Spring Itinerary:

Spring drills are scheduled to run from March 15 through April 16. Coach Todd Graham has scheduled 15 practice sessions. The Annual Blue-Gold Game is scheduled for Saturday, April 16, at Heinz Field. Start time is 2 p.m.

Practice Observation Window for Media:

PITT POSITIONAL OUTLOOK

The 2011 season should be quite a transformation for Pitt football, which begins its first year under the new leadership of head coach Todd Graham.

Whereas past Pitt editions have been more conventional in their offensive and defensive schemes, the Graham Era promises a break from the traditional. The emphasis will be on, as Graham describes it, a "high-octane, high-energy approach" on both sides of the ball.

"We want to snap the ball every fifteen seconds on offense," Graham said. "Defensively we want to apply pressure on every down and make the momentum-changing plays that win football games."

Graham's head coaching tenure at Tulsa reflects the blueprint he looks to implement at Pitt. Behind a prolific offense and opportunistic defense, the Golden Hurricane posted double-digit wins in three of his four seasons. Twice they led the nation in total offense.

Graham's 2010 Tulsa team rolled up 505.6 yards per game to rank fifth nationally and averaged 41.4 points to rank sixth. The Golden Hurricane defense forced a whopping 36 turnovers, the third highest total in college football.

"We're a no-huddle football team," Graham said. "We're going to operate extremely fast on offense. We're going to be high tempo, high octane and explosive. Our goal is to be the most explosive team in the country.

"On defense we want to attack. Our approach to defense stems from our offseason training. We want to put fast and explosive players on the football field and make game-changing plays. Our main focus will be forcing turnovers and impacting the quarterback."

Pitt's transformation on the field begins in earnest on March 15 when the Panthers begin spring drills. Graham has 15 practices scheduled, concluding with the Annual Blue-Gold Game at Heinz Field on April 16.

The spring will give Graham and his staff the first opportunity to evaluate his personnel up close. "We will be adaptive to the skills and talents of the players we have," Graham said. "We've been excited and encouraged by their attitude during the offseason regimen."

The following is a positional look at the 2011 Panthers.

THE OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS

Junior **Tino Sunseri** is the incumbent under center, starting all 13 games a year ago. Sunseri connected on 65% of his passes (223 of 346) for 2,572 yards in his first season in a full-time role. He threw 16 touchdowns against nine interceptions while also showing the ability to make plays on his feet. In the Panthers' BBVA Compass Bowl victory over Kentucky, Sunseri rushed for 53 yards on just four carries (13.3 avg.).

Sophomore **Kolby Gray** joined Pitt as a quarterback prospect in 2009 before shifting to the secondary and lettering at safety last year. Gray will return to QB this spring as his dual-threat capabilities – he was a 1,000-yard passer and rusher his senior year at Cypress Falls (Texas) High – appear well suited to Pitt's new offensive schemes.

The Panthers will have two quarterbacks entering their first active seasons following freshman redshirts. **Anthony Gonzalez** was a standout at Pennsylvania's Liberty High, compiling 5,311 yards in total offense and 61 touchdowns over his final two seasons. **Mark Myers** was a first-team All-Ohio selection as a senior at St. Ignatius after throwing for more than 2,100 yards and 20 TDs.

RUNNING BACKS

Pitt's backfield stable will need restocked with the departure of tailback Dion Lewis and fullback Henry Hynoski to the NFL. Junior **Ray Graham** could be the Panthers' next all-star performer at tailback. Graham rushed for 922 yards last year, averaging 6.2 yards on just 148 carries. He will be the lone scholarship tailback participating in spring drills. Also taking spring repetitions at this position will be freshman walk-on **Randy Morris**.

Four players will vie for time at the vacated fullback spot. Junior walk-on **Chris Mike** is the most experienced after lettering in a reserve role last year. The other three candidates enter their first active seasons at Pitt: redshirt freshman **Derrick Burns**, redshirt frosh walk-on **Adam Lazenga** and junior walk-on **Kris Wildman**.

While Pitt will be working with limited backfield numbers this spring, the Panthers welcome four freshman running backs for fall training camp.



PITT POSITIONAL OUTLOOK

WIDE RECEIVERS

Pitt will employ an array of three-receiver sets this season, maximizing the talents of a promising group of players.

While two-time All-Big East performer Jon Baldwin has departed for the NFL, the Panthers return four lettermen and some intriguing underclassmen.

Pitt will utilize sophomore **Devin Street** at the X receiver. Street played in every game last year, making four starts, and compiled 25 catches for 318 yards and two scores. He will be pushed by sophomore letterman **Ed Tinker**.

At Y receiver, junior **Mike Shanahan** returns after posting career best numbers in a starting role last year. Shanahan was the team's second-leading receiver behind Baldwin with 43 catches for 589 yards and one score. A pair of redshirt freshmen, **Salath Williams** and **Drew Carswell**, will provide quality depth and competition. (Carswell will also get a look at the X position.) Redshirt frosh walk-on **Brett Zuck** is also in the mix at Y.

Junior **Cameron Saddler** is the most experienced returnee at Z receiver, lettering the past two years as a top reserve. Redshirt freshman **Kevin Weatherspoon** enters his first active season looking to earn time in the receiver rotation. Sophomore walk-on **Jake Delmonico** will also look to earn reps at Z.

TIGHT ENDS

Pitt boasts excellent depth and experience at tight end. Last year's top two contributors are back in junior **Mike Cruz** and sophomore **Brock DeCicco**. Cruz had 19 receptions for 213 yards and two touchdowns. DeCicco had only two catches but both went for TDs (totaling 19 yards). Both players will be pushed by junior **Hubie Graham**, who enters his first active season at Pitt after transferring from Illinois.

Adding to the strong competition at tight end will be junior letterman **Justin Virbitsky** and a pair of redshirt freshmen, **Brendan Carozzoni** and **Dan Schneider**.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Pitt returns four players with starting experience and six total lettermen on the offensive front.

Forming the unit's nucleus are three battle-tested seniors in left guard **Chris Jacobson**, left tackle **Jordan Gibbs** and right tackle **Lucas Nix**. The trio owns a combined 49 career starts. Nix leads the group with 25 starting assignments and proved versatile last season when he moved to right guard for nine games.

Also vying for time at tackle will be sophomores **Juantez Hollins** and **Cory King**, redshirt freshman **Matt Rotheram** and mid-year junior-college transfer **Zenel Demhasaj**.

Senior **Greg Gaskins** is a two-year letterman who also brings starting experience to the right guard position. Gaskins could also get a look at center. Additional competitors at guard will be junior letterman **Ryan Turnley**, sophomore **Ryan Schlieper** and redshirt freshmen **Arthur Doakes** and **Shane Johnson**.

At center, sophomore Jack Lippert will look to seize the

starting assignment after being the top backup last year. He will be pushed by redshirt freshman **Brandon Sacco**.

THE DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE

Pitt returns an experienced foundation on its defensive line despite the graduation of two national-caliber ends in Greg Romeus and Jabaal Sheard.

A pair of seniors, **Chas Alecxih** and **Myles Caragein**, returns on the interior. As a starting defensive tackle last year, Alecxih collected 57 stops, including nine TFLs, and thrived as a pass rusher with 7.5 sacks. Caragein, the Panthers' starting nose tackle, had 30 tackles, 4.5 TFLs and two sacks. The tackle spots will boast excellent competition and depth with a pair of sophomore lettermen. **Aaron Donald** will push for time at the nose, while **Tyrone Ezell** will be a factor at the other tackle spot. Also in the tackle mix will be freshman **Khaynin Mosley-Smith**, who enrolled in January following a prep season at Milford (N.Y.) Academy.

Competition at defensive end will revolve around three lettermen: senior **Justin Hargrove**, junior **Shayne Hale** and sophomore **T.J. Clemmings**. Senior **Brandon Lindsey** will transition to the "Panther," a hybrid position that blends the skills of a defensive end and linebacker. As an undersized end in the 4-3 scheme last year, Lindsey earned All-Big East accolades, collecting 51 tackles and leading the team with 17.5 TFLs and 10 sacks. Also vying for time at the Panther will be sophomore **Bryan Murphy**, who lettered as a true frosh last year, and sophomore **Carl Fleming**. A pair of walk-ons, sophomore letterman **Emanuel Rackard** and redshirt freshman **Mark Giubilato**, will provide depth.

PITT POSITIONAL OUTLOOK

LINEBACKERS

Senior **Greg Williams** brings experience and playmaking athleticism to the SPUR position. Williams collected 64 tackles last year and scored on a 32-yard fumble return, the fourth defensive touchdown of his career. He will be pushed by sophomore letterman **Kevin Adams** and redshirt freshman **Eric Williams**. Redshirt freshman **Todd Thomas**, who sat out last season with a knee injury, will get a look at SPUR or possibly in the secondary upon his return.

At Sam linebacker, senior **Tristan Roberts** and sophomore **Shane Gordon** will be the most experienced candidates for the starting nod. Roberts played in every game a year ago with eight starts, and had 40 tackles and 4.5 TFLs. Gordon lettered as a redshirt frosh, playing in all 13 games and making one start. Sophomore **Carl Fleming** will also get reps at Sam.

Senior **Max Gruder** boasts experience at all three line-backer spots but will focus on the Will position this spring. As Pitt's starting middle linebacker last year, Gruder finished second on the team with 84 stops. Another player with diverse experience, junior letterman **Joe Trebitz**, is also slated to compete at the Will.

SECONDARY

Five lettermen return at the cornerback spots. At boundary corner, senior **Antwuan Reed** started 12 games a year ago and had 40 tackles, six pass breakups and an interception. Reed will be pushed by senior letterman **Saheed Imoru** and redshirt freshman **Brandon Ifill**. Also in the mix at boundary corner will be a pair of walk-ons, junior **Jeremiah Davis** and redshirt freshman **Joseph Lopez**.

Competition at field corner will revolve around two players with experience. **Buddy Jackson** enters his senior season as a three-year letterman while sophomore **K'Waun Williams** earned significant time at corner as a true frosh.

At free safety, junior **Jarred Holley** returns after earning All-Big East last season. Holley had 54 tackles and tied for the team lead with five interceptions. Providing competitive depth will be a pair of walk-ons in senior **Todd Gilcrist** and redshirt freshman **Steve Valenza**.

The chief candidates at bandit will be sophomore **Jason Hendricks** and junior **Andrew Taglianetti**. Hendricks made five starts as a redshirt frosh and collected 42 tackles on the year. In addition to logging significant time in the secondary, Taglianetti has been a special teams ace during his career with five blocked kicks. Also vying for time at bandit will be junior walk-on **Marco Pecora**, who lettered the past two years on special teams, and redshirt frosh walk-on **Phil Peckich**.

THE SPECIALISTS

Pitt will need to replace Dan Hutchins, its starting placekicker and punter the past two years.

Ready to take over placements is junior **Kevin Harper**, who lettered the past two seasons handling kickoffs and serving as Pitt's long-range field goal specialist. Also competing at placekicker will be senior walk-ons **Garrett Tonio** and **Chris Yankoski**.

At punter, a trio of walk-ons will vie for the starting assignment: sophomore **Matt Yoklic**, junior **Aaron Hassett** and redshirt freshman **Drake Greer**.

Spring repetitions at long snapper will be split between sophomore **Kevin Barthelemy** and junior **Marco Pecora**.

Pitt boasts two veterans in the return game. Junior **Cameron Saddler** led the team in punt returns and ranked third in the Big East with a 10.5 average (25 returns for 263 yards) last year. Junior **Ray Graham** paced Pitt in kick returns, averaging 21.8 yards per attempt (23 for 501).

HEAD COACH

Widely regarded as one of the finest offensive coaches in the country, Todd Graham was named the head football coach at the University of Pittsburgh by Athletic Director Steve

Graham comes to Pitt after a highly successful head coaching tenure at Tulsa, where in four years he had three 10-win campaigns and three bowl victories. He compiled a 36-17 overall record with the Golden Hurricane, including a 10-3 mark last year that was highlighted by a 28-27 victory at Notre Dame and decisive 62-35 win over 24th-ranked Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl. Tulsa's win over Notre Dame was called the biggest upset of the year by ESPN's Kirk Herbstreit.

Prolific offenses have been Graham's hall-mark. Under his direction, Tulsa led the nation in total offense twice (2007 and 2008) and ranked fifth last year. While he has a well-deserved reputation for devising high-octane offensive game plans, the 46-year-old coach built his career on defense and has also distinguished himself as a defensive coordinator and position coach.

This will be Graham's third collegiate head coaching appointment. In addition to Tulsa, he served as the head coach at Rice for one season (2006), leading the Owls to their first bowl game in 45 years and earning Conference USA Coach of the Year honors. Graham's career head coaching record is 43-23 and includes four bowls in five seasons.

"We are thrilled that Todd Graham has agreed to become the head football coach at the University of Pittsburgh," said Pederson. "His innovative, creative and energized approach to football makes him an exciting leader for our program. He has a proven track record of success at all levels of football and his wealth of experience on both sides of the ball gives him a unique set of credentials.

"The outstanding job he has done at Tulsa – double-digit win totals in three of the past four seasons and an undefeated bowl record – has been noticed across the country. I know he is excited to meet his new team and the great people of Pittsburgh."

"My family and I are honored to join such a prestigious university and rich football tradition like the University of Pittsburgh," said Graham, who becomes the 35th head coach in Pitt football history. "Pittsburgh is a tremendous football city with great fans. We will work diligently every day to earn their respect and build a program that competes for and wins championships. I'm also excited to return to the Big East, a conference that plays tremendous football."

Graham's 2010 Tulsa team rolled up 505.6 yards per game to rank fifth nationally and averaged 41.4 points to rank sixth. The Golden Hurricane defense led the country in interceptions (24) and ranked third in turnovers gained (36).

Under Graham's watch, All-America all-purpose player Damaris Johnson was one of the most exciting performers in college football. The 5-foot-8 dynamo led the country in all-purpose yards for the second consecutive year (202.2 yards/game in 2010) and established himself as the NCAA's career leader in that category with 7,796.

"I don't think I can say enough good things about Todd Graham," said College Hall of Fame coach John Cooper, who formerly coached at Tulsa as well as Ohio State and Arizona State. "If I was named the head coach of some school tomorrow, I would send my entire coaching staff down to Tulsa to learn a few things. I really believe TU's football staff

is on the cutting edge of what is going on in college football these days."

In Graham's first two seasons as Tulsa's head coach, the Golden Hurricane made program history by posting consecutive 10-win seasons and winning a school-record 11 games in 2008. He went 21-7 his first two years, the best start by a Tulsa coach ever. Tulsa was one of just 11 schools on the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level to achieve back-to-back 10-win seasons in 2007 and 2008.

In 2007, Tulsa led the country in total offense, averaging 543.9 yards per game, and set 29 school records, 15 Conference USA marks and four NCAA records. The Golden Hurricane routed Bowling Green, 63-7, in the GMAC Bowl, the largest bowl margin of victory in NCAA history.

In 2008, Tulsa again led the country in total offense (569.9 avg.) while ranking second in scoring (47.1 points/game),

fifth in rushing (268.0 yards/game) and ninth in passing (301.8 yards/game). Graham's team finished with an 11-3 record, capped by a 45-13 victory over 22nd-ranked Ball State in the GMAC Bowl.

Tulsa's 661 points in 2008 established a school record and marked the second highest single-season total in the modern era of the NCAA (second only to Oklahoma's 2008 total of 716 points).

Before elevating to head coach at Tulsa, Graham served as its assistant head coach and defensive coordinator from 2003-05. The 2005 team finished with a 9-4 record, captured the Conference USA title and shut down a highflying Fresno State team, 31-24, in the Liberty Bowl. Graham's defense ranked among the nation's top 40 in five categories, including takeaways (third), interceptions (third), pass efficiency defense (11th), pass defense (17th) and total defense (40th).

Taking over as head coach at Rice in 2006, Graham led the Owls to a 7-6 record and the school's first bowl berth in 45 years. That historic success earned him Conference USA Coach of the Year honors. Rice began the year 0-4 before reeling off victories in seven of its next nine games, including six consecutive wins.





Graham broke into the collegiate coaching ranks as defensive coordinator at East Central University (1991-93) in Oklahoma, where his work helped transform his alma mater from a .500 program to NAIA national champions in his final year.

During the 2001 and 2002 seasons, Graham served at West Virginia under Rich Rodriguez and helped the Mountaineers achieve the biggest turnaround in college football over that period, improving from 3-8 to 9-4.

After coaching WVU's linebackers his first season, Graham was promoted to co-defensive coordinator, defensive scheme coordinator and safeties coach. The 2002 Mountaineers forced 34 turnovers, including 19 interceptions, and ranked fourth nationally in turnover margin (plus 19).

From 1995-2000, Graham distinguished himself in the ultracompetitive Texas high school ranks as both a head coach and athletic director. As head coach at Allen High School, he led a program that had no district wins the year prior to his arrival to five playoff berths in six seasons. His final year, Allen posted a 9-3 record and captured the 5A Division II bi-district title while defeating four teams ranked among the top 10 in the state of Texas.



A native of the Dallas-Fort Worth area, Graham was an all-state defensive back at North Mesquite High School. He went on to play at East Central University, where he was a two-time NAIA All-America defensive back and three-time all-conference performer.

Graham earned his bachelor's degree in education in 1987 from ECU before signing a free agent contract with the NFL's St. Louis Cardinals. He later earned his masters degree, also in education, from ECU.

He and his wife Penni have six children: Bo, Natalie, Hank, Haylee, Dakota and Michael Todd Jr.

Randolph's Pitt appointment continues his

successful association with Todd Graham. Randolph served under the Panthers' new head coach the past five seasons in similar capacities at Tulsa and Rice.

Randolph spent the past four years at Tulsa (2007-10), playing an instrumental role in the Golden Hurricane's emergence as a perennial bowl team. Tulsa won 36 games during that time, including three bowl victories. He helped mold a defense that led the country in interceptions in 2010 (24) and ranked third in turnovers forced (36).

In 2006, Randolph served under Graham as assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and line-backer coach at Rice. His efforts helped produce one of the most impressive revitalizations in recent college football history. The Owls earned their first bowl berth in 45 years after a 7-5 regular season that included victories in six of their final seven games.

Prior to Rice, Randolph was the defensive ends coach at Alabama (2003-05), where he helped the Crimson Tide boast one of the nation's toughest defenses. In 2005, Alabama led the country in scoring defense (10.7 points/game) while ranking second in total defense (255.1 yards/game), fifth in pass defense (160.8 yards/game) and ninth in rushing defense (94.3 yards/game).

His All-Southeastern Conference performers at Alabama included Antwan Odom, a seventh-year NFL veteran with the Cincinnati Bengals, and Mark Anderson, who completed his fifth professional season with the Houston Texans. Randolph also distinguished himself on the recruiting trail during his time in Tuscaloosa and was named one of the country's top 25 recruiters by Rivals.

He is not unfamiliar with Big East circles having coached the defensive line at West Virginia in 2002. His other collegiate coaching stops include Toledo, Illinois State, Valdosta State and his alma mater Tennessee-Martin.

An all-conference linebacker at Tennessee-Martin, Randolph went on to a decorated professional playing career in the Canadian Football League. He played eight seasons with Winnipeg (1988-95) and then served two years as a team captain and player-coach with the Montreal Alouettes (1996-97). Randolph helped Winnipeg to Grey Cup championships in 1988 and '90 before receiving induction into the Blue Bombers' Hall of Fame in 2002.

Randolph earned his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering technology from Tennessee-Martin in 1990. He and his wife Mia have two children: son Patrick and daughter Mya.

Magee comes to Pittsburgh after spending the past three years as associate head coach and offensive coordinator at Michigan. The 2010 Wolverines featured one of the nation's most dynamic offensive talents in quarterback Denard Robinson, who ranked second nationally in total offense (328.62 yards/game) and was named the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year.

Robinson finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting last year and became the first player in NCAA history to throw for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,500 in a single season. He finished with 2,570 passing yards and set an NCAA single-season record for rushing yards by a quarterback with 1,702.

As a unit, Michigan led the Big Ten and ranked eighth nationally in total offense with an average of 488.69 yards per game.

Prior to Michigan, Magee spent seven seasons as the running backs coach at West Virginia (2001-07), where he produced an All-Big East performer each year of his tenure. He added offensive coordinator duties his final three seasons and was named assistant head coach in 2007.

Magee's first-team All-Big East running backs included Steve Slaton, Quincy Wilson and Avon Cobourne, the Mountaineers' all-time leading rusher with 5,164 yards.

Slaton, now an NFL standout with the Houston Texans, was a 2006 first team All-American and finalist for the Doak Walker Award, annually presented to the country's top running back. His 1,744 rushing yards in '06 set a West Virginia record.

The Mountaineers won or shared four Big East titles during Magee's time in Morgantown and captured BCS bowl victories following the 2005 (Sugar Bowl) and 2007 (Fiesta Bowl) seasons.

Prior to West Virginia, Magee spent five seasons at South Florida (1996-2000) and was a member of USF's inaugural staff in '96. He

coached the Bulls' tight ends his first season before shifting his positional focus to running backs his final four years. Magee was USF's run game coordinator in 1999 and 2000.

Magee broke into the coaching ranks after playing professionally in the National Football League. He was a four-year starter at tight end for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1985-88) and finished his career with the Houston Oilers in 1989. Magee led the Bucs in receptions (45), receiving yards (564) and receiving touchdowns (5) during the 1986 season and was a Pro Bowl alternate in 1987.

Magee is one of the greatest players in Southern University history. He was a three-time All-America tight end, earning first-team honors in 1983 and 1984. Magee led the Jaguars in receptions each of his four seasons (1981-84) and was the Most Valuable Player of the 1985 Freedom Bowl. In 2000 he was inducted into the Southern University Hall of Fame.

Magee and his wife Rosie have two daughters, Jade and Jasmine, and one son, Bryson. Magee earned his bachelor's degree from USF in 1990.

wide receivers coach and director of recruiting.

Norvell continues his association with Graham after working on his Tulsa staff the past four years, including the 2010 season when he served as passing game coordinator, receivers coach and director of recruiting.

The Golden Hurricane had five 1,000-yard receivers during Norvell's tenure. His most accomplished pupil was All-America receiver Damaris Johnson, who led the country in all-purpose yards for two consecutive years

and set the all-time NCAA FBS record for that category with 7,796 career yards.

Johnson averaged 202.2 all-purpose yards per game in 2010. In Tulsa's 62-35 win over Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl, he averaged an incredible 21.73 yards per touch en route to 326 all-purpose yards.

In 2008, Norvell's receivers were a vital part of college football's most prolific offense. Tulsa averaged an astounding 569.9 yards per game that season to lead the country. The Golden Hurricane ranked second nationally in scoring (47.1 points/game) and ninth in passing yards (301.8 yards/game).

Tulsa also topped the country in total offense in 2007 (543.9 yards/game) and set 29 school records, 15 Conference USA marks and four NCAA records. The '07 Golden Hurricane became the first team in NCAA history to have a 5,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and three 1,000-yard receivers in a single season.

Prior to Tulsa, Norvell was an offensive graduate assistant at his alma mater, Central Arkansas. In addition to coaching receivers and H-backs, he was a significant contributor to UCA's special teams.

Norvell was accomplished on the field and in the classroom at Central Arkansas. A four-year starter at receiver, he finished his career as the school's all-time leader in receptions (213) and ranked third in receiving yards (2,611). Norvell earned All-Gulf South honors and was the conference's 2001 Freshman of the Year. He also was a two-time first-team Gulf South All-Academic honoree.

Patters on spent the past eight seasons at Tulsa,

where he made invaluable contributions to the Golden Hurricane's impressive rise. He was part of six bowl teams at Tulsa and coached 10 players who earned All-Conference USA.

In addition to coaching the linebackers, Patterson served as co-defensive coordinator his final five seasons at Tulsa. In 2010, he helped mold a defense that led the country in interceptions (24) and ranked third in turnovers gained (36).

Facing the nation's top passing offense in

Hawai'i last Christmas Eve in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl, Tulsa's defense forced five interceptions and six total turnovers en route to a victory over the No. 24 Rainbows. The win was the Golden Hurricane's 36th over a four-year span and marked the program's third consecutive bowl triumph.

Patterson tutored some of the most productive and accomplished defenders in Tulsa football history. His star pupils include first-team All-Conference USA performers Nick Bunting, Chris Chamberlain and Nelson Coleman. The three rank among the top 10 tacklers in school history, a list topped by Coleman who had an impressive 413 career stops.

Bunting finished his career as one of the most decorated linebackers ever at Tulsa. He was named the Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year in 2006 and the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) Newcomer of the Year in 2003. Chamberlain, who finished fifth in Tulsa history with 352 tackles, was drafted by St. Louis in 2008 and has spent the past three seasons with the Rams.

Patterson joined Tulsa after building an impressive resume as a high school coach in Oklahoma and Texas. As head coach at Ardmore (Okla.) High, he led his team to the 1999 District 5A-1 championship and was named district coach of the year. He also worked under Todd Graham at Allen High in Texas, building that program into a perennial power.

Patterson earned his bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation from East Central (Okla.) University in 1986. Dews spent the past three seasons at Michigan, where he coached the wide receiv-

ers. His 2010 receiving corps helped Michigan lead the Big Ten and rank eighth nationally in total offense with an average of 488.69 yards per game. The Wolverines' pass offense ranked second in the Big Ten, averaging 250.15 yards through the air.

Under Dews' guidance, Michigan receiver Roy Roundtree was an All-Big Ten selection by the media after he had 72 receptions for 935 yards and seven touchdowns.

Dews' Pitt appointment marks his return to the Big East. He coached the receivers at West Virginia in 2007, including All-Big East performer Darius Reynaud. Dews additionally served a graduate assistantship with the Mountaineers from 1999-2001, working with the offensive line and secondary.

TODD DODGE

QUARTERBACKS



A renowned teacher of quarterback play with an impressive list of star pupils, Todd Dodge enters his first season as quarterbacks coach at Pitt.

Dodge comes to Pittsburgh after a four-year tenure as head coach at the University of North Texas. Prior to UNT, he established himself as one of the country's most accomplished high school coaches, producing state championship teams and blue chip prospects at an impressive rate.

Hailed as a Texas "high school coaching legend" by *The Dallas Morning News*, Dodge led Southlake Carroll High to four Texas Class 5A state championships in his final five seasons and a 79-1 record during that span.

In seven total seasons at Southlake Carroll (2000-06), Dodge went 98-11 and closed his tenure by winning 48 consecutive games. The Dragons were recognized as national champions three times — twice by *USA Today* (2004 and 2006) and once by PrepNation.com (2005). Dodge also drew individual accolades on a national scale. He was named the National High School Coach of the Year by Schutt Sports in 2004 and *USA Today* in 2005.

Dodge shaped no fewer than six winners of the Texas 5A Player of the Year award. His quarterback protégées included former Missouri star Chase Daniel, now of the New Orleans Saints, and Alabama's Greg McElroy, who led the Crimson Tide to the 2009 national title.

Overall, Dodge coached 22 players who went on to earn athletic scholarships at the NCAA Division I level.

Dodge is a former starting quarterback for the Texas Longhorns. Playing under UT coach Fred Akers from 1982-85, he threw for 2,791 yards and 18 touchdowns during his career. His average of 32.6 yards per completion against Rice in 1985 (11 completions for 359 yards) remains a school record. Dodge threw a 96-yard touchdown pass in that game, which stands as the second-longest play (tied) in Texas history.

Following his 1987 graduation from UT, Dodge embarked on his coaching career, serving as an offensive coordinator on the high school level in Texas. After a two-year stint on the offensive staff at North Texas (1992-93), Dodge secured his first head coaching appointment at Cameron's C.H. Yoe High School in 1994. Many observers of Texas high school football readily credit Dodge for revolutionizing the way offensive football is played in the Lone Star state.

Dodge and his wife Elizabeth have two children, son Riley and daughter Molly. Riley was a two-time Texas 5A Player of the Year and now is a quarterback at McNeese State.

Tony Gibson enters his first season as cornerbacks coach and recruiting coordinator at Pitt.

While he is new to Pittsburgh, Gibson is very

familiar with Western Pennsylvania recruiting circles and the Big East Conference. He actively recruited the region while on the staffs at Michigan (2008-10) and Big East member West Virginia (2001-07) over the past decade.

Gibson served as the assistant head coach and defensive backs coach at Michigan the past three years. He added special teams coordinator to his duties in 2010. During his time in Ann Arbor he oversaw the development of first team All-Big Ten cornerback Donovan Warren.

As defensive backs coach at West Virginia, Gibson produced eight All-Big East performers and had six of his players selected in the NFL Draft. His secondary standouts at WVU included first team All-American Adam Jones, who played with the Cincinnati Bengals this past season.

The Mountaineers won or shared four Big East titles during Gibson's time in Morgantown, capturing BCS bowl victories following the 2005 (Sugar Bowl) and 2007 (Fiesta Bowl) seasons. In addition to coaching defensive backs, he also coordinated West Virginia's recruiting efforts in 2007.

Gibson himself played defensive back at Glenville State, where under coach Rich Rodriguez he helped the team claim two West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC) championships. He would go on to serve on Rodriguez's staffs at Glenville, WVU and Michigan.

After earning his bachelor's degree from Glenville State in 1994, Gibson was the head coach and interim athletic director at Gilmer County (W.Va.) High School. He then joined Rodriguez's staff at Glenville State as the defensive backs coach and also worked with the kickoff teams for the 1996 season.

In 1997 and '98, Gibson worked at Cumberland (Tenn.) University, coordinating the program's special teams and recruitment in addition to mentoring the team's defensive backs. OFFENSIVE LINE



A veteran of more than 20 collegiate seasons coaching offensive lines, Spencer Leftwich begins his first year at Pitt.

Leftwich comes to Pittsburgh after

spending the 2010 season on Todd Graham's staff at Tulsa, where his offensive line helped the Golden Hurricane rank fifth nationally in total offense (505.62 yards/game).

The offensive front played a vital role in Tulsa's 10-3 campaign, capped by a 62-35 win over 24th-ranked Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl. The Golden Hurricane had a 3,600-yard passer and averaged more than 216 rushing yards per game.

The 2010 season marked Leftwich's second appointment at Tulsa as he previously coached its offensive line from 2003-06. During his initial stint, the Golden Hurricane advanced to three bowl games and claimed the 2005 Conference USA championship. In total, he produced eight all-conference performers in his five seasons at Tulsa.

From 2007-09 Leftwich worked at the University of North Texas, where he dramatically upgraded the performance of the Mean Green's offensive line.

The progress was most evident in UNT's protection of the passer. After ranking 110th nationally in sacks allowed in his first season, the Mean Green elevated to 10th nationally his final year, allowing just a single sack per game. That equated to one sack every 14 pass attempts in 2007 to a sack every 34 pass attempts in 2009.

That 2009 unit was also pivotal in the running game, opening holes for a rushing attack that produced 2,223 yards (185.3 yards/game) to

rank 28th nationally. North Texas set a school record with 4,904 yards in total offense in '09.

Before joining Tulsa in 2003, Leftwich had his first coaching stint at North Texas from 1994-2002. He had at least one UNT lineman earn all-conference honors in eight of his nine years.

Leftwich's other coaching stops include offensive line posts at New Mexico State (1992-93) and Stephen F. Austin (1989-91), his alma mater. SFA advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA championship game in 1989 and finished with a 12-2-1 record.

A 1988 graduate of Stephen F. Austin with a bachelor's degree in education, Leftwich was a three-year starter at offensive guard for the Lumberjacks and twice earned all-conference. He also owns a master's degree in physical education from East Texas State (1989).

SAFETIES, SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR



Entering his 21st year in the collegiate c o a c h i n g ranks, Randall McCray was named Pitt's safeties coach and special teams coordinator this past February.

McCray spent the 2010 sea-

son at Middle Tennessee State, where he was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. Prior to MTSU, he spent four years at Wisconsin (2006-09) and helped the Badgers to bowl berths each season.

In his lone season at Middle Tennessee State, McCray helped the Blue Raiders earn a berth in the GoDaddy.com Bowl. His defense ranked 10th nationally in tackles for loss (7.38 TFLs/game) and 17th in quarterback sacks (2.62 sacks/game) while featuring the Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year in end Jamari Lattimore. Among Sun Belt teams, MTSU yielded the lowest yards per rush and ranked second in pass efficiency defense.

At Wisconsin, McCray coached the defensive line (2006-07), outside linebackers (2008) and safeties (2009). He was the Badgers' recruiting coordinator his final two seasons in Madison.

Wisconsin went 38-14 during McCray's tenure, advancing to four consecutive bowl games. The 2006 Badgers featured one of the country's elite defenses en route to a 12-1 record and No. 5 ranking in the final *USA Today* coaches poll. Wisconsin limited opponents to just 12.1 points (second best nationally) and 253.1 yards (fifth best) per game that year. In 2009 the Badgers held every Big Ten opponent to less than 100 yards rushing, an unprecedented achievement in Wisconsin history.

Five of McCray's Wisconsin players were on NFL rosters this past season, including All-Big Ten defensive lineman Matt Shaughnessy, a member of the Oakland Raiders and 2009 Pro Football Writers' All-Rookie selection. Additionally, linebacker DeAndre Levy (Detroit Lions), defensive tackle Nick Hayden (Carolina Panthers), linebacker Jonathan Casillas (New Orleans Saints) and safety Chris Maragos (San Francisco 49ers) were in the professional ranks.

Prior to Wisconsin, McCray coached the defensive line and linebackers at Toledo from 2003-05. In his final season, McCray oversaw a defensive front that helped the Rockets to a 9-3 record, the Mid-American Conference West Division title and a 45-13 victory over UTEP in the GMAC Bowl. Toledo ranked 21st nationally in total defense that season (316.8 yards/game) and topped the MAC in four different defensive categories. McCray coached the linebackers at Toledo his initial two years, including the 2004 season when the Rockets captured the MAC championship with a 9-3 record.

McCray served as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Illinois State from 2000-02. He was promoted to assistant head coach his final season with the Redbirds. McCray oversaw the development of All-America linebacker Boomer Grigsby, who was a finalist for the 2002 Buck Buchanan Award, annually presented to the top defensive player on the Football Championship Subdivision level. Grigsby went on to NFL stints with the Kansas City Chiefs and Miami Dolphins.

McCray has also coached two other All-America performers at linebacker, Galen Scott at Illinois State in 2000 and Ronnie Merritt at Murray State in 1998.

McCray handled inside linebackers at Murray State (1997-99) and became the Racers' defensive coordinator in 1999. His additional coaching appointments include defensive ends at Bethune-Cookman (1996), quality control at Clemson (1995), defensive line at Tennessee-Chattanooga (1993-94) and graduate assistant at South Carolina (1991-92).

A two-year letterman as an outside linebacker and running back at Appalachian State, McCray was a member of the Mountaineers' 1987 Southern Conference championship team, as well as two teams that advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

McCray earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Appalachian State in 1991 and a master's degree in higher education from South Carolina. A native of Monroe, N.C., McCray and his wife Michelle have a son, Matt, and a daughter, Mallory.



Expect passion and intensity from Pitt's Graham

A football program almost always takes on the personality of its coach. If that is the case at Pitt under new coach Todd Graham, fans can expect the Panthers to play with passion and intensity, to be grinders unafraid of dirty work, doing whatever it takes to get the job done. • They will be loyal and caring and support each other through thick and thin because that's the way Graham, who spent the past four seasons as Tulsa's coach, has made a career and a life for himself, according to those who know him. • Graham talked a lot about winning football games and championships at his introductory news conference last week, but he also talked about molding his players into men of integrity, high character and compassion. • A lot of it sounded like coachspeak, but the people around him said there is nothing fake about Graham.

"There is not a thing he will ask of our players that he doesn't believe and live himself," said Pitt's new senior associate head coach, Paul Randolph, who has coached under Graham for the past five seasons at Tulsa and Rice. "He is going to ask them to be young men of character, men of integrity and have great compassion and that's because that is him all rolled up in one. He is extremely passionate about those things that he loves and when you ask, 'What is that he loves?' it is simple: Faith in God is first, then family and football."

Grinding forward

A native of Mesquite, Texas, which is in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, Graham played small college football at East Central University in Oklahoma, graduating in 1987. He then worked his way through the high school ranks. He got his first college job at East Central in 1991 and worked as a defensive coordinator for three years, including 1993 when the team won the NAIA national championship.

Graham jumped to Division I football in 2001 when he was hired by Rich Rodriguez to be linebackers coach at West Virginia. By his second year, he was the co-defensive coordinator.

He parlayed that into three seasons as Tulsa's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. He got his first head coaching job at Rice. In one season, he got the Owls to a winning record (7-6) and a bowl game.

Tulsa then picked Graham to replace Steve Kragthorpe, who had left for Louisville. In four seasons, Graham led the Golden Hurricane to three Conference USA-West Division championships and three 10-win seasons.

"He's a grinder," said Keith Patterson, who was Graham's college roommate and has coached under him for six of the past seven seasons.

Patterson is one of three coaches who followed Graham from Tulsa to Pitt, and he will serve as a co-defensive coordinator.

"We always joked that coming up, we took a lot of jobs nobody else really wanted -- he worked hard to make sure it was successful. People think he is a job jumper and that's just not fair. He worked hard to get to a point where a big-time school like Pitt would even be interested in hiring him."

Patterson said he knew Graham was destined for great things when the two were sophomores at East Central, and Graham, who was a cornerback at the time, told him to accompany him to a talk with the team's defensive coordinator.

That made Patterson uncomfortable, but soon the two were sitting in front of the defensive coordinator in his office.

"Todd then told coach, 'We need to move this guy here, that guy there, this guy's a linebacker and you need to move me back to safety," Patterson said. "I thought to myself 'We're never going to see the field again' but, wouldn't you know it, when spring football started, that's exactly the way we were lined up -- and he finished his career as a safety."

"Todd just believed there was a better way to do things and he was able to get his point across without making anyone uncomfortable. There was just something different about him."

Man with a plan

Phil Bennett, who most recently was Pitt's interim coach and served three seasons as the Panthers defensive coordinator, has known Graham, who is 46, for more than 20 years and said two things will jump out at Pitt fans -- Graham's toughness and intensity -- both products of where he has been.

"First of all, he is an outstanding coach," Bennett said. "But he is tough, and the reason he is tough and always has been is because him and his older brothers were always extremely rough and tumble with him and never made it easy on him.

"But nothing has been easy for him, he has always worked his way and worked for everything he's got in this profession. Nothing has ever been handed to him but he doesn't ask for it -- he'll fight for it and that's what makes him a great coach."

Bennett said Pitt athletic director Steve Pederson, who had been under fire throughout the search process, asked his opinion of Graham several times and every time he told him that Graham was the man for the job.

"I told Steve that he needed to hire this guy and if he did it, it would take a lot of pressure off him and the rest of them," Bennett said. "It won't take but a few months before Pitt fans start to realize they got a great coach and, more importantly, they have a guy who cares about people, cares about life and will do things the right way."

Pederson said Graham's energy, his enthusiasm and his passion -- not to mention his organization -- throughout the process made it tough to consider other candidates because he had made such an impression.

"Todd energizes the room and everyone he meets," Pederson said. "He has a plan, he is very organized, you can see he is very articulate, but the thing that stood out to all of us was his energy, his enthusiasm and the fact that he made it clear, he wanted to be a part of Pitt.

"And when we talked to people about him, the words we kept hearing were genuine, loyal and passionate. That's who he is."

Pederson passed on hiring Graham last month, when he hired Michael Haywood to replace Dave Wannstedt, but Graham told people close to him that talks broke down the first time because of money.

Graham's total compensation package at Pitt is believed to be about \$2 million, about \$800,000 more than Haywood's package, sources said, so money clearly played a part at first in the decision to choose Haywood over Graham.

Caring about others

Compassion is another word that associates often use to describe Graham and all seemed to have a story which backed that up.

Tulsa football radio color analyst Rick Couri remembers how Graham helped his daughter, Lindsey, who suffers from a brain tumor.

Graham offered to pay for transportation costs to and from the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota for Lindsey and the Couri family. Those costs were paid by a charitable foundation, Couri said, but Graham insisted on giving the family "a very large amount of cash" so Lindsey could pamper herself at the Mall of America in Minnesota.

"We lost an excellent football coach, but coaches can be replaced," Couri said. "It is much, much harder to replace what we lost when we lost such a great person."

Patterson said he could fill up a notebook with stories about how Graham has helped people in need, but Graham, the father of six, would "be embarrassed because he just thinks that's the way people are supposed to treat each other. He'd give you the shirt off his back if you were cold and needed one."

A shot of energy

Haywood was Pitt's coach for two weeks. He was fired New Year's Day after being charged with domestic abuse. Graham was hired last week and started the process of picking up the pieces.

After his first meeting with his new team, some of the players talked about how energized he had made them feel. Many talked about how excited they were for the future.

"When coach Haywood came in, he never smiled, he told us to sit up in our chairs and laid down his law," said Pitt receiver Cam Saddler. "After what we had been through in losing a coach we all loved and everything else, that really turned a lot of us off. But coach Graham came in with high energy, he had a smile, he made it clear everyone of us were important to the program and to him and made it clear he really wanted to be at Pitt.

"When we walked out of that room, we were all excited because you could tell this guy has a plan and he has a lot of passion for what he does. After that one meeting, I know this going to work out just fine. You just wait and see."

New Pitt football coach Graham driven to succeed

When they were together — just the two of them — Carol Graham liked to whisper soft words of encouragement in her youngest son's ear.

She is a mother, after all, and Todd, the smallest of the four Graham brothers of Mesquite, Texas, was growing up without a father.

"She was always worrying about me," said Todd Graham, Pitt's new football coach. "She used to say to me, 'You are the smart one. You can do anything you want.'

Sitting in a room last week in the Panthers' South Side training facility, having recently been announced as the team's new coach, Graham prepared to embark on a strategy that would lift the once-proud program out of the turmoil created by the forced resignation of Dave Wannstedt and the arrest — and dismissal — of coach Mike Haywood.

But first, Graham related a story of a childhood that set the foundation he brings from Tulsa, Okla., to Pittsburgh, one steered by three guiding factors: his mother, an unwavering devotion to his faith and football.

Graham grew up in a close family — three older brothers, a younger sister and a single mother who left school after eighth grade and later worked three jobs to feed five hungry mouths at home.

Without a driver's license for much of the time, Carol Graham unfailingly found her way around the working-class Dallas suburb of Mesquite where she worked at the AT&T factory, a greeting card store at the mall and at the dry cleaners sewing monograms on uniforms.

"She took care of us," Todd said. "She was awesome."

Despite her busy schedule, Carol found time to attend many of Todd's games.

"I would always sit in this one section," she said, "and he would always look up from the field to see if I was there."

Carol said Todd was 13 when his father left, but she made it a point to teach her children proper values.

"I was blessed. That is not a sob story," Todd said. "I had a super mom. My

mom was incredible. She always inspired me academically. She always was the person who would tell me you can do anything that you set your mind to.

"Her faith in God that she had was instilled in me and all my brothers and my sister. She worked two and three jobs and never complained. Her life was about her family. It was about integrity and about character.

"You did things the right way. If you didn't, she'd put that metal dust mop on you."

A 'WILD' KID

Graham did not live a passive life as a child.

"He was a little wild, like a lot of kids are," said Bill Taylor, who was defensive coordinator at North Mesquite High School where Todd developed into an all-state safety. "His attitude was a little bad, but by the time he got to high school he changed."

Actually, the change occurred in seventh grade when Graham met Buddy Copeland, the former football coach at McDonald Middle School.

"He could chew you out and hug your neck all in the same sentence," Graham said. "He was old-school."

Graham said he is exaggerating — a little — when he says Copeland "would get handcuffed and shackled today if he coached."

"He was a grab-you-by-the face-mask, kick-your-tail-in type of guy, but you knew he loved you," Graham said. "Buddy Copeland was God and country and traditional values."

Copeland gave the impression he didn't care about Graham's home problems. But his tactic had a point.

"I remember when I came to school I was kind of struggling," Graham said. "I was withdrawn. I was really sad. My mom worked all the time. He would say, 'So what, you don't have a daddy! You big baby.'

"I thought this guy is the most insensitive guy I have ever met in my life, but his whole deal was to toughen you up. Buddy taught me about toughness, and he taught me about commitment. It was really a tough time for me, and this guy brought me out of it."

Carol Graham said it was obvious to those in her family that her youngest son was special.

"Even his brothers knew he had a talent," she said. "We always felt that way, that he would be able to excel. He was like the teachers' favorite. We all wondered, 'How does he do this?' He just had a way with people."

Todd Graham's life took its most crucial turn when — at Copeland's insistence — he joined the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

There, he said, he was "saved and became a Christian."

In the seventh grade.

Copeland said Graham stood out on his seventh-grade team because "every time I spoke his eyes never left me."

Graham said he wanted to be a coach from the moment he met Copeland.

"I wanted to make a difference," Graham said. "If I could have one kid look at me the way I looked at Buddy Copeland, that's what I wanted to do."

"Football is his life," said Copeland, who coached for 33 years. "I have never seen anyone who loved it as much as he did."

Asked about his time with Graham, Copeland said, "I didn't try to show favoritism, but this is one kid I broke down. I get emotional talking about him."

When he was the head coach at Rice and Tulsa, Graham flew Copeland to some games.

"I'll put him in my suite at the hotel. He comes down to the sideline and never says a word," Graham said. "But before he gets ready to leave, he'll punch me in my arm. And he'll get a little tear in his eye."

AN ALL-AMERICAN

At 5 feet 10 inches, 170 pounds, Graham had few looks from Division I universities. That's how he ended up in Ada, Okla., at East Central University — an NAIA school.

He became a two-time All-American safety and the first member of his family to graduate college, earning bachelor's and master's degrees in education.

One day East Central was playing Texas A&I when running back Johnny Bailey, who played six seasons in the NFL and was a three-time Harlan Hill winner as the best player in Division II, escaped the line of scrimmage and appeared certain to score.

"I looked up," said former East Central coach Pat O'Neal, "and I saw Bailey going down the field, and I said, 'That's over with.' But here comes this streak up behind him."

Graham caught Bailey and saved a touchdown.

Graham could run like few others, but that did not define his football career.

"He would light you up," said Gerald "Doc" Williamson, one of Graham's closest friends and the former basketball coach at East Central. "He wasn't allergic to contact."

Asked why Graham never joined the basketball team, Williamson laughed.

"I don't think you have enough fouls to keep Todd happy," he said. "In basketball, you have to sit down with five."

In Ada, people still talk about the day Graham collided with the Southeastern Oklahoma State quarterback. No one remembers the quarterback's name, but everyone recalls the hit.

"I wasn't there, but I heard about it," said Taylor, Graham's defensive coordinator in high school.

"Not only did I see it and hear it, I felt it," O'Neal said.

"The quarterback had been talking some noise," Graham said. "He scrambled around and he tried to lower his head, and I knocked him out. It was a pretty good hit. I still remember that hit. There is nothing like that feeling.

"That's what I miss about the game. I don't miss scoring touchdowns. I miss the physicalness."

FAMILY AND FOOTBALL

Graham was too small to make it in the NFL, but he tried anyway, hurting his back in his first camp with the St. Louis Cardinals.

He became a high school coach and world history teacher before being named East Central's defensive coordinator in 1991. Two years later East Central won the NAIA championship with a 49-35 victory over Glenville (W.Va.) State, coached by Rich Rodriguez. Rodriguez later hired Graham as linebackers coach at West Virginia, where he coached during the 2001 and '02 seasons.

Graham served as head coach at Allen High School about 30 minutes north of Mesquite, from 1995-2000. There he met his future wife, Penni, who was the school district's assistant superintendent in charge of curriculum. They have formed what Graham calls "a blended family," with sons Bo and Hank and daughter Haylee from Graham's previous marriage, daughter Natalie and son Dakota from Penni's first marriage, and the couple's son Michael Todd Jr.

"Yours, mine and ours," Graham said.

Bo was born when Graham played at East Central, and he would accompany his dad to practice, O'Neal said. Bo later coached with his dad at Tulsa and is considering becoming a graduate assistant at Pitt.

Penni is as much a part of her husband's teams as any coach, continually

popping up at practices and news conferences.

"She is one the most passionate people toward football that I know," Graham said. "She thinks this is her job, and I would agree with her."

Although he comes from a different part of Texas, Graham has been told he sounds a lot like former President George W. Bush, and he uses it to his advantage.

His powers of persuasion are such that, even though he spent just one season as the head coach at Rice, it was long enough to coax \$7 million from boosters for renovations to Rice Stadium.

"I can't wait to get into (recruits') living rooms, get on the edge of my seat and tell them about the University of Pittsburgh," Graham said.

The regional recruiting battles are about to get interesting, if they haven't been already, Copeland said.

"The recruiting wars between Pitt and Penn State, I promise you, are fixing to intensify," he said. "He is a relentless recruiter. He is the most demanding, determined person I have ever seen."

Former Pitt defensive coordinator Phil Bennett, who tried to hire Graham when Bennett was coach at Southern Methodist, said Graham will find a way to win at Pitt.

"Sometimes they aren't great players, but he always finds a way to get them to play at a high level," Bennett said. "As sick as I am about the situation with Dave (Wannstedt), I told Todd it is a great job with great kids."

When Graham left for Pitt last week, Tulsa athletic director Bubba Cunningham expressed no resentment, only gratitude for how he left the program.

"We're a far better place," Cunningham said, "than we were four years ago when he arrived."

Pitt coach establishes strict guidelines

Pitt football coach Todd Graham said Tuesday he plans to run a program that will emphasize character, integrity and discipline and include zero tolerance for wayward behavior.

"We are going to tell them, 'We are going to work you harder than you have ever been worked in your life, and we are going to have unrealistic expectations of your attitude and your effort,' " Graham said.

" 'I'm sorry' is not going to work. We are not going to dance around it. We are going to have 100 percent accountability."

The new Pitt coach met for more than an hour yesterday with several media members, speaking passionately about goals for his players and how he plans to avoid the problems that doomed recent Pitt teams.

Five players were disciplined last year for off-the-field behavior, with three suspended by former coach Dave Wannstedt. In the end, Pitt missed a BCS bowl bid for the sixth consecutive season -- a situation that could have been reversed the past three years by one more victory.

Graham said that issue has surfaced during meetings with players in the five weeks since he was hired Jan. 11.

"Tell me. What was it? Why do you lose close games?" Graham said, relaying their conversation. "We talked a lot about that and one of the things (said) was, 'You have to get 11 guys that are totally committed to the team.'

"I guarantee you guys that don't meet the standard for the Pitt way, they will not cross that white line. I don't care how good they are. I don't care if it's (starting running back) Ray Graham. I don't care if it's (starting quarterback) Tino Sunseri."

Graham said "the Pitt way is not negotiable."

"We want to win in the classroom. We want to win off the field. We want to win in the community. If any of those areas are sub-standard, I believe it affects your play on the field."

Graham said winning the national championship is one of five goals he set for his players, but at the top of the list is to "develop championship fathers and

husbands and citizens."

Graham said he will expect players to look him in the eye during meetings, come prepared to take notes, sit without slouching, wear hats properly, tuck in their shirts and take off their earrings and bandanas inside the practice facility.

Graham said he wore an earring in college, but his ban represents "a physical symbol that this isn't about you, it's about team."

He has met no resistance to the ban, but if a top recruit questioned him, "I guess he is going to go somewhere else. If your earring is that important to you, then you probably won't fit."

Graham, raised by a single mother in Mesquite, Texas, said he takes his responsibility as a coach seriously.

"For the first time in the history of our country, there are more kids born in nontraditional families than in traditional families. Men aren't being men," he said.

"Guess why I love being a coach? It's the same as being a father. I feel like I have a great responsibility to be that kind of person in their life."

Q&A with Pitt coach Todd Graham, Part I

New Pittsburgh coach Todd Graham got Panthers fans excited by his energy and enthusiasm when he was formally introduced on Tuesday. Even over the phone, Graham sounds like a guy who can't wait to tee the ball up and play the 2011 opener. I had a chance to catch up with the former Tulsa coach for some of his thoughts on the new job. Here is Part I of my interview. Part II will run on Thursday.

You've been in this area as an assistant at West Virginia. How much did you know about Pittsburgh from that stint and just growing up as a football fan?

Todd Graham: Quite a bit. I've always been a big fan of college football, and there was Tony Dorsett and that group back in '76. Dan Marino, Mike Ditka -- I'm a big-time Ditka fan, now, I love Mike Ditka. Naturally, I followed Pitt because of the great tradition, you know, nine national championships, and when I went to West Virginia we spent an awful lot of time looking at Pitt. That was the No. 1 team we were recruiting against. I spent a lot of time recruiting in the area and know it very well.

I've had the opportunity to speak to a lot of clinics in the area and get to know the high school coaches. I spent 10 years as a high school coach, so those guys mean a lot to me. That's thing I think that I have; I'm one of them. I've been there. I went into this business to make a difference in kids' lives, and there's a trust factor there that I think really will help us. Guys like Tony Gibson on our staff, who grew up an hour from here, and Calvin Magee are going to work very, very hard in owning and winning western Pennsylvania and this state first, and naturally we'll recruit nationwide, too.

There obviously was some turmoil at Pitt the last few weeks. Did that cause much hesitation for you about taking this job?

TG: No, it really didn't. I'm not one of those guys who really frowns upon a lot of that stuff. I think that through conflict and adversity, your true character is exposed. And it brings people together. That's what I talked to the fans and the alumni and the lettermen about -- this university is bigger than one person, one conflict, one problem. I'm asking them just to pull together, and when you go through conflict it makes you stronger. You find out what you're made of.

I asked the Pitt family to come together, to move forward for this team and these players and for this university. That's what college football is all about. We're on the same team. I'm going to work very, very hard to earn their respect and their trust with the product we put on the field, in the classroom and in the community. So that to me wasn't a negative at all. That's part of growing and getting better.

You met with the players Tuesday, and they've been through a lot in the last month. What was your message to them?

TG: My message for them was, I wanted them to hear in my voice the passion, the excitement, the

enthusiasm and the respect I have for this game and this university, and the respect I have for them. The first thing I talked about was, I wanted to give honor to coach Wannstedt and coach Bennett and that coaching staff and the seniors. They worked their tail ends off and I want to honor and respect that. It's important to me. I played the game, I was a two-time All-American in college and every guy who straps that Pitt helmet on is important to me, and we're going to honor the past.

One of the reasons the job was attractive to me is because I've sat in a room and studied the Dave Wannstedt stuff. Phil Bennett and I have had a relationship for 20 years; I learned football from Phil as a young coach. I know the guys who coached here did a great job with fundamentals, and the program's in great shape. You bring that enthusiasm, that excitement, that no-huddle, fast-tempo, high-energy, exciting brand we have to that, and I think it's a great fit. Blend that together with Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania: blue-collar, hard-edged, tough football.

It's all about being in the right place at the right time, and I feel very fortunate to be here.

You've been part of some amazing turnarounds at other places. Is it different here, where the program doesn't seem that far away?

TG: Yeah. I'm getting better jobs. [Laughs]. This is the best job I've ever had. I think it's in great shape. I was part of the biggest turnaround in the country at West Virginia in '02, then in '03 at Tulsa and '06 at Rice we went to a bowl game for the first time since Harry Truman was president.

I've been very fortunate to be around some great people and some great programs. My whole deal is about passion, work ethic and being a great teacher. My background is as a high school coach, so teaching is important to me and great fundamentals. I told the kids that I want you to know who I am. I'm going to work hard to earn your trust. And as soon as you can give me your heart, we can go places you've never been. I know they've been coached hard and well on fundamentals and that fits in with how we do things.

Your background in college is on defense, yet you've become known as an offensive guru. How did that come about?

TG: When I got into head coaching, I talked to a lot of guys who were Division I head coaches and asked what is most important thing? And they said, if you're a defensive guy, you'd better know what you want to do on offense and in the kicking game. So what I did when I took the Rice job is, they had been running the wishbone with Ken Hatfield, and we went in there and put in the no-huddle and runand-gun offense, and we had one of the biggest turnarounds in college football.

We did the same thing at Tulsa. They had been running the pro-style offense, and we had a 5,000 -yard passer, three 1,000-yard receivers, a 1,000-yard rusher that season and the No. 1 offense in the country. What I've done wherever I've worked, especially early in my process, I spend a lot of time in the offensive room and we do everything that I hate to defend. Our offense is designed to attack what the defense is being taught. I've been on both sides of the football, and it's helped me be able to have a perspective. I don't call offensive plays, I don't call defensive plays but I'm involved in everything that we do.

I dictate the vision, the philosophy, the energy, the attitude of the program every day, and then I hire quality people who fit the ideals of what our program is about. Naturally, I let them be creative and innovative. At most places, you just have the offensive staff and a defensive staff and they stay separate.

What I've done is, I've spent time in that offensive room and we've designed the package around what the defensive coaches are teaching fundamentally.

And the no-huddle, when you first come in, it takes several years to get in shape to run it. We're not going to go from A to Z. I don't want to have a rebuilding year. We're going to have a no-huddle team, and it does affect your defense a little bit. But the bottom line is, to win championships you've got to play championship defense. We beat Notre Dame this year, and everybody was all excited about beating Notre Dame at Tulsa. How did we beat them? By playing great defensively. Explosive plays and exciting offense sells tickets and wins some games. To win some championships, you've got to play defense, and we'll work hard on building a championship defense here.

Q&A with Pitt coach Todd Graham, Part II

Here is the second part of my interview with new Pittsburgh coach Todd Graham. You can read Part I here.

You went out of your way at your news conference to say your offense isn't a spread ...

Todd Graham: It's not a spread. You look at what we developed at Tulsa and at Rice when I was there, and on 68 percent of the snaps we had two backs in the backfield. We used tight ends and fullbacks. Our tight end at Tulsa is second in the history of the program in touchdown catches. So when you say spread, I think of Texas Tech -- four-wide, throw it first, run it second. That is not who we are. We are a runfirst, play-action pass football team. We throw for almost 4,000 yards every year and we're in the top 15 of rushing the football -- this year we're fifth in the country. Our deal is still about running the football, and then about hitting explosive plays throwing the ball vertically.

When you look at who played in the BCS title game and Dana Holgorsen being hired at West Virginia and other prolific offenses, do you think you have to have this type of offense to compete at the highest level now?

TG: I don't know. I think things evolve around. ... But I do think college football evolves and changes, just like I think the stats are skewed. You'll see with our system coming in here and with Dana going to West Virginia, you'll see a lot more yards in this league because stats are kind of skewed from conference to conference, depending on how prolific the offenses are.

But I do think there's a trend, and naturally we try to be unique and stay on the cutting edge and innovative about what we're doing. The key is to be a learner. That's my deal -- I come to work every day and try to learn. I try to learn the talents of my players and adapt to them and try to keep constantly adapting. Nobody has an original thought; everybody gets their stuff from everybody else. But I do think it will be interesting to see how it impacts this league.

And defensively, you're a 3-4 base with multiple looks, right?

TG: We're an attacking style defense. We're a 3-4, but you'll see us with four down linemen sometimes when there are multiple tight-end sets. So we're very multiple. Our No. 1 thing is to create turnovers. I think if you look, we're first or second in the country in getting takeaways and right up there in turnover ratio. The key to winning football games 50 years ago is the same as it is now. Take care of the football and turnover ratio is the No. 1 indicator, and then explosive plays.

We will attack and impact the quarterback. This is not going to be a team sitting there rushing three guys. We'll impact the quarterback and, naturally, redirect and reroute receivers and try to disrupt and dictate to the offense instead of them dictating to us. That's a challenge when you have the spread teams and all the things they do. But I think the key nowadays on defense is getting turnovers and impacting

the quarterback.

The current Pitt recruiting class fell apart with the coaching changes. How much can you hope to accomplish in the three weeks before signing day?

TG: I think we'll put together a great class. We have coaches who have great pre-existing relationships with kids, especially in this area. Coach [Tony] Gibson recruits this area. And as we finish this staff out, we'll do that very quickly and get guys in here to get in those homes. And we have a very exciting brand of football, a tremendous institution and great football tradition. I don't think we'll have any problem being able to put together a great class. I need to go to work on it, though.

Will you reach out to the players who have decommitted?

TG: Oh, of course I will. If they're reading this thing, let 'em know that we'll definitely be coming to holler at 'em.

You have a lot of ties in Texas. Given that, and TCU's forthcoming entry into the league, do you think that's an area you can recruit for Pitt?

TG: No question about it. Can we go down there and get two or three guys? I think of course we can. With our style of play and our offense, I think it's attractive. I think kids want to play an exciting brand of football, and when you look at our no-huddle approach, we're going to be able to go and recruit nationwide. We've got strong relationships in that area and there are great skill players there, as well as Louisiana, southeast Florida, Alabama, the Carolinas, Virginia. We'll nationwide recruit, and I think we can attract guys from all over because of the reputation of this program.

I would imagine skill players in particular are easier for you to recruit to this system.

TG: When I sit on the edge of a seat in a kid's home and start talking about our offense, all the receivers and running backs and quarterbacks want to listen. Because statistically, we have been one of the most prolific offenses in the country the last four or five years. We had a guy who was 5-foot-6-and-1/2 come out of this system and put up more yards all purpose than anybody in the history of college football. Brennon Marion set the NCAA record for most yards per catch. So there's no question kids get excited about this system.

Last question: You and some of your staff spent time at West Virginia trying to beat Pitt. Will it be weird at all being on the other side of that rivalry now?

TG: No, not at all. I'm excited. That's what you dream of doing, to get an opportunity to coach in a place and lead a team in as rich of a tradition as the Backyard Brawl. That's what I'm looking forward to. There's nothing bigger than playing West Virginia.

Graham peforms scramble drill with recruiting class

For everyone around the Pitt football program - coaches, administrators, fans, and media - the 2010-11 offseason was unconventional, to say the least. But while the media and fans watched in bewilderment as the past two months unfolded, Todd Graham and his staff had to work through the mire to build a recruiting class.

Amidst the issues surrounding the program, Graham faced a rather difficult task:

Accomplish two years' worth of recruiting in three weeks and build a class.

"It's been an incredible three weeks or two-and-a-half weeks or whatever it's been," Graham said at his Signing Day press conference on Wednesday. "We haven't spent much time counting, but it's been an exciting time."

On Wednesday, Pitt signed 20 recruits to Letters of Intent, including two players who have already enrolled. The class includes a surplus of skill players - just three linemen - and recruits hailing from Texas, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia, and Florida, as well as more traditional Pitt recruiting grounds like Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maryland, and New York.

The class includes six defensive backs and four running backs which were two positions of priority - as well as three linebackers, three wide receivers, two offensive linemen, one defensive lineman, and one tight end.

But the coaching staff had to amass that group of prospects essentially from scratch, as just five of 17 recruits who had previously committed to Pitt stayed with the Panthers. To call it a unique situation is putting it mildly.

"This is a unique, probably once-in-a-lifetime deal," recruiting coordinator Tony Gibson said Wednesday. "Sometimes when you're in a critical situation, the best comes out in everybody.

We knew it was crunch time and we knew what we had to get done. Hopefully our fans see that from the staff and they're excited about it.

"I thought that the staff and Coach Graham did a great job, and I thought that we rallied and put a heck of a class together."

From the outset, the gameplan looked like a fishing expedition: cast as wide a net as possible and see what gets caught. But Gibson says that wasn't exactly the case.

"It might have looked like we were just casting a wide net because we were everywhere, but what we talked about as a staff was that we didn't want to take someone to take him. If they didn't fit into what we



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College football UConn starts an Arkansas looks Wake Forest loo BC could be a h Rivals.com Colle were doing, we weren't going to take him. It's not like we have to use [the scholarships]. We weren't going to sign them just to sign them."

One key for Graham and his coaching staff, which was drawn largely from the coaches he worked with at Tulsa, was going after recruits they had targeted while with the Golden Hurricane. As such, Tulsa recruits like Jason Frimpong (who was committed to Tulsa), Corey Davis, Isaac Bennett, and Lloyd Carrington became Pitt targets.

The class was then filled out with athletes from throughout the Southeast, playing into Graham's oft-stated desires for speed and explosiveness. Add in the re-commitment of Woodland Hills cornerback Lafayette Pitts, and Graham and company built a class that may not be highly-rated, but carries a fair number of college-ready players and quite a bit of potential.

"I'm very, very proud of what they've been able to do," Graham said of his staff. "I don't believe that many people could have accomplished what this group has been able to accomplish."

"It was one of those things where, it was the situation we were in," co-offensive coordinator Mike Norvell said Wednesday. "We hit the ground running. The first day we could be out, we had every coach available out on the road. It was fun. It really was. Obviously it was stressful coming down to Signing Day, but it was a great experience. I'm so excited about this class that we have.

"When you sit there and look at the quality of players we were able to bring in in this period of time, it's exciting."

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
