Angler returns home to win Pike Derby

Kami Merasty's 40-inch pike proved to be the biggest fish caught on Berge Lake June 29, making her the \$10,000 winner of the 2013 Lynn Lake Pike Fishing Derby.

Anglers Darren Dumas, Trevor Kruzer and Bobbie Merasty each pulled in pikes measuring 38.5 inches, providing for a three-way tie for second.

In accordance with derby rules, the three names were placed in a pail and Darren, the first name drawn, received the \$2,000 second-place prize. Trevor received \$1,000 for third place and Bobbie received \$500.

The Hidden length (16.5 inches) draw also resulted in a tie with Jeff Hartman from U.S.A. drawn to take home the \$300 prize.

Department of Natural Redent Jim Shortt. sources donated two ball caps for prizes, which went to the first and last people to register, respectively Christopher Colomb and Tristan Rakowski.

In all, 96 anglers registered for the live-release derby and brought in 124 fish for measuring, the shortest of which measured 15¹/₄ inches.







 Test smoke alarms at least monthly or each time you return to your seasonal home. Pack a new smoke alarm and extra smoke alarm batteries in case they need replacement.

• Install and ensure carbon monoxide alarms in your seasonal home if it has a fuel-burning appliance.

• Develop and practice a home fire escape plan to ensure everyone knows what to do if the smoke alarm sounds.

 Know the telephone number for the local fire department and your seasonal home's emergency sign number, in case of emergency.

 Clean barbecues before using them. Keep an eye on lit barbecues and ensure all combustibles, as well as children and pets are kept well away from them. Fires can happen when barbecues are left unattended.

 Keep barbecue lighters and matches out of sight and reach of children.

• Remember to bring a flashlight

with extra batteries.

• Check heating appliances and chimneys before using them.



Province invests in health of families, babies with Healthy Baby program

The provincial government is investing in the health of mothers and babies through the Healthy Baby Program, Children and Youth Opportunities Minister Kevin Chief announced July 3.

"The Healthy Baby Program supports moms and their families early and gives them financial and community support," said Chief. "Early childhood development programs, like Healthy Baby Manitoba, have shown they give babies a strong start by increasing moms' access to prenatal care, increased breastfeeding rates and decreased number of preterm births."

Chief quoted results from the University of Manitoba's Evaluation of the Manitoba Healthy Baby Program, which showed the program translated into a 1.4 to nine per cent reduction in low birth-weight births, 0.4 to six per cent reduction in preterm births, 10 to 21 per cent increase in breastfeeding initiation and four to 5.7 per cent increase in adequate prenatal care.

The province is making an investment of \$4.5 million for 2013 for the Healthy Baby Program to ensure low-income families can access the program's two components: the Manitoba Prenatal Benefit and the Community Support Program.

"I can't think of an investment that would provide a greater return than one at the stage of a child's life in which their life-long capacity, both intellectual and emotional, is so defined. The employer community must recognize that by supporting early childhood development, they are in fact supporting their future workforce," said Dave Angus, president and CEO, the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce.

The Manitoba Prenatal Benefit is available to all income-eligible pregnant women who live in Manitoba including those who live in First Nations communities. The program provides up to \$81.41 a month to help women meet their extra nutritional needs during pregnancy.

The Healthy Baby Community Programs are delivered through community-based partners at more than 100 sites across the province. Group sessions help pregnant women and new parents with babies up to one year of age connect with other parents, families and health professionals which help ensure healthy outcomes for their babies. Chief said.

"The Healthy Baby Program helps address issues of poverty and nutrition. Families may come for nutritional support such as a healthy snack, but they stay because of the connection they make with other families, health professionals and staff; it all builds toward a strong social support network," said Terrie Redekopp, healthy baby co-ordinator, West Broadway Community Services.

Chief also announced he will go across the province to talk to Manitobans about early childhood development. These public forums and stakeholder meetings - Starting Early, Starting Strong. Join the Conversation - will be held in the months ahead. Visit www.manitoba.ca/cyo/sess.html to give feedback and to find out more about upcoming sessions.


BOIL WATER ADVISORY CONTINUES

Issued by the Medical Officer of Health, Manitoba Health and the Office of the Drinking Water, Manitoba Conservation & Water Stewardship October 12, 2012, the Boil Water Advisory continues.

Until further notice, all water should be brought to a rolling boil for at least one minute before it is used for:

- Drinking and ice making
- Beverage preparation infant formula
 - Preparing food
 - Brushing teeth

It is not necessary to boil tap water used for other household purposes, such as laundry or washing dishes.



Adults and older children that are able to avoid swallowing the water can wash, bathe, or shower.

Young children should be sponged bathed. If boiling is not feasible, an alternative and safe supply of water should be used; i.e. bottled water.

The advisory will remain in effect until testing shows that the water is safe for consumption.

New pain clinic in Thompson first step in plan to increase access to specialists in the region

A new clinic in Thompson General Hospital that is helping northern Manitobans manage chronic pain is part of a larger plan to increase access to medical specialists, says Health Minister Theresa Oswald.

"Health care is a priority for the Manitoba government, just as it is for northerners. This new pain clinic will eventually be a part of the expanded Northern Consultation Clinic, which will be redeveloped to attract and accommodate more visiting specialists to the region," said Oswald. "The result will be more specialized medical services offered closer to home for northern families."

The new pain clinic has been up and running since September, when the Manitoba government and Northern Regional Health Authority provided \$350,000 in new funding to purchase specialized equipment to treat pain disorders. Since that time, pain specialists Dr. Chandran Baker and Dr. Howard Intrater have been offering on-site procedures four days a month such as image-guided injections to control pain caused by damaged nerves and joints.

"Doctors Baker and Intrater have been dedicated in championing and leading this comprehensive pain management clinic, which is the first of its kind outside of Winnipeg," said Helga Bryant, chief executive officer, Northern Regional Health Authority. "We're extremely pleased to have these specialists providing care in our region."

Since the clinic opened, nearly 460

patients have been seen. Of those, 39 were scheduled via Telehealth. Referrals to physiotherapy, mental health supports and dieticians are also available through the clinic.

Infrastructure and Transportation Minister Steve Ashton noted the Manitoba government remains committed to the further expansion of the Northern Consultation Clinic in partnership with the regional health authority and community. A planned \$2-million renovation will attract more visiting specialists to offer even more services in Thompson, such as urologists and additional pediatric specialists, saving close to 1,000 patient trips to and from Winnipeg every year, he said.

"Once complete, the new clinic will also include a learning centre to help solidify Thompson as a centre of excellence for northern medical training," said Ashton. "By helping to attract more students and residents to Thompson as part of their training, the clinic will assist in recruiting and retaining more health-care providers to northern Manitoba and ensure patients requiring specialty services are seen in a timely manner."

The Northern Consultation Clinic currently houses specialists in pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, ear nose and throat and surgery. Telehealth consultations are also available for people living in remote communities.

The expansion project is in its early stages, with construction expected to start in 2015.

Boaters need to have proof of competency

All Boaters are now required to have proof of that they have taken an approved boat safety course.

The Competency of Operators of Pleasure Craft Regulations require all operators of pleasure craft fitted with any type of motor and used for recreational purposes to carry proof of competency on board. Only the Northwest Territories and Nunavut are exempt from this requirement.

Proof of competency indicates the boater has a basic level of boating safety knowledge required for safe recreational boating. In the past, anyone of any age could operate a recreational boat without any minimum boating safety knowledge, experience or training. These requirements were introduced in 1999 in response to boating deaths and injuries, with the goal of improving safety on Canadian waterways through education and training.

Proof of competency can be any of the following:

- A Pleasure Craft Operator Card this is the most common proof, obtained after passing an accredited boating safety test
- Proof of having passed a boating safety course in Canada before April 1, 1999
- A specified marine certificate from the approved list by Transport Canada.
- A completed rental-boat safety checklist good only for the rental period
- For Non-Canadian Visitors, an operator card or equivalent which meets the requirements of their own state or country.
