

Spring 2011 Administrative Updates



after 15 years of dedicated service



From doubling the endowment fund, to building the Convocation Center, to increasing academic program offerings, to continued athletic success, to the recent development of a new mission statement, Fr. Carl has seen much change and success during his time in office that began in 1996.

Through the years Fr. Carl established himself as a fair and kind leader who fearlessly sought to continue pushing Mount Carmel to the forefront of academic excellence. He will be remembered by many as an organizer, guiding light, and friend. While his accomplishments are too numerous to detail, we are proud to revisit a few of the highlights of his term that will be his lasting legacy at Mount Carmel.

Centennial Celebration

Fr. Carl knew the opportunity to celebrate 100 years of Mount Carmel in the year 2000 was a once-in-a-lifetime occasion. He gathered a committee of over 60 alumni and friends to help organize the year-long celebration. It began with Carmelfest, a casual outdoor family friendly celebration held on campus in September of 1999. It was followed by the dedication of the Our Lady of Mount Carmel Memorial Prayer Garden in November. The following summer a Centennial Dinner Dance was held at Navy Pier on July 15. A Centennial Mass at Holy Name Cathedral took place the next day on July 16, the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

Endowment Fund Growth

Prior to Fr. Carl's arrival, visionaries such as Fr. David Dil-

lon, O.Carm. and Fr. Bob Carroll, O.Carm. established the endowment fund to further secure Mount Carmel's future. Recognizing the importance of this initiative, Fr. Carl continued the good work of his predecessors and worked with the Educational Foundation to further strengthen the Endowment Fund.

Through campaigns such as the McCarthy Challenge and fundraisers such as the Annual Big Event, the fund continued to multiply. In fact, under his leadership, the Endowment Fund experienced its biggest period of growth in history, more than doubling during his time here. Despite the hard times of the economy and stock market, the fund currently stands at over \$6,500,000.00.

Major Fundraising Campaigns

Never losing sight of the importance of development initiatives, Fr. Carl led three major fundraising campaigns: the Haggerty Field Campaign, the McCarthy Challenge, and the current campaign, the Campaign for a New Century of Excellence. With \$24,000,000 already raised, the Campaign is nearing its halfway point to its total goal of \$50,000,000.00.

Over \$5,000,000 in donations for Phase II alone has allowed for the resurfacing of Carey Field, the addition of two science labs and the addition of the CBN studio and computer lab. Most recently, Phase II of the Campaign continued last summer with improvements made to the Carey Aquatic Center and Murray Pool. Additional dollars raised during this phase of the campaign will support the endowment fund, student scholarships, and the renovation of classrooms in the main school building.

Campus and Facility Improvements

When any alumnus or friend of Mount Carmel who preceded Fr. Carl's era returns to campus for the first time, they are in awe when they observe the dramatic improvements that have been made over the past 15 years. There were more campus and facility additions and improvements to Mount Carmel during Fr. Carl's time than during the previous 96 years of Mount Carmel's existence.

Haggerty Field and Field House, the McCarthy Wing, Carey Field, the Prayer Garden, Centennial Hall, Champion Way, these places on campus were all built during Fr. Carl's time as President. Perhaps the most significant building was that of the Convocation Center, including the Cacciatore Athletic Center. This building not only added much needed recreational space for workouts, practices, and home contests, but it also gave the student body a new space to gather for liturgical celebrations and assemblies, added technology and science classrooms, a state-of-the-art, media center, of-fice space, an alumni meeting room, and commons space for students to gather and eat every day.

Strengthening Academic Programs

Mount Carmel has always provided an outstanding college preparatory curriculum. Fr. Carl enhanced the already strong academic program by adding more Advanced Placement classes, using the new facilities for expanded program offerings in technology, science, and physical education, and offering new electives such as the Caravan Broadcast Network, a video broadcasting club and class.

Also with Fr. Carl's guidance, administrators began to place greater emphasis on the strength of Mount Carmel as an all-male educational environment. He supported efforts to train faculty in best practices for educating young men by sending select faculty members to the Gurian Institute. Under his leadership faculty and administrators explored

new course structures and plans that would lead to better learning outcomes for our male students.

Stabilizing Enrollment in a Turbulent Era


As the years have progressed, and specifically during the difficult economic times of recent, we have watched many Catholic schools around Chicago, and around the country, close their doors. Yet during this difficult time, Mount Carmel's enrollment remains solid with 790 students. This could not have been done without Fr. Carl's firm support of enrollment initiatives, strengthening of the Educational Foundation, and leadership in expanding the geographic area from which Mount Carmel draws students.

Focusing on the Carmelite Mission

Even with this long list of accomplishments, what Fr. Carl will be most remembered for is his sincere dedication to continue the hard work of the Carmelites who came before him at Mount Carmel. The decisions he made and the projects he initiated were all done with sound focus on meeting the mission of Mount Carmel and the Carmelites.

Fr. Tony Mazurkiewicz, O. Carm. '92 is next President of Mount Carmel

The Mount Carmel High School Board of Members announced that Fr. Tony Mazurkiewicz, O. Carm. has been appointed the school's next president. He will assume his duties June 15, succeeding Fr. Carl Markelz, O. Carm. who is stepping down after 15 years as president.

Fr. Tony currently serves as a faculty member in the Theology department, and as an enrollment and admissions representative in the Office of Mission Effectiveness.

Fr. Tony, a 1992 graduate of Mount Carmel, was recommended to the Board of Members by a presidential search committee including Carmelites, trustees, faculty, parents, and alumni.

"I know I speak on behalf of the Board of Members when I express the fullest confidence in Fr. Tony and the direction he will provide Mount Carmel," said Fr. Carl. "His strong academic background and experience in Carmelite schools and parishes make him the perfect candidate to continue advancing the institution forward. He will guide our mission to live with Zeal for God, life, and learning with sound focus. This is a wonderful day for the entire Mount Carmel community."

Fr. Tony, who grew up in Glenwood, Illinois, is the son of Lawrence and Laura Lee Mazurkiewicz. With their support and encouragement, he enrolled at Mount Carmel in the fall of 1988 and made the trip from his suburban home to 64th and Dante daily for the next four years.


At Mount Carmel he was an accomplished student and athlete; he graduated Salutatorian, served as Captain for the 1991 varsity football and 1992 varsity baseball teams, and started for the 1990 and 1991 Caravan football state championship teams.

After graduating from Mount Carmel, he went on to Yale University where he played football for the Bulldogs and was again named a team captain. He graduated from the Ivy League University in 1996 with a Bachelor of Arts in history.

He then began his career in education in 1996 teaching at Mount Carmel. He went on to Massachusetts where he

taught for three years for Edison Schools. He then returned to Chicago serving one year as an administrator for Edison Schools before returning to Mount Carmel in 2000.

After years of prayer and contemplation, he committed to joining the Carmelite Order and

made his First Profession of Vows to the Order on June 16, 2003.

He spent time living in Carmelite priories in Houston, Texas and Middletown, New York; teaching at Crespi Carmelite High School in Encino, California; and working in Saint Agnes parish in Phoenix, Arizona, as he continued the journey to becoming a Carmelite.


Fr. Tony earned a Master of Divinity degree in 2009 from Washington Theological Union in Washington, DC and was the valedictorian of his class. While in Washington he made his Solemn (final) Profession of Vows on March 28, 2009.

Fr. Tony was ordained on May 30, 2009 at St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Hyde Park. Being open to the "Tenacity of God's love" is how he described his journey to becoming a Carmelite priest. All who had the privilenge of celebrating Fr. Tony's ordination that beautiful spring day agree that he has held firmly to God's Zeal for him.

Durng the ordination homily, Bishop Michael LaFay, O. Carm. stressed that Tony already has everything he needs - a loving family, a dedicated Carmelite brotherhood and family, the experiences of life, and a faith in God - for his ministry and his life. The Holy Spirit will then guide him, he noted, as the Spirit guides all Christians, to put it all together for effective ministry, the sharing of powerful love, and receiving abundance of life.

His first assignment was Associate Pastor at Saint Raphael Parish in Los Angeles, California. He served the community of Saint Raphael for one year before returning to Mount Carmel at the beginning of this school year.

Fr. Tony says he was drawn to return to Mount Carmel for the balance of prayer, community, and ministry. He has a strong sense of Mount Carmel's proud 111 year history of Carmelite leadership in educating young men in a Catholic environment built on faith and values.

"As a teacher, I've had the opportunity to see the day-to-day operations of the school," said Fr. Tony. "I'm inspired by the interactions I've observed between our students, parents, alumni, faculty and staff. The passion, cooperative spirit, and commitment to the community that are clearly present in each of them are so unique to the Mount Carmel identity."

Fr. Tony noted the position of strength Mount Carmel is in and attributed much of the school's ongoing success

to the leadership of current President Fr. Markelz. "His vision chartered the course of the school for the past 15 years," said Fr. Tony. "It is my honor to join this wonderful community in leading Mount Carmel to a new century of excellence."

Overall, Fr. Tony is most excited about giving back to a community which he says has given him so much. "I am humbled by this opportunity to serve the church, the Carmelites, and the Mount Carmel community," he said. "It is a wonderful ministry."

Advent Action



Caravan Alley Players Tackle Tough Teen Issues

"Sound," written by Mount Carmel students and Padre Benjamin Aguilar, O. Carm., garnered attention from friends, family, alumni, community members and media outlets this winter for confronting the issue of teen bullying

Caravan Alley Players brought topics of big importance to their small stage when they presented "Sound", an inhouse play, written by Mount Carmel students and Padre Benjamin Aguilar, O.Carm., about the harmful effects of bullying.

After a popular run of the show on develop such an honest script that campus that garnered the attention of media outlets such as the Chicago Sun-Times, the production moved to the Beverly Arts Center (BAC) for two special encore performances February 26 and 27. Following the February 26 show, alumni, family and friends gathered for a reception in the BAC to celebrate the great success of the show.

The story of "Sound" centers on the new kid in town. "Andrew", played by sophomore Joey Casasanto, quickly becomes a target for ridicule and humiliation by the popular crowd at his high school and receives abuse from four bullies on a daily basis.

Pushed to the limit by the bullies, Andrew hatches a plan for revenge. He rallies together three other bullying victims, "Victor," played by Connor Golden, "Laurie," played by Katie Geary, of Mother McAuley High School, and "Richard," played by Ned Wilson. Together, they form an alliance and work to plot against the school's four leading bullies: "Grant," played by Vince Morgan, "Wes," played by Victor Rivera, "Mike," played by Tyler Lennon, and "Ashley," played by Allie Mason of Walter Payton High School.

As their plan begins to unfold and

The Mount Carmel High School the tables start to turn on the bullies, problems quickly escalate for the entire group and the audience is given a deeper view into the suffering of each of the characters.

The cruelty the characters endure throughout the show reflects the mistreatment that teens and their peers often experience throughout our nation.

"It is important for people to learn that bullying is an unfortunate reality for too many kids," said Padre Benjamin

when asked about the importance of the show.

The show's honest subject matter, paired with a talented cast of young actors, packed audiences into Mount Carmel's student center for six performances taking place over the course of two weekends in January. Since then, the show continued to receive media attention and Mount Carmel continued to receive requests from audience members for encore performances.

Padre Benjamin notes that one reason audiences are responding so much to the show is that they are forced to sit back and watch as bullying takes place. "They audience feels helpless because they can't stop the bullying from taking place," he says. "How often does

this happen in real life? Some kids, for mas later on in life. Once a threat whatever reason, do not stop other kids from bullying--maybe it's because they, too, feel helpless."

The audience is exposed to a full-range of issues that teens must cope with; body image, sexuality, racism, and classism are among the key topics explored by the script. We see the characters suffer through verbal, physical, and psychological abuse. With the play set in the current day, cyber-bullying plays a prominent role in the plot.

"We have to face the fact that bullying is real and traumatic," said Padre Benjamin. "Yes, it's always been around, but today, because of the ubiquitous nature of cyber-technology, our kids may have to relive many of their childhood trau-

or an abuse becomes a digital tattoo, no laser treatment in the world can erase it."

Sound is the third in a series of in-house original shows at Mount Carmel inspired by the five senses, following Touch in 2009, and Sight in 2010. In addition to the annual winter play, the Caravan Alley Players also perform a fall play and spring musical each year.

Writer/performers of Sound include Casasanto, Morgan, Mason, Ricardo Scheiber-Camoretti, and Darius Johnson. Jake McCabe and cast members Rivera and Kris Kocinski also contributed.

Mr. Bill Nolan '87, Director of Enrollment and Admissions, provides an update on the Class of 2015

You never know. It does not matter how many students shadowed during the fall or how many families attended one our Open Houses, the number that shows up on test day remains a mystery until the last test taker straggles in at 8:15. Throughout the fall we welcomed 390 shadows and Open House attendance was the highest in a few years. We were confident, but until you see the whites of their eyes you don't know who is going to show up. That's what was going through my mind as I made the drive to 64th and Dante at 5:30 a.m. on the snowy, blustery morning of January 8th.

The eager testers started to arrive slowly at 7 o'clock, and by 7:30 the number was growing rapidly. By 8:15 the last of our 302 prospective students was securely in his seat. This was going to be a good year. The students traveled from far and wide, from Lincoln Park to Lansing, from Beverly to Burr Ridge, from Mount Greenwood to Munster and from Riverside to Lake Shore Drive. There were kids that came from familiar Carmel families like O'Keefe, McQuillan, Denehy, McCabe, Kilroy and Pappas. There were kids from families just beginning a Carmel tradition like Verta, Sratton, Szot and White. The Class of 2015 is going to be a class to remember.

The class of 2015 not only will be an outstanding class because of the size and where the students come from but also because of the Academic ability they posses. All the young men who score at or above the 85% on the Entrance Exam earn an academic scholarship. 85–89% – \$2000, 90–94% – \$2500, 95–98% – \$3000,

and the guys that score at the 99% get free tuition. This year 81 students earned academic scholarships, the highest number in several years. Ten students scored at the 99%. This group also came from throughout the area – from as far away as St. John, to as close as 64th and Dorchester.

The future looks extremely bright. But the work for the Class of 2015 is far from over. We accepted 270 students and the next task is to register the students and see them start school in August. We will continue to communicate with them and invite them down to school for a series of events: basketball games, school play, Fight Night and a baseball game. With all the selective enrollment schools and charter schools as options for many of our families, the Exam is just part of the whole enrollment process. We will continue to work with all our families until they start school on August 15.

As always we could not have been successful this year and will not be in the future without the help of the Alumni. Over 40% of the Class of 2015 has a MC Family connection. This is why we have remained strong and vibrant. We continue to need your help in the days and years to come. If you know of a young man that would be a great addition to the Caravan let me know—whether it's your son, grandson or a neighbor, please forward his contact information to us and we will add him to our list of prospective students. The Kidpom Woodlawn

Tom Crane '52 was like many Men of Carmel in the late 1940's and early 1950's. Growing up only a few blocks from Mount Carmel, he was from a working class family that, during that time, felt worlds away from the University of Chicago campus which lies just a few blocks north of ours.

This feature on Crane's life in Woodlawn was originally published in the November 30, 2010, issue of the Chicago Maroon, a publication of the University of Chicago; exerpts are reprinted here with the permission of the author, Michael Lipkin.

Michael Lipkin is a fourth-year at the University of Chicago studying Law, Letters and Society. He is the former news editor for the Chicago Maroon. Originally from Brooklyn, NY, he is going to Little Rock, AR after graduation to write for the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette.

Tom Crane was three when he caught lobar pneumonia: practically a death sentence in 1936, the year he fell ill. Tom remembers his sister dragging him through the December slush in their Woodlawn backyard. Their mother yelled at her for getting Tom soaked.

Soon, Tom got chills, spiked a fever of 106, and was put up in his parent's four-poster bed. He fell into a coma for a week, and Dr. Frank Wall, from the University of Chicago Hospitals, tried to open his sinuses to let him breathe. It was the first of two times before Tom reached age seven that the University Hospitals saved his life. Dr. Wall pulled out Tom's eyelashes and stuck a hypodermic needle through Tom's eye socket, beneath his eye—the doctors had to hold Tom down as he struggled and kicked through his nightmares. Tom's mother was usually ushered out of the rooms during the procedures, but she provided her own remedy.

Vapo-Cresolene lamps, a kind of quack cure from the Great Depression, were a popular all-purpose fix. A kerosene lamp would heat a platter of liquid; the instructions directed users to burn cresolene, a coal tar derivative, to kill spasmodic croup, scarlet fever, or diphtheria. It could even be used for animals, the box said, for "the distemper and pneumonia in horses and does; gapes and roup in fowls."

Mrs. Crane didn't trust cresolene and instead burned liquid eucalyptus in the lamps. That's one of the few things Tom clearly remembers from his recovery. "In the height of my pneumonia, I'd come out of the coma, or a fitful sleep, and I'd

ask her, 'Light the lamp. Light the lamp," Tom said. When the fever finally broke, Tom was nursed on pineapple juice. On Christmas morning, he was so excited at the prospect of seeing the tree that he ventured out of bed on his own. His legs weak, Tom stumbled and crawled down the hall, leaning against the wall for support. His sister and cousin downstairs laughed at the toddler desperately grasping towards the Christmas tree, falling over and over, but when his mother asked, they carried Tom to the tree. "It was a delight, just to see things," he said.

This is the story Tom told me over a year ago when he called the campus newspaper, the Chicago Maroon. Maybe his memory was sparked by something we had written about his old neighborhood, or about some new research grant at the Medical Center, his former employer. In surprising detail, he told me about growing up on 61st and Drexel in the 1930s, and his pneumonia. He went on about other visits to the hospital, his time in the Army, and his eventual job at the University's nuclear cyclotron during its heyday.

Tom came from a blue-collar background and lived in a twostory greystone just south of the Midway—still there at 959 East 61st Street. Growing up around the University, he saw frat houses fly banners with hammers and sickles on May Day and read yellow stencils on mailboxes:

"Ban the A-Bomb, Support

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the Communist Party." And now, decades since he'd left, Tom wanted to see Woodlawn again.

Three years after his pneumonia, Tom was back in the hospital. He had gone with his father on a fishing trip to Kankakee, IL, to get away from the city and his father's backbreaking work as a roofer. When his father wasn't looking, Tom climbed a tree and fell, breaking his arm in a compound fracture above the elbow. The local county hospital set the arm in a metal cast so tight it cut off Tom's circulation. The trip back to Chicago was torturous, each bump on the road sending Tom into another fit of pain.

Tom's family couldn't get him an appointment at the Medical Center until the next morning, so his father cradled him in a rocking chair at home, singing lullabies to soothe Tom's moans.

Once admitted, Tom passed through the Billings Hospital's marble rotunda on his way to see Dr. Howard Hatcher, the University's first orthopedic resident. Hatcher took one look at the metal cast, loosened the wing nuts holding it together, and flung it into a trashcan. "That cast is an instrument of torture and that county hospital will never see it again," Hatcher said. He then pricked each of Tom's fingers looking for any sign of feeling. With each finger that failed to twitch, the odds of saving Tom's arm from amputation shrank. Finally, Tom's pinky jerked.

Tom was sent to the children's ward, still screaming in pain. From his bed in the middle of the room, Tom could see that the other children in the room were in worse shape than he was. One girl, maybe four or five years old, had broken her pelvis and had a cast from her waist to her ankles; she cried constantly as the nurse turned her every which way

to try and make her comfortable. A boy about Tom's age had the bed next to the window, which let in the soft spring breeze carrying the smell of newly cut grass from the Midway. The boy was despondent and would only stare out the window singing: "Bring back, bring back, bring back my Bonnie to me."

Tom was awoken that first night by flashlights and ghostly figures moving about the room. The figures spoke in low whispers and gently lifted him onto a litter with wheels. He was whisked to a room with equipment that glowed with a bluish-white light; he was brought back to this room night after night. This, Tom would realize years later when he worked at the Medical Center, was the operating room Dr. Hatcher used to work on his arm. Tom's family couldn't afford surgery, so Hatcher stole hours after his shift to work pro bono.

Tom had a stroke several years ago, but his childhood memories are still remarkably sharp. His stories are full of vivid but seemingly trivial details. He can rattle off the first and last names of people he met 50 years ago or important addresses: Ira Null, U of C Human Resources; DeForest Training School, 4242 North Ashland Avenue; Tom Skelling, high-school friend; 808 East 63rd Street, his father's childhood home.


Perhaps that's because Tom surrounds himself with his past. He and his wife still sleep on the same four-poster bed he slept in during his pneumonia. He owns two Vapo-Cresolene lamps and eucalyptus extract—a dollar each on eBay. He knows, and has written drafts of, the life story of Dr. Wall, details culled from working with his protégés at the Medical Center and research done on his own time. Tom wrote letters to Wall's son, a doctor himself, and tracked both the careers of father and son

Whenever Tom tells his own story, he starts with the 1893 Columbian Exposition. He likes to start at the beginning, he said, and the World's Fair and the University of Chicago are tied together in his mind. "The University was like a giant medieval castle, in that the populace was drawn in around it," he said. But the seemingly stuffy subjects and the lack of a football team kept Tom and his family from respecting the University. "People from Woodlawn used to look at the University as being a little out of the mainstream," he said. "Being in a working-class family, you couldn't understand the intellectual concepts. It was above you."

Tom's perception changed when he was delivering pizzas as a teenager in Hyde Park. Without a football team on [the University's] campus, Tom was taken aback to see a hulking grad student answer the door on one delivery. When he found out the student played football in college, Tom asked how a football player managed to get into such a rigorous graduate program. "He gave me such a lecture on being scholarly," Tom said. He began dreaming of getting out of Woodlawn and going to college. "I don't know if he knows to this day what an impact he had on my life."

Around the same time, Tom's father, a pinochle and three-cushion billiard champ, opened a gas station near their house. His father's connections to organized crime ensured that runners of the "policy rackets" visited the station to pay their respects and keep it afloat.

One alleged hit man, "a typical Humphrey Bogart type," would often tell Tom to appreciate what a great father he had. "He had left all that. My father counseled me against gambling. 'Tom, you can only lose. Stay away from it." Tom returns to his father often, comparing him to his supervisers at the University, or Dr. Hatcher, whom Tom practically deifies. "They were exactly like my father. Their word was law."



The advice from his father and the football-player-turned-student pushed Tom into technical training. Drafted into the Army towards the end of the Korean War, Tom chose to build and repair electrical devices: infrared sniper scopes, mine detectors, and searchlights. When he came back to Woodlawn, his technical expertise made him think work at the University was the natural next step.

His first job was a bit of shock: assisting professors at the Fermi Institute's underground cyclotron. The cyclotron, one of the most complex pieces of equipment on campus, was used to study radioactive particles. "And here I was, with only seven college credits," Tom said. "I went to night school under the G.I. Bill. Only seven college credits so far, and I was working around nuclear physicists."

Tom took Geiger readings throughout the complex and assisted researchers in dozens of experiments. The self-styled "kid from Woodlawn" was soon a part of the University community. Grad students shared their latest findings with him, and during their downtime, tutored Tom in the college math classes he was taking. "They were such a giving bunch of people," he said.

The lab's work soon turned to radioactive material's medical applications, and Tom was transferred to the Medical Center. As cancer patients elected to receive radioactive implants, Tom prepared the materials and watched in the operating room. "For any isotopes that were put into patients, we had to be there," he said.

But the methods used at the Medical Center weren't initially successful, and Tom had to attend dozens of postmortems. After being saved twice by the hospital himself, he now saw patients who weren't as lucky. "I saw a lot of death and dying," he said. "It made me appreciate things more."

Tom suggested we visit his old house together, but his wife, Madeline, was initially against the plan. Even though his memory of the distant past is clear, Tom's stroke makes him easily confused about the present. He can forget what train he's supposed to catch or where he's going. Tom was insistent though.

His wife relented, as long as she could come along—so my girlfriend and I picked both of them up from the train station. This was Tom and Madeline's first train ride together, and they talk about the novelty as they get into my minivan. They're clearly a devoted couple—they remember the Woodlawn bowling alley where they first met and argue about insignificant details. "They had the most delicious pizzas there," Tom said. "I never had them," Madeline replied. "They did." I had the burgers."

We drive through Tom's old haunts,

past where his father's gas station once stood, and pulled up on the house he lived in when he was three. While my girlfriend and Madeline talk about the colleges her grandkids attend, Tom stands in the yard and points to the room where his father used to sit on the floor and read the Sunday funnies. Tom walks around to the back, and points to a window. When his father stormed out of an argument, his mother threw hot tea out the window, trying to scald him.

He points to another window—this is the one he looked out of while he was sick with pneumonia, and his voice weakens. His eyes water, and I begin to get uncomfortable. Tom pulls me aside and gives me a speech that didn't help. "Sometimes, you feel like you're forgotten in life. You've not only honored me, you've honored my family," he said. "Basically, I'm a commoner. And you've taken this occasion to really take an interest in myself. What I'm saying is, you've taken this story of a commoner, and you have done a great honor to me."

The four of us pile back into the van and drive over to the Medical Center to find Tom's old office, which, in a strange coincidence, was the room he stayed in after breaking his arm in 1939.

Madeline is tired from the day's walking, so only Tom and I get out of the car. Like little boys, we hold our hands up to the windows and peer into the main hall, looking at the rotunda Tom was carried through almost 75 years ago. The memories don't come flooding back, Tom says, because he's blocked out most of the bad ones, and he's already told me most of the good ones. We take a few steps back and look at the building's façade until we see the window of his old office. Tom is uncommonly silent.

Lance Todd Bonner, '87 was an all-star student-athlete whose zest for life and dedication to his academic and athletic pursuits impressed all who came across the young man. Sadly, this wonderful life was cut short when Bonner tragically passed away in a traffic accident at the young age of 23.

At Mount Carmel, Bonner was a star running back. He scored the winning touchdown in the Prep Bowl against Lane Tech in 1985.

His athletic talent coupled with his academic success attracted the attention of Ivy League universities. Following his Mount Carmel graduation, Bonner went on to study and play football at Yale University. At Yale he was a member of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity.

Bonner graduated from Yale in 1991 with a degree in history and political science and worked for a law firm and as a foreign exchange trader for Citibank of New York. He was also very involved with Big Brothers Big Slsters, an organization dedicated to providing responsible adult mentors for all children in need of a caring adult friend in their life.

Following Bonner's death freinds and family rallied together to preserve the memory of this cheished Man of Mount Carmel. Under the leadership of Bonner's parents, LT and the late Barbara, and classmates John Furjanic and Andre Burke, the Lance Bonner Memorial Foundation was established in 1993.

The mission of the Lance Bonner Memorial Foundation was formed to perpetuate the life and good works of Lance Bonner. And this they did. Over the course of the past 18 years the organization raised over \$120,000.00 in memory of Lance by hosting golf outings, banquets, and receptions.

Much of the money raised was given to Mount Carmel in Lance's memory while the remaining amount was given to other non-proft organizations close to the Bonner family's heart.

Football

Beginning in the fall, the Caravan football team surprised the pundents finishing in a three-way tie for the Chicago Catholic League (CCL) Blue Championship and advanced to the Class 8A State Championship. Thanks to strong senior leadership, the Caravan improved every week rolling through the playoffs. 


