USS MIAMI (SSN 755) COMMAND HISTORY FOR 1998

1. Command Composition and Organization

Mission: USS MIAMI (SSN 755) is the 44th ship of the Los Angeles class of nuclear attack submarines, but fitted with such advanced modifications that she and her sister ships, beginning with SSN-751, are specially designated as Improved 688 Class submarines. These modifications include retractable bow planes, under ice operation capability, vertical launch Tomahawk Cruise Missile capability, significant ship quieting enhancements, integrated combat systems suite, and improved speed. MIAMI represents the Submarine Forces' premier asset for accomplishing the variety of missions demanded in today's political environment. An independent and powerful anti-ship/anti-submarine asset, she is the ultimate stealth platform, and the singular defense resource capable of covert mining operations, special forces delivery and retrieval, precision land attack strike warfare, sophisticated intelligence gathering, covert communications monitoring, deep arctic operations, visual and electronic surveillance, and regional sea control/denial. Her speed, endurance, versatility, and sustained readiness make MIAMI one of the most formidable, operationally cost-effective, and flexible assets within the country's defense structure.

Anchored in Chesapeake Bay with USS THE SULLIVANS (DDG 68) off the coast of Annapolis, MD. Ships gave familiarization tours for over 1,000 Midshipmen and 100 local VIPs. Officers and CPOs joined the Midshipmen for lunch at King Hall at the United States Naval Academy. The crew enjoyed sightseeing of the United States Naval Academy and the town of Annapolis.

27APR98 Underway for Norfolk Naval Station, Norfolk, VA to investigate and repair hull tile damage caused by the personnel access barge tied alongside the ship while anchored in Chesapeake Bay. The barge damaged SHT tiles during heavy weather encounted on the evening of 26 April 1998.

The crew enjoyed the local attractions of Dubai, shopped at the souks (markets) for gold and persian rugs, and went on local tours, including a Safari Sunset ride in the sand dunes, camel rides, belly dancing and an open-air Arabian dinner under the moonlight.
02DEC98- 11DEC98	Underway in the Arabian Gulf. Embarked nine servicemen and commenced operations as tasked by COMFIFTHFLT.



12DE0		Moored at Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. Heightened threat conditions resulted in crew recall and less than 1 day in port. A small part of the crew was able to get out to see the town and get some gifts and food at the souks and local hotels. The ship was made ready to get underway and departed the next day.
16DE0		Participated in Operation DESERT FOX with the ENTERPRISE Battle Group. The operation involved a series of Tomahawk cruise missile strikes against Iraq. MIAMI has now shot more weapons in a single engagement than any other submarine.
20DE0		Moored at Bahrain. The crew enjoyed some great food, music and dancing at a Christmas Party organized by the MWR staff of the Admin Support Unit, Bahrain. Even with heightened threat conditions and liberty restricted to the base, the crew managed to get some much needed relaxation. We also helped fund a local rug merchant's retirement by buying nearly all of his stock at the pier before we departed.
23DE0 26DE0		Underway and continued operations in the Arabian Gulf with the ENTERPRISE Battle Group.
27D E 0	C98	Transited the Straits of Hormuz and left the Arabian Gulf.
25DE0	C98	Although the crew spent Christmas Day underway, we enjoyed the holiday with some Christmas carols, a reading of the Christmas story, and a fantastic dinner. Christmas boxes and stockings provided by our families were distributed to the crew to open and enjoy.
31DE0	C98	The ship was anchored in the Gulf of Suez on New Year's Eve while

waiting to transit the Suez Canal the next day.
