Born with a congenital amputation to his lower left arm, Matthew started swimming at the age of five and was determined to not just be as good as any able bodied person, but to be better. Having set his goals for success, he quickly stamped his mark on his S9 classification, breaking his first Australian open record at age 11 and world record at age 13.

At the 2004 Athens Paralympic Games Matthew won three gold, two silver and two bronze medals and finished the meet with two world & Paralympic record times. He followed this up at the 2006 Commonwealth Games, where he was the only Australian male swimmer (able-bodied or EAD) to win individual gold. The same year, he produced a phenomenal performance at his first world championships in South Africa, winning an incredible five gold, two silver and one bronze medals and breaking three more world records.

Matthew's excellent form continued through to Beijing where he won four individual gold medals and five overall each in world record times as well as three silver medals. His performances far surpassed his expectations and he particularly enjoyed the 50m freestyle and the 4x100m medley relay. Matt will continue swimming for as long as he enjoys it and is already planning to make a splash at the Australian Championships and World Championships in 2010.
