The directors set policy for the Chamber, which is an organization that serves its membership through representation, support services and co-ordination in the areas of Farragut and West Knoxville.





"Don't start your day until you have it finished on paper first." -- Jim Rohn

Time is the most precious resource at our disposal, but it is also one of the most fickle. Used wisely, it can be a powerful asset. Misused, it can be your greatest enemy. Always work from a list. You can bring



order out of chaos faster with a list than with any other time management tool. Write down every task you intend to complete over the course of the day. Each day, organize, starting with what you must do and working down to what would be nice, but certainly not

essential, to get done.

Commit to using a time management **system you like.** It doesn't matter what system you use, what does matter is that you master your preferred time management system and use it regularly-until it becomes a natural habit.

"Do you have a minute?" is an innocent question we often hear, but often means, "Do you have a half-hour?" Interruptions are a necessary part of every workday. In fact, for many, interruptions like phone calls are our work. Because they're unavoidable, the trick is to accept interuptions that are inevitable and manage those you can control. Tell your visitors and callers how much time you have, and stick to your words.

Listen carefully and don't let your mind stray back to what you want to be doing. If the person speaking seems to be wandering, nudge them back on track.

Stick to priorities. Don't be your own worst interrupter. Stick to a prioritized "To Do" list. Tackle your top-priority tasks first. If you find yourself doing all the little, less important tasks first, "just to get them out of the way," it's a signal you're procrastinating.

Break large projects down into workable pieces. Work backward from your deadline and set smaller deadlines along the way. Don't lose track of the priority task. Handle each piece of paper only once. Either act on it, throw it out or pass it on.

Telephone interruptions can tie up a major part of every day. If someone is picking up your calls or if you are receiving them from a message machine, bunch phone messages and call everyone back during one block of time. Rather than play telephone tag, leave a complete message, mention a good time you can be reached or simply say you will call again. Don't forget to be a considerate caller yourself. Always ask if it is a good time to talk. At times, it may be necessary to remove yourself and go to a quiet spot to work. Ask someone else to take your calls, but be sure to tell others where you are in case of an emergency.

And finally, hang a friendly reminder in full view that reads: "What's the Best Use of

Try and imagine ... You have a good job with ABC Corporation. Then, your company downsizes.



Before you know it, you're unemployed and you emptied your sav-ings last year. You're ashamed to leave your house, but you feel like you have no place to go. It is the worst of times. Then one day ... You happen upon this you nappen upon this place that you heard about as a kid. Its red, yellow, blue and green sign shines like a bea-con that draws you inside. Once there,

staff members and volunteers become friends and tell you, "our doors are always open." For

the first time in weeks, you have hope. Vickey Beard says those kinds of stories are common at the Farragut Family YMCA where she serves as executive director. "We are not just a fitness club. ... Being here and having such acceptance and love helps people heal," she shares. "When that happens, it becomes contagious."

When organizers first decided to open a YMCA in Farragut, they weren't sure that it would work. But, Vickey says, "We started with one-third of the building, and now we have the entire space. What people don't real-ize about West Knoxville is that we are covered up with need."

To meet that need, the Farragut Family YMCA will break ground on a new facility April 27 with plans to open June 2008 when their current lease expires. The new 40,000 square foot family-oriented facility located at Concord Park will house an indoor pool, gymnasium, meeting rooms, fitness equipment and sports areas. No one is turned away because of their inability to pay; the YMCA offers financial assistance to those in need. Members' dues and the recently launched **Strong Kids Campaign** allow the YMCA to provide that kind of community service.

Some of the activities members can parsome of the activities members can par-ticipate in include: fitness programs for ages pre-school through senior, kids and adult yoga, tutoring, arts programs, cardio belly-dancing, karate, kickboxing, pilates, spinning, and the Silver Sneakers program featuring exercises that are easy on joints. Rental space is available for creating acounts and the X offer is available for special events, and the Y offers a summer day camp.

Events coming up at the Farragut Family YMCA include the **Healthy Kids Day** Saturday, April 14, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the site of the new Concord YMCA. Expect games and activities supporting strong kids,

strong families and strong communities – the mission of the YMCA. Such a special place takes a special group of dedicated people. Vickey is quick to praise her staff. "They go through an extensive training system. They become a part of our mission. It's just like a family."

My Time Right Now?"
