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Trudeau Liberals To Run The Table

Tied for first in generic matchup

Toronto, February 7th, 2013 – In a random sampling of public opinion taken by the Forum Poll™ among 1,091 Canadians 18 years of age and older, more than 4-in-10 would vote for the Liberals federally if an election were held today and the Liberal leader were Justin Trudeau (41%), and this would give the Liberals a strong majority of 164 seats in the 308 seat house. The Conservatives would net 3-in-10 votes (30%) and 93 seats, and the NDP would be in third place with just one fifth of the vote (20%) and 45 seats. The Bloc Quebecois would command 6% of the vote and 5 seats, while the Green Party would retain their single seat, but take just 2% of the vote. It is interesting to note that significant support for the Liberals led by Trudeau would come from the Greens (35%), the NDP (25%) and even the Conservatives (10%). They are especially popular in Atlantic Canada (47%), Ontario (45%) and the Prairies (46%), among middle aged Canadians (45 to 54 - 48%) and older (65+ - 45%) and among women (46%).

Liberals tied for first in generic matchup

In a generic matchup, with no leaders' names mentioned, the Conservatives (32%) and the Liberals are essentially tied (30%) within the margin of error, and this represents a decline for the Conservatives since last month (from 36%) and a sharp increase for the Liberals (from 25%). In this situation, the NDP takes about one quarter of the vote (26%, down slightly from 28%). The Bloc would take 6% of the vote and the Greens 4%. Under this scenario, the Conservatives would capture a weak minority of 129 seats in the 308 seat house, compared to 86 for the Liberals and 81 for the NDP. The Bloc would take 11 seats and the Greens would retain leader Elizabeth May's seat.

Prime Minister's favourables down sharply

About one third of Canadians approve of the job Stephen Harper is doing (32%) and this is down sharply since last month (38%). His net favourable (approve minus disapprove) is a dismal -23. Close to 4-in-10 approve of the job Tom Mulcair is doing (38%) and this is steady since last month (37%). His net favourable is a relatively lofty +7. Bob Rae has the approval of about one third (34%) and this has not changed much since last month (32%). His net is 0.

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Joint nominations favoured by Liberal, NDP supporters

In the general population, there is an even split between those who support opposition joint nominations (42%) and those who do not favour this idea (41%). Among supporters of the opposition parties, however, the idea is seen to have merit. More than one half of Liberals (53%), NDP supporters (55%), Green Party supporters (57%) and Bloquistes (60%) favour the idea of opposition parties running a single candidate against the Conservatives in each riding.

"After a brief setback last month, it appears the Trudeau Express is back on track, crushing everything in its way. The support which the Green Party and the NDP bleed to the Trudeau Liberals must be worrisome for them, if not for the Conservatives. The Trudeau Effect is even nudging the generic matchup, and the Liberals are no longer in the basement," said Forum Research President, Dr. Lorne Bozinoff.

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Methodology

The Forum Poll™ was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 1,091 randomly selected residents of Canada aged 18 or older. The poll was conducted on February 6th, 2013.

Results based on the total sample are considered accurate +/- 3 %, 19 times out of 20. Subsample results will be less accurate. Margins of error for subsample (such as age, gender) results are available at www.forumresearch.com/samplestim.asp

Where appropriate, the data has been statistically weighted to ensure that the sample reflects the actual population according to the latest Census data.

This research is not necessarily predictive of future outcomes, but rather, captures opinion at one point in time. Forum Research conducted this poll as a public service and to demonstrate our survey research capabilities.
