holland was 19-of-35 for 233 yards, but he was sacked 4 times. CSU WR David Anderson had 9 grabs for 137 yards.

USC unveiled its 2003 national championship banner at the game, which also included a moment of silence in honor of the third anniversary of Sept. 11.

### GAME 3 – September 18, Provo, Utah **USC 42, BYU 10** Att: 63,467

USC 0 21 0 21 42 **BYU** 10

Top-ranked USC made its first visit to BYU a memorable one as it overwhelmed the Cougars, 42-10, before a near-capacity crowd of 63,467 fans in LaVell Edwards Stadium and a national ESPN audience.

It was USC's 12th consecutive win and its seventh straight road victory.

USC's offense rolled up 514 total yards, including 278 on the ground (with 4 rushing TDs) against a Cougar defense that was seventh nationally against the run (41.5). TBs Reggie Bush (124 yards—the first 100-yard outing of his career and 1 TD on 14 carries) and LenDale White (110 yards—his second consecutive 100-yard game—and 1 TD on 17 carries) became the first Trojan duo to eclipse the 100-yard rushing barrier since Chad Morton and LaVale Woods did so against Oregon State in 1996. Coupled with the 322 rushing yards USC had in its previous game against Colorado State, the 600 rushing yards were the most by Troy in back-to-back games since getting 638 against Ohio State and Washington State in 1990.

And USC's defense limited BYU to just 207 total yards (only 13 rushing), 23:07 of possession time and 4-of-15 third down conversions while getting turnovers and 4 sacks. The Trojans had a decided edge in plays (85 to 58) and first downs (26 to 11).

BYU held USC scoreless in the first quarter for the first time in Troy's past 17 games before PK Matt Payne gave the Cougars the lead with his 46-yard field goal early in the second quarter. But USC then scored 21 unanswered points before halftime: a 21-yard pass from QB Matt Leinart to Bush on the Trojans' ensuing possession, followed by a career-long 66-yard run by Bush with 2:03 to go and then a 15-yard Leinart TD pass to WR Dwayne Jarrett less than a minute later (3 plays after LB **Lofa Tatupu** recovered a BYU fumble).

But the Cougars, who had only 98 total yards at halftime compared to USC's 255, struck on their first play of the second half, a 69-yard scoring bomb from QB John Beck to WR Todd Watkins (the brother of USC OG Travis Watkins). However, USC controlled the rest of the game, getting fourth quarter TD runs from Leinart (1 yard for his first career score), White (43 yards) and FB Lee Webb (9 yards for his first career score).

Leinart was 22-of-34 for 236 yards and the 2 TDs (but he threw a first quarter interception to break a streak of 102 passes without a pick). WRSteve Smith had 6 catches for 62 yards, Bush added 4 for 42 yards (he had 211 all-purpose yards), WR Chris McFoy had 4 for 37 yards and Jarrett had 3 for 58 yards. Tatupu had a team-best 7 tackles and DE-DT **Shaun Cody** had 3 sacks.

For BYU, Beck hit 18-of-33 passes for 194 yards but was intercepted 3 times (by LB Matt Grootegoed, S Darnell Bing and CB Terrell Thomas), while Watkins had 4 catches for 94 yards.

The game was a homecoming for USC offensive coordinator Norm Chow, who returned for the first time to the school where he spent 27 years as an assistant.

### GAME 4 – September 25, Palo Alto, California **USC 31, Stanford 28** Att: 55,750

No. 1 USC averted a major upset in its Pac-10 opener by overcoming an 11point third quarter deficit to post a 31-28 victory at Stanford in front of 55,750 fans and a national TBS cable audience.

It was USC's 13th consecutive victory, as well as its eighth straight win on the road and in Pac-10 play.

It was a game of 2 halves. After surrendering 291 total yards in the first half to Stanford, USC shut out the Cardinal in the second half by allowing only 36 total yards and 2 first downs (Stanford penetrated midfield on only 1 drive that half). And the Trojans got 224 of their 383 total yards after halftime (along with 14 of their 23 first downs) while controlling the ball for 17:23.

USC jumped out to a 10-0 first quarter lead on a 23-yard field goal by PK Ryan Killeen on its opening possession and then a 2-yard TD pass from QB Matt Leinart to WR Steve Smith, 1 play after CB Kevin Arbet's 66-yard interception

But the Cardinal then scored on its next 4 possessions. First, QB Trent Edwards threw a pair of short TD passes to FL Evan Moore (3 yards) and TE Patrick Danahy (2 yards). Then, QB Kyle Matter ran 11 yards on a fake field goal late in the half after USC lost a fumble. Troy quickly pulled within 21-17 on a 17-yard tackle-breaking TD run by TB Reggie Bush with 52 second left in the half, but Stanford stunned the Trojans as TB J.R. Lemon—while trying to run out the clock burst out of the pile and raced 82 yards for a TD on the half's final play.

But USC came out energized in the second half and got a pair of short TDs runs, first by Leinart (1 yard) late in the third quarter and then—aided by Bush's zig-zagging 33-yard punt return—by TB LenDale White (2 yards) with 6:15 to

Leinart hit a career-best 76.7% of his passes (23-of-30) for 284 yards, Bush had 240 all-purpose yards (95 on 16 rushes, 25 on 4 receptions, 85 on 4 kickoff returns and 35 on 2 punt returns) and Smith had 7 catches for 129 yards. LB Lofa Tatupu posted a game-high 10 tackles, LB Matt Grootegoed added 7 stops and LB Keith Rivers had 2 sacks.

For Stanford, Edwards was 23-of-35 for 183 yards (but just 3-of-9 for 19 yards in the second half) and Lemon ran 96 yards on 10 carries.

### GAME 5 - October 9, Los Angeles Coliseum **USC 23, California 17** Att: 90,008

Top-ranked USC withstood an NCAA record-setting performance by California QB Aaron Rodgers and used a late goal line stand to hold off the No. 7 Golden Bears, 23-17, before a sold-out, vocal Coliseum crowd of 90,008 and an ABC-TV regional audience

The victory over Cal, the only team to beat the Trojans in their last 26 games, was Troy's 14th consecutive win, as well as its 17th in a row at home and its ninth straight Pac-10 win. The crowd—the first home sellout in the series since 1930 was USC's largest in the Coliseum for a non-UCLA or Notre Dame game since the 1952 California contest.

Rodgers completed his first 23 passes to tie an NCAA single game record (he also set an NCAA season mark with 26 straight completions extending to his previous game), but he couldn't connect when it counted the most. He guided Cal to a first-and-goal at the Trojan 9-yard line with 1:47 to play, but a sack by DT Manuel Wright and 3 incomplete passes ended the Bears' upset hopes. Overall, Rodgers was 29-of-35 for 267 yards (including 14-of-14 for 133 yards in the first half), but he coughed up 2 fumbles and was sacked 5 times.

Cal dominated the statistics, more than doubling USC's first downs (28-12) and total yards (424-205) while getting more plays (79-50) and possession time (37:11-22:49). USC's total yards and plays were its fewest since 1998 (189 yards at Florida State and 49 plays versus TCU), while Cal's first downs were the most against USC since 1999 (29 by Oregon). But the Bears, who were first nationally in scoring offense (48.7) and second in total offense (539.0), were held to 41 points and 115 yards under their averages, and they also had 3 costly turnovers.

USC jumped out to a 10-0 first quarter lead on a 5-yard pass from QB Matt Leinart to TB LenDale White (after a botched Cal punt attempt) and a 31-yard field goal by PK Ryan Killeen (following a fumble recovery by DT Mike Patterson). Cal got on the board early in the second quarter with a 39-yard field goal by PK Tom Schneider, but Killeen answered with a 33-yard field goal (after CB **Eric Wright** recovered a fumbled punt return by Cal). The Bears responded on the ensuing series, as Rodgers hit WR Geoff McArthur for a 20-yard TD, but Killeen hit his third field goal of the half (a 42-yarder) just 3 seconds before intermission.

The teams traded touchdowns on their opening series of the second half, first a 16-yard Leinart toss to WR Dwayne Jarrett and then TB Marshawn Lynch's 2yard run. Neither team could score the rest of the game, with USC failing to get a first down in its final 4 possessions and Cal losing a fumble (recovered again by Patterson) and missing a field goal before its unsuccessful final drive. USC had just 78 yards of total offense in the second half.

Leinart was 15-of-24 for 164 yards, but was intercepted once (4 plays after an 84-yard kickoff return by TB Reggie Bush in the third quarter). White ran for 52 yards on 11 carries and Jarrett had 4 catches for 37 yards.

Cal TB J.J. Arrington had 112 yards on 21 carries to become the first runner over 100 yards against USC in 14 games, while McArthur had 7 grabs for 101

LB Lofa Tatupu (13 tackles) was among 4 Trojans in double figures in tackles (with SScott Ware's 12, Patterson's career-high 10 and LB Dallas Sartz's 10). Patterson, who also had 2 tackles for losses (with a sack) and a forced fumble, was named the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week, Football Writers Association of America Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week and Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week for his showing. All 6 of Killeen's kickoffs were touchbacks (Killeen was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week).

It was the first time since 1968 that the teams met when both were ranked and it also was the highest-ranked Cal squad USC had faced since 1952. ESPN's "College GameDay" pre-game show made its first visit to the Coliseum.

Top-ranked USC used a 42-point first half—behind 4 touchdown passes from QB Matt Leinart and school single game record-tying 3 scoring grabs by true freshman WR Dwayne Jarrett—to demolish No. 15 Arizona State, 45-7, before a sold-out Coliseum crowd of 90,211 and an ABC-TV regional audience.

It was USC's 15th consecutive win (the last 3 were over undefeated teams), as well as its 18th victory in a row at home, 10th straight Pac-10 win and 10th consecutive victory over an APTop 25 team. It was USC's fifth consecutive win over ASU, but its first in 5 tries over a ranked Sun Devil team. It was also USC's second consecutive Coliseum sellout (only the second time in history it has done that, the other being in 1947) and the largest crowd to see a non-UCLA/non-Notre Dame home game since 1952.

USC led 42-7 at halftime and had nearly doubled the Sun Devils in total offense (307 to 155) and first downs (15 to 8). It was the most points in a half by USC since 1981 (when it had 42 at Oregon State). All of ASU's first half yardage came through the air and the Sun Devils converted just 3 of 10 first downs while being assessed 8 penalties.

USC jumped out to a 21-0 lead on Leinart scoring tosses to TBs Reggie Bush (10 yards) and LenDale White (9 yards) in the first quarter and to Jarrett early in the second quarter (19 yards on the play following LB **Matt Grootegoed's** interception). After ASU got in the end zone on TB Hakim Hill's 2-yard run following a Trojan fumble, USC scored TDs on its final 3 possessions of the second quarter (all in the last 5:08): a 1-yard Leinart sneak, then Jarrett catches from Bush on a reverse (52 yards) and Leinart (34 yards).

The game's only second half scoring came on a 34-yard fourth quarter field goal by PK Ryan Killeen as USC played mainly its reserves in the final period.

Overall, USC had 446 total yards and 23 first downs against a Sun Devil defense that was in the national Top 25 in every stat category (allowing just 12.8 points and 304.4 total yards). Leinart was 13-of-24 for 224 yards in 3 quarters of work (he was 11-of-16 for 193 yards and the 4 TDs in the first half), Jarrett had 5 catches for a career-best 139 yards (he was named Rivals.com National Freshman of the Week), White ran for 68 yards on 16 carries (and had 2 catches for 22 yards) and Bush had 115 all-purpose yards (49 on 2 punt returns, including a 41-yarder in which he barely stepped out of bounds as he was breaking into the clear, plus 45 yards on 2 receptions and 21 on 5 carries). Six of Killeen's 8 kickoffs were touchbacks. LB Dallas Sartz led USC with 7 tackles and S Darnell Bing added 6 tackles and an interception.

For ASU, which overall managed just 243 total yards (24 rushing) and 13 first downs (converting only 5-of-17 third downs) while surrendering 8 sacks, QB Andrew Walter was 19-of-34 for 181 yards but was intercepted twice (he had thrown only 1 pick in 179 season attempts coming in and was the ASU career recordholder with 70 TDs), with TE Zach Miller getting 8 grabs for 102 yards. Walter became ASU's career leader in passing yardage and completions

The 50 millionth fan (Jim Farrell of Long Beach) to see a USC football game, home and away, came through the gates.

QB Matt Leinart threw 2 touchdowns passes, TB LenDale White ran for 2 more and the Trojan defense allowed just 113 total yards as No. 1 USC whitewashed Washington, 38-0, before 72,855 fans and a FSN national cable audience watching the 75th meeting in the series.

It ended Washington's national-best active streak of consecutive games without being shut out at 271 (dating to 1981) and assured the Huskies—who moved to 1-6 overall (their worst start since 1973)—of their first losing record since 1976. It was USC's first shutout in the series since 1965 and its biggest margin of victory over UW since 1954. It also extended USC's winning streak to 16 in a row (plus 19 consecutive at home and 11 straight Pac-10 games) and gave the Trojans their best start (7-0) since 1988.

UW's total yards, 63 passing yards and 7 completions were the fewest allowed by USC since the 2002 Colorado game (61, 24 and 2). USC also limited Washington to 6 first downs (the fewest since Notre Dame had 4 in 2002), no third down conversions on 14 attempts (and 0-of 1 on fourth down tries) and just 20:51 of possession time (the lowest since Texas Tech had 19:58 in the 1995 Cotton Bowl).

USC led just 10-0 after a sluggish first half on a 29-yard field goal by Ryan Killeen (after LB Lofa Tatupu's fumble recovery) and a 15-yard Leinart scoring pass to TB Reggie Bush, both in the second quarter.

But the Trojans scored on their first 2 possessions of the second half, on a 3-yard White run (following DE Frostee Rucker's fumble recovery on UW's first play) and then a 29-yard Leinart strike to WR Jason Mitchell (for his first career TD). The Trojans scored again late in the third quarter on White's 2-yard run and then late in the game with all the reserves in on TB Desmond Reed's 28-yard run (his first career score)

USC piled up 453 total yards (256 through the air) and 28 first downs while running off 90 plays (USC's most since the 2002 California game) to Washington's 55 (the fewest by a USC foe since the 2002 Notre Dame contest). The Huskies averaged just 2.1 yards per play. Troy's 48 pass attempts were its most since the 2002 Washington State game.

Leinart was 24-of-43 (a career-high attempts) for 217 yards and an interception before getting replaced after the first series of the fourth quarter. White ran for 93 yards on 17 carries and Bush had 126 all-purpose yards (55 on 13 carries, 41 on a game- and career-best 6 receptions and a 30-yard punt return). Thirteen Trojans caught passes, including TE Dominique Byrd (57 yards) and WR Dwayne Jarrett (31 yards), who each had 5 grabs. LB Matt Grootegoed had a team-best 5 tackles (2 for losses) and forced a fumble, LB Keith Rivers had an interception and 4 stops and Rucker had 2 tackles for loss and a forced fumble along with his fumble recovery. Killeen had 6 touchbacks for the fourth time in 2004, while P Tom Malone averaged 48.3 yards on his 3 punts.

For Washington, QB Isaiah Stanback made his first career start and was just 3-of-16 for 27 yards before being replaced in the fourth quarter by QB Casey Paus (who went 4-of-12 for 36 yards with a pick). DT Manase Hopoi had a UW game record-tying 6 tackles for a loss (with 3 sacks). The Huskies got into USC territory on just 2 of their 16 drives, missing first half field goals (both coming after USC turnovers), and they had just one play longer than 11 yards (an 18-yard run).

No. 1 USC used an impressive offensive performance—TBs Reggie Bush and LenDale White both scored 2 touchdowns and QBMatt Leinart threw a pair of TDs to WR Dwayne Jarrett—and a strong defensive showing to cruise to a 42-12 win at cold (upper 30s), wet Washington State before a sold out crowd of 35,117 and an ABC-TV regional audience.

It was Troy's 17th consecutive win, as well as its 12th straight Pac-10 victory and ninth win in a row on the road.

The game was over quickly, as USC led 14-0 before WSU's offense got on the field. By halftime, it was 35-0, as the Trojans had 289 yards and 16 first downs to the Cougars 54 and 4.

After WSU tied an unsuccessful onside kick to open the game, it took USC just 5 plays to score, as Bush ran 19 yards for a TD. Then, after WSU couldn't handle the ensuing kickoff (TB Desmond Reed recovered it), it was only another 2 plays before USC scored again (a 1-yard White run). Then, midway through the first quarter, Bush took a punt, reversed his field and went 57 yards to the end

USC scored twice more in the middle of the second quarter: first on a 42yard Leinart pass to Jarrett and then, 5 plays after DT Mike Patterson recovered a fumble (caused on a sack by DT Shaun Cody), White ran 7 yards

USC scored on its first possession of the second half on a 4-yard pass from Leinart to Jarrett to open up a 42-0 lead.

WSU finally got on the board late in the third quarter following a pair of USC turnovers when the Trojans were playing many backups. First, WR Michael Bumpus caught a 24-yard pass from QB Alex Brink after a USC fumble and then LB Pat Bennett intercepted a pass by QB Matt Cassel on USC's next offensive play and ran 28 yards for a score

Overall, USC dominated the statistics, getting more total yards (421-156), plays (84-65), first downs (25-11) and possession time (38:54-21:06). The Cougars ran for minus 9 yards, converted just 5-of-18 third downs and had 4 turnovers (they fumbled 7 times). It was the first time since 1996 that WSU was held to less than 200 yards of total offense.

Leinart was 23-of-28 for 235 yards (he was 18-of-21 for 203 yards in the first half), White ran for a game-best 77 yards on 26 carries, Bush had 143 allpurpose yards (42 on 14 rushes, 23 on 5 catches and 78 on 3 punt returns), TB Hershel Dennis added 55 yards on 11 rushes, TE Dominique Byrd caught 5 passes for 32 yards and Jarrett grabbed 4 for 64.

Brink was 17-of-40 for 165 yards, but threw an interception, lost 2 fumbles and was sacked 5 times. Bumpus caught a game-best 6 passes for 68 yards. WSU's top rusher was its punter, Kyle Bassler, who went 17 yards on a fake punt.

LB Matt Grootegoed led USC with 6 tackles (3 for losses, with a sack), LB Lofa Tatupu added 5 stops (2.5 for losses, with a sack) and Patterson recovered 2 fumbles

USC was greeted in pre-game warm-ups with pounding hail, and rain fell during the first few minutes of the game. It was the first time ever that a No. 1 team visited Martin Stadium.

Playing in thick fog on a cold (40 degrees) night in Corvallis, TE Dominique Byrd caught a pair of TD passes from QB Matt Leinart and TB Reggie Bush had a dazzling scoring punt return for the second week in row to help No. 1 USC overcome feisty Oregon State, 28-20, before a sold-out crowd of 36,412 and a FSN national cable audience.

It was USC's 18th consecutive win, as well as its 13th straight Pac-10 win and it's 10th in a row on the road.

After falling behind 13-0, the Trojans scored the next 28 points. The Beavers jumped ahead on a pair of first quarter field goals by PK Alexis Serna (25 yards after recovering a USC fumble and 32 yards) and then an 8-yard pass from QB Derek Anderson to WR Marcel Love in the second quarter. But then Byrd made a one-handed grab of a Leinart pass for an 18-yard TD late in the half. Following an interception by LB Lofa Tatupu early in the third quarter, Leinart hit Byrd for another score (a 25-yarder) to give USC the lead for good.

Then, early in the fourth quarter, Bush was pinned along the OSU sideline after fielding a punt, but reversed his field and went 65 yards for a TD. USC scored again on its next possession, as TB LenDale White ran 5 yards for a score.

Late in the game, Anderson hit WR Josh Hawkins for a 36-yard score (it was the first TD USC surrendered in the fourth quarter in 2004), but USC recovered the ensuing onside kick.

USC's offense was balanced (210 yards rushing, 205 passing), while the Trojan defense limited OSU to 34 rushing yards and no third down conversions on 13 tries while posting 12 tackles for loss.

Overall, Byrd caught 7 passes for 85 yards (career highs), White ran for 116 yards on 25 tries (his sixth career 100-yard game), Bush had 249 all-purpose yards (88 on 11 rushes, 82 on 3 kickoff returns, 73 on 3 punt returns and 6 on 2 receptions) to earn Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week honors and Leinart was 17-of-31 for 205 yards (he threw an interception at the goal line late in the first half). LB Matt Grootegoed had 9 tackles, including 4 for losses, and a fumble recovery, CB Justin Wyatt added a career-best 8 tackles, DT Mike Patterson had 7 stops, including 5 for losses and S Jason Leach had an interception.

For OSU, Anderson was 22-of-51 for 330 yards and WR Mike Hass caught 8 passes for 119 yards.

It was the first time USC played in fog since 1937.

The win gave Troy its third straight Pac-10 title and clinched a berth in—at worst—the Rose Bowl. It was USC's school record-tying 20th consecutive home victory, as well as its 19th consecutive win and its 14th straight Pac-10 conquest.

After a sluggish first half, the Trojans exploded in the second half, scoring the game's final 28 points. Arizona jumped out to a 3-0 lead on a career-long 48-yard field goal by PK Nick Folk in the first quarter.

USC took control in the second quarter as Leinart hit FB David Kirtman for a 5-yard score (Kirtman's first career TD) and then White ran in from 3 yards out (a play after a 55-yard reverse pass from TB **Desmond Reed** to Jarrett). Troy drove 76 yards on the opening series of the second half, culminating with a 2-yard White

Arizona scored later in the third quarter on a 9-yard pass from QB Richard Kovalcheck to TE Steve Fleming. But USC responded with touchdowns on its next 4 possessions: a 6-yard White run, 13- and 12-yard Leinart passes to Jarrett and a 1-yard run by TB Hershel Dennis.

USC piled up a season-high 585 total yards (including a season-best 369 through the air) while holding the Wildcats to 255, and the Trojans also had more first downs (25-14), plays (78-57) and possession time (33:48-26:12)

White ran for game-high 118 yards on 16 carries (his fourth 100-yard game of 2004 and seventh of his career), Leinart completed a career-best 27 passes in 35 attempts for 280 yards (he hit 11 consecutive passes in the first half and was 12-of-14 for 173 yards in the second half), Jarrett had 6 grabs for a career-high 144 yards (his second 100-yard game of 2004) and TE **Dominique Byrd** had a game-high 8 receptions for 72 yards. LB **Lofa Tatupu** had a game-best 11 tackles, while CB **Justin Wyatt** and DE **Lawrence Jackson** each had an interception.

For Arizona, which converted just 2-of-12 third downs. Kovalcheck was 15of-32 for 165 yards and TB Mike Bell ran for 74 yards on 15 carries.

QB Matt Leinart threw a school record-tying 5 touchdown passes to lead No. 1 USC to its third consecutive 31-point victory over intersectional rival Notre Dame, this time 41-10 on a chilly, wet evening before a Coliseum capacity crowd of 92,611 and a national ABC-TV audience.

It equaled USC's largest victory margin over ND.

Leinart, whose 5 TD throws also tied an Irish opponent record (and was the second time he has thrown 5 scores in his career), made quite a Heisman impression on a national stage as he threw for personal-best 400 yards (the second most-ever versus Notre Dame) on 24-of-34 passing with no interceptions.

It was USC's 20th consecutive victory, as well as a school record 21st in a row in the Coliseum. At 11-0, USC got off to its best start since 1972. The victory kept alive the Trojans' quest for a spot in the BCS Championship Game.

Notre Dame took a 10-3 lead early in the second quarter by scoring on its first 2 possessions (and gaining 165 total yards): a 1-yard, fourth down pass from QB Brady Quinn to TE Billy Palmer and then, following a 39-yard field goal by PK Ryan Killeen, PK D.J. Fitzpatrick answered back with a 28-yard field goal.

But it was all USC the rest of the way, as the Trojans scored 38 unanswered points. First, Leinart hit WR Dwayne Jarrett on a pair of scoring passes (12 and 57 yards) late in the first half. Then, the Trojans scored on their first 4 possessions of the second half on a 42-yard Killeen field goal, a 69-yard Leinart pass to TB Reggie Bush (he took a short pass out of the backfield and outraced the Irish defense), a 35-yard Leinart strike to WR Steve Smith early in the final quarter (Smith had missed the previous 5 games with a broken leg) and then a 23-yard Leinart toss to WR Jason Mitchell.

Overall, Jarrett had 6 catches for 102 yards (his third 100-yard outing of 2004), Smith had 4 for 96 yards and TB **LenDale White** ran for 51 yards on 14 carries. USC piled up 488 total yards to ND's 300. The Trojans allowed the Irish just 4-of-15 third down conversions and only 16 first downs.

Notre Dame rushed for 195 yards, the most allowed by USC in 2004, behind TBs Ryan Grant (94 yards on 15 tries) and Darius Walker (64 yards on 11 carries). Quinn was 15-of-29 for 105 yards.

USC LB Lofa Tatupu had a game-best 8 tackles, while LB Matt Grootegoed and DE-DT Shaun Cody both had 6 stops.

The loss left Notre Dame 0-4 against top-ranked Trojan squads. USC, coming off a bye, set both USC home attendance (511,373) and Pac-10 home per game average attendance (85,229) records.

There was a constant drizzle throughout the first quarter-and-a-half and then rain returned with 12 minutes to go in the game. ESPN's "College GameDay" pre-game show made a visit to the Coliseum for the second time in 2004 (and

TB Reggie Bush had a pair of electrifying touchdown runs among his career-best 335 all-purpose yards and PK Ryan Killeen kicked a school-record (and a Pac-10 conference game record) 5 field goals as No. 1 USC held off pesky UCLA, 29-24, before a soldout crowd of 88,442 in the Rose Bowl and a national ABC-TV audience

The win—giving Troy the outright Pac-10 title—propelled USC into the BCS Championship Game in the Orange Bowl. It was USC's sixth consecutive victory over the Bruins (a Trojan best) and it gave Troy its third consecutive season sweep over traditional rivals UCLA and Notre Dame for the first time in school history. It also was USC's 21st consecutive win, its 15th straight Pac-10 victory and its eighth road win in a row. At 12-0, USC tied its best-ever start with the 1972 team.

Bush ran for a career-best 204 yards (the most by a Trojan since Shawn Walters' 234 in 1994 at Stanford) on 15 carries (he had 153 yards and both TDs on just 6 carries in the first half), plus he had 73 yards on a game-best 6 catches, 39 yards on 2 kickoff returns and 19 yards on 2 punt returns. He zig-zagged 65 yards for a TD run on the game's second play, then jetted a career-long 81 yards for another score midway through the second quarter.

USC held a 10-0 lead after Killeen's 37-yard field goal midway through the first quarter, but FL Craig Bragg had a UCLA-record 96-yard punt return in the second quarter to give the Bruins life. However, 2 plays after a missed UCLA field goal (following a blocked Trojan punt), Bush had his 81-yard score. The teams then traded field goals late in the half, as PK Justin Medlock hit a 43-yarder and Killeen answered with a 42-yarder with 9 seconds to go. USC had a 268 to 72 edge in total offense in the half (and 10 first downs to UCLA's 3).

Killeen added a 34-yarder midway through the third quarter, but TB Manuel White's 9-yard scoring run late in the quarter brought UCLA within 23-17. Killeen added fourth quarter field goals of 36 and 34 yards in the final quarter before QB Drew Olson lofted a 4-yard TD pass to TE Marcedes Lewis late in the contest for the game's final points.

USC had 477 total yards to UCLA's 295 (the Bruins had only 17 of those yards on the ground). Although Troy controlled the ball for 34:33, it converted just 1-of-13 third downs (UCLA made good on only 3-of-14). QB Matt Leinart was 24-of-34 for 242 yards and an interception (he completed his first 10 passes of the game and was 15-of-17 for 103 yards in the first half), but he was held without a TD throw for the first time in 25 games as a starter. TB LenDale White added 75 yards on 16 carries, WR **Dwayne Jarrett** had 5 catches for 44 yards and LB Lofa Tatupu had a game-high 10 tackles (with an interception).

For UCLA, Olson was 20-of-34 for 278 yards and 2 interceptions, while Bragg made 6 catches for 67 yards and SE Junior Taylor had 5 for 89 yards. It was the 75th anniversary of the first USC-UCLA game in 1929.

### **2004 GAME SUMMARIES**

### GAME 13 - January 4, Miami, Florida Fed Ex Orange Bowl USC 55, Oklahoma 19 Att: 77,912

Oklahoma USC 14 24 55

Top-ranked USC won its 11th national championship—and second consecutive-in overwhelming fashion by thumping No. 2 Oklahoma, 55-19, in the BCS Championship Game in the 2005 Orange Bowl before a sold-out crowd of 77,912 in Miami's Pro Player Stadium and a national prime time ABC-TV audience.

USC became just the second team ever to hold the AP No. 1 ranking from the pre-season through the bowl (Florida State did it in 1999). The Trojans also became the 10th team to win consecutive AP national championships. It was Troy's 22<sup>nd</sup> victory in a row, including a school-record 13 in 2004. USC's 55 points tied its most ever in a bowl (and were the most ever allowed in a bowl by Oklahoma). It was a school-record eighth time in the season that USC won by 30-plus points. USC scored 38 of its points off of OU turnovers.

QB Matt Leinart, the game's MVP, threw an Orange Bowl record (and USC record-tying) 5 touchdowns, including 3 to WR Steve Smith (tying both an Orange Bowl and USC record). PK Ryan Killeen set the USC career scoring record (with 329 points).

Oklahoma looked impressive early, driving 92 yards for the game's first score midway through the opening quarter on a 5-yard pass from QB Jason White to WR Travis Wilson. But USC countered on the ensuing possession to start a 28point scoring run, as TE Dominique Byrd made a spectacular one-handed TD grab of a 33-yard Leinart aerial. Then, late in the quarter, USC S Josh Pinkard recovered a botched OU punt return and TB LenDale White ran for a 6-yard TD on the next play. S Jason Leach intercepted White's desperation heave on Oklahoma's next series and Leinart soon after hit WR Dwayne Jarrett on a 54yard scoring bomb. White was picked off again on OU's next drive, this time by CB Eric Wright, and 3 plays later Leinart hit Smith for a 5-yard score with 9:17 to go in the half. After Oklahoma responded with a 29-yard field goal by PK Garrett Hartley, USC took just 4 plays to score again, this time on Smith's impressive one-armed reception of a 33-yard Leinart pass. When Oklahoma fumbled the ball away on its following possession (LB Matt Grootegoed had the recovery), Killeen nailed a 44-yard field goal with 3 seconds to go to put USC up 38-10 at halftime.

USC scored on its first 2 drives of the second half: a 4-yard Leinart-to-Smith pass and a 42-yard Killeen field goal. The Trojans capped a 27-point scoring outburst when White ran for an 8-yard TD just 5 plays after Grootegoed intercepted White early in the fourth quarter.

The Sooners scored twice late in the game against mostly Trojan reserves, getting a safety when Leinart fell on a fumbled snap in the end zone and then on White's 9-yard pass to Wilson.

USC piled up 525 total yards (averaging 8.3 yards per play) to the Sooners' 372, even though OU ran off 13 more plays (76 to 63) and held the ball for 35:06.

But USC didn't turn the ball over, while Oklahoma had 5 giveaways. For USC, Leinart was 18-of-35 for 332 yards, White ran for 118 yards on 15 carries, Smith had 7 catches for 113 yards, Jarrett had 5 receptions for 115 yards and TB Reggie Bush had 149 all-purpose yards (75 yards on 6 rushes, 36 yards on 2 kickoff returns, 31 yards on 2 catches and a 7-yard punt return). LB Lofa Tatupu had a game-best 12 tackles, S Darnell Bing added 10 stops and Leach and Grootegoed each had 7

OU's White was 24-of-36 for 244 yards, but threw 3 interceptions, Wilson caught 7 passes for 59 yards and TB Adrian Peterson ran for 82 yards on 25 tries.

It marked the first time that a pair of Heisman Trophy winners (Leinart and White) faced each other in a game (in fact, 4 of the 2004 Heisman finalists played in the game, including Bush and Peterson).
