
Voyageur Country Visitor Center – Located just south of town on Highway 53 for information on everything there is to see and do in Orr and all around Voyageur Country.





Voyageurs National Park lies in the rocky Canadian Shield, some of the oldest exposed rock formations in the world. The pink and gray bedrock has been shaped and carved at least four times by glaciers leaving four large interconnected lakes. The landscape is rugged and varied; rolling hills interspersed with bogs, beaver ponds, swamps, islands, and a variety of lakes. In the years since the glaciers, a thin layer of soil has been created to support the boreal forest ecosystem, the North Woods of Voyageurs National Park.

This landscape has a rich human history. The park is named for the Voyageurs the French-Canadian canoemen who traveled these waters in their birchbark canoes from the Great Lakes to what is now the interior of the western United States and Canada. Modern voyageurs continue to ply these waters. The water, accompanying scenery, geology, and rich cultural and natural resources, gives Voyageurs its national significance, and merit its protection for the enjoyment of future generations.

Over a third water, Voyageurs is an active park that you must see from the water. Access to the Kabetogama Peninsula, islands and nearly all of the park s shoreline is by watercraft. The park s naturalist programs include kids activities, canoe trips, boat tours, and the famous North Canoe Voyage. Join a costumed interpreter and learn about the voyageurs as you paddle a 26 reproduction North Canoe. Free public boat ramps and parking are available at the park s visitor centers and at the Woodenfrog State Forest Campground near

Kabetogama. Watercraft rental and water taxi service are available from private outfitters and resorts at each of the park s four gateway communities Ash River, Crane Lake, International Falls (Rainy Lake) and Kabetogama.

On the northern and eastern edge of Minnesota s border, 55 miles of the park meanders along the Ontario border of Canada. Voyageurs National Park is located five hours by car from Minneapolis-St. Paul, MN, three hours from Duluth, MN and four hours from Winnipeg, Manitoba. Roads approach the park from four points along U.S. Highway 53 between Duluth and International Falls. Air travelers can take advantage of the International Falls or Hibbing airports where rental cars and hotel shuttles are available. The park is open year-round with no entrance fee and few charges to use park facilities. The park charges \$10.00 per day to use park-provided boats on interior lakes, and \$35/night for group campsites. Free, self-registration permits are required for overnight camping.

THINGS TO DO

Fishing and Boating – Boating and fishing are the most common recreational uses of the park. Known as some of the best walleye and bass water in the nation, the lakes attracted sport anglers long before the park was established. A Minnesota fishing license is required and Minnesota boating regulations apply.

Canoeing and Kayaking – Even though waters are shared with powerboats, the lakes of Voyageurs National Park are large enough to provide for some solitude. Canoe and kayak trips are available through outfitters, from day-trips to journeys lasting over a week; the Kabetogama Peninsula can be circumnavigated in approximately one week.

Boats on Interior Lakes – Voyageurs provides, for \$10.00 per day, canoes and/or rowboats on the following interior lakes of the Kabetogama Peninsula: Locator, Quill, Ek, Cruiser, Brown, Peary, Little Shoepack and Shoepack. Boats are available by reservation only. Reservations to use these boats can be made one week in advance by phone or at the visitor centers. The trails leading to these interior lake boats are accessible only by water. Water taxi service to the trails can be arranged through privately-owned outfitters and resorts.

Hiking, **Skiing and Snowshoeing** – The park has a variety of hiking trails accessible by boat or car. There is a hiking trail near each visitor center as well as two long distance trail systems. The park grooms two ski trails and three snowshoe trails for your enjoyment.

Camping – There are water-accessible campsites distributed throughout the park designed for either tent camping or houseboats. Designated tent sites have a mooring aid, tent pad or level area, fire ring, privy, picnic table and bearproof food-storage locker. Houseboat sites include two mooring aids and a fire ring. There are no fees or reservations but self-registration permits are required for overnight camping. Sites are available on a first-come, first-served basis. New group campsites for up to 30 people are available by reservation.














Snowmobiling – Voyageurs National Park has 110 miles of groomed snowmobile trails over frozen lake surfaces. The 11-mile Chain of Lakes trail travels through the scenic interior of the park; this trail is not groomed. **Lodging Facilities –** The historic Kettle Falls Hotel offers lodging within the park. Often called the Jewel in the Wilderness , Kettle Falls is accessible by boat and floatplane. This historic 1912 hotel is a concessionoperated complex that includes a dining room, bar, trading post, rooms and modern housekeeping villas. A mechanical portage allows access between Rainy and Namakan lakes (closed in winter).

The Ash River is the most central entranceway to Voyageurs National Park, Lake Kabetogama, Namakan Lake and all they have to offer. Its central location makes the Ash River an ideal base for your resort or houseboat vacation getaway in the wilderness of northern Minnesota.

This big-water country is popular for a variety of outdoor activities all seasons of the year. In spring or summer, enjoy fishing, boating, canoeing, or hiking along many hiking trails. Our lakes boast some of the finest walleye and northern pike fishing, serving up crappie and small mouth bass as well. When the lakes freeze and snow carpets the woods, it s time for snowmobiling, ice fishing and cross-country skiing! Our area offers hundreds of miles of groomed lake and land snowmobile trails, well deserving its name of Minnesota s Little Yellowstone.




Voyageurs National Park Area Activities – Ash River is the central entrance to Voyageurs National Park. Various activities are offered in and near the park, including the Kab/Ash hiking trail, Ellsworth Rock Gardens, inland hiking trails, cross-country ski and snowshoe trails, and snowmobile trails.

The Park Service also makes boats available to those who would like to explore the inland lakes. Naturalist-led programs for all ages occur at the park visitor s center. Various scenic boat tours are offered throughout Voyageurs National Park. Please call any of the park visitor centers for the latest tour and program schedules.

A wilderness paradise born of an ancient glacier flow, edged by the great Canadian Shield, Kabetogama Lake is surrounded by wilderness untamed by time. Here you II find creation in its most natural state, teeming with plants and wildlife aspen, white pine and spruce, black bear, deer, moose and wolf. The lake itself is dotted with over 200 remote, scenic islands that maintain their beauty through harsh winter storms, and produce rich foliage and wild berries in summer.

Situated along the U.S.-Canadian border in Minnesota, Kabetogama Lake has a 500-mile, rocky shoreline, 25,000 acres of clean, cool water, and is one of five major lakes forming Voyageurs National Park.

Whether you re an angler looking for walleyes, someone in need of relaxation, or an outdoor enthusiast, resorts along the Kabetogama shoreline can provide you with boats and motors or safe docking for your own boat. Large boats and motors have easy access to the interconnecting Voyageur Waterway of Kabetogama, Namakan, Sand Point and Crane lakes (65 miles west to east). Canoes, kayaks and complete outfitting services are available from local outfitters for you to camp out and visit the wild.

A short scenic boat ride across from the Kabetogama Community shoreline will take you to the historic Ellsworth Rock Gardens, a popular and must-see site that is actively being restored by volunteers and historians.

Kabetogama s reputation as a great fishing and recreation destination became best known as a resort community in the late 40s and early 50s. Today

WHY VISIT BORDERWATERS?

Variety through all seasons!

Our BorderWaters area is unique. There are three types of ecosystems that overlap in this region and the geology offers variety in landscape.

Here, you II find sprawling lakes carved from the Canadian Shield and featuring dramatic cliffs, rocky islands and extensive fishing structure. You will also find chains of smaller lakes where many different species of fish exploit the changes

in aquatic habitat.


The history of our region is interpreted in many different ways. Many area museums offer information and artifacts on the Ojibwe or Chippewa natives, and there is a great interpretive center at the site of ancient burial mounds along the Rainy River near Emo, Ontario. Voyageurs National Park maintains displays at all their visitor centers and offer many interpretive programs throughout the year.

The Koochiching Museums also feature an annex devoted to football legend and International Falls native Bronko Nagurski.

Transportation has always been an impor-

tant part of the BorderWaters region. The early fur trade brought Voyageurs to the region to bring trade goods west and return to the east with furs. Their huge canoes plying the interconnected waterways and establishing several historic portages. With all the water around, it is not surprising that our most popular recreations are dominated by boating. Houseboats are great ways to explore the large lakes throughout the region, most people bring along a fishing boat. Anglers indeed find variety on our lakes and rivers, fishing for Walleye, Northern Pike, Muskellunge, Smallmouth Bass, Black Crappie, Lake Sturgeon, Lake Trout and many other species. Pleasure boaters find beaches, points of interest and hiking trails to visit and there plenty of room for water skiing. Many a canoe or kayak has glided quietly along the shorelines of this historic waterway paradise.

I am most familiar with Rainy Lake, where you can explore the site of an abandoned gold mine and the site of the city that sprung up to serve miners and has since disappeared. Rainy also offers an opportunity to visit a remote and historic hotel that served the loggers that replaced the Voyageurs as the driving



economic force. You can also visit a historic fish camp represent-

the extended walleye season attracts the first open-water anglers every year. The season remains open until mid April and river accesses are opened as soon as it is safely possible. This often means that you could fish through the ice on the Lake in the morning and launch a boat to fish the river in the afternoon.

The entire region is well known to winter anglers. Ice fishing is quite popular with good reason. Slot limits on many BorderWaters have kept large breeding fish in the population resulting in increasing fry production most every spring. The large age classes of fry add to the populations of keeper size fish as they grow making it possible

to catch some pretty good sized fish you will return to the lake and some perfect eating size fish. On Rainy Lake, you are allowed to keep one trophy size walleye. Regulations differ between the United States and Canada so be sure to check the rules.

Winter visitors are also treated to some great snowmobiling and cross country skiing. Snowshoers will find accessible trails where you can spot wildlife or just take in the scenery. Forestry roads throughout the county offer opportunities to check for wildlife or just take a scenic drive.

Boise Cascade operates one of the biggest and fastest papermaking machines in the world at International Falls. Naturally, a network of logging roads reaches into vast tracts of public lands. In the fall, many of these roads offer access to areas open to hunt whitetail deer, black bear, ruffed or spruce grouse and more. 




Ranier is an historic little city on the bay offering a unique blend of history, art, fishing and recreational activities.

Situated on the edge of Rainy Lake and Rainy River, this resort community is only eight nautical miles from Voyageurs National Park. It was here that Native people traded furs, fish, berries and handcrafted goods with the Voyageurs and later, local merchants.

During the Prohibition era, Ranier was home to bootleggers who smuggled whiskey between Canada and the United States across the oldest cantilevered bridge in the world. Spanning the rushing waters, the bridge, built in 1908, is still a vital link at this port of entry, the largest bulk rail port in the United States. Five import/export houses operate in Ranier.

Once raucous with saloons and bordellos, Ranier now enjoys good times in other ways. Over the years, Ranier has attracted innovative entrepreneurs, artists, writers and musicians, who cherish the quaint and lively city.

Ranier is brimming with manicured parks. It is also home to gift shops, an art gallery, a restaurant, a marine shop, pubs, an ice cream shop, tennis court, public beach, a hiking/biking trail and much more. A variety of rental properties are available to visitors.

Here are a couple more interesting facts you may not know: Ranier is the second largest tonnage-capacity port in the United States, and the birthplace of the world famous Mr. Twister fishing lure.








Historic Village on Rainy Lake



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International Falls is relatively young as cities go, yet very old. As a bustling modern community, it dates back over 100 years. Explorers, missionaries and Voyageurs were very familiar with the area as early as the late 1600s. It is located on the south bank of the Rainy River, near the west end of Rainy Lake. The river forms part of the border between Minnesota and Ontario.

The village that sprang up in the late 1800s was named Koochiching, an Ojibwe name for the falls, Rainy Lake and Rainy River area. Koochiching described the waterfall s mistlike rain at the point where the lake flowed into the river. The village was incorporated in 1901, and in 1903 its name was changed to International Falls.

Visitors to International Falls will enjoy majestic scenery, wildlife, water recreation sports and world-class fishing on Rainy Lake and Rainy River. Walleyes, northern pike, smallmouth bass and crappies are popular catches.

The championship eighteen-hole golf course along the historic Rainy River is hailed as one of the most scenic golf courses in Minnesota. Make it a two nation vacation and play another 18 holes of golf in the sister city, Fort Frances, Ontario.

The Falls serves as gateway to Minnesota s only national park Voyageurs National Park. The Park Service offers an interpretive center, naturalist-guided activities, programs, hiking opportunities, picnic areas and boat cruises.

History buffs will enjoy area museums and the Waters of the Dancing Sky Scenic Byway stretching along Highway 11 East and West. A variety of lodging opportunities abound resorts, inns, motels, houseboats. Visitors will also enjoy charming shops, pubs, and restaurants.



SPRING

Warmer water temperatures trigger the walleye run up the Rainy River. The tributaries and shoreline of the Rainy are teeming with life during the spring when fish and birds return to their breeding grounds. Lake of the Woods is strategically located on the Mississippi migratory flyway, and thousands of shore birds and waterfowl stop to rest and nest on the secluded shoreline of the lake.

Minnesota's State Flower is the Showy Lady s-Slipper. This lovely orchid is a native perennial and blooms in abundance in mid-June in the Lake of the Woods area. Our area hosts a wildflower celebration the third Saturday of June.

SUMMER – Fishing is fabulous. The lake is a world-class fishery providing hundreds of thousands of pounds of walleye annually. Lake of the Woods also has sauger, small mouth and large mouth bass, muskie, jumbo perch, sturgeon and northern pike.

Kayaking and canoeing are becoming very popular sports in the area and route maps are available at the Lake of the Woods Area Tourism Bureau.

Enjoy a nature hike or bike trip down one of the winding logging trails in the Beltrami Island State Forest. Be sure and stop in at the tourist information center and pick up a Wilderness Drive Map before setting out.

FALL Autumn is an amazing time in the Lake of the Woods area. The trees blush in hues of red, yellow and orange.

WINTER – Winter brings on a pristine white landscape. Any true Minnesotan will tell you, winter is the time for outdoor fun!

Ice fishing has become incredibly popular on Lake of the Woods during the winter season, and why not? Heated fish houses, safe reliable transportation across the ice and worldclass service set the stage for successful fishing year around! It s an extraordinary experience you won t want to miss.

Cross-country skiing and snow shoeing at Zippel Bay State

Park are two great ways to recreate. Or snowmobile the Northern Connection Trail which provides over 500 miles of groomed trails.

If you re wondering what to do with the wee ones, may we suggest a sledding party at Willie Walleye Park in Baudette? The park has one of the best toboggan hills anywhere.

AREA ATTRACTIONS

Golf – Oak Harbor Golf Course is an 18-hole course located along the shores of the Rainy River, 8.5 miles north of Baudette off of Highway 172. Open from dawn to dusk, seven days a week. (218) 634-9939.

Hiking and Bike Trails – Zippel Bay State Park is ten miles north east of Williams, Minnesota on the shoreline of Lake of the Woods. The park has 53 campsites, a shower house, two miles of sandy beach, covered picnic pavilions, and a safe harbor with dock slips. This beautiful park has nearly 3,000 acres of pristine wilderness and is a highly favored spot for wildlife watching.

The Beltrami Island State Forest offers visitors thousands of acres of wilderness to enjoy and is crisscrossed with graveled roads.




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The largest town in the Rainy River District with a population of 8,000, Fort Frances is a modern, full-service community, located on the shores of Rainy Lake and Rainy River along the Canadian-U.S. border, making it the gateway to Northwestern Ontario. The town is linked by bridge to International Falls, Minnesota.

Fort Frances is the oldest settled community west of Lake Superior, incorporated in April 1903. The community has grown and prospered in the past century.

A view of pioneer and aboriginal life, along with displays of local arts and crafts, is provided at the newly renovated Fort Frances Museum and Cultural Centre, in the heart of downtown.

Enjoy walking along a waterfront development area to the rapids where Rainy Lake flows into Rainy River. The next half-mile takes you through Pither s Point Park and onto the shores of one of North America s cleanest bodies of water, sparkling Rainy Lake. Stop at Pither s Point and check out the logging boat Hallett. This 6ofoot, 57-ton boat was built in 1941 and was the largest, most powerful boat on Rainy Lake until it was taken out of operation in 1974. Want to spend time on the water?

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Crossing the Border

International Falls – Fort Frances Baudette – Rainy River; Warroad – Sprague

CROSSING THE INTERNATIONAL BORDER IS EASY!

You can walk across the bridge free of charge or drive across the bridge for a toll. Either way, you are required to be cleared through U.S. or Canadian Customs. A passport is required by both American and Canadian citizens to enter the U.S. To enter Canada, proof of citizenship is required. Youths under 18 traveling alone may need a letter of permission from a parent or a legal guardian.

WHAT GOODS CAN YOU BRING IN WITH YOU

- U.S. residents entering Canada:
- private vehicles, pleasure boats, and recreational vehicles;
- up to 1.14 liters (40 oz.) of liquor or 1.5 liters of wine or wine coolers or 24 355 ml/12 oz. cans or bottles of beer or ale* duty-free;
- up to 200 cigarettes, 50 cigars or cigarillos, 200 tobacco sticks, and 200 grams of manufactured tobacco* duty-free.

You must meet the provincial age requirements (19 in Ontario) to import these goods.

CANADIAN RESIDENTS ENTERING THE UNITED STATES:

- private vehicles, pleasure boats, and recreational vehicles;
- up to 24 355 ml/12 oz. cans/ bottles of beer, or 4 liters liquor, wine/wine coolers, or 1 liter duty-free*;
- 200 cigarettes duty-free
- * You must meet state age requirements (21 in Minnesota) to import these goods.

WHAT GOODS ARE NOT ALLOWED INTO CANADA?

- live minnows, leeches;
- smelt, live or dead:
- handguns and automatic weapons;
- mace or any other spray to be used against people.

HOW MUCH CAN YOU BRING BACK DUTY-FREE?

U.S. residents leaving Canada: (all figures in U.S. dollars)

If you stay in Canada under 48 hours, \$200 worth of goods including:

- 50 cigarettes or 10 cigars (Cuban cigars prohibited);
- 150 milliliters (or 5 fl. oz.) liquor.

After a 48-hour stay in Canada, you may return with \$800 worth of goods including:

- 1 liter (33.8 oz.) liquor;
- 200 cigarettes + 100 cigars;
- family members may combine their \$800 exemptions.
- Canadian articles are duty-free.

Canadian residents leaving the United States: (all figures in Canadian dollars)

If you stay in the U.S. under 24 hours there is no exemption.

After an absence of 24 hours or more, you can claim goods (except tobacco products and alcoholic beverages) worth up to \$50 in total. If the goods you bring in are worth more than \$50 in total, you cannot claim this exemption. Instead, you have to pay duties on the full value. After an absence of 48 hours or more, you can claim goods worth up to \$200 in total including:

- 200 cigarettes, 200 tobacco sticks, 50 cigars or cigarillos, and 200 grams of manufactured tobacco;
- 1.14 liters (40 oz.) of liquor or 1.5 liters of wine or 24 355 ml/12 oz. cans or bottles of beer or ale.

After an absence of 7 days or more, you can claim goods worth up to \$750 in total;

• the same amount of tobacco products and alcoholic beverages as above can be included in these goods.

PLEASE NOTE: Family members may NOT combine their exemptions.

CAN YOU GET A REFUND ON TAXES

The New Rebate System

As from 1 April 2007, the earlier method of getting tax rebates on goods and accommodation purchased in Canada by a visitor and taken out of Canada was repealed. A substantially more limited form of partial rebate was introduced in its place. This new system allows for a one half refund (rather than full refund) of the GST/HST paid on the accommodation component of packaged tours to Canada.

A packaged tour has to comprise a mix of airfare and accommodation (and potentially other things) all sold for one price without a price breakdown of the components. Refunds are claimed back through the tour operator you bought the packaged tour from, and are to be claimed only after you have returned from Canada.

For more details as to the eligibility for any refund when you are buying travel packages to Canada, ask the company who is selling the package to you.

Sadly, this new arrangement is vastly less generous than the earlier arrangement.

WHAT ABOUT DRIVING?

All United States driver's licenses are valid when driving in Canada and vice versa. Seat belts are mandatory in both Ontario and Minnesota. In Minnesota, if it is raining or snowing, your headlights must be on. Here are some handy comparisons that will help you convert distances and speed limits:

A kilometer (km) is roughly six

or

90-100 km/h = 55-62 mph 80-90 km/h = 50-55 mph

40-60 km/h = 25-37 mph

Fuel in Canada is sold in liters. Fuel in the U.S. is sold in gallons. It takes 3.78 liters to make a U.S. gallon.

CAN YOU BRING FIREARMS ACROSS THE BORDER?

Canada: Canada welcomes hunters and sportsmen in season, but handguns, fully automatic weapons or firearms under 26" in length are not permitted. During the hunting season, if you are at least 18 years of age, you may bring a hunting rifle or shotgun into the province for hunting purposes and up to 200 rounds of ammunition.

To bring a firearm into Canada, a license is required. Either a five-year possession and acquisition license or a yearly temporary license fee that you can acquire at the border when you enter Canada. For more information call 1-800-731-4000.

CAN YOU BRING YOUR PET?

When bringing a pet across the border, you must have a valid rabies vaccination certificate issued for the pet during the previous 12 months.

DO I NEED A PASSPORT TO TRAVEL BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA?

On June 1, 2009, U.S. citizens returning home from Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean or Bermuda, by land or sea, will be required to present one of the travel documents listed below. Many of these documents are already available, and obtaining one now will ensure that you are ready on June 1, 2009, when they will be required.

U.S. Passport – This is an internationally recognized travel document that verifies a person's identity and nationality. It is accepted for travel by air, land and sea.

U.S. Passport Card – This is a new, limited-use travel document that fits in your wallet and costs less than a U.S. Passport. It is only valid for travel by land and sea.


Enhanced Driver's License (EDL) – Several states and Canadian provinces/territories are issuing this driver's license or identification document that denotes identity and citizenship. It is specifically designed for cross-border travel into the U.S. by land or sea.

Trusted Traveler Program Cards – NEXUS, SENTRI or FAST enrollment cards can speed your entry into the U.S. and are issued only to preapproved, low-risk travelers. The cards are valid for use at land or sea; the NEXUS card can be used in airports with a NEXUS kiosk.

Note: Beginning June 1, 2009, U.S. and Canadian citizen children under age 16 arriving by land or sea from contiguous territory may also present an original or copy of his or her birth certificate, a Consular Report of Birth Abroad, a Naturalization Certificate, or a Canadian Citizenship Card.

Children traveling with someone other than their legal guardian should have written permission.

Beginning June 1, 2009, U.S. and Canadian citizen children under age 19 arriving by land or sea from contiguous territory and traveling with a school group, religious group, social or cultural organization, or sports team, may also present an original or copy of his or her birth certificate, a Consular Report of Birth Abroad, a Naturalization Certificate, or a Canadian Citizenship Card.
