MEDIA SERVICES

Members of the media can obtain updated statistics as well as daily tournament results for the Crimson Tide men's golf team during their season via e-mail and at Alabama's official athletics website at www.rolltide.com. In addition, the Media Relations office will also provide the media with rosters and tee times for any event the Tide is scheduled to host. Credentials are usually not needed to cover an Alabama-hosted men's golf event, but notification of your intent to cover is needed by the Media Relations Department.

Information about the University of Alabama's athletics can be found on the world wide web on the Crimson Tide official athletics site: www.rolltide.com. For information about the Crimson Tide men's golf program select that area from the main menu. Information on the web includes statistics, results, biographies and other historical information.

TELEVISION

The University of Alabama, through the Crimson Tide Sports Network (CTSN), offers a weekly 15-minute satellite feed consisting of interviews with coaches and athletes, taped video highlights and narrated tape package from September through May. Occasionally the men's golf team will be featured in this package. Please call the media relations office for more details. During the season, the golf team's progress will be covered each week on "The Crimson Tide This Week," a 30-minute regional sports show.

INTERVIEWS

Head coach Jay Seawell is available for interviews and can be reached through the Alabama Media Relations office, due to the extensive time the golf coaching staff spends outside on the course. Team practice sessions rotate times and locations daily depending on upcoming events and areas of practice emphasis. Because of this, we require you to make golf interview requests at least 24 hours in advance. We ask that golf interviews be arranged through Josh Maxson in the Media Relations office at (205) 348-7496.

FACILITIES

As part of the Crimson Tradition Fund facility upgrades, Alabama's home golf course — Ol' Colony — has some brand new additions that only serve to turn the course into the Tide's real home. Construction took place in 2004 on the Jerry Pate Golf Center, UA's private practice facility and club house that includes coaches' offices, a fully furnished locker room and a team room. Ol' Colony, a course designed by former UA men's golf standout Jerry Pate, serves as the team's home course. In addition to its "home" course, the Alabama men's golf team benefits from the opportunity of being able to access several golf courses in the Tuscaloosa area for practice, including NorthRiver Yacht Club and Indian Hills Country Club.

TOTAL PROGRAM

Jay Seawell has rekindled the proud tradition of the Crimson Tide men's golf program. Entering his ninth year at the Capstone, Seawell has established Alabama as one of the elite programs in collegiate golf. His teams are routinely ranked among the top 10 in the country while leading UA to seven NCAA Tournament appearances and four berths in the NCAA Championships. Under Seawell's guidance in 2008, Alabama captured its first Southeastern Conference Championship since 1979 and its first SEC medalist - Michael Thompson - since Bobby Hill won it in 1952. Over the past eight years, the Crimson Tide has garnered seven All-America honors by five players, had eight All-Region selections by seven players and 12 All-SEC honors, including seven first-team choices. Bud Cauley was also named the SEC Freshman of the Year in 2009 and was a finalist for the Ben Hogan Award. Thompson was also a finalist in 2008.



ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

Alabama's play on the golf course has only been a portion of the Crimson Tide's success during head coach Jay Seawell's tenure. The men's golf team also has a history of producing some of the University's best and brightest in the classroom. The Crimson Tide has had 91 players selected to the SEC Academic Honor Roll. The list includes six players in 2010, including Bud Cauley, Hunter Hamrick, Lee Knox, Hunter Slatton, Scott Strohmeyer, and Phillip Weaver. The most decorated student-athlete in the classroom was Joseph Sykora, who was a four-time winner of the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for men's golf, an ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American and the 2008 H. Boyd McWorter Award winner, given to the SEC's top student-athlete across all sports.



OUTSTANDING PLAYERS

The Crimson Tide boasts a legion of great players that have come through the program over the years. Maybe the most well know is Jerry Pate, whose list of accomplishments just keeps going. Pate competed in the Walker Cup, garnered All-America honors, captured the U.S. Amateur, won the U.S. Open, was named PGA Rookie of the Year and went on to enjoy a successful career on the PGA Tour and the Champions Tour. Along with Pate, Alabama has produced numerous great players, including Steve Lowery, Spike McRoy, Jason Bohn, Dicky Pride, Marten Olander, David Kirkpatrick and Michael Thompson, along with current Tide standouts Bud Cauley and Hunter Hamrick. Olander captured the highest honor in golf in 1993, winning the Ben Hogan Award.



NCAA SUCCESS

Alabama has enjoyed some of its most extensive NCAA success under the leadership of head coach Jay Seawell. The Crimson Tide has qualified for seven NCAA Tournaments in the last eight years and advanced to the NCAA Championships four times, including 2005, 2007, 2008 and 2009. In all, Alabama has appeared in 19 NCAA Tournaments and advanced to the finals 12 times. The Tide's top finish came under the great Conrad Rehling in 1975 with a tie for third place. Rehling qualified for the NCAA Championships five times, including three straight years from 1973-75. Dick Spybey then took the Tide to seven NCAA Regional appearances and three trips to the championships from 1989-2002.





CRIMSON TRADITION

The Alabama Crimson Tide men's golf program has a rich history that dates back to the program's inception in 1952. That first season saw Crimson Tide golfer Bobby Hill capture medalist honors at the SEC Championships. A few years later Conrad Rehling coached the Crimson Tide into the national spotlight with three straight trips to the NCAA Championships in the early 1970's with Jerry Pate leading the charge. Rehling won SEC Coach of the Year honors in both 1979 and 1983 and was inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame in 1980. Pate would become the most decorated golfer in Crimson Tide history, earning first-team All-America honors in 1975, playing in the Walker Cup and winning a U.S. Amateur title before going on to a long and productive PGA Tour career, which included the 1976 U.S. Open and the 1982 Players Championship. Dick Spybey replaced a retiring Rehling as the Tide's head coach in 1989 and led Alabama seven NCAA Regional appearances and three trips the NCAA Championships. He was named the 1992 SEC Coach of the Year. Jay Seawell, the 2008 SEC Coach of the Year, arrived in 2002-03 and has steadily taken the Tide to even greater heights.



ALL-AMERICA ACCOLADES

Bud Cauley and Hunter Hamrick are the most recent in a long line of All-Americans at the University of Alabama. Cauley, Jerry Pate, David Kirkpatrick and Michael Thompson all garnered first-team honors. Ten other golfers have also earned second-team or honorable mention honors, beginning with UA's first All-American, Alan Pate, in 1973. In all, Alabama has had 13 players garner 21 All-America honors. Since the arrival of Jay Seawell, the Crimson Tide has had four players earn All-America honors - Matthew Swan, Michael Thompson, Bud Cauley and Hunter Hamrick - with Thompson and Cauley earning first-team accolades. Cauley is the first UA player to be a two-time first-team All-America selection.



AMATEUR HONORS

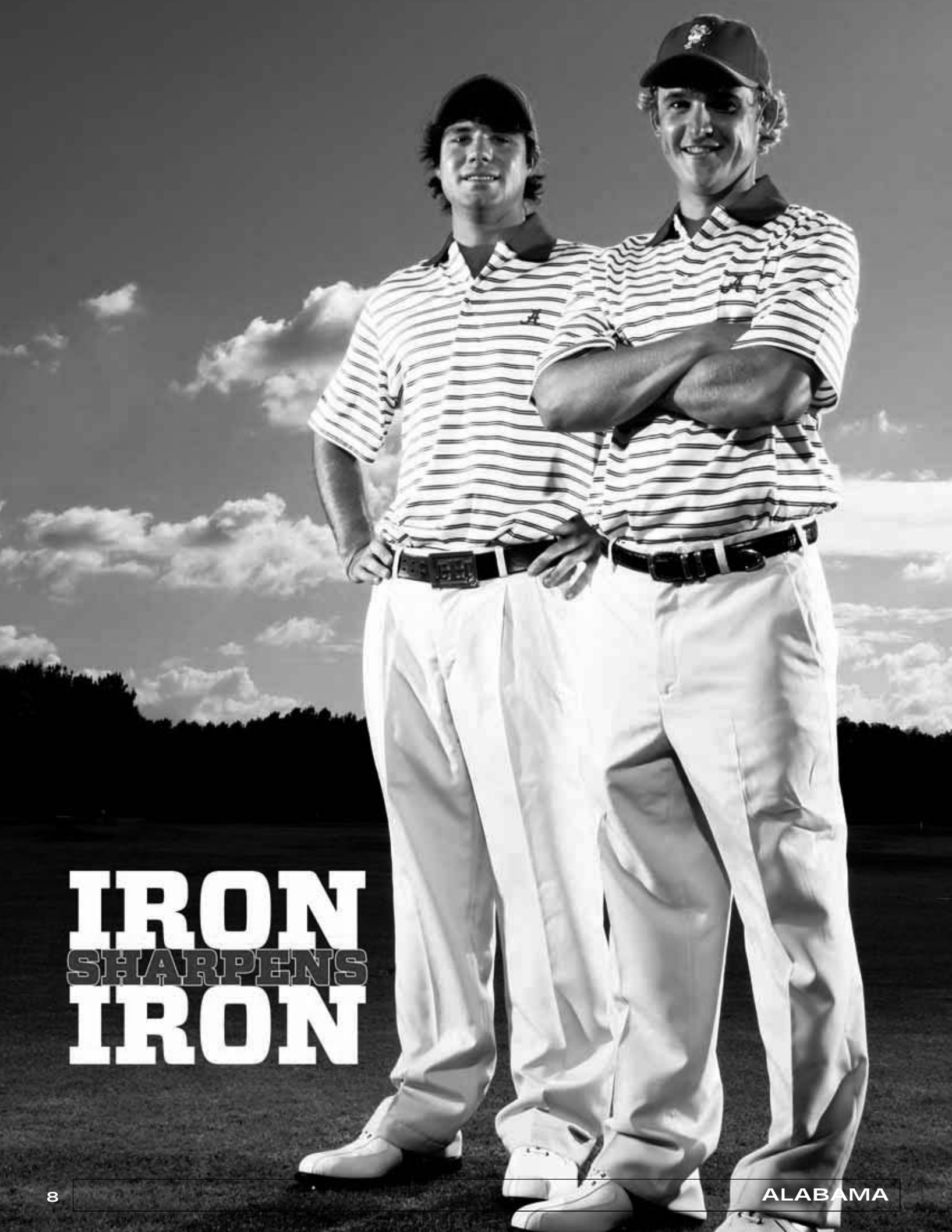
Another rich tradition for the Crimson Tide is on the amateur circuit. Alabama has had two players participate in the prestigious Walker Cup, which is held every two years and matches America's best amateur golfers against Great Britain and Ireland's best in a Ryder Cup style event. Bud Cauley was selected for the 2009 team and went 3-0-1 to help the United States capture its third straight Walker Cup. Jerry Pate helped the Americans to another win in 1975. Alabama has had three golfers play in the Palmer Cup while the Crimson Tide has had 38 golfers qualify 51 times for the U.S. Amateur. Jerry Pate was the most successful, winning the 1974 U.S. Amateur while Michael Thompson was a three-time finalist (2004, 2006 & 2007). Dicky Pride and Cecil Ingram were also semifinalists.



SEC RESURGENCE

Alabama captured its first Southeastern Conference Crown in 1979 and waited 29 years before Jay Seawell's 2008 team brought home the Tide's second SEC Championship. The Crimson Tide's 2008 team spent most of the season ranked No. 1 nationally and lived up to its expectations at the SEC's with a commanding win. Alabama has had 18 players earn 24 first-team All-SEC accolades. The Tide has also had 25 players win 30 second-team All-SEC honors. Steve Lowery was the 1982 and 1983 SEC Golfer of the Year and Michael Thompson followed that up by winning 2008 SEC Golfer of the Year honors.





IRON SHARPENS IRON

Heading into his ninth year at the helm of the Alabama men's golf team, head coach Jay Seawell has the Crimson Tide poised for a season unlike any other in the 59-year history of the program.

With an established core of top-flight veterans returning to join forces with an ultra-talented group of newcomers, the history books could very well be rewritten for the 2010 Alabama men's golf team.

"We want to win the national championship and win the conference," Seawell said. "That's what we're shooting for. We have those as goals but we really stress to be the best we can be. We want to give ourselves a chance to win with five or six holes left to play."

Seawell's 2009-10 Alabama team won its fourth straight team title in the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate at the Old Overton Club in Vestavia Hills, but struggled with consistency throughout the season.

Individually, Bud Cauley and Hunter Hamrick excelled last season, earning a spot on the Division I PING All-America team in addition to first-team All-SEC honors. Moreover, sophomore Lee Knox was named to the 2010 SEC All-Freshman team to round out the 2009-10 campaign for Alabama men's golf.

A disappointing finish to the end of the year didn't dampen the spirits of the team heading into the offseason. Hamrick and Knox each claimed state amateur titles in Alabama and Georgia, respectively, while Cauley finished fifth at the prestigious Southern Amateur at Shoal Creek. With arguably the best recruiting class in the nation heading to the Capstone to join the likes of Cauley, Hamrick, Knox, Scott Strohmeyer, Hunter Slatton and Phillip Weaver, Seawell and the Crimson Tide are in prime position to compete for the first NCAA Championship in school history.

"Iron sharpens iron," Seawell said. "With our team, you're not going to be able to take a day off. You're not going to get away with an average day. You are going to have to be your best every day if you want to get in the van or on the plane. You are going to have to be more prepared every day at practice, sharper with your workouts and sharper with your time on the golf course. By being sharper every day, by the time we get to the tournaments, we're going to be ready to play. We'll have five guys ready to compete for the win. The depth is going to help so much with the preparation and gives us a chance to be a very, very, very good team."

Last season, Cauley collected wins at the Isleworth Collegiate Invitational in October and the Linger Longer Invitational in March. Additionally, Cauley tied for fourth place at the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate and picked up top-10 finishes at the PING/Golfweek Invitational, the John Hyatt Collegiate Invitational and the Augusta State Invitational.

The Jacksonville, Fla., native finished the season with a 71.32 scoring average and ranked fifth in the Golfweek/Sagarin Ratings Index. Cauley was selected as a finalist for the Ben Hogan Award and was a first-team All-American by Golfweek.

Hamrick garnered honorable mention accolades with wins at the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate and the Western Refining All-American Classic. The Montgomery, Ala., native also tied for first at the Schenkel E-Z-Go Invitational but fell in a playoff on the first hole to miss out on medalist honors. Hamrick turned in the Crimson Tide's top performance in the SEC Championship with a tie for fourth place and finished the year with a 72.21 stroke average.

"I think their (Cauley and Hamrick) work ethic and what they do by example, how they practice and prepare will already do great things," Seawell said. "I do want them to have a sense of communicating to the younger guys what it means to be (a part of) Alabama golf. We've tried to formulate that in words, but there is some pride in that, there is some family in that. There are a lot of people who've worked very hard to make Alabama golf a good name. And their

job is to really communicate that to the young people."

Cauley and Hamrick will be joined this season by two of the most heralded freshman golfers ever to set foot in Tuscaloosa. Cory Whitsett, the 2007 U.S. Junior Amateur champion, will pair with Bobby Wyatt, a four-time winner of the Alabama Boys' State Junior Championship, to form an outstanding mix of youth and experience at the top of the Crimson Tide's lineup.

"I'm looking forward to seeing Cory and Bobby," Seawell said. "I think they're going to make each other better. I think Cory and Bobby want to find out how good Bud and Hunter are and then conversely the older guys want to find out how good the young guys are. Bud and Hunter have done it on the college level for two years now and the young guys haven't yet. I think the energy the young guys are going to bring, plus the talent, and then the leadership and the talent of the older guys - I'm hoping it's going to be a great fit and give us a chance to win some championships."

Whitsett and Wyatt come to Alabama as the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked junior golfers, according to Golfweek, in 2009-2010.

In addition to his U.S. Junior title in 2007, Whitsett won the Western Junior and the AJGA's Rolex Tournament of Champions in 2008. The lefty from Houston, Texas, chose Alabama over Oklahoma State, Texas A&M and Oklahoma.

Wyatt, who achieved national fame for his second-round 57 this summer in the Alabama Boys' State Junior Championship at The Country Club of Mobile, chose Alabama over Georgia, Auburn, Vanderbilt and Mississippi.

The first person to ever win the Boys' State Junior more than twice, Wyatt has won it four times. The Mobile, Ala., native and UMS-Wright alum shot an 18-under 195, with scores of 68-57-70, to win the tourney and finish six shots ahead of his nearest competitor.

"They (Whitsett and Wyatt) could have gone anywhere they wanted to in the country but they came to Alabama," Seawell said. "They're good enough to start for any team. They have great golf talent, but what I like about them is they are winners. They know how to win tournaments. Bobby has won the Alabama State Junior four years in a row. Cory won the U.S. Junior as well as multiple tournaments. I like that they are winners and they know how to win. They have a great amount of talent, there is no potential - they already have winning talent. I think that's the biggest asset they are going to bring to us. They want to win and that's why they came here."

Alabama's 2010 fall slate will consist of the Carpet Capital Collegiate, the annual Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate and the Isleworth Collegiate Invitational as well as a new addition - the Olympia Fields/Fighting Illini Invitational at Olympia Fields Country Club, host of the 2003 U.S. Open.

"We have two philosophies," Seawell said. "We want to play against the best and we want to play on the best, most challenging golf courses. That's how you find out what kind of players you have. You get a chance to play a course like Olympia Fields and travel to a great town like Chicago, we couldn't pass that up. That's what we do. We promise the kids we're going to give them an opportunity to test their game at the highest level, so that's one of the reasons we added Olympia Fields."

Moreover, Seawell changed up the spring schedule in order to keep the Tide tournament ready.

"I caught ourselves needing to play more before the conference tournament," Seawell said. "So I added a couple more two-day tournaments that we could drive to and get to, instead of just sitting at home and practicing. Practicing can get a little boring sometimes as you do it week in and week out. You need to play. So we added more dates in the spring so we can be a little sharper on the course, hopefully, by SEC Championship time."

HEAD COACH

Named the University of Alabama's head men's golf coach on July 26, 2002, Jay Seawell has rekindled the proud tradition of the Crimson Tide program and has quickly established Alabama as one of the elite programs in the country during his tenure in Tuscaloosa.

In his ninth season at the helm of the Crimson Tide men's golf program, Seawell has his teams routinely ranked among the top 10 in the country while leading UA to seven NCAA Tournament appearances and four NCAA Championships berths - including four of the last six.

Returning only two lettermen for the 2009-10 season, Seawell was presented one of his biggest challenges. The veteran coach responded with a squad that captured their fourth straight Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate and boasted four medalists throughout the season. The win at the Jerry Pate was the program's 15th in eight years under Seawell's guidance.

Hunter Hamrick captured medalist honors at the JPNI and the Western Refining All-America Classic while tying for first at the Schenkel E-Z-Go Invitational on his way to honorable mention All-America honors. Bud Cauley set a new school record for scoring average at 71.32 while Hamrick finished second on the team with an average of 72.88. Cauley also won the Isleworth Collegiate and the Linger Longer Invitational while garnering first-team All-American honors.

The 2009 team added a program first to Seawell's resume with a victory at the NCAA Northeast Regional. It was the first regional title for the Crimson Tide's men's golf team and the club's second win of the season.

Seawell's teams from 2007-09 finished sixth, 13th and 15th, respectively, in the NCAA Championships while the 2008 team also captured the school's first Southeastern Conference Championship since 1979. UA's success over

the past several years has energized the Tide's alumni base and created an excitement for Alabama golf not seen in recent memory.

The 2008-09 team finished with two tournament titles with wins at the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate and the NCAA Northeast Regional. Seawell's five-man team almost always included at least three freshmen and finished with a 292.06-round average.

True freshman Bud Cauley garnered second-team PING All-America honors and first-team honors from Golfweek. He was also named first-team All-SEC and the SEC Freshman of the Year. He won medalist honors at the United State Collegiate Championship while Hunter Hamrick was the medalist at the NCAA Northeast Regional. Cauley was also a semifinalist for the Ben Hogan Award and selected to play for the Americans at the 2009 Walker Cup and the 2009 Palmer Cup.

Alabama's 2007-08 team finished the season ranked No. 3 in the final Golf World/NIKE Coaches poll and captured its first Southeastern Conference golf championship in 29 years. Seawell's success at Alabama has caught the attention and respect of his coaching peers who voted him the 2008 SEC Coach of the Year. His 2008 Tide team co-led the nation in team tournament championships with six wins. He has coached Alabama to 13 team tournament championships and five individual championships in seven years, including four medalists in 2007-08. The team also set the school's 54-hole record with the 810 it shot to win the 2007 Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate.

His 2006-07 Alabama team made UA history, catapulting to the nation's No. 1 ranking in all three collegiate polls in September of 2006 and holding on to the top spot in the Coaches' poll from September through early February of 2007. The team won four tournaments and set school scoring records en route to a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championship and a runner-up showing at the SEC Championships.

Seawell is producing headline-worthy men, on the course and in the classroom. His golfers are among the most active in the Tuscaloosa community, volunteering their time at schools and helping host athletic department sponsored events for kids. In 2007-08, the golf team won both of the UA Athletic Department's biggest awards, the Men's Team with the Highest GPA and the Men's Community Service Award.

Golf produced six Academic All-SEC award winners in 2008. Joseph Sykora, was a three-time ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American and was voted by the league's golf coaches as the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for an SEC-record three times, winning in 2006, 2007 and 2008. In 2008, Sykora won both the SEC's H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award (all sports, all males in the league) and the University's Bryant Award as its top male student-athlete of any sport.

Seawell has coached 11 All-Americans during his coaching career, including his latest, Michael Thompson in 2007 and 2008. In 2008 his Alabama golfers were nominated for the sport's highest national awards, including the Ben Hogan Award, the Jack Nicklaus Award and the Byron Nelson Award.

Seawell arrived at the Capstone for the 2002-03 season and quickly established a formula for success. His first Crimson Tide team finished sixth at the SEC Championships, after a ninth-place showing the year before. Alabama also qualified for the NCAA East Regional, only the second appearance in the previous six seasons for the Tide.

The 2003-04 season helped build the foundation for the coming years at Alabama. The Crimson Tide finished 11th at the SEC Championships, but captured its first tournament team title with a win at the Conrad Rehling Invitational and proved it was building for the future.

That future came quickly as the Crimson Tide qualified for not only the NCAA Regionals in 2005, but finished tied for 28th at the NCAA Championships. It was Alabama's first NCAA Championship





appearance since the 1996 season. The Tide posted a sixth-place finish at the NCAA East Regional to qualify.

The Crimson Tide again qualified for NCAA regional play in 2006, finishing 14th at the NCAA West Regional. Alabama also recorded a third-place finish at the SEC Championships, its best at that time since a third-place showing in 1990.

He began his coaching career at Anderson College where he coached from 1991-96, winning five consecutive Region 10 championships. His work earned him five Region Coach of the Year Awards. After briefly leaving Anderson for another career pursuit, Seawell returned to coach Anderson again in 1997-98 then was hired by Augusta State as its head coach prior to the start of 1998-99 season.

He led ASU to four straight NCAA Regional appearances and three trips to the NCAA Championships. Seawell's 2001 team finished seventh at the NCAA Championships before turning in the best finish in school history the following year with a fifth-place showing. He coached three All-Americans during his tenure at ASU, including two-time All-American Jamie Elson and All-American and former Ryder Cup player Oliver Wilson.

Seawell is a 1988 graduate of the University of South Carolina. His degree is in hotel and restaurant management. He lettered on the Gamecocks' golf team and served as the president of USC's Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Seawell and his wife, Stephanie, have three children: Brooke, Jackson and Lauren.

ASSISTANT MEN'S GOLF COACH



Scott Limbaugh is in his fourth season as the Crimson Tide's assistant golf coach after an extremely successful tenure as the head coach at Huntingdon College from 2005-07.

Limbaugh brings a wealth of experience as both a coach and a former collegiate golfer. He is also the Director of the Alabama Golf Academy and the Tide's recruiting coordinator.

Hired in July of 2007, Limbaugh was the head golf coach at Huntingdon (Ala.) College for three years (2005, 2006 and 2007) before joining the Crimson Tide's coaching staff.

Limbaugh, a Childersburg, Ala., native, was the 2005-06 Eaton/Golf Pride South Region NCAA Division III Coach of the Year. He coached Huntingdon to a fourth-place NCAA Division III men's golf finish in 2007, which was its best finish in school history.

It was Huntingdon's third straight NCAA appearance as Limbaugh's teams qualified in all three of his seasons as head coach. His first Huntingdon team in 2005 finished ninth before the 2006 team finished 15th. His 2006 team was ranked No. 1 for almost the entire season in Division III.

He produced an All-American in Fairhope's Jacob Collinsworth who finished second individually at the NCAA Division III Championships. Collinsworth is one of three All-Americans Limbaugh produced at Huntingdon.

Limbaugh played collegiately for the Hawks for two seasons after helping lead Central Alabama Community College to two NCAA Junior College National Championships. Limbaugh was a co-captain on that 2000 National Champion team for Central Alabama. As a golfer at Huntingdon, he competed at nationals and was team captain in 2002.

He is a 2003 graduate of Huntingdon College and was hired as Huntingdon's assistant golf coach upon graduation. He was elevated to head coach in June of 2004.

Limbaugh married the former Kate Mastin on July 18, 2009. Kate works for Crimson Tide Sports Marketing as marketing coordinator. The couple is expecting their first child in February.

The University of Alabama's Director of Athletics since 1999, Mal Moore has made an indelible mark on one of the nation's most storied athletic programs, leading a department that has enjoyed tremendous success athletically and academically and has undergone an unprecedented period of growth during his tenure.

Through his guidance, Alabama's athletic department remains focused on his vision of having all Crimson Tide athletic teams and student-athletes competitive at the highest level nationally while continuing to elevate athletic facilities at the Capstone to premier status nationally for all sports.

During his tenure as Director of Athletics, Moore has overseen more than \$200 million of capital improvements to University of Alabama athletic facilities. Those projects have encompassed the entire scope of all Crimson Tide athletic programs and have benefitted every Alabama student-athlete, coach, and administrator.

Throughout his multi-faceted career, Moore has worked with a diversified field of constituents, from fellow coaches and former players, to fans and the business community. All of those experiences and relationships - in addition to his ability to unify those many constituents - have made him the ideal person to lead Alabama athletics in the 21st century.

His leadership has been crucial in helping guide Alabama through a period that has been, at times, extremely challenging. His guidance and effort helped Alabama athletics weather the storm, while continuing to move in a positive direction toward a future that holds great promise.

Moore's dedication to and love of the University of Alabama was recognized on March 28, 2007, when as a permanent tribute to his life-long contribution to The University of Alabama, the Board of Trustees of The University of Alabama officially dedicated the facility formerly known as The Football Building as the Mal M. Moore Athletic Facility.

Under Moore's direction, Alabama's athletic teams have produced two national championships, the 2009 football title and the 2002 NCAA gymnastics championship, as well as several Southeastern Conference championships, winning titles in football, gymnastics, men's basketball, women's golf, men's golf, men's cross country, baseball and softball; taking SEC tournament titles in both baseball and softball. Alabama athletes have earned some of the highest honors the SEC and NCAA have to offer, including SEC Athlete of the Year, SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year, NCAA Top VIII, NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships and NCAA Sportsman of the Year. These honors are over and above the individual conference and national titles that Alabama athletes continue to bring home to the Capstone on a regular basis.

In addition to making his mark on Alabama, Moore has also had a national impact as a key member of several prestigious NCAA and college football committees. Moore has served on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee, the SEC Athletic Directors Bowl Advisory Committee and the Big Six Conferences Minority Coaches Forum.

Moore's distinguished record of service to UA began more than 50 years ago when he joined the Crimson Tide football squad as a scholarship player for Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant from 1958-62. Moore has the distinction of being a part of eight national championship teams (1961, 1964, 1965, 1973, 1978, 1979, 1992 and 2009) with the first coming as a player, the next six during his coaching career and the last during his tenure as director of athletics. As a player and coach, he was also part of 14 SEC championships, and 27 bowl trips. He is the only individual connected with the Tide program to be a part of eight national championships.

During a coaching career that spanned 31 years, Moore spent 22 of those at Alabama with stops at Montana State, Notre Dame and the NFL's St. Louis and Phoenix Cardinals. At Alabama, Moore started as Coach Bryant's graduate assistant in 1964, then as defensive backfield coach for five years beginning in 1965 before becoming quarterbacks coach from 1971-82 and serving as the Tide's first offensive coordinator starting in 1975. He would go on to coordinate all of the offensive plays for Alabama's last four national championship teams.

A 1963 graduate of The University of Alabama, Moore holds both an undergraduate degree in Sociology and a 1964 Master's Degree in Secondary Education from the Capstone. Moore was born December 19, 1939, in Dozier, Ala. He and the late Mrs. Charlotte Moore have one daughter, Mrs. Steve (Heather) Cook of Scottsdale, Ariz., a granddaughter, Anna Lee, and a grandson, Charles Cannon.

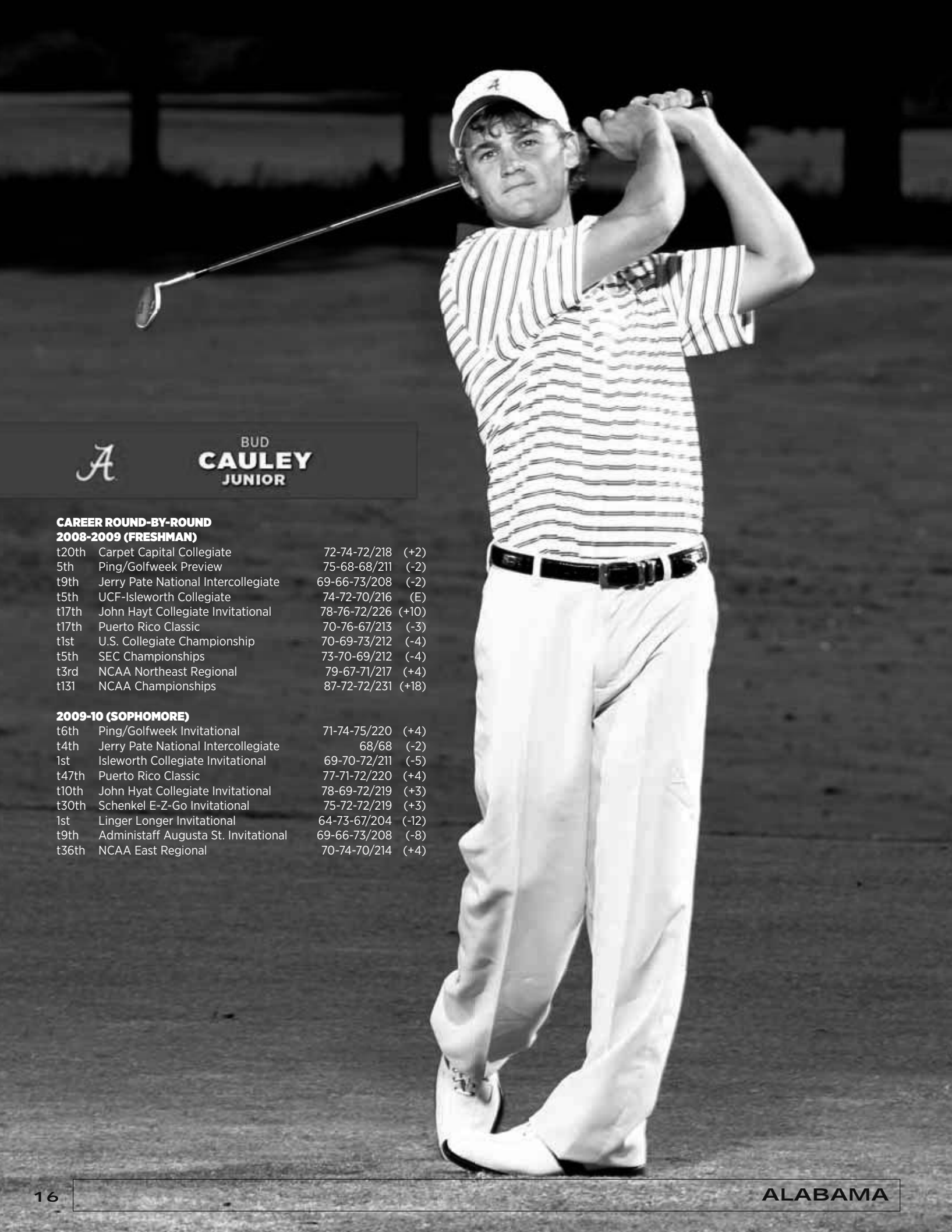

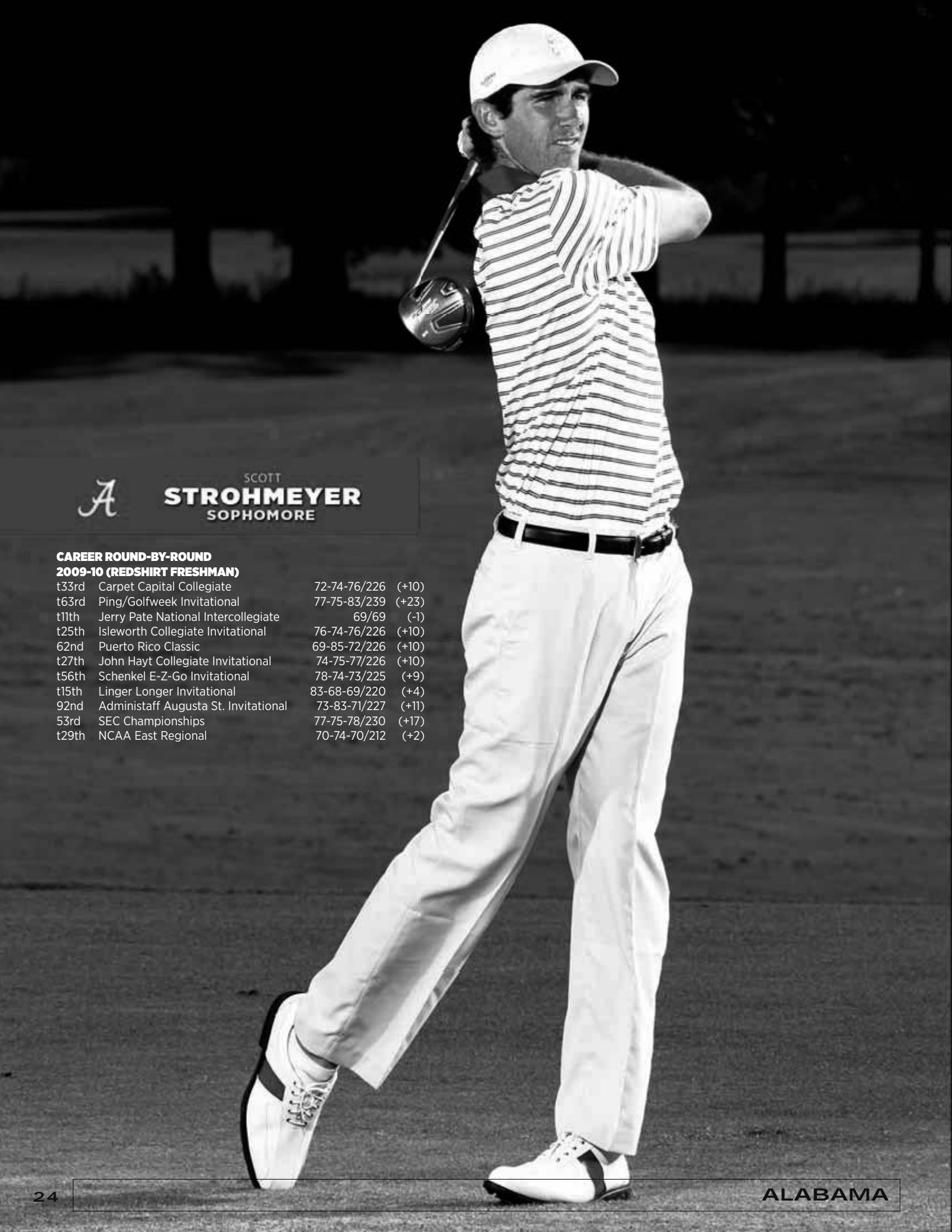

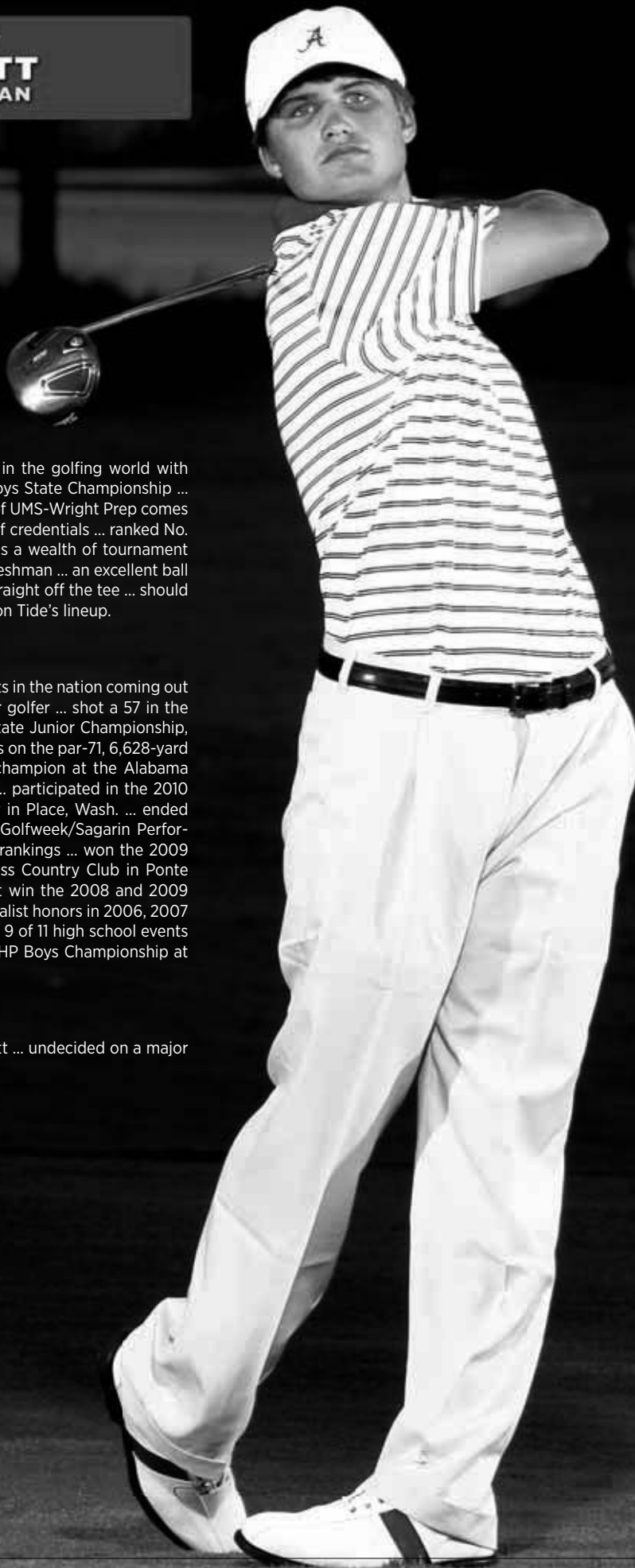

The Pate Center is also equipped with wireless internet, a big-screen TV and plenty of dining space available for meals and recruiting dinners."

The Jerry Pate Golf Center at the Ol' Colony Golf Complex provides the University of Alabama men's golf team with one of the best practice and playing facilities in collegiate golf. The Pate Golf Center is a private facility that is only utilized by the Alabama golf teams. The Pate Golf Center provides plenty of space for both the men's and women's teams with the ability to conduct full practice sessions during inclement weather. It has six indoor hitting bays and two indoor putting surfaces. The Pate Golf Center is also equipped with state-of-the-art teaching tools, including the V1 Swing Analysis System and Trackman, which aids the coaching staff in ball flight analysis using doppler radar and club fitting. The locker rooms inside the Pate Golf Center have tour-sized lockers and all of the amenities while the lounge area includes comfortable seating and a large-screen television.

The Ol' Colony Golf Course was named one of the "Top 5 Best New Public Courses in America" by Golf Digest in 2001 and *Golfweek* named it one of the top 50 municipal course in America in 2010. The Jerry Pate-designed course is considered one of the best public courses in the nation. It's a test for even the most advanced golfer with large bunkers, mature trees and numerous water hazards, including a 25-acre lake that challenges almost every shot.

The practice range at the Pate Golf Center, which already provides the Crimson Tide golfers all of the practice components and tools needed to develop, recently finished an expansion and renovation. The practice facility includes a full practice range, putting greens, a chipping area and practice bunkers. The Jerry Pate Golf Center recently added a new putting green with an expanded chipping and hitting area. The new chipping and hitting areas are complete with new bunkers and practice tees that allow players to hit their own golf balls up to 200 yards into six new target greens.



One that asks you to hit more shots and be more creative than what we had in the past. This is an excellent new practice area that will help us better prepare for our season. Another aspect of the expanded practice area, and one that I feel is very important for good players, is their ability to hit their own balls - especially on approach shots. We now have the ability to hit our own balls on flat or uneven lies to target greens up to 200 yards away. For good players it is hard to put into words how much that will help."

The Indian Hills Country Club and the NorthRiver Yacht Club both provide the University of Alabama men's golf team alternative courses to play and practice throughout the year.

Indian Hills' championship golf course has impeccably manicured bermuda fairways and crenshaw bent greens.

NorthRiver was designed by legendary golfer Gary Player in 1978 and is cut through heavily wooded areas and rolling hills. In 1999, Bob Cupp redesigned the course adding bentgrass greens and modernizing the bunkering while preserving the integrity of the original Player design.

No. 1 is a medium-length starting hole at 405 yards. The fairway is a tight fit on this par 4, so getting your tee shot in play is the No. 1 priority. If you do find the fairway, then a good second shot will leave you in excellent shape for a birdie.

PAR 4
310 YARDS



The second hole is a drivable par 4 for the long hitters at 310 yards from the back tees. The challenge on No. 2 is the bunker complex short and left and a shallow green with severe undulation that makes it very difficult to get to pins - and even tougher to sink putts.



3

PAR 5
536 YARDS



No. 3 is a great par 5. The second shot requires you to maneuver around an old oak tree. If you are able to do that, it becomes possible to reach this 536-yard hole in two shots. The green slopes from back to front but gives golfers a chance at par.





4

**PAR 3
213 YARDS**

Club selection is very important on this downhill par 3 fourth hole that measures 213 yards. The green is guarded by two bunkers front and left and a bunker back right. Like all of the par 3s at Ol' Colony, par is an outstanding score.



5

**PAR 4
475 YARDS**

It is 475 yards from the back tee on this long and challenging par 4 fifth hole. The drive is challenged by well-placed fairway bunkers. If you are able to avoid the fairway bunkers, your long-second shot is guarded by a very narrow opening at the green.



6

**PAR 4
431 YARDS**

The sixth hole is deceptively hard. It is a 431-yard par 4 that is setup on your second shot. The green is very shallow and club selection is very difficult and key to scoring. The front of the green is well bunkered and awaits shots that come up short, while long shots will find a downhill slope into the woods.

The par 5 seventh hole measures 556 yards with many obstacles in the way. The hole is reachable in two shots, but a blind second poses many dangers. The green is well bunkered and if your shot strays too far left water will come into play.

No. 8 is a good solid par 3 that will require an accurate long iron from 203 yards. Your best shot is something in the middle of the green. The carry is over water to a well-bunkered green. Anything short and left is either wet or on the beach.



9

**PAR 4
409 YARDS**



The par 4 ninth hole is not that long at 409 yards, but trouble looms with an errant shot. The water up the left side can come into play, so it is best to keep the tee shot up the right side. A short-iron approach makes birdie a possibility, except when the pin is tucked into the front-left corner.

PAR 5
555 YARDS

No. 10 is an excellent par 5 with the creek running up the left side and then cutting across the fairway and along the right side of the green, which makes the second shot very difficult. At 555 yards the tenth is a risk-reward hole if you attempt to go for the green in two shots.

397 YARDS

The 11th hole is a 397-yard par 4 that has a slight dogleg to the right. You should consider a fairway wood off the tee to position yourself short of the fairway bunker down the left side. A well-placed tee shot will leave a short iron into a well-bunkered green and a chance for birdie.

213 YARDS

The 12th is probably the most difficult par 3 on the course at 213 yards. You will be hitting another long iron into a green positioned between a swell to the right and a creek to the left. Par is another good score here and you have to find the green if you want to do that.

No. 14 is a pretty simple par 5 at 513 yards. The 14th is made for the long hitters, just hit it hard and straight to find the fairway. A good drive will leave you with a mid to long iron into a green with bunkers guarding the left. Two well executed shots will leave you in good position for a birdie.

The 15th is a fun little hole where club selection is important. The 394-yard par 4 requires an accurate line and the right club off the tee to set yourself up for a wedge on your second shot. The green has bunkers guarding the left and right side.

No. 16 is a 432-yard par 4 that poses problems off the tee. The fairway is well bunkered down the left side as the hole doglegs around to the left. The correct line off the tee is important because finding those bunkers will make the hole very difficult. Get past the bunkers and a complicated green adds even more fun.

The downhill par-3 17th is maybe the most scenic hole on the course, but it provides a stiff challenge at 186 yards. The key is to pay close attention to the wind because it will affect the ball twice what it normally does, so club selection is vital. The green is well bunkered on the left with a deep bunker on the right.



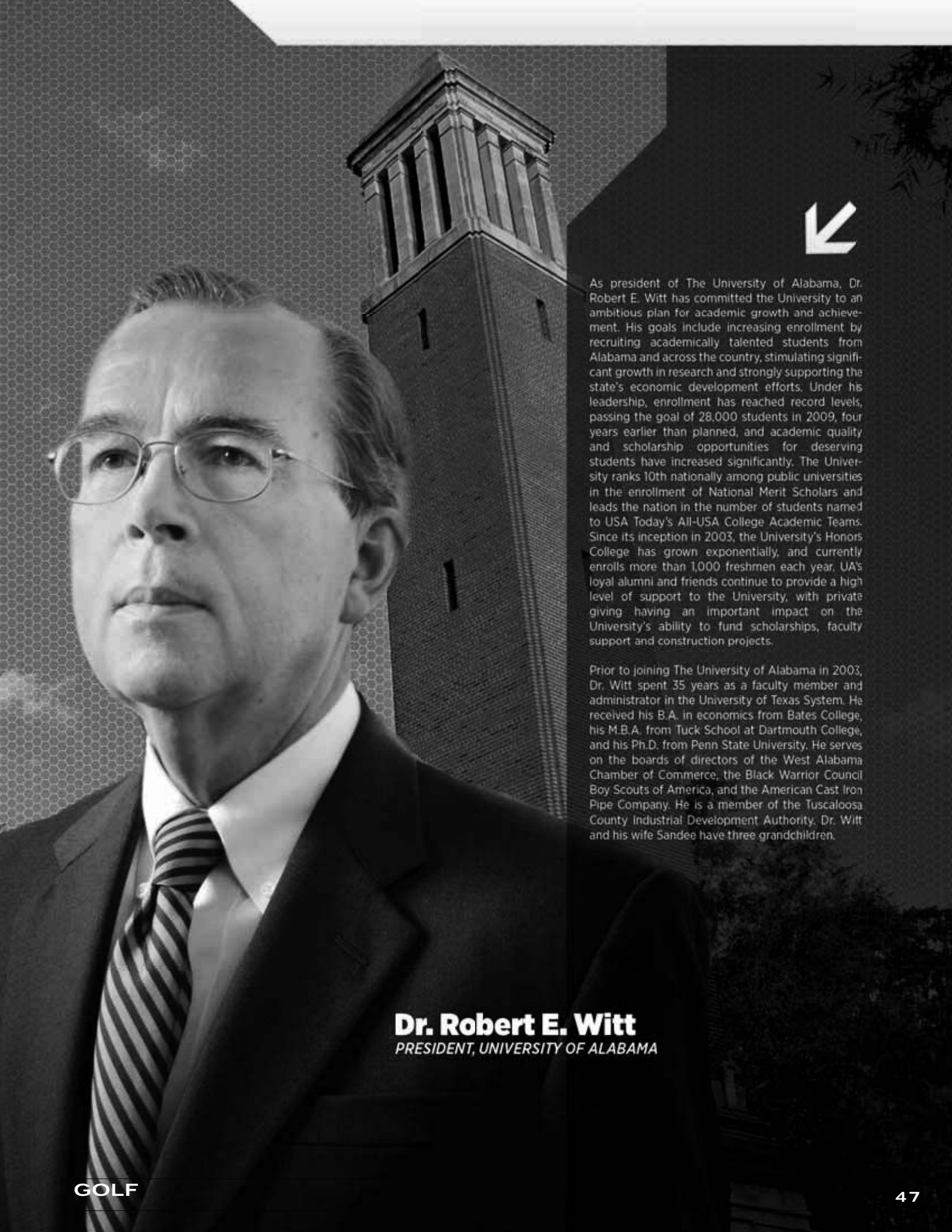

The 18th is a great finishing hole. Water runs the length of the hole on the right and looms over each shot. The 450-yard par 4 is the toughest tee shot on the course, followed by an equally challenging second shot. The green is very complicated and tucked around to the right. A par here is a very good score.

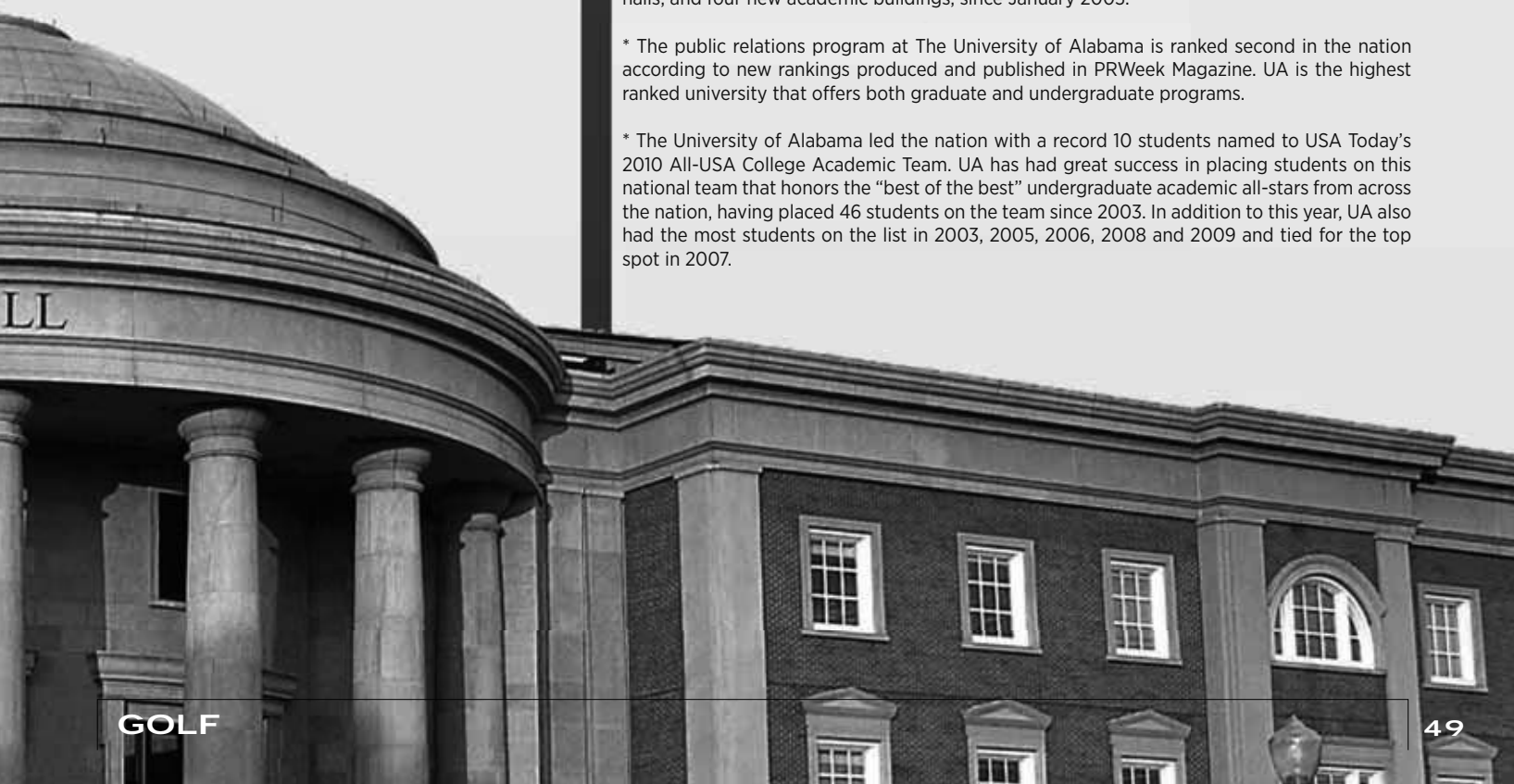

THE CRIMSON TIDE ACADEMIC SUCCESS

The Crimson Tide golf team has a history of producing some of the University's best athletes and brightest students. Joseph Sykora, a senior in 2008, is the first three-time winner of the Southeastern Conference Scholar-Athlete of the Year award from men's golf, winning in 2006, 2007 and 2008 with his perfect 4.0 GPA. He was also a three-time ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American, winning in one of the toughest categories, the At-Large division which includes student-athletes from several sports. Sykora finished his Crimson Tide career by capturing the H. Boyd McWorter Award, given to the SEC's student-athlete of the year.

The 2010 season had six golfers earn SEC Academic Honor accolades, including Bud Cauley, Hunter Hamrick, Lee Knox, Hunter Slatton, Scott Strohmeyer and Phillip Weaver. In 2009, Alabama saw Matthew Swan named to the Cleveland Golf/Srixon All-America Scholars Team. The Crimson Tide also had five golfers named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, including Hamrick, Matt Hughes, Slatton, Swan, and Weaver. In 2008 the Tide golfers again won the athletic department's award for the men's team with the highest GPA.

Sykora was one of six Crimson Tide golfers named Academic All-SEC in 2008, along with Mark Harrell, Matt Hughes, Ben Moody, Swan and Stewart Whitt.

Standing out in the classroom and playing a year-long sport is a feat not easily achieved. Golfers contend with a season that starts in early September and continues through the first week in June with the NCAA championships.

Despite those demands, Alabama has produced 88 Academic All-SEC golfers since 1985. Joseph Joyner was the first Tide golfer to be named to the Academic All-SEC Honor Roll in 1985. And, in 2004 when the SEC began its first Freshman Academic Honor Roll, Alabama produced two men on the list. Swan made that team in 2006.

Encouraging academic success is as much a part of Bama's coaching mantra as winning championships. Celebrating academic success is also a priority.

Six Tide men's golfers have won the University of Alabama's highest award for an athlete, The Bryant Award. Michael Thompson is the latest of the winners, taking the trophy in 2008. The award is announced each spring and is given to the top male and top female student-athlete at the University, placing emphasis on athletic achievement, academic achievement and leadership.

Dicky Pride, Marten Olander, Dan Mutert, Allan MacDonald and Michael Thompson are the men's golfers who have won the Bryant Award. MacDonald was a 1997 Palmer Cup participant. Olander, an All-American on the golf course and a four-time Academic All-American, won the Ben Hogan Award. Pride is a PGA Tour player. Thompson was a 2007 U.S. Amateur finalist and played in the 2008 Masters and U.S. Open as an amateur as well as the 2008 U.S. Palmer Cup team.

Seawell and assistant coach Scott Limbaugh work closely with the Center for Academic Student Services. Former Tide golfer Lance Walker is an assistant on that staff. CASS monitors the academic progress of each athlete who wears a Crimson Tide uniform and advises the athletes on areas of study that best suit their capabilities and dreams. Study hall is required for all freshmen and any athletes whose grades aren't Academic All-SEC worthy.

Jon Dever is Alabama's Assistant Athletics Director for Student Services. The CASS Center is located in the Bryant Academic Center as is the Champs' Lifeskills program.

The Bryant Academics Center, which houses the CASS staff and is a frequent stop in the daily lives of Alabama's student-athletes, is the crown jewel in the Alabama athletic department's Crimson Tradition Fund facility enhancement campaign. The renovation project at Bryant Hall was completed for \$10.3 million in 2005.

"This project has been priority one since we started the renovations of our athletic facilities," said UA athletics director Mal Moore. "Academics are at the center of our mission at Alabama and we wanted to create a place that would aid all our student-athletes in their educational pursuits. I feel very strongly that Bryant Hall will benefit every student-athlete, not just during their years at Alabama, but for a lifetime."

Among the building's many amenities is a 48-seat computer lab equipped with brand new equipment. The computer lab has 25 laptop computers available for student-athletes to check out and use on team road trips. The building features math, English and writing labs along with 40 individual study rooms. A pair of 50-seat classrooms and a 140-seat lecture hall are also available. Located in the lobby of the building is the Crimson Tide Academic Hall of Fame with plaques recognizing all of Alabama's Academic All-American selections.

The University of Alabama's student-athletes receive not only classroom education but leadership education. The CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills Program offers a variety of programs geared toward the personal growth and development of student-athletes.

The concept of CHAMPS/Life Skills is to provide the student-athlete with the necessary tools to succeed in sport as well as other areas of life, such as in the classroom, in the community and in the workplace. In 1999 the University of Alabama CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was given the Program of Excellence Award by the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association.

Alabama calls its own program the T.U.S.K.S. program, borrowing its mascot, the elephant, for the name. It stands for "Tide Uniting in Service, Knowledge and Support," and its programs and goals are geared toward a commitment to academic excellence, athletic excellence, personal development, community service and career development.

An excellent leadership source, Alabama's CHAMPS/Life Skills exposes the Tide's student-athletes to a variety of programs with topics that include alcohol and drug education, time management, personal relationships, stress management, media training, professional career planning and even etiquette.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee is composed of at least two student-athletes from every sport. S.A.A.C. is very active on campus and in the Tuscaloosa community, sending student-athletes to schools, churches and organizations and hosting events such as the Halloween Extravaganza which provides kids with a safe place to trick-or-treat and play games, The Gatorade "Get 60" programs which encourages local school children to participate in 60 minutes of physical activity a day for 60 days, the Beat Auburn/Beat Hunger food drive that helps stock the Weest Alabama Food Bank, and Project Angel Tree each year where student-athletes and athletics department employees purchase Christmas gifts for children in need.

Alabama's men's golf team is extremely active in the community. It won the athletic department's 2008 Community Outreach award as the team that spent the most hours volunteering and working in the community.

CHAMPS & LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

In 1994, the Division 1A Directors' CHAMPS program and the NCAA Life Skills program joined forces to become the CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills program. The CHAMPS/Life Skills program focuses on five commitments that over 300 NCAA institutions are making in the growth and development of student-athletes.

The CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, at Alabama, offers a variety of programs geared toward each of the commitments. The program is an important aspect, because it provides the student-athlete with the necessary tools to succeed in his or her sport, as well as other areas of life, such as the classroom, the community and the workplace. The University of Alabama CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was awarded the 1999 Program of Excellence Award given by the Division 1A Athletic Directors Association.

THE CRIMSON TIDE OPEN

Each fall the University of Alabama head men's golf coach Jay Seawell hosts the Crimson Tide Open, in honor of the late former Conrad Rehling, who coached the Crimson from 1972-88. Alabama hosted the fifth annual Crimson Tide Open this past November at the Jerry Pate Golf Center at the Ol' Colony Golf Course.

The format of the event is a four-man scramble and the grand prize is a trip to Phoenix to the Ping Headquarters for 36 holes of golf and custom golf clubs. Each four-man team contributes \$1,200 to compete with a \$300 fee for individuals with all proceeds going to help fund the Crimson Tide golf program. Other prizes include golf clubs, Alabama golf gear, golf trips, Alabama football skybox tickets, Alabama basketball tickets and much more.

The Crimson Tide Open started as a tribute to former Alabama Coach Rehling, who was instrumental in moving Alabama golf into the national landscape. The coach led the Crimson Tide to its first SEC Championship in 1979 and won Coach of the Year twice in the league in 1979 and 1983. Rehling was inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame in 1980.

THE JERRY PATE INVITATIONAL

Each October, 12 of the nation's best men's college golf teams gather in Vestavia Hills, Ala., for the University of Alabama's annual Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate. In addition to hosting a premier field and event, the tournament annually raises some \$20,000 for charities.

The host and tournament namesake is the most successful professional golfer to have worn the Crimson and White, Jerry Pate. The former Tide golfer and current Champions Tour player proudly lends his name and plays an active role - from team selection to presenting the awards trophies.

Pate and Alabama have hosted this event since 1986. Originally, it was held in Pate's hometown of Pensacola, Fla. He moved the tournament to Birmingham's Shoal Creek in 1992 where it remained for five years. In 1997 the JPNI moved to its current home, the Old Overton Club.

The strength of the JPNI field makes it a premier team fall gathering. Even the selection committee is a powerful one. The tournament's selection committee has included PGA greats Arnold Palmer, Ben Crenshaw and Mark McCormack. The committee seeks the highest-ranked teams from the previous season who are expected to again be in the national title hunt. In the fall of 2004 Georgia finished fourth at the JPNI but went on that spring to win the NCAA title. The 1995 JPNI champion Arizona State, won the (spring) 1996 NCAA Championship, and fall 1997 JPNI participant UNLV didn't win the JPNI, but went on to win the 1998 NCAA title. The 1994 field included all of the top nine from the 1994 NCAA Championships, including national champion - and 1994 Jerry Pate Champions - Stanford, led by 1994 U.S. Amateur Champion Tiger Woods. Woods was also the 1994 JPNI medalist.

He continues to represent the Crimson Tide proudly today, lending his name, energy and money to Alabama's annual Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate.

HOW IT WORKS

Each May, the NCAA hosts six regionals, which are spread around the country and provide for exciting golf from coast to coast. The six-regional format was started at the 2009 NCAA Championships and replaces the old three-regional system.

Each of the six regional sites will qualify five teams for the NCAA Championship Finals, being held at The Honors Course, on June 1-6, 2010. Those 30 teams will then play 54 holes of stroke play, with the individual champion being declared at that point. The top-eight teams after the 54 holes of stroke play will then move on to match play and be seeded according to their finish in the stroke play portion. The No. 1 team will face the No. 8 team, No. 2 will face No. 7, No. 3 vs. No. 6 and No. 4 vs. No. 5. The team that wins three rounds of match play will be crowned the national champion.

Teams are selected for regional competition based upon their overall tournament finishes and head-to-head finishes against other teams that are in their region. Selection is made by a regional committee made up of head coaches.

From 1989 through the 2008 NCAA Championships, the finals consisted of 72 holes of play with a cut after 54 holes to the top-15 teams.

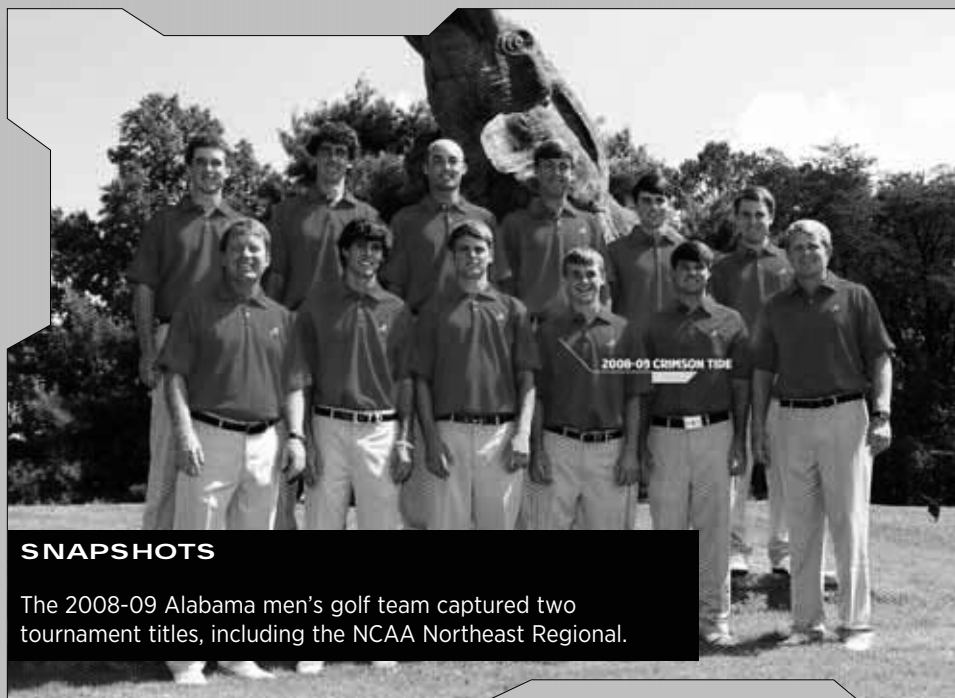

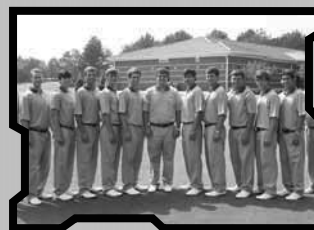

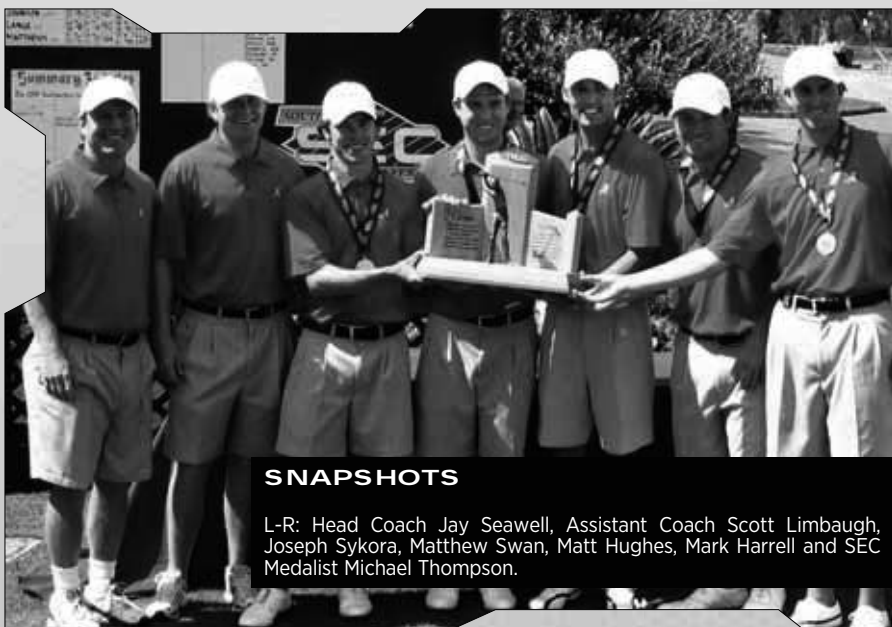

Some FAQs when dealing with Student-Athletes

WHO IS A REPRESENTATIVE OF ALABAMA INTERESTS?

Someone who:

- Has ever made any type of financial or in-kind contribution to the athletics department, to a specific sport program or to an athletics booster organization, including purchasing donor seating to athletics events (i.e., Tide Pride Football or Tide Pride Basketball)
- Is or has been a member of any organization or agency promoting University of Alabama athletics (i.e., Red Elephant Club, Grand Slammers, etc.);
- As ever helped to arrange or has provided employment for an enrolled student-athlete, a prospective student-athlete or their parents or relatives;
- Has ever assisted in any manner in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes;
- Has ever provided benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families or to prospective student-athletes or their families;
- Has otherwise promoted the institution's athletics program in any manner;

WHAT ABOUT RECRUITING?

As a representative of Alabama's athletics' interests, you may not:

- contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an effort to evaluate a prospect
- visit the prospect's institution to pick up film or transcripts pertaining to the evaluation of the prospect's academic eligibility or athletic ability
- contact a prospect, his/her parents, legal guardians or spouse on or off the Alabama campus
- contact a prospect by telephone or by letter
- make special arrangements for entertainment for recruiting purposes
- provide reduced cost products or services to a prospect

WHO IS A PROSPECTIVE STUDENT-ATHLETE?

NCAA rules stipulate that a prospective student-athlete is a person who has started classes for the ninth (9th) grade, regardless of his/her athletics ability.

A prospective student-athlete remains a prospect even after he or she has signed a National Letter of Intent or accepts an offer of financial aid to attend The University of Alabama until he/she reports for the first day of classes for a regular term (fall

WHAT ABOUT STUDENT-ATHLETE APPEARANCES & PROMOTIONS?

Student-athletes are prohibited from being involved in the advertisement, recommendation or promotion of sales or use of any commercial product or service of any kind. All charitable, educational and nonprofit promotional activities involving student-athletes must have prior approval from the athletics department. All student-athlete appearances for such events are coordinated through Bama's Life Skills Office. For information, please call (205) 348-6618.

WHAT ABOUT STUDENT-ATHLETE EMPLOYMENT?

Student-athletes receiving athletics grants-in-aid will be eligible for employment during the regular academic year. Student-athletes will continue to be eligible for employment during the University's official vacation periods (i.e., Christmas, Spring Break) and during the summer. Very detailed rules regarding which student-athletes may be employed, when and how much money they can earn must be followed. In addition, the Compliance Office must keep written records verifying all student-athlete employment. If you have an interest in hiring a student-athlete, you must first contact the University's Compliance Office prior to employing the student-athlete. Failure to contact the Compliance Office prior to employing a student-athlete could jeopardize the student-athlete's eligibility to participate in intercollegiate athletics at Alabama and could result in an NCAA violation for the student-athlete's sport.

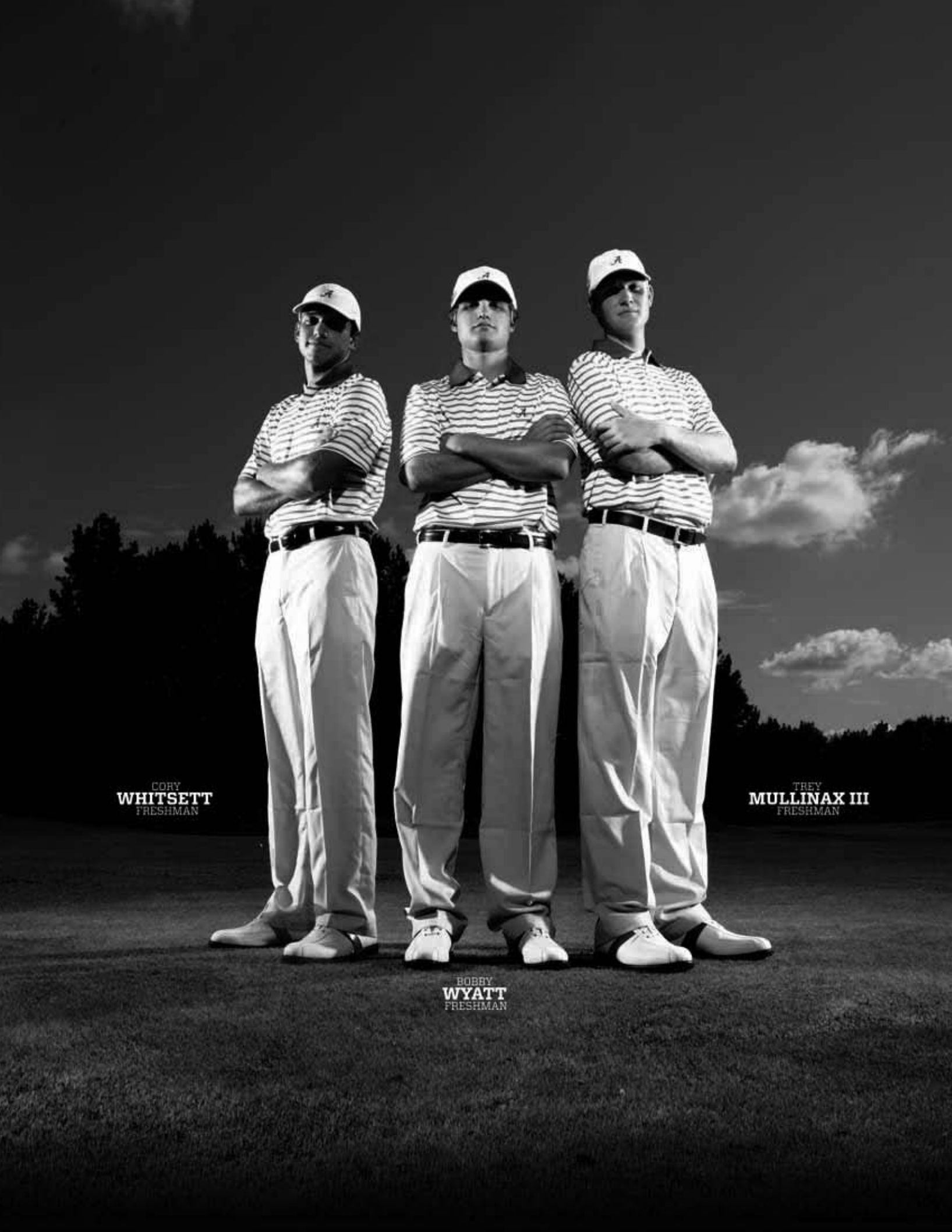
WHAT ARE THE RULES GOVERNING GAMBLING?

A student-athlete, coach and/or employee of The University of Alabama may not provide information to individuals involved in any type of organized gambling concerning sporting events. In addition, student-athletes, coaches and employees of The University of Alabama may not solicit or accept any wager on any intercollegiate or professional athletics contest.

WHAT ARE EXTRA BENEFITS?

NCAA legislation expressly prohibits University supporters from providing "extra benefits" to student-athletes. An extra benefit is any special arrangement to provide a student-athlete or his/her family a benefit not authorized by NCAA legislation. In general, you may not provide anything or make special arrangements for student-athletes or prospective student-athletes that are not available to the general student population.

- providing cash or loans in any amount, or signing or co-signing for a loan
- a guarantee of bond
- the use of an automobile
- gifts of any kind, including birthday cards, flowers and holiday gifts
- gift of clothing or equipment
- providing loans to relatives or friends
- any tangible items, including merchandise
- free or reduced-cost services, rentals or purchases of any type
- free or reduced-cost housing
- gift of cash or like items
- providing special discounts for goods and services (e.g., car repairs, legal services, haircuts, etc.)
- purchasing complimentary admissions from a student-athlete
- providing an honorarium to a student-athlete for a speaking engagement
