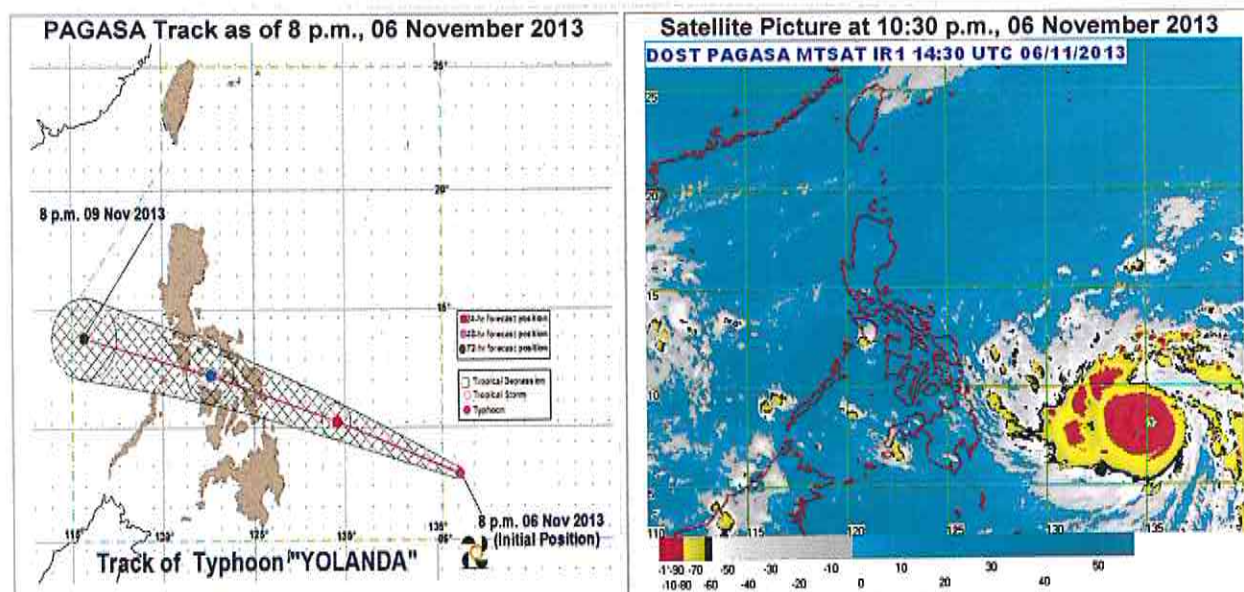
SUBJECT : Severe Weather Bulletin No. 01 re Typhoon "YOLANDA" (HAIYAN)

I. SITUATION OVERVIEW:

The Typhoon East of Mindanao is about to enter the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) and will be named "Yolanda".



Location of Center: (as of 10:00 p.m.)	1,110 km East of Hinatuan, Surigao Del Norte
Coordinates:	8.1°N, 135.5°E
Strength:	Maximum winds of 195 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 230 kph
Movement:	Forecast to move West Northwest at 30 kph
Forecast Positions/Outlook:	<p>Thursday evening: 423 km East Southeast of Guiuan, Eastern Samar</p> <p>Friday evening: 55 km Southeast of Romblon Island</p> <p>Saturday evening: 527 km West Northwest of Coron, Palawan</p>

- Estimated rainfall amount is from 10.0 - 30.0 mm per hour (Heavy - Intense) within the 600 km diameter of the Typhoon.
- Sea travel is risky over the eastern seaboard of Southern Luzon and Eastern Visayas.

You are hereby directed to monitor the situation and undertake precautionary measures in your area of responsibility (AOR). Likewise, the public and the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (DRRMCs) are advised to take appropriate actions.

In order to better inform/warn communities, you are reminded to disseminate these through local/community leaders and through your local media, including community radio stations. Conduct press briefings as often as needed. This local effort will complement and reinforce efforts at the national level. Emphasis should be on proactive actions – evacuation rather than rescue.

Let us untiringly aim for zero casualties.
