Type look forward to seeing a large number of you at this year's Annual General Meeting on Tuesday, 19 March. I will not be stepping down completely, as I will be chairing the Education Committee - withdrawal symptoms might be too much otherwise! So, I'll still be around and happy to help where I can.

From new Board to new Rabbi - we received eight official expressions of interest from rabbis and student rabbis in our search for a suitable candidate to succeed Rabbi Tony - testament to the attraction of our synagogue. A Journey Shared - Some Pesach Reflections

s Jews we are always playing fast and loose with time and place. Perhaps because we sense that life is lived in a number of different time frames and in different perspectives all at once. At the Seder table we are in all sorts of important ways at home, and in the here and now, at the specific season of Pesach, on the first or second Seder night. But we are also aware that we are sharing this time and this space with past and future generations. Not only the past and future generations of our own family and friends, but at the same time with untold generations of Jews from ancient times and all across the world.

We sit or recline at the table, but we say we are at the same time enacting - or is it re-enacting? - our journey out of Egypt, making our way through desert trials to our promised homeland. It is at the same time a more perennial journey, a spiritual passage from bondage to freedom, from subservience

to autonomy, and as a such a journey we need to make over and over again in our present lives, liberating ourselves from those things in our lives that tend to possess us, constrain us, limit us.

Each Seder, each Pesach is new and different. Just as we revisit the same rituals and foods and songs and stories that we remember from previous years, so we cannot be unaware of the changes that each year, each Pesach, brings. New faces beside us, others gone, whom we will not see again except in memory and the spirit; differences in ourselves, our lives and our concerns.

We can feel that time and place are playing fast and loose with us! We are being swept along by life and its changes. We are tempted to try to hold on to what has been familiar, even just because it is familiar, and so seems reassuring. So the ritual of the Seder comes to comfort us if we are a little unsettled by change. But within that ritual, within the story of our redemption from bondage and the servitude of repetitious labour, out into the adventure of finding the Eternal in the new and the unfamiliar, we are encouraged to embrace possibilities that the journey offers, at whatever stage of it each one of us finds ourself.

Personally, this year marks the last occasion I shall have the privilege of leading our communal Seder. The happy memory of past Bromley sederim will always be part of my Pesach in future years, and my family's.

Who knows where this journey will take us? What we can know is, we will always be in good company, whatever our future, and wherever we find ourselves, so long as we embrace our freedom and continue to celebrate our Passover. We travel together.

Major change at the Movement for Reform Judaism

Following the conclusion of its strategic review, the Movement for Reform Judaism has announced a major restructuring to ensure its effective implementation. The aim is to release resources tied up in the central office to enable more to be invested in community development and articulating Reform values, in line with the strategic plan's central goals. The intention is that these and the other investments in frontline services will be paid for by the discontinuation of the post of Chief Executive and other savings.

The changes are expected to see the various elements of Chief Executive Ben Rich's role taken on by Board members, supported by the senior executive team, as well as greater streamlining of administrative functions.

In order to enhance its direct provision to communities MRJ is delighted to announce the appointment of **Rabbi Debbie Young-Somers** as MRJ's new Community Educator. Her role will be to help ensure Reform values are cascaded to all ages throughout the Movement's communities. Rabbi Young-Somers joins the Movement from West London Synagogue. She is an outstanding educator and will focus on building on the excellent practice already in place in our synagogues. In a letter to Reform communities, MRJ Chair Jenny Pizer and Chief Executive Ben Rich write: "The aim is to focus limited resources outwards on serving communities. This has required us to think radically about reducing costs and we are convinced that the difficult decisions we are now taking are the right way forward for the organisation."

Jenny Pizer says: "Ben has really helped the Movement to move forward over the past two years, overhauling the organisation and putting in place a strategic plan that gives us renewed focus."

Ben Rich comments: "I am extremely proud of what we have achieved while I have been Chief Executive. As we move from strategy to implementation I have taken the view that now is the right time for me to move on to fresh challenges."

Opening the door to Ezekiel

"Crazed and demented".

We run from these words. We wouldn't normally use them to describe prophets. We want them to be inspired. We want them to see the things we can't see. And to hear the messages that we can't hear. Dr. Stein's second talk was attended by a cross-section of synagogue members, visitors and his professional colleagues. He made complex ideas accessible and clear, with humour and scholarship.

As we learned, during Dr. Stein's compelling talk, Ezekiel saw things that we would prefer not to see. And he heard messages that we would prefer not to hear. His behaviour was 'not part of normal human experience'.

When we hear phrases like that, we know that we're about to hear something disturbing. And we did. Ezekiel may have suffered – literally, not metaphorically – from episodes of schizophrenia:

a long-term mental disorder of a type involving a breakdown in the relation between thought, emotion, and behaviour, leading to faulty perception, inappropriate actions and feelings, withdrawal from reality and personal relationships into fantasy and delusion, and a sense of mental fragmentation. (Oxford English Dictionary)

Thanks to modern psychiatry, we know his prophecies could be interpreted as delusions, littered with abnormal behaviour – hearing third person voices, four episodes of muteness. He stayed so still that he appeared paralysed. He ate material that no 'normal' person would eat willingly. (Ezekiel, Chapters 3 and 4). He seemed to be unable or unwilling to mourn the death of his wife,

Some of his behaviour could be symbolic – eating unclean food to represent the unclean behaviour of the people of Israel. Or deliberately disobedient – cutting and burning his hair, forbidden to a Zadokite priest like Ezekiel.

Ezekiel's behaviour was beyond the

experience of rabbinical commentators. He didn't fit into the template of other prophets. His writings make disturbing reading, especially as we're not sure whether we're reading elaborate symbolism and visions or the fantasies of a sick man.

But Ezekiel is more than madness and confusion. He also heard the voice of God (Ezekiel 7:1) as Jeremiah heard the voice of God (Jeremiah 1:14). According to Dr. Stein, this doesn't mean that either of them had lost touch with reality. They both used a particular form of words, common to prophets.

Also, Ezekiel had radical, but rational, views that ran counter to the norm – no collective punishment. The people of Israel should take responsibility for their actions – future generations would not be held responsible for the acts of their ancestors.

What do we do with Ezekiel? Run from him or accept him?

To accept Ezekiel doesn't mean that we understand him. We don't have to like him or agree with him. He represents the parts of our tradition that we may find unmanageable, too much to bear.

Too much for our ears to hear – we want our prophets to make sense to us.

Perhaps we need Ezekiel to remind that the absence of rational thought has its place too. And not all questions can be answered.

Much of Jewish history has taken us to places that are 'not part of normal human experience'. But we have still emerged with our humanity intact. And we are no more or less human than the rest of humanity.

Dr. Stein opened the doors to a world that most of us would prefer locked and barred.

We look forward to opening more doors, in his future talks.

Tu Bishvat Tree Planting – Michael Abrahams reports:

On Sunday, 3 February, members of Bromley shul, together with members of the local community (including Jim Dowd MP and Councillor Susan Wise), planted a tree at the Horniman Play Park in Forest Hill to celebrate Tu Bishvat. The tree chosen was a Paper Bark Maple (Acer griseum) or Eder.

Interestingly there is another Hebrew word Eder, which is translated as the hide of a stuffed animal. Just across the road from the play park is the Horniman Museum, which is probably most famous for its collection of stuffed animals! I would like to say that this was all carefully planned, in fact, it was just a remarkable coincidence, but I can't think of a more suitable tree to plant opposite the museum.

If you visit the Horniman Museum you can see this tree in the corner of the play park, behind the swings, and you can also visit the Sweet Chestnut tree Bromley Synagogue planted two years ago for Tu Bishvat and to commemorate the visit of Janusz Korczak to Forest Hill one hundred years earlier. The tree has a plaque to help you find it.

Charlotte becomes London Citizens' first Jewish community worker

A hearty mazal tov to **Charlotte Fischer**, daughter of Martin Fischer and Rabbi Sylvia Rothschild, who has become London Citizens' first designated Jewish community worker.

Charlotte has a twin role: she is promoting the grassroots activist organisation within the Reform, Liberal and Masorti movements, which are sponsoring her post, and will also be London Citizen's Barnet worker, fostering alliances between faith communities and other groups.

Charlotte had been impressed by Citizens' UK campaigns and jumped at the chance to join it. Although the organisation has come under fire from some in the Jewish community for associating with mosques that have hosted radical Islamists, she stresses that the Israel/Palestine conflict is not on its agenda. "We deal with what synagogues and mosques can do in their area to change problems members from both communities are facing," Charlotte told the Jewish Chronicle.

A year at the Board

Joe Millis reports

When I was elected as your representative to the Board of Deputies a year ago, I had visions of its being an old men's club where there were endless meaningless debates about procedure and points of order but very little done. How wrong I was.

Although, at times, plenary sessions do resemble parish meetings à la the Vicar of Dibley or Trades Union meetings from the mid '70s, most debates are conducted in an atmosphere of mutual respect – well, within reason, anyway – and attentiveness.

The Board of Deputies of British Jews, set up in 1760, exists to promote and defend the religious and civil liberties of British Jewry. And that it does admirably.

As the community's democratically elected cross-communal organisation, the Board connects with government, media and wider society, providing a unique means through which all British Jews can be heard and represented.

In January, senior members of the Board gave evidence to the Parliamentary committee debating same-sex marriages. And the Board's President, **Vivian Wineman**, and its senior Vice-President, the Reform Movement's **Laura Marks**, had talks with Prime Minister David Cameron over a range of topics – from his opposition to the boycott of Israeli goods and his determination to protect shechita to his opposition to a nuclear Iran.

Also the Board is cross-communal – in fact it is the only body that incorporates all community institutions from Liberal and Reform Judaism to the United Synagogue and from the Union of Jewish Students to the Jewish National Front.

The debates – usually once a month on a Sunday at the splendid main hall of the British Medical Association, although we do travel once a year to the "provinces" (next month, it's Bournemouth) - have been eye-openers. And none more so than the highly charged discussion of a Board tie-in with Oxfam, with which some of the more vociferous Deputies have a problem because of a perceived anti-Israel bias.

At the end of the debate, during which the vast majority of speakers gave their reasoning in calm, moderated tones – except for the odd invocation of the Nazis - the Board voted by 113 to 65 in favour of the

project that will bring Jewish campaigners together with the NGO to tackle world food injustices. Needless to say that, in common with other Reform deputies, I voted in favour of the tie-in with Oxfam.

As senior Vice-President Laura Marks said: "It's important to defend Israel in the wider community rather than from the side lines." And herein lies one of the main problems that the Board faces today. For too long, perhaps, everything has been seen through the prism of whether it's "good for Israel or bad for Israel".

With a new intake of younger members, predominantly from the UJS, but not only, a new atmosphere is growing. I, along with many others, would rather see the Board deal with issues that are of growing importance to the community. These issues include funding care for the elderly, government-proposed benefit caps and childhood poverty, which does exist in the community. To that end, a group of "younger" deputies are trying to change the Board from within.

So, while it may have had a reputation for staidness, the Board is shifting in the right direction because of the young blood that has entered its veins.
