
School Timetable

Both the structure of the school day and the number of subjects students choose in the senior school changed in 2006. Instead of choosing six subjects in Years 11 and 12, students chose five and instead of having six periods per day everyone now has only five. This has meant changing the way we do many things at the school.


Eight weeks into Term 1 both the staff and Year 11, 12 and 13 students were surveyed about the impact of the change. This meant that people were still able to remember the previous system were therefore able to offer useful comparisons.

Both groups reported strong support for both changes. The staff showed marginally stronger support than students.

Qualifications

NCEA Levels 1 to 3

Both senior and junior students are focussed, not only on achieving standards but also on gaining Merit and Excellence grades. All students should be keeping a close record of the credits they are achieving. Parent help in this valuable organisational task can be very effective. Summaries of the credits achieved to date are available from the Office for parents to collect at any time.

All students will have received a course outline for each course they are taking. This includes detail about:

- 1. The standards they can expect to be assessed against (Achievement and Unit Standards).
- 2. When they are to be assessed

As the winter sports codes gear up it is important that students do not push academic goals to the background. Parents can assist their sons by ensuring a regular study habit at this early stage. Senior students have all the details necessary to be able to design an accurate study/learning programme.

Qualification Entries

Entries for all qualifications (NCEA Levels 1, 2, and 3) will be finalised this term. Parents should be aware of this upcoming cost and may wish to pay these fees prior to the deadline of Aug 4th. It is possible to change student entries at any time before the end of term 2. Invoices for qualifications will be sent out in week 7.

International Fee Paying Candidates

Entry for all NQF standards \$375 All Scholarship entries \$100 per subject

Financial Assistance

Financial assistance is available to assist with the payment of entry fees to National Secondary Schools Qualifications. To be eligible to apply you must be the fee payer and meet at least one of the following criteria:

- 1. Be receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit; and/or
- 2. Have a joint family income below the threshold for receipt of a Community Services Card; and /or
- 3. Have more than one child in the family* undertaking these qualifications in the same year, irrespective of income.

Financial assistance claims cannot be made for foreign fee paying students.

Fees for those eligible for financial assistance in 2006

One child entering qualifications \$20.00 Two or more children entering qualifications A maximum of \$30.00 per family

For those who pay full fees there is a maximum of \$100.00 per child and \$200.00 per family

Full details of eligibility for financial assistance will be enclosed with the Senior Reports at the end of term 2.

Academic Review - Year 11, 12 and 13

Time has been set aside for each year 11 student to meet with their House Group teacher to discuss their academic progress to date, their goals and how they plan to achieve them. This programme aims to raise academic achievement by encouraging students to take increased responsibility for results. Before the interview students will be required to summarise their own achievement and prepare a plan for their academic success both for this year and future years at school.

House Group teachers will support students by providing targeted individual academic coaching.

Parents can support their sons by discussing their academic programme, and helping to develop specific goals before the interviews take place. Academic Reviews for all year levels will take place this term.

DEPARTMENT NEWS

MATHS DEPARTMENT

As you may be aware we are undertaking a major restructuring in the Mathematics Department's schemes. All schemes from Year 9 to Year 12 have been rewritten with two main aims in mind.

- Preparing students for NCEA. The year 9 and 10 course has been written with the aim of giving our students the best possible preparation for the Level 1 NCEA course.
- 2. Meeting student's needs.

In Years 9 and 10 we have designed three tiers within the course to allow us to support and challenge students at all levels. In Years 11 and 12 we have a designated "Accelerate and Enrichment class". These classes are embarking on a programme aimed at creating time to allow specific scholarship study in Year 13.

The reason I am highlighting this in this newsletter is that we will soon be meeting as a department to review the progress so far and plan changes for next year. I would welcome any feedback from you as to the strengths and weaknesses of the programme from your perspective as parents/ carers. ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

Congratulations to all NCEA L1 boys from last year. 78% of you gained the essential literacy credits and above the national mean. There were some excellent results from L2 as well.

All senior classes have now completed their first internal English assessment for credits for NCEA. These credits are the first step to gaining essential credits for literacy st L1 or for tertiary education and apprenticeships.

This year over 95% of Yr 13/14 are studying English. The ability to communicate one's ideas through writing or speaking is paramount to achieving success in all careers.

SOCIAL SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Curriculum News

The academic year is in full swing with the first round of internal assessments completed for Social Studies, Classical Studies, Geography and History. The consensus amongst the staff is that there has been a positive response from the students which are reflected in some extremely good results.

The emphasis this term is on research and inquiry with students being given the opportunity to explore many facets of the complex world that we live in.

Geography – The Yr 11 group will be researching natural disaster patterns on a global scale. The Yr 12 students are doing an in depth analysis of the structural patterns of Rotorua requiring a great deal of field work. The Yr 13s will be doing a fascinating study, quantifying the scale and effects of a "one in fifty year" flood of the Utuhina stream.

Classical Studies – The Yr 12 students are doing their research work on Greek Mythology, which has intrigued the students and proving to be a fascinating look at the ancient world.

History – The students in this subject are also in research mode. The Yr 12 students are gaining greater insight into their own local heritage by researching the history of local buildings. The Yr 11 and Yr 13 students are doing research into the same period of history, namely the Second World War with the Yr 13 group having to create and construct museum displays of WW2 campaigns.



ACCELERATE AND CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME (ACE)

Year 9

Year 9 explore the secrets of the Ancients.

Our boys in 9A and 9B explored the theme of 'Ancient Civilisations' this term. Mr. Raphael began the programme with a fascinating introduction to Classics, bringing the mythology and language of the ancient Greeks to life.

Life, death and the after-life in ancient times were the focus in social studies. The boys mummified each other (temporarily!) and preserved a grizzly range of internal organs in home-made canopic jars! Well done to Adam Crompton for sourcing a variety of viscera!

The boys constructed scale models of the Pyramid of Cheops in maths, made approximations of the value of Pi, and learned how to use Egyptian fractions and multiplication.

Creative writing skills were developed in English through the creation of illustrated diaries and postcards designed from the viewpoint of someone living in ancient



times.

In science, the boys were introduced to the philosophy of scientific thinking and how it applies to modern science. They also looked at the life and inventions of the great Archimedes, and the impact of his ideas on modern science and technology.

The themed study was brought to an exciting conclusion making Egyptian death masks with Mr. Whitrow in art.

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The boys cast the masks from their own faces, and incorporated their own personal hieroglyphs into their designs to great effect.

Year 10

Year 10 study skills workshop

The first study skills workshop for year 10 was with Mr. Richardson (science). The boys were taught some simple but effective memorisation techniques and how to arrange their study notes using an electronic graphic organiser.

Year 10 consider New Zealand's nuclear-free status.

Year 10 explored the controversial issue of nuclear energy in their first themed study.

The boys learned the science behind nuclear energy and weapons of mass destruction, and the history and reasons behind New Zealand's nuclear policies in social studies, including nuclear testing in the Pacific and the Chernobyl disaster. Some thought-provoking statistics were analysed in maths and the possible effects of a nuclear accident in New Zealand were modelled.

In English the boys researched, presented and argued cases for alternative energy sources. They produced some very impressive Powerpoint slideshows and static image posters to support their presentations and exercised their public-speaking skills. A very well presented and defended presentation on 'Biofuels' from Tom Kelly, Daniel Walker, Callum Roberts, Dipesh Buddhia and Jarrod Braddock was a highlight.





In science, they were also challenged to research, design and build a wind-generator from scratch in over just 2 class periods from a *very* limited supply of materials. Well done to Jordan Marr, Kaperirere Wharewera, Daniel Fraser and Zak Raphael who fried the competition, generating a sizzling 50mA!
