Fighting Irish Continue to Make History in Fourth Decade as a Varsity Program

Consecutive NCAA quarterfinal appearances has Notre Dame among the nation's best

Bobby Clark's reputation in the collegiate soccer world is of a coach known for turning programs around and making them into national contenders. Prior to his arrival at Notre Dame in January of 2001, Clark experienced great success at both Dartmouth and Stanford as he transformed both of those schools into perennial soccer powers.

In his seven seasons along the Irish sidelines, Clark has worked his magic and steadily built a solid foundation within the Notre Dame program. Leading the Irish to seven consecutive NCAA appearances, Clark has established Notre Dame as one of the elite programs in the nation.

Clark took over an already successful Notre Dame program in 2001, yet his expertise has led the Fighting Irish to unprecedented heights. In 2006, the Irish advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever. Clark steered the squad back to the quarterfinals in 2007, the same season the Irish reached as high as No. 2 in the national rankings. That signified the highest ranking in program history.

The 2007 campaign also witnessed the Irish winning a share of their second regular-season BIG EAST title as they tied for the Blue Division championship with Connecticut. The Irish went 7-0-4 in league play and were the only BIG EAST squad to go undefeated within the con-

ference. Notre Dame advanced to the finals of the BIG EAST tournament before falling to UConn.


Notre Dame opened the '07 season with a 2-1 overtime win over top-ranked UCLA at the adidas/IU Credit Union Classic in Bloomington, Ind. That would be the first of five triumphs over ranked foes for the Irish on the year. Notre Dame garnered the 10th seed in the 2007 NCAA Championship and following a first-round bye, the Irish topped Oakland University, 2-1, at Alumni Field. A 2-0 upset victory at No. 7 Santa Clara would propel Notre Dame into the 'Elite Eight'. The season would come to an end as the Irish suffered a 1-0 overtime loss at eventual national champion Wake Forest in the NCAA quarterfinals to finish with a 14-5-5 record and a No. 6 ranking in the final National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) poll. That marked the seventh straight season in which the Fighting Irish have concluded their season ranked nationally in the top 20.

In what has become a common theme in the Clark era at Notre Dame, the Irish boasted two All-America honorees for the 2007 season. Senior Joseph Lapira earned first-team All-America accolades for the second straight season, while fifth-year senior Ryan Miller was a second-team pick to become Notre Dame's seventh All-

American in men's soccer. Miller also earned the distinction of becoming the first player in program history to be named both an All-American and Academic All-American in the same year.

Lapira and Miller were also unanimous first-team all-BIG EAST selections. The duo spear-headed a group of seven Fighting Irish players that copped all-conference accolades. In addition to their all-league honors, Lapira and Miller heard their names called in the third round of the Major League Soccer (MLS) SuperDraft. They became the 10th and 11th Notre Dame players ever taken in an MLS draft.

The 2006 season was a milestone campaign for the Fighting Irish. Notre Dame reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history and the Irish boasted the national player of the year in Lapira. The Fighting

Irish compiled a 15-6-2 record and finished third

in the BIG EAST Conference's Blue Division with an 8-3-0 mark. After earning the No. 12 seed and a first-round bye in the NCAA Tournament, Notre Dame knocked off Illinois-Chicago, 1-0, in the second round before taking down defending NCAA champion Maryland 1-0 in double-overtime. The win over the Terrapins, who were ranked seventh, marked the second straight season in which the Irish topped the defending national champion in postseason play.


The stellar run for the Irish ended with a 3-2 setback against No. 4 Virginia. Notre Dame concluded the 2006 campaign ranked sixth in the last NSCAA poll.

Accolades were abundant for the 2006 Irish squad following the unprecedented success. Lapira, a junior forward, won the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy as the nation's top player according to the NSCAA. Lapira, who led all NCAA Division I men's players with 22 goals and 50 points, also captured player of the year honors from Soccer America along with being Notre Dame's first-ever consensus first-team All-American. He was named the BIG EAST offensive player of the year, while his teammate Greg



Sami Kahale finished his Irish career with 35 goals and 30 assists while playing in 74 games from 1978-81.

Dalby was selected as the midfielder of the year. Dalby earned first-team All-America honors for the second straight season and was selected by the Colorado Rapids in the second round of the MLS draft. Nate Norman also heard his name called as the Chicago Fire selected the midfielder in the second round.

In addition to the 2006 and 2007 tournament runs, Clark has guided the Fighting Irish to the NCAA Round of 16 on two other occasions, in 2003 and 2005. Notre Dame has earned a seed in the NCAA Tournament four times. The '07 Irish were the 10th seed, while the year before they were No. 12. Notre Dame garnered the No. 5 seed in both the 2003 and 2004 tournaments.

Even without claiming one of 16 national seeds in 2005, the Irish had an impressive run to the Round of 16 as they posted back-to-back 2-0 shutouts in the first two rounds of the tournament. The Irish topped Western Illinois at Alumni Field and then hit the road and took down two-time defending national champion Indiana. The victory over the Hoosiers was arguably the biggest win in the history of the program to that point. It marked the first time, in nine tries, that Notre Dame had ever knocked off the defending national champion. The win also snapped Indiana's 10-game NCAA tournament win streak and its 19-game NCAA tournament home win streak. What made it even more amazing is that Notre Dame suffered a 3-0 home loss to Indiana a month prior to the NCAA tournament showdown. Unfortunately, the Fighting Irish run ended in their next match, a 1-0 loss at Clemson.

Notre Dame concluded the '05 campaign with a 12-8-3 mark (6-4-1 BIG EAST) and ranked 15th in the final NSCAA poll. Dalby became the first player in program history to be named a first-team All-American on three separate lists (NSCAA, Soccer Times, College Soccer News).

Four shutout wins over nationally-ranked teams were one of many highlights during the 2004 campaign. The ninth-ranked Irish knocked

off No. 21 Villanova on the road by a 1-0 tally and followed that up with a 1-0 overtime victory over Boston College. The Eagles were ranked ninth at the time and the Irish were 14th. A victory over No. 22 Michigan (3-0) and a win at 17th-ranked Seton Hall (1-0), with a 1-1 tie at No. 10 St. John's sandwiched in between, marked a solid stretch for the Irish, which included a 10-game unbeaten streak. As a result of that impressive stretch, the Irish peaked at No. 4 in the NSCAA/adidas poll on November 2nd.

After earning the No. 5 seed and a first-round bye in the NCAA Tournament, the Irish fell to Ohio State, 2-1, in the second round. Despite the ending to the 2004 season, Notre Dame still had a solid campaign due in a large part to the leadership and play of a solid trio of senior captains. Goalkeeper Chris Sawyer, defenders Jack Stewart and Kevin Goldthwaite propelled the Irish to a 13-3-3 record, which was capped by the program's first regular-season BIG EAST crown.

The Fighting Irish led the nation in goalsagainst-average (0.37), which was a reason Sawyer collected All-America and BIG EAST goalkeeper of the year honors for the second straight season. The senior posted seven shutouts in 10 league games and earned first-team allconference honors. Joining him on the all-BIG EAST squad were Goldthwaite and Stewart, who were also M.A.C. Hermann Trophy semifinalists. All three of those student-athletes were selected in the 2005 Major League Soccer draft with Stewart going in the first round to the Chicago Fire (10th pick overall), Goldthwaite being tabbed by the San Jose Earthquakes in the first round and Sawyer was a second round selection of the Kansas City Wizards.

The 2003 season was a memorable one in terms of BIG EAST Conference accomplishments. Notre Dame finished third in the regular season conference standings, then swept through the league tournament with three consecutive shutouts. The Irish defeated Connecticut 2-0 at

home, eliminated Providence 1-0 in the semifinals (in Storrs, Conn.) and claimed the BIG EAST Championship with a 2-0 victory over No. 4 St. John's (the eventual NCAA runner-up).

Earning a championship in arguably the toughest conference in the country brought the Irish a number of major individual awards. Clark was named the regional coach of the year, while Sawyer earned first-team All-America honors and two major conference awards (BIG EAST goalkeeper of the year, BIG EAST Championship most outstanding player). Senior Justin Detter also earned All-America honors, while Stewart and Goldthwaite were named to the all-regional team.

Notre Dame peaked at third in the national rankings after their BIG EAST title - that marked the second-straight season the Irish had been ranked in the top five of a national poll (Notre Dame appeared at fifth during September of 2002).

The '03 campaign was highlighted by a home victory over eventual national champion Indiana, 1-0, at Alumni Field in September. The Irish also defeated five ranked teams on their way to the NCAA Round of 16 - a run that ended with a tough 1-1 tie to Michigan (the Wolverines advanced 4-3 on penalty kicks). Notre Dame also had the unique distinction of defeating both teams who appeared in the NCAA Championship final (St. John's, Indiana) during the 2003 season.

In 2002, Notre Dame posted a 12-6-3 record (6-3-1 BIG EAST). The Irish played host to a first-round NCAA Tournament contest for the first time and registered a 3-1 victory over Akron before falling to Indiana, 1-0, in the second round.

In his inaugural season, Clark inherited a team that had experienced a great transitional period with three coaches in an 18-month span. As the '01 BIG EAST coach of the year, Clark engineered a great turnaround as the Irish eclipsed their conference single-season win total of the previous year by three games. Notre Dame's 7-3-0 conference mark was good enough for a second-place tie in the final regular-season standings with St. John's. That marked the best finish and most wins by a Notre Dame team since becoming a conference member in 1995.

Clark's first season saw the Irish register key victories, but none more thrilling than an upset of sixth-ranked Indiana, 1-0, in Bloomington. The win was just the second ever for Notre Dame in a series that had spanned 22 games.

Clark took over for Chris Apple, who had spent one year (2000) as head coach following four seasons as an assistant. Apple succeeded the late Mike Berticelli, who died suddenly in January of 2000 of a heart attack, following 10 successful campaigns at the Irish helm.

During Berticelli's 10-year coaching tenure, his teams won 104 games (his 100th win occurred at Notre Dame in '99 when his Irish squad defeated Eastern Michigan on Sept. 29) and garnered three conference tournament championships while earning NCAA tournament berths in 1993, '94 and '96.

Irish History

Berticelli helped usher in a new era in Notre Dame athletics in 1995-96 when Irish teams began competing in one of the nation's most prestigious conferences - the BIG EAST.

Founded in 1979 primarily as a men's basketball conference, the BIG EAST has grown today into one of the country's most diversified leagues.

In 1995, the Notre Dame men's soccer team left its Midwestern Collegiate Conference roots after seven years and two straight MCC tournament crowns to face the challenges of the competitive BIG EAST Conference. And while the Irish experienced growing pains in their first year as a league member, they could call themselves BIG EAST champions following the 1996 cam-

The '96 season, which marked the 20th year of varsity soccer at Notre Dame, proved to be one of the most successful in school history. In winning the BIG EAST championship title, the Irish earned the conference's automatic berth into the 32-team NCAA field. Making their third appearance in four years, the Irish, 0-3 in previous NCAA contests, won their first-ever tournament game with a 1-0 shutout at second-ranked UNC-Greensboro.

A heartbreaking 1-0 defeat to eventual NCAA semifinalist UNC-Charlotte in the final 24 seconds of the contest could not dampen the success Notre Dame enjoyed that season.

Men's soccer became an official sport at Notre Dame in the fall of 1977 as the once club sport was elevated to varsity status following the growing interest and popularization of soccer in the United States in the mid-'70s.

Nearly 200 upperclassmen and freshmen turned out for tryouts that first year. Head coach Rich Hunter assembled a team with no scholarships and a starting lineup comprised of 10 underclassmen. Notre Dame ended up 16-1-1 in its inaugural season after tying and losing its first two games. Wins over Purdue, Michigan and Xavier highlighted the 16-game win streak during the campaign.

The Irish finished with a 21-3-1 record and were a perfect 14-0 at home in their second season. Kevin Lovejoy, who went on to become Notre Dame's all-time leading scorer (a mark which still stands today), netted 29 goals (still a Notre Dame single-season record) in 1978. A 26game win skein dating back to the 1977 campaign was halted by a 2-1 loss to Goshen.

Hunter's squads in 1979 and 1980 won 20 games for the second and third straight years as the Irish finished 20-10-1 and 20-7, respectively. The Notre Dame schedule in 1979 included two ranked opponents, Lovola (Maryland) and Indiana. The Irish battled the eighth-ranked Greyhounds to a 2-2 tie at home. Lovejoy led Notre Dame in scoring both seasons as he closed out his three-year career with 67 goals and 19

assists. Notre Dame's only loss at home in 1980 was a 2-1 decision to Miami of Ohio.

The Irish missed out on an NCAA bid in 1981. but the season demonstrated the progress the program had made in its brief five-year existence. Notre Dame stunned the soccer world with a 4-3 overtime win at home against top-ranked St. Louis, and finished with a 16-3-3 record. Forward Sami Kahale became the second player in Irish soccer history to reach the 100-point mark as he finished out his career with 35 goals and 30

After starting slowly during the 1982 campaign, the Irish finished the year with a 16-4-1 mark. Over the final 15 games of the season, Notre Dame went 12-2-1 and outscored its opponents, 59-16. Forward Mario Manta led the Irish with 16 goals and eight assists and concluded his career third on the all-time scoring list with 36 goals and 18 assists.

The 1983 campaign marked Hunter's final season at the helm after seven years. During his tenure, he guided the Irish to a 128-32-8 mark for a .786 winning percentage. Notre Dame finished the season with an 18-4 mark after suffering its first-ever season-opening loss. The Irish were 11-1 at home and concluded the season by winning 11 of their last 13 contests.

Dennis Grace ushered in a new era in 1984 as he took over just one week prior to the start of the season following the resignation of Hunter. Grace, who had been named an assistant in July, inherited a program that had lost 11 players to graduation. The Irish finished 12-6-2, their fewest wins since the program's inception. Rich Herdegen led Notre Dame in scoring for the second straight year as he netted 16 goals and dished off two assists. His 57 goals and 23 assists (137 points) still today place him second all-time on the career Irish scoring list.

The 1985 season marked the first non-winning season in the program's history as the Irish tackled an extremely tough schedule. Grace's squad opened up with two tough road games at Virginia and at George Mason. The Irish dropped a 3-0 decision to the Cavaliers and were beaten 4-2 by the Patriots. Notre Dame concluded the regular season with three straight wins.

In Grace's third season, the Irish rebounded to post a 13-7-2 mark in 1986. Highlighting the season was a 2-1 overtime win for the Irish on the road at Connecticut in a game which was seen in the New England area on the New England Sports Network. Sophomore Pat Murphy provided the game-winning tally with just six minutes remaining in the overtime session. The win snapped the Huskies' 18-game regular season non-losing streak on their home field and marked Connecticut's first home loss in nearly two years. Forward Bruce McCourt ranked among the top 10 nationally in scoring as he finished the year with 16 goals and six assists (38 points).

The 1987 season witnessed several Notre Dame milestones as the Irish began the season with a 14-0-1 record, their best start in the program's 11-year history. Notre Dame had a new home in the 5,000-seat Moose Krause Stadium goal in the first-round upset of second-ranked UNCfacility and the Irish also earned the school's first-

ever top-20 ranking. The string of victories was highlighted by the school's first win over Indiana, 4-3, in overtime at Notre Dame.

At one point during that season, the Irish were one of just three unbeaten Division I teams in the country. Grace's squad suffered its first loss of the season when it traveled to Portland. The ninthranked Pilots handed the Irish their first of three straight road setbacks, 3-1.

Notre Dame would also lose to UCLA, 3-2, and San Diego State, 1-0. Hoping to get an atlarge bid into the NCAA tournament, Grace and his squad would have to wait one more year for the school's first-ever berth.


The 1988 season produced another 17-win campaign for the Irish as Notre Dame finished with a 17-4-2 mark and made the school's firstever appearance in the NCAA tournament. Notre Dame, in its first year as a member of the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, locked up an at-large berth by winning the MCC tournament crown and finished 15th in the final Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America ranking.

Nine starters and five reserves from the previous season plus a talented freshman class helped Notre Dame win the MCC title with back-toback wins over third-ranked St. Louis (2-0) and fourth-ranked Evansville (2-0) in the semifinal and final of the conference championship. Notre Dame jumped out to a 9-0-2 record to start the season, highlighted by a 1-1 tie with eventual national champion, Indiana. The Irish faced 11thranked SMU in Dallas in their first NCAA appearance and fell victim to the Mustangs, 2-0.

In seven seasons, Rich Hunter's Irish averaged nearly 18 victories each year and never won fewer than 16 games.

The season also produced the school's first All-American. Forward Randy Morris garnered third-team All-America honors as he led the Irish in scoring with 14 goals and 12 assists (40 points) to finish 11th nationally in that category. He garnered MCC MVP honors in the tournament after leading the Irish to three shutouts en route to the conference title.

With the graduation of Morris in 1988, the Irish struggled somewhat during the 1989 campaign while posting a 10-7-3 record. Notre Dame was led by a young group of players. Freshman forward Kevin Pendergast, who would also become the placekicker for the Notre Dame football team during his career, led the Irish with 12 goals and five assists during his rookie season. The school's 200th victory came on September 22 when Notre Dame defeated Michigan State at home, 4-2. The Irish season ended with a 2-1 loss to St. Louis in the semifinals of the MCC championship. The campaign also marked the final for Grace as the Irish head coach. During his six seasons, his teams won 64.8 percent of their games, while posting a 76-38-14 ledger.

Enter Berticelli, who was hired as Notre Dame's third soccer coach. He had led UNC-Greensboro to national championship crowns in 1982 and 1983 and later coached for six seasons at Old Dominion.

After humble beginnings in 1990, Berticelli guided the Irish to back-to-back MCC tournament crowns in 1993 and 1994 and two straight NCAA tournament appearances. Under him, Notre Dame attained status among the nation's top programs.

After a 4-11-3 mark in his first season, Berticelli piloted the Irish to four straight seasons of 10 or more victories. In 1991, he brought in a talented freshman class of 13. Nine of those players were starters by season's end as the Irish finished with a 13-5-2 record. Notre Dame tied nationally-ranked Evansville and lost to third-ranked Indiana in overtime during the season. Notre Dame won 11 of its final 13 contests

before losing to Evansville, 2-0 in the final of the MCC championship.

Berticelli's third season at the helm produced a 10-7-2 mark that saw four nationally-ranked teams dot the Irish schedule. Notre Dame opened the 1992 campaign with its first-ever preseason national ranking from Soccer America at 20th. The Irish opened the campaign with one-goal losses to UCLA and eventual semifinalist Duke. Notre Dame missed out on a chance at an NCAA bid when the Irish were defeated by Evansville, 3-2, in the semifinal of the MCC championship.

Three years of top-notch recruiting classes resulted in consecutive NCAA appearances in both '93 and '94. For a four-year stretch from '91-'94, Notre Dame averaged 12.5 wins per season in winning 50 games and captured two conference crowns. Led in 1993 by Bill Lanza, the MCC player of the year, the Irish registered their most wins since 1988 in posting a 15-6 mark.

Notre Dame won the school's second MCC crown as the Irish shut out La Salle, Butler and Detroit in the conference championship and earned a berth in the NCAA tournament. Berticelli's squad faced Wisconsin in Madison and dropped a 3-1 decision to the Badgers.

Notre Dame's second consecutive NCAA appearance did not prove easy in 1994. The Irish battled injuries and a tough schedule to finish with a 12-10-2 mark. After struggling for most of the season, the Irish came back to win the MCC tournament with a dramatic 3-2 double-overtime win over Wisconsin-Milwaukee and then beat Mid-Continent Conference champion Central Connecticut, 1-0, in another double overtime thriller to earn an automatic bid into the tournament. The Irish met eventual national runner-up Indiana in Bloomington for the second time during the season. After dropping a 2-0 decision earlier in the year, Notre Dame put a scare into the Hoosiers who escaped with a controversial 1-0 win in overtime.

The 1995 season proved to be somewhat of a rebuilding year for the Irish as Notre Dame struggled to a 9-10 overall record and 4-7 mark in its first season as a member of the BIG EAST.

Notre Dame's second year as a member of the BIG EAST proved to be a season of redemption for the Irish program. Berticelli's squad silenced the critics in winning the BIG EAST crown after finishing third in the final regular-season standings with a 6-3-2 record. Notre Dame posted a 14-7-2 record overall, the second most victories in Berticelli's 10-year tenure.

The '96 Irish squad defined perseverance. After losing its best defensive player, senior Brian Engesser, to a career-ending injury eight games into the season, Notre Dame maintained its poise and composure. Despite losing four of its final five regular-season contests, Notre Dame responded to the challenge by winning three straight games to earn the title of BIG EAST champion. Drama prevailed in three-straight one-goal decisions.

In Notre Dame's 2-1 quarterfinal win over Georgetown, which was played in a snowstorm, the Hoyas went up 1-0 midway through the first half. Senior Chris Mathis tied the game with under a minute to play before intermission. Another senior, Konstantin Koloskov, scored the game-winning goal at the 84:56 mark.

Facing second-seeded and 14th-ranked Connecticut, the Irish pulled out their second straight one-goal decision with a 2-1 victory over the Huskies. Despite being out shot 24-9 in the contest, Notre Dame received a strong game from sophomore goalkeeper Greg Velho, who was named most outstanding player of the tournament, as he came up with 10 saves.

Notre Dame earned the BIG EAST crown the next day with a 1-0 victory over 12th-ranked Rutgers on the Scarlet Knights' home field. Koloskov scored the contest's lone tally at the 39:45 mark of the match off an assist from freshman Andrew Aris, who just the day before scored Notre Dame's first goal in the victory over the Huskies.

Senior midfielder Tony Capasso, the heart and soul of the Irish team for two seasons, became the second Notre Dame player to earn All-America accolades. A first-team all-BIG EAST and Great Lakes Region honoree, he was a '96 third-team selection by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

In four of Notre Dame's five seasons in the BIG EAST under Berticelli, his squads earned a spot in the league's eight-team field. In 1997, the Irish advanced to the semifinals after defeating Seton Hall 2-0 in a quarterfinal matchup in South Orange, N.J. The win avenged a 2-1 setback to the fourth-seeded Pirates during the regular season. Notre Dame, seeded fifth, was eliminated from the tournament in its semifinal contest by top-seeded St. John's 4-1. Berticelli's team finished with a 10-9-2 record, which marked the sixth time in seven seasons that his squad ended the campaign with 10 or more wins.

The Irish earned their third and fourth straight trips to the BIG EAST tournament in '98 and '99. Berticelli's team clinched a tournament berth in the regular-season finale against West Virginia at home in '98 as the Irish beat the Mountaineers 2-0 and marked the 300th win in the 22-year history of the program.

That campaign produced a first for Notre Dame since joining the league in 1995 as three Irish players garnered all-conference honors. Senior Greg Velho, who finished up his career as the school's all-time saves leader with 311, garnered second-team all-conference honors as did junior defender Matt McNew and freshman forward Shan rookie-of-the-week honoree who led the Irish in scoring with 10 goals and seven assists, also was one of three freshmen in the league to earn a spot on the league's two all-conference teams (Walton eventually moved on the Notre Dame football team and earned All-America honors as a cornerback).

Notre Dame had its first BIG EAST rookie-ofthe-year honoree in '99 when freshman Erich Braun from Frankfurt, Germany, became the first Irish player to earn one of the league's four major awards. He finished the season with nine goals and six assists (24 points).

In 2006, Joseph Lapira became the program's first recipient of the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy as the nation's top player. The award, which has been presented annually since 1967, is the official Player of the Year Award presented by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). That season, Lapira led all NCAA Division I men's players with 22 goals and 50 total points en route to becoming the first unanimous first-team All-American in Irish history.


The Christopher Zorich Award



This award was first presented in 1993 and is named in honor of a former Notre Dame wrestler who died in 1973 following his freshman year at the University. He was the son of Jane and the late William "Bucky" O'Connor (he played football at Notre Dame in 1942, '46 and '47) from Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The awards — which go to one female and one male graduating senior student-athlete - are presented to those individuals upon nomination by their head coaches, who best display the total embodiment of the true spirit of Notre Dame as exemplified by their contributions and inspiration to their teams. Among the qualities consid $ered\ in\ nominating\ invididuals-as$ attributed to Pat O'Connor - are caring, courage, confidence, encouragement, humility, humor, honesty, kindness and patience.

Byron V. Kanaley Award

The most prestigious honor awarded to a Notre Dame student-athlete, the Byron V. Kanaley Award has been presented each year since 1927 to the senior monogram athletes who have been most exemplary as both students and leaders.

The awards, presented by the Faculty Board on Athletics, are named in honor of a 1904 Notre Dame graduate who was a member of the Irish baseball team as an undergraduate. Kanaley went on to a successful banking career in Chicago and served the University as a lay trustee from 1915 until his death in 1960.

The Notre Dame men's soccer team has had eight of its players honored with the Kanaley Award, which is presented at the spring athletic department awards dinner: Kevin Lovejoy (1981); Bret Hoffmann (1992); Mike Palmer (1994); Chris Dean (1995), Phil Murphy (1999), Connor La Rose (2000), Andreas Forstner (2002) and Greg Dalby (2006).





Notre Dame captured its second consecutive Midwestern Collegiate Conference tournament crown in 1994 with a 3-2 overtime win against Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

During Notre Dame's seven years as a member of the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, the Irish compiled a 24-13-4 record (.634) in regular-season competition and were 13-4 (.765) in seven tournament appearances. Notre Dame captured the tournament championship in 1988, won back-to-back titles in 1993 and 1994, and advanced to the semifinals of the MCC Tournament all but one season (1990).

Notre Dame won the North Division regular-season championship in 1989 as the Irish finished with a 5-0-1 mark. Former Notre Dame head coach Mike Berticelli guided his squad to the regular-season championship in 1993 as the Irish finished with a 5-1 record.

The most memorable showing for the Irish in the MCC Tournament came during the 1988 season when the Irish defeated fourth-ranked Evansville and third-ranked St. Louis on successive days to capture the tournament crown and earn the school's first-ever NCAA bid. All three teams from the MCC were at-large selections into the NCAA tournament that season.




