REGARDING: 2016 Race for the Republican Nomination for President

cygnal conducted a telephone survey of potential Republican caucus goers in Iowa regarding the 2016 Republican nomination for President. The survey was conducted July 10-12, 2013 using IVR and cell phone collects and includes 1,705 respondents, resulting in a 2.37% MoE. The poll was balanced to reflect the target voter universe.

A cygnal flash poll was conducted among potential Republican caucus goers to gauge the current standing of potential candidates for the 2016 Republican nomination for President. Some respondents who answered that they are likely not participating were included in the sample due to the fluid nature of caucus participation in past cycles and the inability to predict behavior three years from now. Respondents who claimed to definitely not participate were screen out.

The clear winner in the Republican field was Undecided at 36.3%. Two candidates received double-digit support - Marco Rubio at 11.4% and Rand Paul at 10.5%. Paul Ryan was in third place with 9.3%. Candidates included in the flash poll were Jeb Bush, Chris Christie, Ted Cruz, Bobby Jindal, Rand Paul, Marco Rubio, Paul Ryan, Rick Santorum, and Scott Walker.

Considering Santorum's surprise showing in 2012, he only notched up 6.7% of the support. Rand Paul performed best among women with 14.1% while Marco Rubio grabbed the most among males at 13.4%. Jeb Bush performed best among those with a high propensity to participate in Primaries at 13.4%.

When it comes to the direction of the country, lowa Republicans are dour. 88.8% of the respondents believed we are on the wrong track. Only 9.5% felt the country was moving in the right direction.

Government spending took top spot among the issues at 31.8% followed by the economy at 21.8% and healthcare at 13.0%.
