Tuesdays, September 10, 2013–June 17, 2014
Grades: 3 and up; can be read aloud to all ages

“Magical Dinner Table” by Deborah Drezon Carroll
September 10, 2013–November 26, 2013

This family-friendly adventure tale entertains as it educates readers about the importance of the family dinner. It's a wonderful story about a family that travels through time and space once they begin having dinner together. Along the way they meet incredibly interesting people like Franz Kafka and George Washington Carver. They learn history and culture, food lore and fascinating facts. Most of all, they learn that families who connect share a magical bond that can't be broken.

“Civil Rights” by John Colgan-Davis
Tuesday, December 3, 2013–March 11, 2014

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. dreamed of a world where all people had equal rights. Have we achieved that goal? Students are challenged to learn the history of the civil rights movement and to think about the future of equal rights for all. This 12-part series was written by a humanities teacher and is a terrific and compelling read.

“The Secret Life” by Elizabeth McDavid Jones
March 18, 2014–June 17, 2014

There are many mysteries and secrets brewing in 11-year-old Susan's life. The new boarder is not what she seems. Susan is secretly pretending to be a boy in order to work shining shoes to help the family's financial woes. Mum goes off to visit a relative and disappears. The year is 1914. The setting is New York City, but the message is one of national importance because, behind it all is the inspiring inside story of the movement to earn the right to vote for women. And earn it they did. Without firing a single shot, women won the vote, changing our democracy forever. For 150 years our country excluded more than half of the population. In reading this story, students will learn how this changed only after one of the most remarkable and successful nonviolent efforts the world has ever seen. The women's suffrage movement is a record of the experiences of ordinary citizens like the characters in this story. It's vital that students learn more about this history in order to appreciate and understand the value of democracy. The suffrage story is just like this serial — a dramatic tale filled with intrigue, dedication, frustration, commitment, success and failure.
