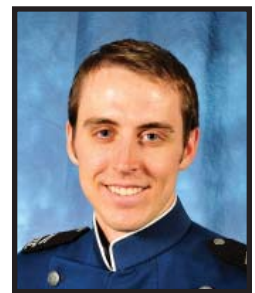

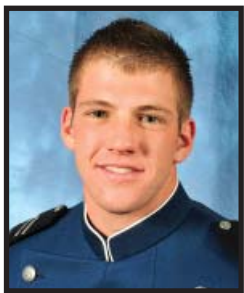

THE USAFA

The United States Air Force Academy offers a four-year program of instruction and experience designed to educate, train and inspire men and women to become officers of character, motivated to lead the United States Air Force in service to our nation. Each cadet graduates with a bachelor of science degree and a commission as a second lieutenant in the Air Force.

COURSE OF STUDY

Cadets are exposed to a balanced curriculum that provides the knowledge, skills and responsibilities essential to a career Air Force officer. The entire USAFA experience is integrated and mapped to achieve a set of desired outcomes in every graduate.

The core academic curriculum includes courses in basic sciences, engineering, social sciences and humanities. Cadets take additional elective courses to complete requirements for one of 32 major areas of study. About 50 percent of the cadets complete majors in science and engineering; the remainder graduate in the social sciences and humanities. Some of the most popular majors include management, aeronautical engineering, foreign area studies, history, behavioral science, civil engineering, astronautical engineering, electrical engineering and engineering mechanics.

FACULTY COMPOSITION

The majority of the Academy's faculty members, more than 500 total, are Air Force officers. They are selected primarily from career-officer volunteers who have established outstanding records of performance and dedication. Each has at least a master's degree and more than 55 percent have doctorates or other terminal degrees in their field of study.

About 30 percent of the faculty are civilians who bring great depth of disciplinary and educational expertise and provide academic stability and continuity.

Faculty members are intensely focused on cadet learning as an integral part of their officer development. The Air Force Academy has been ranked No. 1 in the nation for the most accessible and involved faculty for four years in a row.

To provide greater contributions by a diverse faculty, the Academy has several distinguished visiting professors and endowed professors who serve one or more years. Officers from other services, as well as officers from allied countries are also members of the faculty. Distinguished civilian and military lecturers also share their expertise with the cadets during the academic year.

ATHLETIC PROGRAM

The Academy's athletic program is designed to improve physical fitness, teach athletic skills and develop leadership qualities. To achieve its goals, the Academy offers some of the most extensive physical education, intramural sports and intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation. Cadets take at least three different physical education courses each year.

MILITARY EDUCATION AND TRAINING

An air, space and cyberspace-oriented military education, training and leadership program begins with basic cadet training and continues throughout the four years. Seniors are responsible for the organizational leadership of the cadet wing, while juniors and sophomores seek to develop team and interpersonal leadership and instructional skills. Cadets are projected into as many active leadership roles as possible to prepare them to be effective Air Force officers.

Fundamental concepts of military organization -- drill, ethics, honor, Air Force heritage and physical training -- are emphasized the first summer during basic cadet training. Freshmen then study the military role in United States society as well as the mission and organization of the Air Force. Sophomores receive instruction in communication skills and juniors study the combat and operational aspects of the Air Force.

The Academy offers courses in flying, navigation, soaring and parachuting, building from basic skills to instructor duties. Some cadets may fly light aircraft with the Cadet Flying Team.

Summer training for cadets is divided into three, three-week training periods. There are a variety of programs available and each cadet is required to complete two training periods each summer with leave during the other period. All new cadets take six weeks of basic cadet training in their first summer.

Combat survival training is a required three-week program during cadets' second summer. For other second-summer training periods, cadets have options such as working with Airmen in an operational unit at an Air Force installation, airborne parachute training, soaring or basic free-fall parachute training.

During their last two summers, all cadets are offered leadership training as supervisors or instructors in the summer programs listed above.

Extracurricular activities also are an integral part of the education program. The cadet ski club, drum and bugle corps, cadet chorale and forensics are a few of the programs available.

NOMINATIONS

HISTORY OF THE ACADEMY

In 1948, a board of leading civilian and military educators was appointed to plan the curriculum for an academy that would meet the needs of the newly established Air Force. The board determined that Air Force requirements could not be met by expanding the other service academies and recommended an Air Force Academy be established without delay.

In 1949, then Secretary of the Air Force W. Stuart Symington appointed a commission to assist in selecting a site and on April 1, 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorized creation of the United States Air Force Academy. After considering 580 sites in 45 states, the commission narrowed the choice to three locations. The summer of 1954, Secretary of the Air Force Harold Talbott selected a site near Colorado Springs, Colo. Colorado contributed \$1 million toward purchase of the property.

In July 1955, the first Academy class entered interim facilities at Lowry Air Force Base, Denver, while construction began. It was sufficiently completed for occupancy by the cadet wing in late August 1958. Initial construction cost was \$142 million.

Women entered the Academy on June 28, 1976, as members of the class of 1980.

USAFA SENIOR LEADERSHIP

Lt. Gen. Michael C. Gould



Lt. Gen. Michael C. Gould is Superintendent, U.S. Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colo. He directs a four-year academic, military training, athletic and character development program leading to a bachelor's degree and commission as an Air Force officer.

The general is a graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy's Class of 1976. His career encompasses a wide range of assignments, ranging from head football coach of the Air Force Academy Preparatory School, to serving as Air Force aide to the President of the United States.

He has held numerous command positions at the group, wing and numbered air force level, and was commander of Cheyenne Mountain Operations Center during 9/11. Prior to his return to the Academy, he was Director of Operations and Plans, U.S. Transportation Command, Scott Air Force Base, Ill. General Gould is a command pilot with more than 3,000 flying hours in the T-38, T-41, KC-10, C-5, C-17, C-21, C-141 and KC-135R.

The general's military awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Defense Superior Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, Meritorious Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, Air Force Commendation Medal, Air Force Achievement Medal and the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Dr. Hans J. Mueh



Dr. Hans J. Mueh is in his eighth year as the director of athletics at the Air Force Academy. A retired Air Force brigadier general, Mueh was vice dean of faculty for two years prior to his retirement from active duty in the summer of 2004. Mueh was heavily involved in Academy athletics before becoming director of athletics. He was the Academy's faculty athletics representative from 1996-2004 and was a long-time member of the board of directors for the Air Force Academy Athletics Association.

Since becoming the director of athletics, Mueh has led the Academy to some remarkable feats. In 2007, the Academy was one of only three schools (Michigan State and Boston College) to reach post-season play in football (2007), men's basketball and ice hockey (2006-07). It marked the first time a service academy has ever had a team compete in the post-season in all three sports.

In addition, under Mueh's watch the men's basketball team has played in an NCAA tournament and the National Invitational Tournament's Final Four. Mueh hired current head coach Jeff Reynolds and helped him continue Air Force's winning tradition last season. The ice hockey team has won three straight conference championships and made three straight appearances in the NCAA tournament. Mueh was on the selection committee that hired current head coach Frank Serratore and led the Academy's move into the Athletic Hockey Association. The women's basketball program has shown steady improvement and tied a school record with four league wins in 2006-07.

The football program, the Academy's flagship sport, went through a major overhaul. Mueh led the transition from the retirement of the legendary Fisher DeBerry after 23 years at the helm to hiring current head coach Troy Calhoun, a 1989 Academy graduate. Calhoun's impact was immediate, leading the Falcons to a 9-4 overall mark and a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference in 2007. The Falcons qualified for their first bowl game in five years, playing in the Armed Forces Bowl in 2007 and 2008.

Mueh has been just as successful behind the scenes with the administration of the department. Mueh restructured the department with an internal/external model that has streamlined resources and made the department more effective from top to bottom. In addition, he has the department on course to become a federally chartered non-profit organization which will lead to more fund-raising opportunities.

Mueh has also been active within the conference and the NCAA. He was recently selected to be part of the NCAA Division I Amateurism Cabinet and has been active on the NCAA's academics/eligibility compliance cabinet, the men's golf committee and the region 7 postgraduate scholarship committee. Mueh has been equally active within the conference on various leadership committees. He is currently on the awards and recognition committee and has previously served on the joint council executive committee, and committees on championships, television and sportsmanship.

Before assuming his duties as vice dean at the Academy, Mueh was permanent professor and head of the department of chemistry at the Academy, a position he held since October 1987 where he oversaw the annual design and instruction of 25 undergraduate courses for 1,500 cadets annually.

Mueh was born Jan. 8, 1944, in Celle, Germany, and emigrated to the United States in 1951. He entered the Air Force in 1962 as a member of the Academy's eighth graduating class, and graduated with a bachelor of science degree in chemistry in 1966. While at the Academy, Mueh was a two-year letterwinner in soccer as a goalie. He still holds the Academy record for saves in a game with 30, accomplishing it twice in 1965 against North Carolina and Benedictine. In his junior and senior years, Mueh helped the Falcons to the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Soccer League championship and quarterfinal berths in the NCAA tournament.

Following graduation, Mueh completed two assignments in intelligence before attending the University of Wisconsin where he earned his master's degree in chemistry in 1970. He later earned a doctorate degree in chemistry from Wisconsin in 1976 as a distinguished graduate. He has also completed Squadron Officer School, Air Command and Staff College and Air War College.

Between earning the two degrees, Mueh returned to the Academy as an instructor in the department of chemistry from 1970-72. He also served as assistant soccer coach and played semi-pro soccer with the Aurora Internationals in Denver during those two years, leading the Internationals to the Colorado state title in 1971. He volunteered for duty in Vietnam and served as an intelligence officer in Saigon, Republic of Vietnam and at Nakhon Phanom RTAB, Thailand, in 1972 and 1973. After earning his doctorate degree, Mueh returned to the Academy in 1976 as an associate professor of chemistry. He remained at the Academy except for a stint in 1985-86 as the special assistant for technical matters at the Defense Intelligence Agency at the Pentagon.

In 1986, he assumed the position of acting head, department of chemistry, before being selected for his position of permanent professor and head of the department of chemistry in 1987. As faculty athletics representative, he was active in both the Western Athletic Conference and Mountain West Conference, and was the Academy's representative on the transition team to form the new MWC, the only faculty athletics representative on the team. He competes in golf, racquetball, handball and tennis, and has promoted Air Force Academy intercollegiate sports throughout his tenure, beginning with work as chairman of the hockey eligibility committee, officer representative to the men's golf team and five years as the officer representative to the football team.

Mueh is married to the former Sally Flax of Cincinnati, Ohio. They have three children, Kristine, Kurt and Deborah.

Dr. Mueh is in his eighth season as the Director of Athletics. In 2006-07, Air Force was one of just three Division I schools to reach post-season play in football, men's basketball and ice hockey and the first service academy to accomplish the remarkable feat.

USAFA ATHLETICS

Few schools in the country have an athletic program as extensive as the Air Force Academy's.

The goals of the athletic program are to enhance the physical conditioning of all cadets, to develop the physical skills necessary for officership, to teach leadership in a competitive environment and to build character. There are three subdivisions of the athletic program: intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and physical education.

The intercollegiate program has 17 men's and 10 women's NCAA-sanctioned teams, facing some of the top competition in the nation. Men's teams are football, baseball, basketball, ice hockey, cross-country, fencing, golf, gymnastics, indoor and outdoor track, lacrosse, rifle, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, water polo and wrestling. The Academy fields women's teams in basketball, cross-country, fencing, gymnastics, rifle, indoor and outdoor track, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis and volleyball. In addition, the Academy sponsors two non-NCAA programs; boxing and cheerleading.

The majority of the Academy's men's and women's programs compete at the NCAA Division I level in the Mountain West Conference. The Falcons compete in this conference against teams from Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, TCU, UNLV and Wyoming. All sports also compete against non-conference opponents, including many nationally-ranked teams.

The football team competes annually for the Commander-in-Chief's Trophy, which is emblematic of service academy football supremacy. The Falcons have won the trophy 18 times, which is more than any other academy. The winner of the annual rivalry visits the White House to have the trophy presented by the President of the United States.



The USAFA Cadet Field House is one of the most impressive buildings in the country. It's a modern, versatile structure with seemingly endless uses. The \$5.6 million building is five stories high and 396 feet by 426 feet, the size of three football fields laid side by side. The structure is divided into three areas--basketball arena, ice hockey arena and multipurpose area. The three sections have a combined seating capacity of more than 9,000.

Clune Arena seats 5,858. The Cadet Ice Rink has a seating capacity of 2,470, while the multi-purpose area seats 1,000 fans for track and field competitions.

The department's newest facility, the Holaday Athletic Center (above), was completed in July 2011.

Air Force head coach Jeff Reynolds guided the Falcons to a 16-16 record last season and a spot in the CollegeInsider.com tournament, AFA's first post-season appearance since 2007. The Falcons were 6-10 in the Mountain West, good for a sixth-place tie with Utah. Reynolds led Air Force, which was picked ninth in the preseason poll, to the biggest jump of any MWC team from predicted to actual finish.

Reynolds enters the 2011-12 campaign after losing three seniors to graduation and one sophomore to a transfer that accounted for nearly 50 percent of the team's scoring and 46 percent of the team's rebounding.

Senior co-captains Taylor Stewart and Shawn Hempsey are each back for his fourth year. Stewart appeared in 28 games last season and started both games at the Sun Bowl Invitational in El Paso, Texas. He averaged 3.2 points and 1.6 rebounds per game and scored a season-high 11 points at Colorado State. Stewart also dished out a career-best five assists against the Rams and pulled down a season-high seven rebounds against North Carolina Central.

Meanwhile, Hempsey played in 25 games and scored a career-high nine points against North Carolina Central and Sam Houston State. He averaged 1.1 points and one rebound per game off the bench last year. The other senior on the squad, Scott Stucky, played in two games and scored the first points of his career at Wright State after missing his first two seasons with a pair of knee injuries.

The junior class has high expectations after two solid seasons. Leading the way is Michael Lyons, a third-team all-Mountain West pick last year and the conference's top returning scorer for the 2011-12 campaign. He averaged 13.7 points and 3.5 rebounds a year ago when he started 30 of AFA's 31 games. Lyons scored at least 20 points seven times, including a career-high 26 points in a 77-69 victory over Utah at Clune Arena.

Lyons is also the Mountain West's top returner in field-goal percentage (finished second at 49.7%) and free-throw percentage (finished third at 78.9%) and he scored the most points by an Air Force sophomore (424)

since AFA's career-leading scorer Raymond Dudley had 444 in 1987-88. While leading the Falcons in scoring 15 times last season, Lyons also led the team with 31 offensive rebounds and was second with 32 steals.

Todd Fletcher is back after starting all 32 games at the point guard position last year. He led the team with 90 assists and enters the '11-12 campaign with a career 1.9 – 1 assist-to-turnover ratio. Fletcher, who scored a career-high 15 points against CSU Northridge, had a career-high six assists three different times and had at least three dimes in 17 different games.

Taylor Broekhuis started 29 games at the center position while Mike Fitzgerald was one of just four players to appear in all 32 games last season. Broekhuis made the most of his opportunity by averaging 7.5 points and 3.4 rebounds per game. He also scored a career-high 19 points against Evansville on 7-of-13 shooting, including a blistering 5-for-10 from three-point range. Entering that game, he was 2-for-35 from 3-point land in his career. Broekhuis was also a solid presence on the defensive end, blocking a team-high 16 shots, including a career-high three against Colorado College. He also grabbed a career-best nine

rebounds in a career-high 41 minutes against CC.

Fitzgerald, meanwhile, averaged 3.3 points and 1.2 rebounds last season. He shot 39.5 percent (17-43) from three-point range and tied his career-high with 13 points at BYU and at home against New Mexico. He will be asked to replace sharp-shooter Tom Fow, who graduated ranked No. 4 on the school's career three-point percentage list at 41.8 percent. Fitzgerald enters this season at 40.2 percent (39-97) for his career.

Adam Brakeville appeared in 19 games and started the first game of his career against Sam Houston State at the Sun Bowl Invitational. Brakeville, who had a career-high four rebounds vs. Florida A&M, sank the first two free throw attempts of his career in the final minute of a 70-65 victory over TCU in the final home regular season game. Meanwhile, Kyle Green, who earned the Falcon Award for 100% effort no matter place on the team, played in five games and scored his first career points and made first career vs. Florida A&M.

Jamil Bailey (five games) and Chase Kammerer (one game) comprise the sophomore class for the 2011-12 season.

Eleven freshmen join the program this season. The group includes seven players

from the USAFA Prep School and four direct entries. The Class of 2015 consists of Scott Adler (6-4, G, Las Cruces, NM), Colt Barnhill (6-7, F, Grayson, KY), Chris Carter (6-3, G, Port St. Lucie, FL), Brian Davidson (6-8, F, Colorado Springs, CO), DeLovell Earls (6-5, 215, Colorado Springs, CO), Daniel Grieves (6-7, F, Gulfport, MS), Justin Hammonds (6-7, G/F, Houston, TX), Marek Olesinski (6-8, F, Roswell, NM), Rafael Rojas-Reyes (6-4, G, Brawley, CA), Kamryn Williams (6-4, F, Colorado Springs, CO) and Max Yon (6-5, G, San Antonio, TX).

The seven players from the Prep School each played at least 21 of the team's 30 games last season. Carter led the team in scoring and assists, averaging 11.8 points and 3.6 assists per game, while Williams was the team's top rebounder at 4.6 per contest. Barnhill (56%), Earls (52%) and Williams (51%) each shot better than 50 percent from the field and Adler (41%) and Olesinski (40%) were the shooting leaders from three-point range. Rojas-Reyes, meanwhile, paced the team by shooting 90 percent (18-of-20) from the free-throw line.

Eight opponents that played in post-season tournaments last season, including the season-opener against Army and a game at perennial NCAA Tournament participant Gonzaga, highlight the 2011-12 Air Force men's basketball schedule.

Air Force opens the regular season by hosting the first annual All-Military Classic Nov. 11-12 at Clune Arena. The Falcons will face service-academy rival Army in the season opener, while Citadel and VMI will play in the other first-round game. It will mark Army's first-ever appearance at Air Force. The third-place and championship games will be played on Saturday, Nov. 12. This is the first of a four-year contract for the tournament, with each school hosting once.

The Falcons renew their rivalry with the University of Colorado on Nov. 23 at Clune Arena. The two schools have not played since the 2007-08 campaign. Air Force's first road game is against Drake on Dec. 3 as part of the Mountain West / Missouri Valley Challenge Series. Three more games at Clune follow,

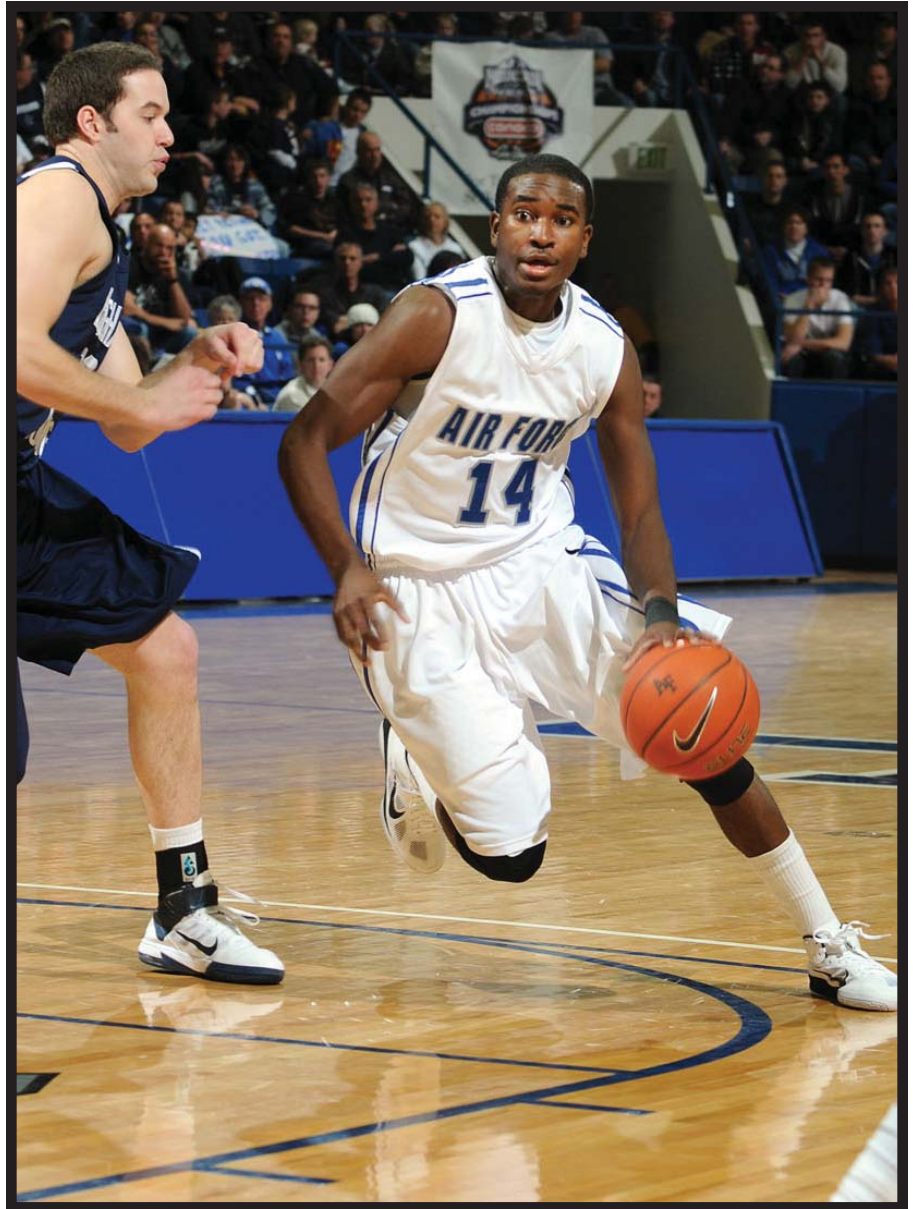
Wright State (Dec. 7), Arkansas-Pine Bluff (Dec. 10) and Maryland-Eastern Shore (Dec. 17).

The game at Gonzaga is scheduled for Dec. 22 and then the Falcons will travel to Santa Clara, Calif., to play in the Cable Car Classic Dec. 29-30. Air Force opens with Wagner, while Santa Clara and Eastern Michigan play in the other first-round game.

Three consecutive home games against Johnson & Wales (Jan. 3), Chicago State (Jan. 6) and Texas Pan-American (Jan. 9) round out the non-conference games.

Air Force opens the new-look Mountain West schedule against conference newcomer Boise State on Jan. 14 in Boise, Idaho, followed by a home game against Wyoming on Jan. 18. Road games at defending MW Tournament champion San Diego State (Jan. 21) and TCU (Jan. 15) precede a pair of home games against UNLV on Jan. 28 and New Mexico on Jan. 31. The first half of the conference slate ends on Feb. 4 at Colorado State.

HEAD COACH DAVE PILIPOVICH



Dave Pilipovich became the eighth head coach in the history of the Air Force men's basketball program on February 8, 2012 and named permanent head coach on March 3. Pilipovich was in his fifth season as a member of the coaching staff and first as associate head coach when he was promoted to head coach after Jeff Reynolds was relieved of his duties.

Pilipovich helped Air Force to a 16-14 record in his first season as an assistant (2007-08) and was instrumental in the falcons making the CollegeInsider.com Tournament last year, the team's first postseason appearance since 2007.

Prior to joining the Falcons, Pilipovich spent two years with the University of Michigan basketball program. In his first season with the Wolverines, he served as the administrative assistant to head coach Tommy Amaker, then was an assistant coach during the 2006-07 campaign.

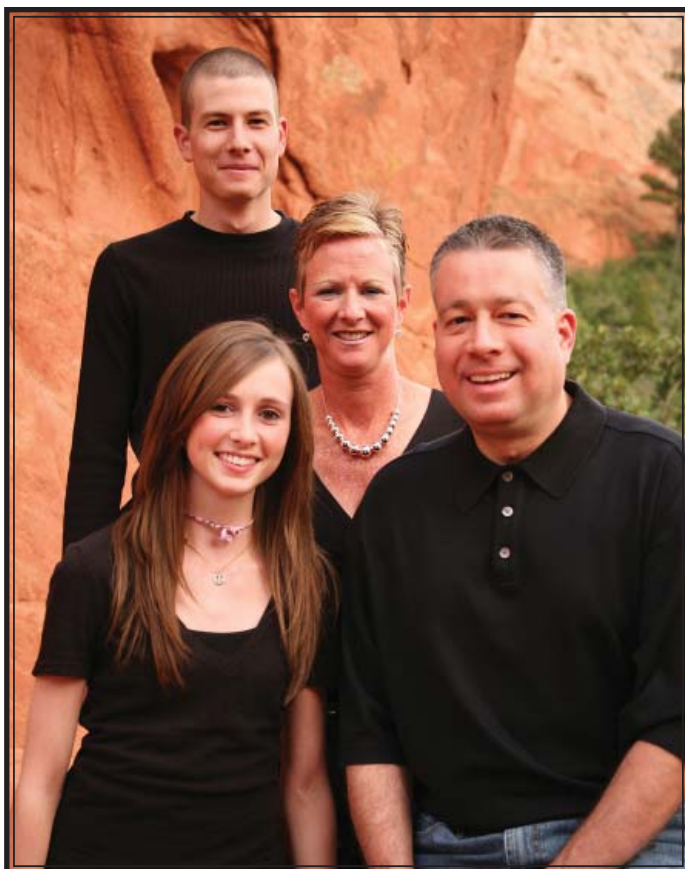
Pilipovich has 25 years of coaching experience under his belt. He served as an assistant coach at Eastern Michigan University for five years (2000-05) prior to joining the Michigan staff. Before his stint at EMU, he served four

ASSISTANT COACH SILVEY DOMINGUEZ



Silvey Dominguez joins the Falcon staff as an assistant coach for the 2011-12 season. Dominguez, who is very familiar with the Air Force basketball program and the Mountain West Conference, replaces Rob Pryor, who left the Academy to become head coach at Shenendoah University.

Dominguez, 58, was an assistant coach under Reggie Minton at Air Force from 1988-91 and has coached at five current Mountain West schools. He brings nearly three decades of experience to the Air Force program, having coached at the Division I level for the last 21 years and been a part of three NCAA Tournament teams and two NIT squads.

Most recently, Dominguez served as an assistant coach at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, from 2008-10. He was the Cardinals' recruiting coordinator, oversaw the basketball program's contract with Nike and assisted with game scheduling.

Dominguez spent the 2007-08 season as the director of basketball operations at New Mexico during Steve Alford's first year in Albuquerque. He was responsible for coordinating team travel, scheduling, academics and maintaining Alford's daily schedule. The Lobos posted a 24-9 record - a nine-win improvement from the year before - and advanced to the MasterCard Postseason NIT.

He previously served on Steve McClain's staff at Wyoming from 2003-07. The Cowboys won 57 games while Dominguez was the recruiting coordinator and handled scheduling in addition to his on-court coaching and scouting responsibilities.

Dominguez went to Wyoming after one season at the University of Utah where he was Rick Majerus' top assistant for the 2002-03 campaign. That year the Utes won the Mountain West regular-season title and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. He spent the 2001-02 season as an assistant coach at UTEP.

Prior to that, he was an assistant for five years at the University of Southern California (1996-2001). In his final season at USC, the Trojans advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. USC made two other postseason tournament appearances with him as a member of its coaching staff - going to the NAAs in 1997 and the NIT in 1999.

Three of the players Dominguez recruited to USC were selected in the NBA Draft. Brian Scalabrine and Jeff Trepagnier were chosen by New Jersey and Cleveland, respectively, in 2001. Sam Clancy went to Philadelphia in 2002.

Dominguez' coaching career has been primarily in the West. He began as an assistant at Western New Mexico in 1979. From there, he coached at Southern Colorado (1984-86) before joining Boyd Grant's staff at Colorado State in 1986. He was there for two seasons, before joining Minton's staff at Air Force in '88. Dominguez then moved on to St. Mary's (Calif.) from 1991-96.

A 1977 graduate of New Mexico with a bachelor's degree in political science and Spanish, Dominguez received his MBA in business administration from Western New Mexico in 1981.

A native of Grants, N.M., Dominguez is single.

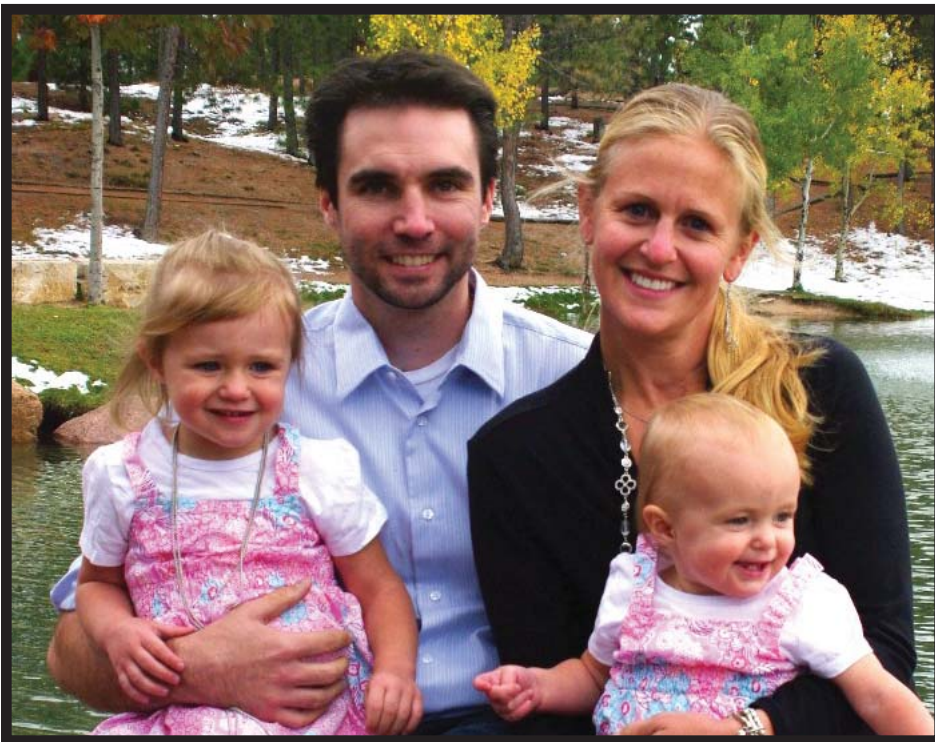
Drew Long enters his second season on the Air Force coaching staff in 2011-12 after spending three seasons on the basketball staff at the University of Colorado.

ASSISTANT COACH CAPT. TOM BELLAIRS



Capt. Tom Bellairs begins his third season on the Falcon coaching staff in 2011-12. Previously, Bellairs was an assistant basketball coach at the USAFA Prep School during the 2003-04 campaign, helping the Huskies to a 31-3 record. Prior to joining the Air Force program this season, Bellairs spent five years at Los Angeles Air Force Base working in the GPS Wing on the User Equipment Group, primarily building the next generation GPS devices for the modern warfighter.

Bellairs, who earned his bachelor's degree in management from the Academy in 2003, enjoyed a stellar basketball career with the Falcons. A four-year letterwinner, he is No. 3 on AFA's career rebounding list with 694 and 32nd on the scoring list with 914 points. Bellairs, who started 98 of his 108 career games, is the only Air Force player to lead the team in rebounding in each of his four seasons.

He took the Mountain West Conference by storm as a freshman in 1999-00 when he was named co-freshman of the year and a member of the all-newcomer team by the league. He finished second in the conference in rebounding, averaging 9.2 boards per game, the highest single-season average by an Air Force player since the 1980-81 campaign. Bellairs was the only MWC player to average a double-double in league games that season and set a freshman school record with eight double-doubles.

Bellairs, who had 13 double-doubles in his career, scored a career-high 25 points against Arkansas State as a junior and pulled down a career-best 18 rebounds vs. Dartmouth in his first

career start as a freshman. His 90.9 percent (10-of-11) shooting from the floor against Arkansas State is tied for the fourth-best single-game percentage in school history.

While coaching at the Prep School, Bellairs was selected to the All-Air Force and All-Armed Forces basketball teams and represented the United States in the 3rd World Military Games in Cantania, Italy. In 2004, he helped the U.S. Armed Forces team to the gold medal at the 41st SHAPE (Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe) Basketball Tournament in Mons, Belgium.

His international basketball experience includes playing for the AHEPA (American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association) team since he was a student at Mullen High school in Denver, Colo. In 2008, the team was invited to play several games in Athens, Greece, and defeated the Greek Junior National Team at Olympic Stadium.

Bellairs, who attended Squadron's Office School for military training this spring, completed his master's degree in business administration from the University of Southern California in 2010.

Bellairs married Sassa Witherspoon on Sept. 18, 2010 in Denver, Colo. They reside in Colorado Springs.

Andrew is currently permanent professor and head of the department of mathematical sciences and he chairs the five-department

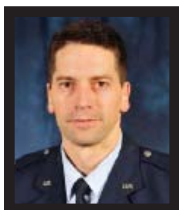
basic sciences division at USAFA. He also served as vice dean (vice provost) of the faculty from 2008-10.

Sedelmyer came to the Academy in 1997 after spending three years

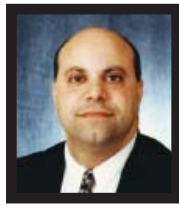
at the Foundation Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation in Madisonville, Ky.

CABLE CAR CLASSIC

In 1967 the Cable Car Classic was founded by Art Santo Domingo, a former public relations director of the San Francisco Giants, and his long-time friend, the late Harry Jupiter, a sports writer for the San Francisco Examiner, who passed away three years ago. This year's Classic will feature host-Santa Clara, Eastern Michigan, Air Force and Wagner.

In 31 of the Classic's 44 years, the Classic has featured a team that would receive a bid to the NCAA Tournament just months later. For 10 years it has featured multiple teams who would later advance. The 1995 Cable Car Classic proved to be one of the strongest fields with all four teams advancing to the 1996 NCAA Tournament in March. Penn State won the Cable Car Classic with Georgia Tech, Santa Clara and Bradley also making the post-season. Georgia Tech won the ACC that year as well.

Those participating in past Cable Car Classics read like a who's who in college basketball history. From the Santa Clara teams of the 1960's and '70's that featured the talents of Bud Ogden, Dennis Awtrey and Kurt Rambis and the USF squads, led by Kevin Restani, Winford Boynes and Bill Cartwright to traditional basketball powers such as Dean Smith's North Carolina Tar Heels featuring Michael Jordan and James Worthy and the Ralph Sampson-led Virginia Cavaliers, to the '90s with Stephen Marbury of Georgia Tech to this century's teams, including one of the Air Force Academy's best-ever teams in 2006.

The Falcons won the Cable Car Classic in 2006, defeating George Washington, 66-52, in the first round and host Santa Clara, 78-48 in the championship game. Jacob Burtschi was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

The Mountain West

THE MOUNTAIN WEST

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 13th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements over its first 12 years of existence, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. Additionally, the Mountain West was the first conference to have a member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in 2005). With San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of two conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL, NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999. In 2011-12, the Mountain West will be among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundar-

ies, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders three MW institutions (Air Force, newest member Boise State and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West) and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of TCU.

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. TCU re-joined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06. Effective July 1, 2011, Boise State University became the newest member. California State University, Fresno and the University of Nevada, Reno will join the Mountain West effective July 1, 2012. Also on July 1, 2012, the University of Hawai'i will become a football-only member of the Conference.

When the Mountain West officially began operations on July 1, 1999, the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN, giving the broadcaster exclusive national television rights to MW football and men's basketball, and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl. Commissioner Craig Thompson also arranged a third bowl tie-in each of the first three seasons (1999 Motor City, 2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans) before securing a four-year deal with the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco in 2002. Entering the 2011 season, the MW has four contracted bowl affiliations – the



Bill Doleman and Marius Payton of The Mtn.

MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, San Diego Country Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, AdvoCare V100 Independence Bowl and Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in five inaugural bowl games (2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans, 2002 San Francisco (Emerald), 2005 Poinsettia, 2006 New Mexico), as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

From the gridiron to the diamond, Mountain West teams enjoyed an outstanding year in 2010-11. For the third consecutive year, the MW sent a record five football teams to bowl games, posting the best win percentage among the 11 FBS conferences for the fourth time in seven years. The Mountain West finished with a 4-1 (.800) mark in postseason play and claimed the 2010-11 Bowl Challenge Cup, becoming the only conference to win the trophy four times since the award's inception in 2002-03. Two MW teams were ranked in the final BCS Standings and USA Today/ESPN Coaches polls for the third straight year. TCU's No. 3 BCS ranking marked the highest finish by a non-automatic-qualifying team in the final BCS Standings, surpassing the Horned Frogs' No. 4 ranking in 2009. The Horned Frogs' automatic bid to the Rose Bowl marked the MW's fourth BCS bowl game since 2004. The MW set a record for attendance with 1.86 million fans coming to football games in the 2010 season.

Three men's basketball teams represented the Mountain West in the 2011 NCAA Tournament, marking the 11th time in the last 12 years the Conference has sent multiple teams to the Big Dance. Regular season co-champion San Diego State captured the MW Tournament title to earn the league's automatic bid, while MW co-regular-season champion BYU was joined by UNLV in receiving at-large invitations. San Diego State and BYU advanced to the Sweet Sixteen.

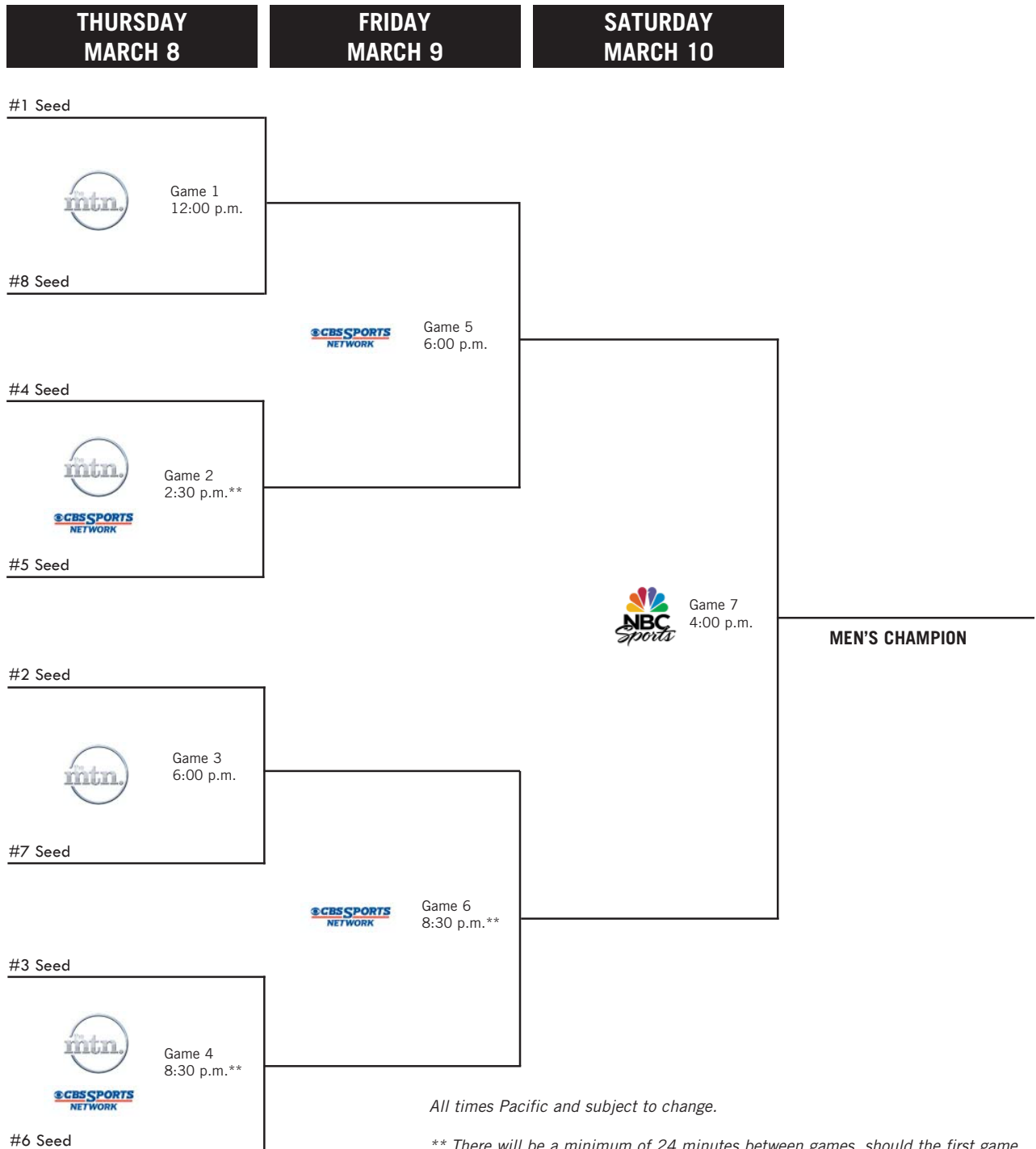

The Bob Spear Award is given to the player that is outstanding in all areas of the Academy -- academics, athletics and military performance. The award started in 1991 and is named for former head coach Bob Spear. Known as the "Father of Air Force Basketball," he coached the Falcons from 1957-71. Spear led the Falcons to a 177-175 record and is the winningest coach in school history. Spear led Air Force to winning seasons in seven of his 15 years and the school's first two NCAA Tournament appearances. His 1960 and 1962 squads were selected to the Midwest Regional. Spear also coached two of Air Force's five All-Americans (Bob Beckel and Cliff Parsons). Aaron Benson was the inaugural winner of the award following the 1990-91 campaign. Derek Brooks won the award last season.

Born in East Chicago, Ind., Popovich, a 1970 graduate of the Air Force Academy, is the son-in-law of the late Air Force athletic trainer Jim Conboy. As a senior at Air Force, Popovich led the Falcons in scoring with a 14.3 average and served as team captain while helping the team to a 12-12 record.

He graduated with a degree in Soviet studies, followed by a five-year military commitment in the United States Air Force. Soon thereafter, he made his first foray into coaching, spending six years as an assistant at the Academy. He then spent eight seasons as the head coach of Pomona-Pitzer College in Claremont, Calif., leading the team to its first conference championship in 68 years in 1985-86. He then joined Larry Brown as an assistant for the Spurs. After a two-year stint coaching with Don Nelson at Golden State, Popovich returned to the Spurs as general manager in 1994.

Popovich added head coaching to his long list of responsibilities on Dec. 10, 1996, when he replaced Bob Hill on the Spurs' sideline. With a roster decimated by injuries to key players such as David Robinson and Sean Elliott, the Spurs struggled through the remainder of the season, finishing a lowly 20-62, including 17-47 under Popovich, who

is also the team's executive vice president of basketball operations.

But they struck it rich in the NBA Draft Lottery, coming away with the right to pick first in the 1997 NBA Draft. And as expected, Popovich chose Tim Duncan, the All-American from Wake Forest who teamed with Robinson to form a formidable Twin Towers.

The Spurs soared to 56-26 in 1997-98, setting an NBA record for the greatest single-season turnaround in league history by winning 36 more games than the year before. San Antonio beat Phoenix in the first round of the playoffs but lost to Utah in five games in the Western Conference Semifinals.

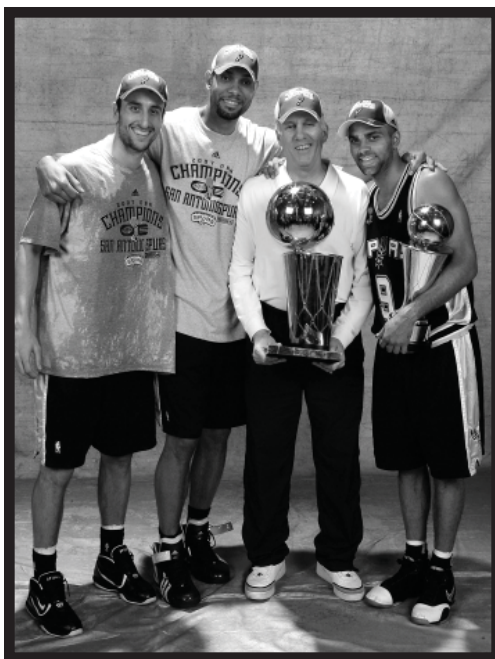
In 1998-99, the Spurs posted a league-best 37-13 record during the strike-shortened regular season and followed that up with a 15-2 mark in the playoffs, beating Minnesota 3-1 and then sweeping the Lakers and Portland before defeating New York 4-1 in the NBA Finals.

Popovich led the Spurs to their second NBA title in 2003 after posting a 60-22 record during the regular season. San Antonio defeated the New Jersey Nets, 4-2, in the NBA Finals. Popovich was named NBA Coach of the Year following the season.

The Spurs gave Popovich his third NBA championship ring in 2005 after posting a 59-23 regular season record. San Antonio defeated the defending champs, Detroit Pistons, in seven games in the NBA Finals. After producing an NBA-high 63 victories during the 2005-06 campaign, the Spurs won their fourth title under Popovich in '06-07 by sweeping the Cleveland Cavaliers in four games. Popovich is one of only two active NBA coaches with multiple NBA titles (Phil Jackson-10) and one of only four coaches in NBA history with at least 100 playoff victories, joining Jackson, Pat Riley and Larry Brown.

Popovich has also been a champion off the court. In 1991, he teamed with Frank Martin to create the Spurs/Pizza Hut Drug-Free Youth Basketball League. Currently, the league plays at 75 locations in and around San Antonio. More than 20,000 boys and girls – ages 7 to 16 – played in the league in 2002-03 (Spurs guard Devin Brown played in the Spurs Drug-Free League). Prior to each game, every participant takes the Drug-Free League pledge, promising to remain drug and alcohol free while showing good sportsmanship and fair play.

Popovich, active in the San Antonio community, was also honored by President George Bush in February 1992 with a "Daily Point of Light Award" for the Spurs Drug Free Basketball League. He was also named a distinguished graduate by the Academy in 2008.

ATHLETIC COMMUNICATIONS

The Athletic Communications office is located in the Cadet Field House, just outside the northwest tunnel of Clune Arena. The main phone number for the office is 719-333-2313 and the fax number is 719-333-3798.

WORKING MEDIA

Press and photograph credentials are issued to members of the working media only. These credentials may be obtained by contacting the athletic communications office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate passes will be left at the media "Will Call" for you.

RADIO / TELEVISION

Upon receiving permission to broadcast a game at Clune Arena, please contact Jerry Cross in the athletic communications office. Press credentials will be left at the media "Will Call" for you. Telephone lines are the responsibility of the broadcaster. Two ISDN lines and two telephone line have been installed. Please contact Jerry Cross for the phone numbers.

PRESS PARKING

Parking will be available for media on the west side of the Cadet Field House. Please contact Jerry Cross in the athletic communications office to obtain a parking pass and specific directions.

POST-GAME POLICY

Air Force players and head coach Jeff Reynolds will hold a press conference 10-15 minutes following the end of each home game in the media interview room. Players will be available first, followed by Reynolds. The Air Force locker room, training room and weight room are closed to all media. Air Force has a closed locker room policy for both home and away games.

WIRELESS CONNECTIONS

Wireless access is available free of charge throughout Clune Arena and the media work room. In addition, eight phone lines are available in the media work room.

MEDIA POLICIES

INTERVIEWS

Players: Air Force players are available for interviews any day the team practices. Players will not be available on non-practice days. All interviews will be scheduled before practice (primarily between 1:30 and 2:15 p.m.). If the requested player is not available before practice, all efforts will be made to conduct the interview after practice. Please request each player at least one day in advance so the player can be properly notified.

Head Coach Jeff Reynolds: Air Force head coach Jeff Reynolds is available on Mondays and Fridays between 1:15 and 1:45 p.m. during the regular season. The Friday session may be changed to another day due to that week's game or travel schedule. Beginning Jan. 2, the Monday session will move to 11 a.m. for the Winter Sports Press Conference. Reynolds will also be available on the Mountain West Conference teleconference on Mondays beginning Jan. 9.

Air Force basketball practices: Media can view / film the first 20 minutes of Air Force basketball practice. Please contact Jerry Cross in the athletic communications office at least one day in advance if you are planning to attend a practice and for practice schedule.

Contacting athletes, coaches and staff: All communications with Air Force cadet-athletes, coaches and staff must go through the athletic communications office – ABSOLUTELY NO EXCEPTIONS. Failure to follow this policy will result in loss of credentials and access to Air Force athletes, coaches and staff. Cadet-athlete's private phone numbers and email addresses will not be issued to the media. Air Force cadet-athletes have also been instructed not to accept calls from media without prior notification from athletic communications.

CREDENTIALS

General: All credentials must be requested from the athletic communications office no later than noon (MT) the day before the game. No credentials will be issued the day of the game. Visiting team media are urged to request credentials through the team they cover and credentials will be distributed in advance of the game. All other credentials will be left at the Media Entrance Will Call the day of the game.

Internet Sites: Only accredited news agency internet sites will be granted game credentials or access to Air Force student-athletes and coaches. All inquiries must be made through the athletic communications office. Accreditation will be determined on a case-by-case basis, but all sites must have a recognized news affiliation.

Photo Credentials: Freelance photography credentials will not be issued unless the photographer has a request on company letterhead from an accredited media outlet. No credentials will be issued to "assistants" - NO EXCEPTIONS.

Single-Game Credentials: Single-game credentials will not be issued to any local media outlet that has not regularly covered Air Force or the competing team, unless space allows.

Season Credentials: Media outlets must regularly cover Air Force (attend weekly media teleconferences and/or games) to be eligible for a season credential. If media outlets request credentials for staff members (columnists, anchors, etc.) that are not always able to attend and that staff member wishes to attend a particular game, they must call at least 48 hours before the game to inform the athletic communications staff for seating purposes. A season credential does not always reserve media members a seat on press row.

Parking: Media parking passes are issued for football and men's basketball only and are on a space-available basis. Media with season credentials and visiting media will have priority in this case. Please contact Jerry Cross in the athletic communications office to obtain a parking pass.

Scouting Credentials: Professional scouting credentials are issued and seats provided as space allows. These requests must be made in advance on company letterhead.

DIRECTIONS TO CLUNE ARENA

From Colorado Springs - Take I-25 North to the North Entrance of the Air Force Academy (Exit 156B). Take the second left (south) on Parade Loop. Take the first right (west) on Field House Drive. The first building on the right is the Cadet Field House. Enter the parking lot on the east side and follow the road around the north side of the building to the media parking lot, which is on the west side of the Field House.

From Denver - Take I-25 South to the North Entrance of the Air Force Academy (Exit 156B). Take the second left (south) on Parade Loop. Take the first right (west) on Field House Drive. The first building on the right is the Cadet Field House. Enter the parking lot on the east side and follow the road around the north side of the building to the media parking lot, which is on the west side of the Field House.

MEDIA ENTRANCE WILL CALL

The media entrance to Clune Arena is on the west side of the Cadet Field House in close proximity to the media parking area. There is a "Will Call" desk for media credentials only at the media entrance.

AIR FORCE BASE SECURITY

The Air Force Academy is located on an active military base. The athletic department facilities are best located by the media by entering the base through the North Entrance (See directions above).

If at any time the base security is heightened, media may lose their access to the base without an escort.

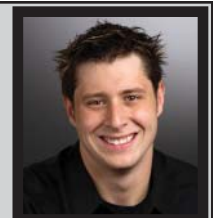
