## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Cedar Grove, a New Kent County farmhouse, is situated on the north side of route 609 near Providence Forge. The present brick and frame structure was built at two different periods. The  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story, single-pile brick house was built ca. 1810. The frame section was added ca. 1916 and replaces an earlier frame building. The present outbuildings date to the present century.

Set on a brick foundation, the front (south) elevation of three bays is laid in Flemish bond. The former one-story facade porch was removed in the present century. The present brick steps were added when the porch was removed. The main entrance consists of a paneled double door set within a three-part architrave. A four-pane transom is found above the door. A stuccoed keystone arch above the doorway was removed in the present century. Fenestration consists of 9/9 hung-sash windows within three-part architraves. All windows were formerly surmounted by flat keystone arches of stucco that were removed in the present century. A dentil cornice embellished the eaves course. Standing-seam sheet metal presently covers the roof. A brick water table is found on the north, south and west walls. The north elevation is similar to the south.

Fenestration on the west elevation consists of 9/9 hung-sash windows on the first story and 6/9 hung-sash windows above. The gable is wood framed rather than brick, is weatherboarded, and contains 4/4 hung-sash windows. The east elevation is dominated by a two-story, wood-frame wing added in 1916. The addition's fenestration consists of 2/2 hung-sash windows. A one-story porch shelters the east entry.

Cedar Grove contains a traditional one-room side-hall plan. The hall is dominated by an open-well, closed-string stair that ascends to the second floor. The stair has a square newel, molded handrail, and finely turned balusters. The hall doorways are framed within finely molded surrounds. A wooden wainscot with a molded chair rail together with a dentiled cornice add further embellishment. The parlor contains a finely executed Federal mantel, pedestal chair rail and baseboard. A dentiled cornice, similar to that found in the hall, ornaments the room. The second-floor chamber also contains a finely executed mantel. The interior of the 1916 addition is undistinguished.

A wood-frame smokehouse and several sheds were erected in 1916 to replace earlier outbuildings. Approximately 100 yards to the north of the house is the Cedar Grove cemetery. The 19th-century cemetery contains the graves of the Christian family, including Letitia Christian Tyler, the first wife of President John Tyler.

#### BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The nominated property of fourteen acres includes the house, cemetery, and the outbuildings. It is a small fraction of the 342 acres held by Robert Christian in 1789. The cemetery contains Christian family graves, and the outbuildings are replacements of older structures.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Cedar Grove is a landmark to the social and cultural past of New Kent County and rural Tidewater generally. It was the farm residence of the Christians, a leading county family of colonial and early-Republican times, and architecturally reflects their standing. Letitia Christian, the first wife of President John Tyler grew up, was married, and is buried at Cedar Grove. The house, built ca. 1810 by Robert Christian, is, in its exterior design, a somewhat provincial adaptation of typical Richmond town houses of the period. While the keystone arches, mantels, and dentil cornices are in keeping with architectural fashions in the capital city, the house's staircase is Georgian in feeling, underscoring a country location twenty miles from Richmond. The most notable of a number of early-19th-century graves in the Christian family cemetery at Cedar Grove is that of Letitia Christian Tyler. The remains of Mrs. Tyler were brought here from the White House following her death in 1842.

Cedar Grove stands on property patented in the 18th century by Anthony Langston and was owned variously in the 18th century by the Bacon and Clopton families. An examination of the tax books reveals that the owner previous to Robert Christian was Thomas Mitchell. Mitchell was charged with 342 acres through 1788. The same 342 acres is charged to Robert Christian beginning in 1789. That same year Christian's taxable chattels included, "7 slaves, 2 horses, and 1 chair," indicating a homestead on his newly acquired land.

Robert Christian served in the General Assembly from New Kent and was a candidate for presidential elector in 1808. He amassed substantial acreage in New Kent. Among his children was Letitia Christian Tyler, who married John Tyler on March 29, 1813. Letitia was born at Cedar Grove, in what is believed to have been an earlier 18th-century frame section that had been attached to the brick house. The older portion was removed ca. 1916 for the present frame wing. According to tradition it was Letitia's abilities as a plantation supervisor that enabled Tyler to engage in a successful political career. Due to poor health, the First Lady shunned public appearances and maintained a private apartment in the White House where she died on September 10, 1842.

By 1815 the Cedar Grove house was valued at \$2,500, a substantial amount. Robert Christian died in 1822, and the property was then charged to his son, John B. Christian. The house remained in the immediate family until it was acquired by a great-nephew of Robert Christian. The name "Cedar Grove" does not appear in the early tax books, although it does appear in an 1850 deed and on the 1864 Civil War maps.
