The Young Masters Program helps children develop their unique talents in music, theatre, dance, visual arts, literature and media arts. This program stimulates outstanding students involved in arts education and creates a mentoring relationship between the student and the instructor. The student may be enrolled in a program through their school or receive private lessons from a qualified professional instructor. Grants of up to \$2500 per year will be provided to successful applicants for a period of three years.

The Young Masters Program provides exemplary students who are engaged in arts studies with the financial help they need to pursue advanced study in the areas of visual arts, literature, media arts, music, theatre, and dance.

The recipients receive the title of Young Master and will be granted scholarships of up to \$2500 per year for three years to further their studies in their chosen arts disciplines. "These young artsists were identified as Young Masters due to their phenomenal artistic ability as well as their dedication to developing their talents and knowledge in their chosen discipline," said TCA Chair Patty Bryant. "The Commission takes great pride in helping these young people become prominent artists of the next generation."

In order to be considered for the award, students must be U.S. citizens living in Texas and participating in a school-based program, a summer institute, a specialized course of study or receiving private lessons from a qualified professional instructor. They must maintain passing grades in all academic areas. Young Masters are selected by a citizen panel of experts from across the state, based on their level of potential, level of commitment, and quality of their proposed plan of action. Applications will be available through the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA). Students, their parents, and their instructors are all required to provide information as part of the application process. A completed application will include a narrative describing the course of study, and the

intended impact of the student's learning and need. Active participation on the part of the parent(s)/guardian is required, and a description of the parental participation will be an important component in the narrative on the application.

Applicants must submit audio visual materials specific to their arts discipline to demonstrate their artistic ability. Proof that the student is maintaining passing grades in other academic areas will be required. The application will also require signatures of the parents, instructor, and student. Lastly, application will require a budget showing anticipated expenditures.

SELECTION PROCESS

The TCA convenes a panel of experts from throughout the state to review the applications. The applications are reviewed based on the following criteria:

OPPORTUNITY: Will support for the application provide an opportunity not otherwise available to the student (because of economic need, geographic isolation, or lack of appropriate expertise/opportunity within the community to pursue specific artist development/genre)?

QUALITY OF THE PLAN: Has the mentor or program designed a course of study and involvement for the student that is likely to achieve the intended goals?

COMMITMENT: Has the applicant provided substantial evidence that there is a strong commitment on the part of the student, instructor, and parents to the success of the program?

POTENTIAL/ARTISTIC MERIT: Does the student currently evidence a high level of aptitude and skill in their chosen field?

EVALUATION: Successful applicants are required to submit a written report each year of the scholarship.



APPLICATION DEADLINE

Applications must be postmarked by November 15 of odd numbered years. The next Young Masters application deadline is November 15, 2011.



AWARD DISTRIBUTION

Initial awards will be made in the summer of the first year. Payment in subsequent years will be made upon receipt and approval of the final report from the previous year.




