• The Lake Express high-speed ferry takes passengers and cars across Lake Michigan, to and from Milwaukee and Muskegon, Michigan in just 2-1/2 hours for a fun, fast and convenient alternative to driving.

• The Port of Milwaukee is host to cruise ships from numerous ports of call, here to visit our beautiful lakefront, marina and downtown area.

Moving Commerce Worldwide

The Port connects southeastern Wisconsin to its neighbors in the Midwest, Canada and the World via the St. Lawrence Seaway, a series of locks and navigation channels linking the Great Lakes to the Atlantic Ocean, and inland river barge service throughout the inland waterway system. Serviced by two major railroads, we handle a diverse mix of general cargoes, including steel, forest products, asphalt, petroleum products, cement, heavy machinery, and project cargoes like wind generation equipment and grain.

Enhancing Our Quality of Life

• WE Energies brings in coal that provides electricity to heat, cool, and light our homes.

• Morton, Cargill and North American Salt provide much-needed salt that melts the ice on city roads.

• Lafarge and St. Mary's Cement distribute the concrete and cement used for building roads, the new Marquette Interchange, and for home construction.

• Milorganite fertilizer is manufactured and distributed from the Port's commercial area, known as "Jones Island."

• Having these tenants at the Port has saved this community over \$58 million in transportation costs for these products alone.

Fun Facts:

• The Port's commercial land is referred to as "Jones Island," named after the shipbuilder, Capt. James Monroe Jones. Jones Island's Kaszube Park commemorates the late 1800 to early 1900 fishing village of immigrants whose descendants still live in the area.

• Kaszube Park is the smallest Milwaukee County park.
