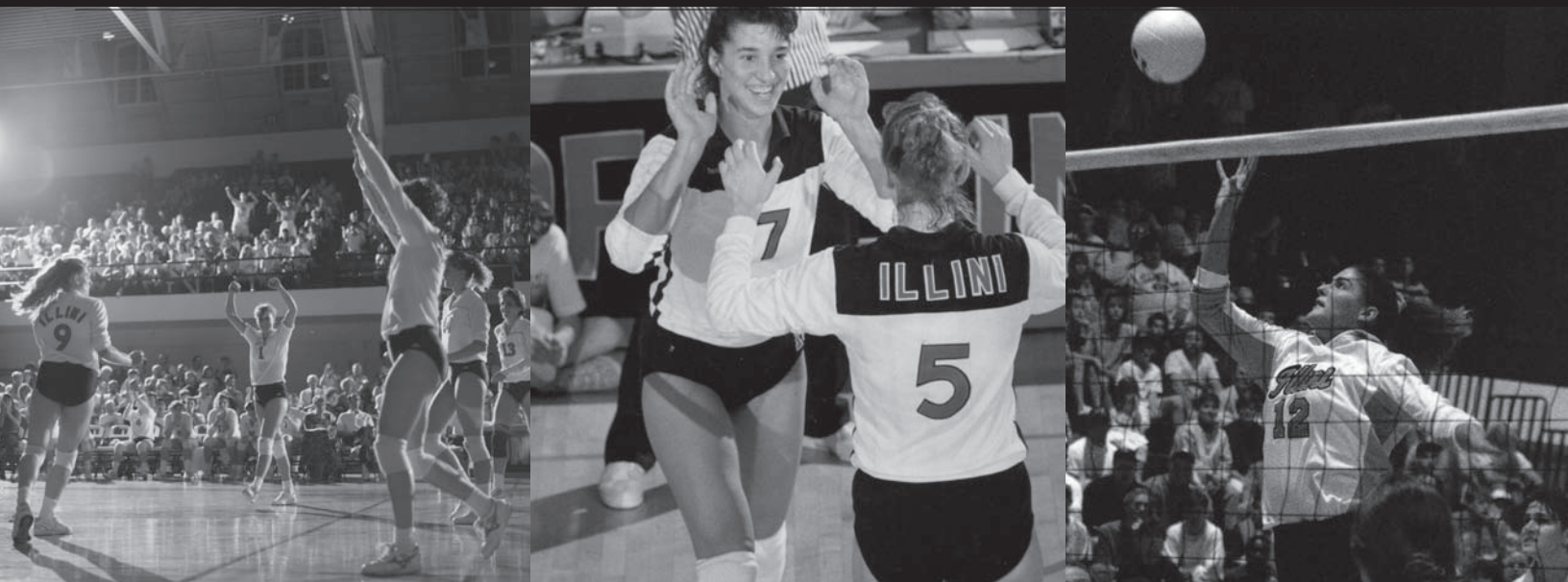

ILLINI VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

1974

The University of Illinois recognizes the women's athletics program as part of the Athletic Association, naming Dr. Karol Kahrs to head the seven-sport program. Volleyball is one of the seven newly-incorporated varsity sports. Kahrs originally came to Illinois in 1966, coaching the volleyball and women's basketball teams.

The first UI varsity volleyball squad, coached by Kathleen Haywood, posts a 19-9 record, finishing fourth in the IAW State Championship and losing in the second round of the MAIAW Regional Championship.

1975

In the first season of Big Ten championship play, Illinois posts a 4-2 record to finish second. Illinois posts a 15-14 overall mark under Head Coach Terry Hite, finishing fourth in the IAW State Championship.

1976

Illinois posts a 25-14 record, posting a 3-1 record in the Big Ten playoffs, good for fifth place. Illinois ties for fifth in the IAW State Championship.

1977

First-year Head Coach Chris Accornero leads UI to its second-highest win total in the program's history, posting a 38-17-6 record and advancing to the AIAW National Championship, where the team lost four out of five matches.

1978

Illinois posts its fifth consecutive winning record, posting a 28-14-1 mark and earning third place in the Big Ten playoffs.

The Fighting Illini win the state tournament and place third in the MAIAW Regionals. It was the last winning season at Illinois for five years.

1981

The NCAA absorbs the AIAW and takes control of Division I college volleyball.

1982

The Big Ten Conference sanctions women's athletics, incorporating a 13-game volleyball schedule. Illinois finishes 8-5 in league play, earning a third-place finish after losing its final two home conference matches.

1983

The Mike Hebert era begins with a 5-25 overall mark, 3-11 in Big Ten play.

Illinois establishes records for losses (25)

and consecutive defeats (17). Illinois sweeps Wisconsin, 3-0, Sept. 16, at Kenney Gym for Hebert's first Fighting Illini victory.

In 1983, Kenney Gym seating capacity is listed at 800.

1984

Illinois begins the season by winning nine of its first 12 matches, before settling into an 18-15 record, 6-7 in Big Ten play.

Hebert and Assistant Coach Don Hardin bring in a recruiting class consisting of middle hitter Lori Anderson, middle blocker Buff Binkley, outside hitter Paula Douglass and setter Disa Johnson.

Middle blocker Denise Fracaro leads the team with 342 kills and a .226 attack percentage.

1985

Illinois explodes on the national volleyball scene, winning its first 30 matches behind freshman sensation Mary Eggers.

The Big Ten adopts a round-robin, 18-game schedule, scrapping the four-team, divisional playoff format.

Illinois posts a 38-2 regular-season record, finishing 16-2 in the Big Ten, one game back of league-champion Purdue. For the first time in school history, Illinois qualifies for NCAA tournament play, beating host Western Michigan, 3-1, and losing to USC, 3-0. The Western Michigan match features the first-ever radio broadcast of UI volleyball by WDWS AM-1400 radio.

Eggers is named Big Ten Freshman of the Year and Hebert is named Kaepa National Coach of the Year. Eggers pounds 431 kills and hits .361.

Illinois establishes a Big Ten attendance record, drawing 2,632 fans to Kenney Gym on Oct. 4, to see the Fighting Illini sweep Iowa, 3-0. Illinois enters the top 20 polls for the first time in school history, advancing as high as seventh.

Following the highly successful and visible season, Illinois signs *Volleyball Magazine* All-Americans Bridget Boyle and Nancy Brookhart.

1986

Following a near-miss in 1985, Illinois blasts through the Big Ten schedule undefeated, winning its first league title with an 18-0 mark, 36-3 overall.

Johnson quarterbacks the team to a .300 hitting percentage, good for fourth in the nation.



Mary Eggers led the nation with a .455 hitting percentage in 1986.

Illinois posts a 26-match winning streak and draws 26,034 fans to Kenney Gym with three sellouts.

Illinois dumps Northern Iowa, 3-1, and Western Michigan, 3-0, before losing to host Nebraska, 3-0, in the NCAA Mideast Regional finals.

Illinois is ranked in the top 15 in the nation for the entire season, finishing the season ranked ninth in AVCA and 10th in NCAA polls.

Eggers posts an astounding .455 hitting percentage to lead the nation. She earns AVCA/Russell first-team All-America honors, the first of three consecutive first-team All-America selections for the middle blocker. Eggers, Johnson and senior Sally Rea earn first-team All-Big Ten honors.

1987

Illinois reaches the pinnacle, establishing itself as the Midwest's best team. The Fighting Illini win 31 of 38 matches and post a 17-1 mark to win the Big Ten for the second consecutive year.

The Fighting Illini pound Nebraska, 3-0, in sold-out Kenney Gym in the NCAA Mideast Regional final. Hebert also earns his 300th career coaching victory and 100th Illinois win.

Eggers and Brookhart are named Co-Big Ten Players of the Year. Eggers earns AVCA/Russell first-team All-America honors; Brookhart is named to the second team. Eggers hits .436, the second-best mark in the nation.

Illinois closes the season with a 3-0 loss to eventual NCAA national champion Hawaii in the NCAA semifinals in Indianapolis.

ILLINI VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

1988

Illinois is ranked No. 1 in the *Volleyball Monthly* preseason poll.

The Fighting Illini earn their fourth consecutive 30-win season, putting together a 30-4 record and winning the Big Ten with a perfect 18-0 mark.

The Fighting Illini beat Oklahoma, 3-0, to win the NCAA Mideast Regional and a second-consecutive trip to the NCAA national championship.

For the second year in a row, Hawaii ends the Illinois season, this time with a 3-1 victory.

Eggers is named Big Ten Player of the Year and a first-team All-American for the third consecutive year, hitting .433 to lead the nation. Eggers concludes her college career as the all-time NCAA leader in hitting efficiency at .420. Six months later, Mary Eggers receives the prestigious Honda Broderick award symbolic of the nation's top collegiate volleyball player.

Eggers, Brookhart, and Winsett earn first-team All-Big Ten honors. Illinois draws a record 33,729 fans to Kenney Gym, an average of 2,108 fans per match.

1989

Injuries to key performers Brookhart and junior middle blocker Laura Bush hold Illinois to a 27-8 record, 13-5 in the Big Ten.

Illinois dumps Big Ten champ Ohio State, 3-1, in the NCAA Mideast regional semifinal but loses to host Nebraska in the regional final.

Brookhart and Bush earn AVCA/Russell second-team All-America honors. Bush is also named a GTE/CoSida First Team Academic All-American. Brookhart, Bush and Winsett are chosen first-team All-Big Ten picks. Winsett quarterbacks Illinois to a .303 attack percentage, second in the nation.

In April, Illinois signs the nation's top recruiting class, as selected by *Volleyball Monthly* magazine. Illinois inks four "Fab 50" picks.

In June, UI administrators announce the Fighting Illini are moving to Huff Gym, increasing seating capacity to 4,050.

In its last season in Kenney Gym, Illinois draws nearly 2,000 fans per match and ranks third in the nation in attendance.

1990

Expectations soar for the Fighting Illini, who return four senior starters, including All-America middle blocker Laura Bush and All-Big Ten selections Petra Laverman and Barb Winsett.

The four seniors join the nation's top recruiting class as the Fighting Illini move into Huff Gymnasium. Illinois, ranked No. 7 in the preseason by AVCA, wins just six of its first 10 matches, losing to Stanford, Nebraska and Pacific, despite holding a 2-0 lead in each match.

Illinois wins three of its final four matches to advance to its sixth consecutive NCAA tournament. The Fighting Illini lose, 3-0, in NCAA first-round action at Big Ten-champion Wisconsin in front of a then all-time NCAA record crowd of 10,935. Illinois ends the season 21-12, 11-7 in the Big Ten, good for fourth place. The Illini play on television a record nine times.

Freshman middle blocker Kristin Henriksen earns Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors, winning the league hitting title at .379. Laverman earns First-Team All-Big Ten honors and Third-Team All-America honors.

In April, Illinois lands the nation's top recruiting class for the second year in a row, according to *Volleyball Monthly*.

1991

The youngest squad in Illinois history jumps out to a quick 10-3 start, 6-0 in the Big Ten before winding up 19-10, 14-6 and in fourth place in the Big Ten. The Illini sell out Huff Gym for the first time, packing 4,050 fans in to see Ohio State.

Junior outside hitter Lorna Henderson earns first-team All-Big Ten and honorable mention All-America honors after hitting .263 with 398 kills. She also earns Big Ten Player of the Week honors in successive weeks.

Freshman middle blocker Sue Nucci hits a team-high .322 and earns Big Ten Player of the Week honors.

The Illini advance to their seventh consecutive NCAA tournament, losing 3-0, at Nebraska in the first round.

The Illini set records for single-season attendance and average attendance, drawing 31,391 fans in 14 home dates for an average of 2,242, good for sixth in the nation.

1992

Illinois wins its fourth Big Ten championship (a co-championship with Penn State) with a 32-4 overall record, 19-1 in league play.

The Illini rank among the top 5 in the nation all season, winning the Illini Classic and placing second in the Wahine Invitational and Reebok Challenge.

Illinois wins five-consecutive matches against ranked teams in September and strings together a 22-match winning streak late in the season, including 18 in a row in Big Ten play.

The Fighting Illini qualify for their eighth-consecutive NCAA tournament. Along the way, the Fighting Illini set an NCAA record for season attendance, leading the nation with 52,666 fans pouring into Huff Hall, an average of nearly 3,100 fans per match.

Illinois loses to eventual-NCAA national champion Stanford in the NCAA Mideast Regional final in front of a Huff Hall-record 4,316 fans.

Illini outside hitter Kirsten Gleis earns first-team All-America honors, outside hitter Tina Rogers is named a second-team All-American and middle blocker Kristin Henriksen finishes second in the national hitting race with a .433 attack percentage. Illinois wins the NCAA hitting title with a .328 team percentage.

ILLINI VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

1993

Illinois opens the season ranked fourth in the nation and faces five top-10 teams to begin the season. After dropping all five matches, the Illini go on a nine-match win streak, including a 6-0 start in the Big Ten.

After splitting the final six Big Ten matches of the season, Illinois qualifies for its ninth consecutive NCAA tournament, beating host Southwest Missouri State, 3-0, in the first round as senior outside hitter Tina Rogers hammers a school-record 32 kills. The Illini end the season 18-13, 14-6 in the Big Ten.

Senior middle blocker Kristin Henriksen wins her third Big Ten hitting title, earning first-team All-Big Ten honors along with Rogers, the UI leader in kills, aces and digs.

Illinois wins the NCAA attendance title for the second consecutive year, drawing 34,539 fans into Huff Hall for 13 home dates.

1994

Illinois goes 23-14 overall, 12-8 in the Big Ten to finish fourth, and qualifies for its 10th consecutive NCAA tournament appearance.

Freshman Erin Borske sets a school record with nine 20-kill matches, combining with senior Julie Edwards for 978 kills and 705 digs. Borske becomes the third UI player to earn Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Edwards earns All-Big Ten and second-team All-Mideast Region honors after becoming just the second Fighting Illini player in school history with 500+ kills in a season.

Edwards leads the Illini with 500 kills, hitting .287 and earning MVP honors. Edwards pounds 30 kills in a victory over William & Mary and is named Big Ten Player of the Week. Sophomore Melissa Neal is named the Sandy Scholtens Award winner.

It is a season of streaks as the Illini lose their first four matches to ranked teams, then rattle off 14 wins in their next 15 matches. The Illini then endure another four-match losing streak before winning eight of their next nine. The Illini lose four of their last five matches, including an NCAA first-round loss to visiting Ball State.

Illinois draws 29,106 fans in 15 home dates, an average of 2,715 fans per match to finish fifth in national attendance.

1995

Mike Hebert entered his 13th, and what will turn out to be his final, year as head coach with one of the youngest and most unknown squads

in Illini volleyball history. With only one senior on the roster, Illinois surprises many as it jumps out to a 9-0 start. That start is the best for the Illini since 1985.

The Illini then lose four of their next five matches, including close 3-2 matches against Penn State and Purdue, before rebounding to win its next seven matches. The streak wouldn't last, though, as the Illini drop their next three road matches. After losing its home finale to Wisconsin, Illinois sees its NCAA tournament hopes slipping with two of its toughest road contests left against Ohio State and Penn State. But the Illini pull off two brilliant upsets, beating No. 10 Penn State, 3-2, and taking care of No. 7 Ohio State, 3-1. It is only the second time in conference history that a team had defeated those two schools in their venues on successive days.

Illinois' late-season heroics pay off as it receives a first-round bye in the NCAA tournament and faces Georgia in a second-round match at Huff Hall for the team's 11th straight NCAA appearance. With a 3-1 defeat of Georgia, Illinois travels to Gainesville, Fla., to face No. 6 Texas in the Mideast Regional semifinal, losing to the Longhorns, 3-0.

The 1995 season belongs to sophomore Erin Borske who earns first-team AVCA All-America and All-Big Ten honors. Borske sets Big Ten and Illinois records for most kills in a match (44 vs. Penn State, Sept. 23) and in a season (714). She also has two 40-kill matches. Junior Carolien Dikhoff sets a Big Ten and Illinois record for most assists in a season (1,770).

The Illini finish fourth in the national attendance race, drawing 32,856 fans into Huff Hall.

1996

Don Hardin returns to Illinois as head coach and takes over a young Illinois team which is trying to cope with the loss of All-Big Ten hitter Erin Borske and starting setter Carolien Dikhoff. The Fighting Illini remain competitive during the season despite having to rely greatly on eight underclassmen.

The Fighting Illini finished the non-conference schedule with a record of 5-3. The team won its second straight Illini Classic title by defeating Southern Mississippi and Connecticut in the annual tourney. Mary Coleman was named the Classic's MVP.

The most emotional weekend of the non-conference slate occurred a week prior to the Illini Classic, Sept. 13-14, when the team traveled to the Louisville Invitational. Hardin would be leading the Illini against the team he coached the year before, the 15th-ranked Cardinals. Despite the fact that setter Melissa Beitz had to sit out the tourney with mononucleosis, Illinois upset Louisville on its own court in a dramatic 3-0 first-round sweep.

During the Big Ten season, Illinois remained competitive but was unable to pull out a win versus the upper division teams in the league. The Illini finished 8-12 in the conference and placed seventh. UI claimed wins over Iowa, Michigan, Indiana, Northwestern and Purdue.

Overall, Illinois ended the season with a record of 13-15. Senior captain Kelly Scherr was named first-team All-Big Ten and the team's MVP. Illinois averaged 2,414 fans at each home game, which ranked as the fifth-best average in the nation.

1997

After suffering the school's first losing season in 13 years in 1996, the 1997 Illini hoped to show that better times were ahead for the UI program. The team rebounded to post a 17-13 record and returned to the national rankings two times during the season.

Illinois still had a young team, with only one senior, defensive specialist Heidi Coulter. Led by a group of five juniors and four sophomores, the Illini won their first eight matches of the season and ended the nonconference season with a record of 9-1. The highlights of the non-conference slate included tournament wins at the University of Virginia's Jefferson Cup and the Illini/Pepsi Classic. Illinois also upended No. 21 Arkansas, 3-0, at Huff Hall on Sept. 19.

The team had a tough time getting on track during the Big Ten season. After starting the conference schedule with three straight road

losses against ranked opponents, Illinois could never pull to the .500 mark in the league. Despite finishing with an 8-12 Big Ten record and finishing seventh in the league, Illinois ended the season on a strong note. The Illini won their last three matches of the season, all by 3-0 scores.

Illinois continued to draw well at the gate. UI averaged 1,962 fans per game, which ranked as the 10th-highest average in the nation.

Following the season, Illinois assistant coach Tarnisha Thompson retired and was replaced by Denise Baez. The entire squad traveled to The Netherlands over the summer and competed in several tournaments in late May and early June.

1998

Don Hardin's team entered the season with the hope of showing fans what Illinois volleyball was like, Fighting Illini style. After returning to national prominence and to the NCAA Tournament in grand fashion, it can certainly be said that the 1998 Illini accomplished their goal.

Illinois entered the season with a tough non-conference schedule, playing several returning NCAA Tournament teams, including Ball State, Southeast Missouri State, Oral Roberts, Illinois State, Texas, Penn State, Arkansas and Kansas State. The Fighting Illini finished 7-3 in the non-Big Ten schedule.

The Fighting Illini moved into the national rankings the week of Sept. 18 after knocking off seventh-ranked Texas at The Chicago Challenge at Mother McAuley High School. Illinois pulled

off a dramatic, 3-2 victory to a gain a No. 22 ranking. After reaching the national Top 25, Illinois would not leave the rankings all season.

Big Ten play began in Michigan Sept. 25-26 and Illinois opened the season in a great way, by sweeping Michigan and No. 18 Michigan State. UI also defeated No. 24 Indiana and Minnesota during the first-half of the conference season to end with a terrific 8-2 league mark. One of the losses came in a thrilling 3-2 defeat at the hands of top-ranked Penn State at Huff Hall. The two games were the first that PSU had dropped all season, and the Illini picked up their two wins after losing the first two games of the match.

Illinois finished the Big Ten season with three consecutive wins over Iowa, Purdue and Minnesota. The Illini finished fourth in the conference with a 13-7 Big Ten mark. That finish was enough to propel Illinois into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1995. UI ended up hosting a sub-regional at Huff Hall and defeated Southwest Texas State and No. 17 Colorado to move into the Sweet 16. Illinois wound up playing at No. 1 Long Beach State in the Mountain Region semifinals and fell to the eventual-national champions, 3-0, to end the season.

In all, the Illini spikers had one of the best finishes on campus in 1998. The team finished 22-11 with what was judged to be the nation's toughest schedule. Illinois finished 14th in the final national rankings. Several Illini were accorded postseason honors. Chapman was named honorable mention All-America, junior setter Melissa Beitz was named AVCA All-District V and was an Academic All-Region pick. Chapman and Marshall were named first-team All-Big Ten while Beitz and sophomore middle Betsy Spicer were named honorable mention All-Big Ten.

1999

The Illini entered the season ranked 14th in the nation, and played a tough non-conference schedule which included matchups with Cal-Santa Barbara, North Carolina, Illinois State, George Mason, Georgia, and Louisville. Illinois went 4-2 in non-conference play, which included its fifth straight State Farm Illini Classic title courtesy of a 3-0 victory over Georgia in the championship match. To help prepare for the rigors of the Big Ten, the Illini also played a pair of exhibition matches against top-flight competition, facing the U.S. Pro Volleyball League team and the Dresdner Sports Club of Germany.

No. 25 Illinois carried a four-match winning streak into its conference opener against Indiana. A three-game sweep of the Hoosiers,

followed by a 3-2 victory over Northwestern improved the streak to six straight wins.

After a road loss to top-ranked Penn State, the Illini quickly bounced back with their best stretch of the Big Ten season. Illinois reeled off five-straight wins to improve to 7-1 in the conference and move as high as 20th in the national rankings. Included in that streak were victories at two of the league's most difficult places to play, Ohio State and Minnesota. The Illini defeated the Buckeyes in five games and knocked off the 22nd-ranked Gophers in four games. Illinois also garnered its first win in four seasons over Wisconsin, when the Orange and Blue upended the 18th-ranked Badgers in straight games.

A tough stretch followed where Illinois dropped five of its next six matches. But the final loss, a spirited and competitive four-game loss to Penn State, was just what the Illini needed to regain their rhythm. Illinois had the No. 1 Nittany Lions on their heels time after time, pushed by the crowd of over 3,000 fans that packed Huff Hall for the match.

The Illini closed out the Big Ten winning four of their final six matches, highlighted by a pair of thrilling 3-2 road victories at Indiana and at Michigan State. Illinois finished 12-8 in conference play, securing its second-straight fourth place finish.

The Illini received an invitation to the NCAA Tournament and were sent to Gainesville, Fla., to play in the East Regional. UI won its first round contest against Wisconsin-Milwaukee in four games to set up a showdown with No. 4 Florida in the second round. Illinois fought the Gators point-for-point the entire match before eventually falling in five games to end the season.

In the end, Illinois finished with a 17-11 record and ranked 26th in the country. Middle blocker Betsy Spicer received first team All-Big Ten honors, as well as first team All-District 2 honors by the AVCA. Setter Melissa Beitz broke the UI's all-time career assists record, finishing with 5,797 and outside hitter Tracey Marshall became the school's all-time career digs leader, totaling 1,426 over four years.

2000

The year 2000 began with high expectations for the Fighting Illini volleyball program. Illinois entered the season ranked 29th in the nation in the AVCA preseason poll. After a successful nonconference season, a rash of injuries hit the squad and Head Coach Don Hardin was left juggling the lineup from match to match. Five-

game matches became the norm as the young Illini fought through the ultra-competitive Big Ten slate.

The Illini compiled an impressive 9-2 record in non-conference matches. During that stint, Illinois enjoyed a trio of three-match winning streaks. Betsy Spicer earned two Big Ten Player of the Week honors and the Illini won its sixth straight Illini Classic tournament championship, fighting back from an 0-2 deficit to defeat Ball State in five games in the title match.

After losing three starters due to injury during the Big Ten season, the Illini went 4-16 in Big Ten play. All four of Illinois' victories in the conference - Purdue, Northwestern, Michigan State, and Iowa - lasted five games. Overall, 11 of Illinois' 31 matches on the season went to the fifth and deciding game, with the Illini posting an impressive record of 7-4 in five-game matches.

Accumulating a number of post-season awards and honors was senior middle blocker Betsy Spicer. Spicer won the Big Ten title in attack percentage, hitting .398 on the year. She was a unanimous selection to the All-Big Ten team, while also garnering All-Region and honorable-mention All-American honors. Spicer was also named Illinois' female Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient.

2001

The 2001 season got off to a promising start as the Illini cruised through the non-conference schedule with a 7-1 record. After winning the first six matches of the season in impressive fashion, the Illini were dealt their first loss of the year by No. 11 Florida. Despite the 3-0 defeat, Illinois gave the Gators all they wanted in the first two games before falling to the eventual SEC Champions in the championship of the State Farm Illini Classic.

Following tough road losses at No. 15 Ohio State and No. 6 Penn State and wins over Northwestern and Iowa, Illinois traveled to Minneapolis, Minn., to take on No. 21 Minnesota. After dropping the first-two games to the Gophers, the Illini rallied to take the next two and nearly won the fifth game before falling 15-13.

Following the five-game heartbreaker, the Illini reeled off seven straight victories and won 11 of their next 13 matches to work their way near the top of the conference. Included in that seven-match stretch were six wins over Big Ten foes that helped elevate the Illini from eighth in the Big Ten standings up to third and was the longest winning streak for the Illini since 1997.

Following a loss at eventual Big Ten champion Wisconsin, Illinois regained its winning ways by taking five of its final seven conference matches, including a dramatic come-from-behind win over No. 13 Penn State, its first victory over the Nittany Lions since 1995. The Illini wrapped up the regular season finishing tied for fourth in the Big Ten with a 13-7 record.

For their efforts, Head Coach Don Hardin was selected as Big Ten Coach of the Year by league coaches, and senior Shadia Haddad was named the Big Ten's Defensive Player of the Year. Haddad and sophomore Lisa Argabright were named to the All-Big Ten Team while Argabright also earned All-Region honors.

As reward for their impressive regular season, Illinois was chosen to host the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament. The first round saw the Illini defeat the Missouri Tigers in four games to advance to the second round. Illinois' remarkable season came to an end in round two at the hands of No. 4 Arizona. Despite falling in four games, Illinois gave Arizona all they could handle before bowing to the Final Four-bound Wildcats.

The Illini ended the 2001 season with a record of 21-9 and ranked No. 20 in the nation in the final AVCA/USA Today Coaches' Poll.

2002

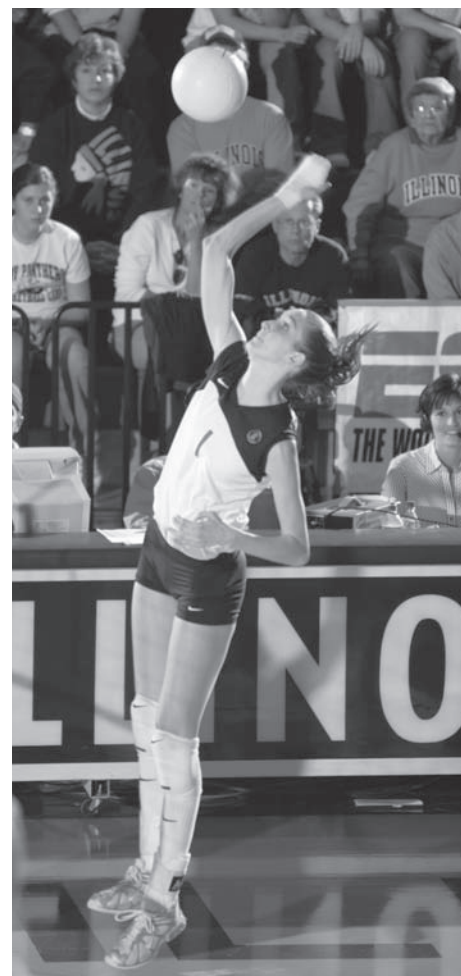
Illinois opened the 2002 season in Gainesville, Fla., at the University Centre Hotel Invitational. The Illini kicked off the tournament with consecutive 3-0 sweeps over Rhode Island and UAB, setting up a showdown for the title with host Florida. Illinois fell in the championship match to the No. 6 Gators.

The Illini then traveled to Chicago to participate in the Loyola Tournament. The Orange and Blue dropped a tough, five-game decision to the Ramblers but bounced back by sweeping Northern Illinois.

Illinois won its 13th State Farm Illini Classic title with 3-0 victories over Arkansas State in the first round and Connecticut in the championship. The title match was a memorable one as Don Hardin collected his 300th career victory in leading Illinois to victory.

In the final tune-up prior to conference play, Illinois headed west for a road trip to the state of Utah. The Illini won their fourth straight match with a 3-0 sweep at Brigham Young, but the winning streak ended one night later in a four-game loss at No. 10 Utah. The Illini finished non-conference play with a 6-3 record.

Illinois opened Big Ten play with a four-match homestand at Huff Hall. Things did not start out as planned, however, as the Illini fell in five games to in-state rival Northwestern. But the Illini rebounded quickly, wiping away the disappointment the next night with an impressive victory over the 13th-ranked and two-time defending Big Ten champion Wisconsin Badgers. The Illini then defeated Purdue in four games before a loss to No. 9 Penn State.

Illinois' first road trip of the conference slate began with a 3-1 loss at Iowa. But just as the team rebounded two weeks earlier after a Friday loss, the Illini surged back with their best performance of the season one night later in winning at No. 6 Minnesota. Illinois fought back from behind to win in a five-game thriller and hand the Gophers their first loss in conference play. The win marked the highest-ranked opponent that the Illini had defeated in Don Hardin's tenure as UI coach.

Adversity followed, however, as the Illini dropped a pair of heartbreaking five-game matches to Indiana and Ohio State. After losses at Michigan and Michigan State, it became evident that starter Lisa Argabright was not herself. She was diagnosed with mononucleosis and the Illini were forced to play the next six matches without their top offensive option and best blocker.

After falling to No. 7 Minnesota, the Illini posted back-to-back 3-0 sweeps over Iowa and Purdue. But the Orange and Blue then dropped four straight decisions at No. 14 Penn State, No. 14 Wisconsin, Northwestern and Michigan State.

Illinois got back on the winning track on Senior Night at Huff Hall as seniors Betsy Eiserman and Sue Webber led the Illini to a 3-0 victory over Michigan.

The final weekend of the season was spent on the road, where the Illini fell to No. 20 Ohio State before closing out the 2002 season on a high note with a 3-1 victory at Indiana to finish the year 13-16 overall and 7-13 in the Big Ten.

2003

Illinois completed its best season since 1992, qualifying for its ninth Sweet 16 and 15th NCAA Tournament overall.

Middle blocker Lisa Argabright earned third team All-America honors, while setter Erin Virtue was an honorable mention selection.

The Illini rolled to two tournament titles, including claiming its 14th State Farm Illini Classic victory by sweeping Wake Forest in three games.

The Illini played the first two weekends of the conference race on the road, then opened the Big Ten schedule in dramatic fashion with a dominating win over No. 11 Penn State. That began a string of 12 victories in 14 matches, giving Illinois a chance at the Big Ten title heading into the final weekend of the season. The highlight of that stretch was a come-from-behind victory over No. 20 Minnesota on Nov.

7. Minnesota had three match points in game four before a Jessica Belter kill closed out the game 34-32. Illinois won game five, 15-13. Outside hitter Rachel VanMeter, who paced the way with 25 kills, exploded for a kill to close the match.

Belter gave the Illini a tremendous individual performance the weekend of Oct. 17-18, hitting .737 with 16 kills vs. Michigan State and registering 12 kills and 11 digs, hitting .417 and recording eight blocks vs. Michigan. This earned Belter the AVCA National Player of the Week honors.

Illinois spent three weekends during the regular season in the Top 25, reaching 18th in the last week of the season. The respect for Illinois led to a No. 15 national seed in the NCAA Tournament and the ability to host the First and Second Rounds at Huff. The Illini swept through matches with Murray State and Louisville, giving the Illini a shot at playing at No. 2 Hawaii in the Regional Semifinal. The hosts won 3-0, but Illinois was competitive in falling 33-31 in game three. Illinois finished the season ranked No. 15 in the nation and No. 14 in attendance (1,598).

2004

Illinois was one of the top stories of the first half of the volleyball season as the Illini halted top-ranked USC's NCAA record 52-match winning streak with a 30-24, 24-30, 12-30, 30-27, 15-8 victory in front of better than 3,000 fans at Huff Hall in the title game of the State Farm Illini Classic. After that week, Illinois reached the top 10 for the first time since 1993, chiming in at No. 9.

The season had its ups and downs. On the positive side, the Illini were "streak busters." Besides the USC victory, Illinois knocked off Ohio State, who entered the Oct. 23 match at Huff 19-0 as the lone unbeaten team in Division I. Then on Nov. 6, the Illini swept Wisconsin, who was the hottest team in the Big Ten at the time with an eight-match win streak.

Attendance was a story again. Illinois drew 22,890 fans to Huff Hall, an average of 1,761 per match. That ranked 10th nationally, was the highest team average since 1999, and bettered the 2003 average by 163 per match.

Don Hardin posted career victory No. 350 in the 30-27, 30-20, 32-30 win over Wisconsin. Senior Jessica Belter earned Big Ten Player of the Week after having dominating performances vs. Michigan and Michigan State for the second straight year. For the week, Belter had 43 kills and hit a combined .567.

Two Illini were named All-Big Ten -- Belter (first team) and junior hitter Rachel VanMeter (honorable mention), while middle blocker Jen Hynds garnered All-Big Ten Freshman Team accolades. Belter was named Honorable Mention All-America.

On the down side were injuries to Jen Hynds, who missed eight games in mid-September, and to setter Erin Virtue, an Honorable Mention All-American in 2003 and Pre-Season All-Big Ten honoree in 2004. Virtue suffered a season-ending knee injury on Sept. 17, giving the setting duties to freshman Stephanie Obermeier.

Although Illinois eventually dropped out of the Top 25 and to fifth in the Big Ten, the Illini qualified for its 16th NCAA Tournament. Louisville knocked the Illini out in the first round in four games.

Illinois won three in-season tournaments. Besides the Illini Classic, Illinois won the Hurricane Frances Classic hosted by Miami (Ohio), after the tournament in Miami, Fla. was cancelled due to the approaching hurricane, and the C&C Services Invitational, hosted by the University of Arkansas.

2005

Despite suffering through an injury and illness-riddled season, the Illini managed to complete their 20th winning season in the past 23 seasons at 16-15. Illinois finished the second half of the Big Ten season 5-5, including victories in three of the last four matches.

Senior Rachel VanMeter, one of five players chosen All-Big Ten unanimously, had a record-setting season, breaking the Illini record for attacks in a match (99), season (1,786) and career (4,462). VanMeter also ranked fourth in the nation in kills per game (5.79).

VanMeter's success started from the opening match of the year, when she set a Redbird Arena record with 39 kills in a five-game victory over Illinois State, earning her Big Ten Player of the Week honors. VanMeter was named MVP as the Illini won the Northern Illinois Tournament.

Illinois had two big victories over Top 25 teams, but none bigger than a five-game victory at No. 16 Ohio State. The Illini trailed two games to none and 22-20 in game three before rebounding. In the final week of the Big Ten season, Illinois downed No. 18 Purdue 3-2. VanMeter earned Big Ten Player of the Week honors for her 39 kills and 99 attacks while junior libero Beth Vrdsky tallied 31 digs to become Illinois' first Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week. Vrdsky set the Illinois single-season digs record with 520 for the year.

2006

The season began in impressive fashion with a 3-1 victory over Illinois State in front of the largest home crowd in over a decade. The promotion, called "Stuff Huff," drew 3,129 fans on a sultry night in late August.

Junior middle blocker Vicki Brown, an honorable mention All-Big Ten selection, was the story of the non-conference season, earning MVP honors of the State Farm Illini Classic and the Marquette Kick-Off Tournament. Brown belted 45 kills and hit .413 in the Illini Classic, hitting for a .625 clip in a 3-0 victory over UW-Milwaukee.

Freshman Ashley Edinger stepped into the libero spot, posting 488 digs, second all-time in Illinois history. Kylie McCulley, playing for the injured Kayani Turner, was impressive in her debut as a starter, hitting .265 with 19 kills in a competitive match with No. 2 Penn St. Illinois had a pair of game points in games one and three before falling 34-32, 30-23, 32-30.

Lizzie Bazzetta ranked sixth in the nation in assists per game at 13.54. Edinger and Bazzetta earned Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors throughout the season, both coming after

matches with Northwestern and Iowa.

Paced by 19 kills and a .459 attack percentage from an ailing Turner, Illinois downed No. 16 Ohio State 3-0. Senior Meghan Macdonald broke the Illinois single-game attack percentage record by hitting a perfect 1.000 with 12 kills in a 3-1 win over Indiana on Senior Weekend.

The Illini were 15-15, 6-14 in the Big Ten.

2007

Illinois posted its 21st winning season in the last 23 years in 2007. The Illini defeated a ranked team for the seventh straight season and took eventual national champion Penn State to five games, all the while breaking in a new, yet talented freshman class.

Still the 2007 season will be remembered for how close the Illini came to being a top three team again in the Big Ten and getting a chance to return to the NCAA Tournament. Illinois finished the season 16-14 with nine of the those losses coming in five games and another in four to

No. 9 Wisconsin after the Illini took the opening game 41-39, a record for the longest single game in school history.

Laura DeBruler's performance headlined a strong start from the nation's sixth-ranked recruiting class. DeBruler led all freshmen nationally (22nd overall) in kills per game at 4.89.

No player, not even national Player of the Year Mary Eggers, had even double figures in kills in an Illinois debut. DeBruler, however, exploded for 28 in a four-game win over Bowling Green in the season opener. She was named Big Ten Player of the Week twice.

Vicki Brown eclipsed the 1,000-kill mark for her career. Sophomore Ashley Edinger set the single-season digs mark with 564.

The roller coaster season ended on a high as head coach Don Hardin won his 400th match in a three-game win over Iowa. Earlier in the year, Hardin won his 200th at Illinois.

2008

The 2008 regular season was highlighted by a win over No. 11 Oregon. After the Ducks dominated the first two sets 25-14 and 25-16 in the championship match of the State Farm Illini Classic. Fans got a glimpse of just how good Laura DeBruler could be as well. The somewhat undersized sophomore came up big with 22 kills in the final three sets as Illinois rallied from a 19-14 deficit in the fourth set and then went on to take set five 15-13 and the match in dramatic fashion.

DeBruler was named National Player of the Week for her efforts and also earned the first of three Big Ten Player of the Weeks on the season.

All year, Illinois played a style that kept rallies going and forced the opponent to make the mistake on the point. Thanks to a lot of hard work by returnees and the emergence of freshman Michelle Bartsch, the Illini became a force on the block. Bartsch had 134 blocks, which ranked 10th in the Big Ten, en route to Big Ten and Mideast Region Freshman of the Year accolades.

Middle blocker Johannah Bangert, a two-time Big Ten Player of the Week, was at the heart of the blocking success, leading not only the conference, but also the nation with 1.60 blocks per set. With the fans counting down each dig, Ashley Edinger set the Illinois career digs record on Nov. 1 against Ohio State, now with 1,614 for her career.

The Illini won 16 out of 19, including 13 of 15

following the hiccup against Northwestern. A total of 10 of those 16 wins came in three sets as Illinois made its case for a national seed and home matches in the NCAA Tournament.

The Illini did just that, earning a number nine national seed and hosting first and second round matches for the third time this decade. Illinois defeated UW-Milwaukee and Cincinnati on its home court in the first two rounds, earning the school's first Sweet 16 appearance since 2003. Hardin announced his retirement from coaching in the week leading up to the tournament and fans came out not only to push the Illini past the first two rounds, but also to express appreciation for all Hardin has meant to the Illini in his career.

Although California downed Illinois in three sets in the Sweet 16, all three sets came down to the end with the Bears winning 25-22 each time. The Illini had backed up their seed and DeBruler was named All-Regional Tournament and later became Illinois' first All-American in four seasons. Illinois finished the season 26-8, a wins mark only eight Illini teams have surpassed in the program's 34 years.

2009

The 2009 season saw continued success for Illinois volleyball. With a 26-6 final record, only four teams in school history posted a better winning percentage. The Illini finished in sole possession of second place in the Big Ten, posting a 16-4 conference mark, and reached the Sweet 16 for the second year in a row and 11th time overall.

Not only that, Illinois, emerged as a top-five team in the country, earning that seed overall in the NCAA Tournament while spending eight straight weeks in the top 10 in the AVCA coaches' poll. Illinois finished the year at No. 10. The Illini posted five victories over ranked opponents and twice defeated the No. 6 ranked team in the country, a five-set thriller at Michigan and a three-set sweep of Minnesota, a Final Four team, at Assembly Hall.

That Assembly Hall victory came in front of a school-record 7,632 fans in a promotion called "Spike the Record" which preceded Illini Basketball Madness.

Junior Laura DeBruler became just the fourth First Team All-American in school history. DeBruler ranked 15th in the nation in kills and 14th nationally in points (4.96).

Illinois again had success through the block. Junior Johannah Bangert led the nation in blocks for the second straight year at 1.58 per set. Her 179 total blocks are third-best in school

history while her 492 career blocks are fifth best. Sophomore Michelle Bartsch (128) and freshman middle blocker Erin Johnson (104) also surpassed 100 blocks on the season as the Illini ranked 18th nationally.

Illinois had three All-Big Ten performers for the first time since 1989 with DeBruler, Bangert and junior setter Hillary Haen, who ranked 16th nationally in assists, earning that distinction. Bartsch was honorable mention All-Big Ten while Johnson was named to the Big Ten All-Freshman team.

Illinois went 14-1 at home, won the Bluejay Invitational to start the year, and claimed its 19th State Farm Illini Classic. In the middle of the season, the Illini rattled off 11 straight victories, which included wins over No. 6 Minnesota and No. 15 Michigan.

During that run, the team lost senior libero Ashley Edinger for the season. Edinger finishes her career with 1,921 digs, the most by an Illini by nearly 500, and ninth-most in Big Ten history. Sophomore Rachel Feldman took over for Edinger and had 19 digs while successfully returning all 41 serves sent her way in her debut vs. Michigan. Feldman had 26 digs vs. Dayton, the most by an Illini ever in an NCAA match.

Illinois also accomplished in the classroom with eight players earning Academic All-Big Ten and three honored as Academic All-District -- Bangert, Haen and DeBruler.

2010

The 2010 season saw Illinois volleyball continue to firmly cement itself as a national contender. The Illini defeated a pair of top-five teams, including eventual national champion Penn State and reached as high as No. 3 in the national poll.

The season also will be remembered for its share of adversity. Both Laura DeBruler and Erin Johnson missed time recovering from mononucleosis. Highly touted freshman Anna Dorn suffered an ACL tear during the second week of the season. But the biggest blow came on Oct. 9 when 2009 First Team All-American DeBruler was lost for the season also with an ACL tear.

Early in the season, the Illini were as good as any team in the country. On Sept. 3, the Illini swept No. 2 Texas 25-23 25-18, 25-18 to end the Longhorns' 25-match home court winning streak. Michelle Bartsch was named the Time Warner Cable Invitational Tournament MVP after hitting .514 in leading the Illini to wins over Texas and Florida A&M.

Early the following week, the Illini found out

DeBruler had mono, and the senior would miss the following two weekends. Even without DeBruler, the Illini defeated No. 20 Dayton and took the first two sets from No. 7 Nebraska in front of nearly 12,000 fans in Lincoln. In set three, however, Bartsch sprained an ankle and Nebraska came back to win in five sets. Bartsch returned the following weekend, but unranked Cincinnati also took down the Illini in five.

The Illini ended the weekend with a win over eventual NCAA qualifier Louisville and DeBruler returned the following weekend against No. 2 and three-time defending national champion Penn State.

With over 4,100 fans filling Huff for the first sellout in 18 years, the Illini posted a thrilling five-set victory over the Nittany Lions, ending their record 65-match Big Ten winning streak on Sept. 24. Colleen Ward led the Illini with 16 kills in that match. Johannah Bangert had 11 kills with no errors in 18 swings for a .611 attack percentage.

Illinois finished the first half of the Big Ten season 9-1, which included five-set victories over No. 25 Northwestern and at No. 20 Minnesota and stood in first place for the first eight weeks

of the season. On Oct. 29, Illinois completed victories over every other Big Ten team with a five-set win over No. 15 Michigan at Huff Hall.

Illinois extended its string to 12-1 to start the conference, winning at Wisconsin for the third straight season. The only loss in the stretch, however, came at Michigan, where DeBruler suffered the ACL tear in set three of the match.

Illinois dropped five of its last seven conference matches, the most devastating coming in the rematch with Minnesota. The Illini led two sets to one and 24-20 in the fourth set, but the Gophers scored 13 of the next 14 points to take the match in five sets.

Illinois saw the NCAA Tournament as a fresh start. On the heels of six wins over ranked opponents, including two in the top five, Illinois received the No. 8 national seed and a pair of home matches. The Illini defeated Austin Peay in three sets in round one, then won the rematch with No. 21 Cincinnati in four sets in the second round to advance to their third straight Sweet 16, setting up another rematch -- this time with ninth-seeded Texas in Austin.

Junior Colleen Ward led the NCAA tournament with 44 kills in the first two matches. Against Texas, it was freshman Jazmine Orozco who led the way with 21 kills, but the hosts battled back from 2-1 down to eliminate the Illini in five sets.

Three Illini earned All-America honors, Ward on the second team and Bartsch and senior setter Hillary Haen on the third team.

The year saw several milestones. DeBruler became Illinois' all-time kills leader, passing Illini legend Mary Eggers at Wisconsin and finishing her career with 1,833.

Johannah Bangert set a new Illinois record for blocks, finishing with 653 for her career, which is also seventh in Big Ten history. In the final match of the year, Bangert set an all-time conference mark for block assists with 613, breaking the old mark by one. Bangert also became Illinois' first First Team Academic All-American since 1990.

Freshman libero Jennifer Bonilla, an Honorable Mention All-Mideast Region selection, set a new single-season school record for digs with 623. Haen moved into fourth on Illinois' all-time assists list with 3,956 while finishing her career eighth on the single-season assist list with 1,471.

2011

To judge the impact the 2011 Illinois volleyball squad had on Fighting Illini fans across the continent and beyond, one just had to look at the thousands of fans who met at a number of local establishments to root on their favorite team in their quest for a national championship. Fans who previously had just a casual interest in the sport were glued to the television and had their hearts racing on every point.

The national ESPN2 audience witnessed one of the epic points in the history of the sport, perhaps the greatest rally the game has seen, especially with what was riding on it. It came at match point of the national semifinal between Illinois and USC. The Illini and Women of Troy took turns taking shots at each other. Some 55 touches, 18 over the net volleys and 68 seconds of electric play later, the Illini completed a five-set win over the nation's top-ranked team and earned a spot in the national championship match. The point got a spot on Sportscenter's "Top Plays" that night and continues to have fans talking about it.

The point was the pinnacle in a historic season for Illinois who broke through a number of barriers.

The Illini began the year 20-0, the second most wins to start a season in school history. It resulted in the school's first number one ranking in the AVCA Coaches poll. The wide-open national race was reflected in six different teams reaching the top spot, but none held it as long as Illinois (four weeks).

For the first time since 1992, Illinois played two home matches in front of near capacity crowds of 4,000-plus. In Illinois' first weekend at number one, a sell-out crowd of 4,261 saw a battle of the last two unbeateans in Illinois and Purdue and the Illini eke out a tight four-set victory over the Boilermakers.

For much of Penn State's 20 years in the Big Ten, the conference championship has gone through Happy Valley, but for the first time ever, Illinois swept the season series from the Nittany Lions.

If the battle with USC was the defining match of the post-season, the first meeting with Penn State was that for the 2011 regular season. Over 5,200 fans watched the match which lasted nearly three hours, and, in the end, the visiting Illini came away with an epic five-set victory.

Illinois hailed perhaps the best outside hitting combination in the country in seniors Colleen Ward, who became Illinois' fifth first-team All-American, and Michelle Bartsch, who earned third-team All-America honors for the second-straight year.

In reality, though, several members of the team took turns taking center stage throughout the year. Redshirt freshman Anna Dorn did so against Penn State, with four blocks in each of the fourth and fifth sets, tying an Illinois record with 13 block assists in the match.

Bartsch helped the Illini get off to a hot start to the season, winning MVP of three in-season tournaments, including the State Farm Illini Classic, which saw the Illini battle back from two sets down to defeat 21st-ranked Dayton. Bartsch had a combined 64 kills and 59 digs while hitting .273 in that tournament. The win over Dayton was one of six for the Illini that went to five sets in that 20-0 start.

The Illini had the top-ranked RPI the entire season, thanks in large to part to a challenging schedule. Illinois won a school record 11 matches against ranked opponents, playing a school-best 15 matches against top-25 clubs as well as 27 matches against 19 NCAA qualifying teams.

Bartsch and fellow senior Rachel Feldman helped the Illini post a 57-6 record at Huff Hall in their

four years, including a 16-1 mark in 2011, which saw 42,068 come through the doors at the historic arena, the second most in school history.

Illinois earned the No. 3 seed for the NCAA Tournament and started its run to the Final Four with convincing straight set wins over Central Michigan and Marquette at Huff, bringing the Illini's all-time postseason home record to 22-3.

For the second-straight year, six Big Ten teams made the Sweet 16 and three of them converged at the Gainesville, Fla., Regional. The Illini met Ohio State in the Regional Semifinal, a round that had been a roadblock for Illinois each of the past three seasons. After dropping the first set, Illinois won a fierce battle with the Buckeyes,

Jennifer Beltran, whose 571 digs in 2011 were second only to her 623 output from 2010 in Illini history, had perhaps her best effort as a collegian with 26 digs vs. the Buckeyes. Beltran later set a new Illinois postseason mark with 32 in the national semifinal win over USC.

Illinois would not be denied in its quest for its first Final Four appearance in 23 years. Facing the host Florida Gators in the Regional Final, the Illini posted a four-set win behind a career match from Ward. The former Gator had 23 kills in 42 swings, hitting .500 in earning the Regional MVP. Bartsch and Beltran joined Ward on the All-Regional Tournament team.

While the Final Four meeting with USC may best be remembered nationally for the final point, the match had some of the best volleyball on display

the entire night. Freshman Liz McMahon, whose 6-6 frame on the right side helped provide a huge blocking presence all year, had five kills in eight swings in the fifth set alone in helping the Orange and Blue advance to the title match.

For much of the night, it was a chess match to try to get the big block with McMahon paired up with USC's Alex Jupiter. The USC outside hitter was the national Player of the Year and she demonstrated it several times with 32 kills in 83 swings and a .241 hitting percentage, but Illinois head coach Kevin Hambly said a big difference was his team having more weapons than the Women of Troy.

For just the second time in school history, two different players contributed 20-20 performances. Ward paved the way with 27 kills in 71 swings, the second most by an Illini player in a postseason match. She added a career-best 22 digs while Bartsch had 22 kills and 22 digs. That marked just the second time that an Illini tandem has posted a 20-20 performance in match.

Junior setter Annie Luhrsen, playing full-time for the first time in three years, helped engineer a high-powered Illinois offense down the stretch of the season and joined Ward and Bartsch on the all-tournament team for the NCAA Finals. Under Luhrsen's guidance, Illinois hit over .300 in seven of the 10 matches leading up to the Final Four, including .340 in a three-set win over Penn State in that rematch and a .338 clip in the Regional Final win over Florida.

Despite the 32-5 overall record, the Illinois faithful

still ponder just how close their team came to claiming the title. The Illini came back from 20-13 down in the second set of the championship match with UCLA to win it and tie match. The Illini then had two set points in the third in an attempt to take a 2-1 lead in the match, but unfortunately, the Bruins scored the final four points of the set and went on to claim that frame and the championship in four sets.

The loss didn't overshadow the list of accomplishments for Illinois, who finished a school-best second in the final coaches' poll. The Big Ten honored Bartsch and Ward as all-conference, McMahon on the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Feldman with the Sportsmanship Award. Erin Johnson, who led the Illini in attack percentage (.328), joined Luhrsen and Dorn in earning Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week throughout the year.

Several players reached milestones. Beltran surpassed the 1,000-dig mark and sits fifth on the all-time career digs list with 1,194 through two seasons. Bartsch ends her career fourth in block assists (422), seventh in kills (1,644), 10th in digs (1,035) and second in attacks (4,776) on the school's career lists. Dorn (178) and Johnson (149) are third and sixth, respectively, in single-season block assists with Dorn's 183 total blocks third for a single season.

"What I'm going to remember most is how much I enjoyed coaching this team," Hambly said on the season to remember.

HUFF HALL



This year marks the 23rd season that the Illinois volleyball program has called George Huff Hall its home. Huff Hall is a versatile multi-use facility and is home for Illini volleyball, wrestling and men's and women's gymnastics.

Illinois has been one of the nation's toughest places for visiting teams as the Illini have compiled a 304-99 (.754) home mark during the past 27 seasons. Illinois won 33 home matches in a row from 1987-89 and 22 in a row from 1991-1992 and 2010-11.

Illinois has consistently been ranked among the top 10 in the nation in attendance. Much of Illinois' success can be attributed to the home court advantage created by Illini fans. Illinois sold out Huff Hall for the Penn State match in 2010, drawing 4,141 fans, then tallied 3,127 vs. Northwestern. The Illini had two more 4,000-plus crowds in 2,011 and ranked 10th in the nation in attendance.

The Fighting Illini won consecutive NCAA attendance titles in 1992 and 1993. In 1992, the Illini broke the NCAA single season attendance record as 52,666 fans packed into Huff Hall for 17 matches, an average of 3,098 per match.

Huff Hall contains two volleyball practice courts and the volleyball game facility. In addition, the building contains the spacious Illinois volleyball locker and squad rooms, which were completely renovated in 2002. Huff Hall also houses a weight room, equipment rooms, locker rooms, training rooms, a wrestling room and one squash court. Within the last decade, Illinois has made multiple improvements to Huff Hall with the addition of a new scoreboard, a new sound system, new bleachers and new lighting.

Huff Hall, known for creating the circus-like atmosphere that fostered the term "March Madness" when it was the longtime home of the Illinois State High School Association state basketball tournament, is a versatile, multi-use facility that currently serves as the home for the Fighting Illini men's and women's gymnastics, volleyball, and wrestling squads.

Huff Hall is named for longtime Illinois Athletic Director and coach, George Huff. Huff served as Illinois' Athletic Director from 1901 to 1935, during a time in which the Fighting Illini athletic programs enjoyed unparalleled success. Huff was also the driving force behind the construction of Memorial Stadium in 1923.

Prior to Huff's tenure as athletic director, he served as head football coach from 1895 to 1899 and baseball skipper from 1896 to 1919. Known by many of his close friends and business associates as "G," Huff served as manager of the Boston Red Sox in 1907.

Originally called the "New Gymnasium", Huff Hall was designed in the Georgian-Revival Style by Charles A. Platt and University Architect James M. White. The building's architecture matches that of the Armory, Main Library, the Union, and other campus buildings. At the conclusion of its \$772,000 construction in 1925, Huff Hall replaced the Military Drill Hall (now known as Kenney Gym Annex) as the home for Fighting Illini basketball.

The "New Gymnasium" was renamed Huff Hall in 1937 following the longtime athletic director's death. Today, the University of Illinois works to honor the hard work and success of Huff with the George Huff award. Every year, this award is given to student-athletes who earn a 3.0 GPA for a full academic year.

HUFF HALL



Illinois athletics has enjoyed a proud athletic tradition in the gymnasium at Huff Hall. Huff Hall served as home for Illinois basketball from 1925 to 1963, when the Fighting Illini cagers won 339 out of 418 games (.811), eight Big Ten championships and earned two NCAA Final Four appearances. Even though it was more than twice the size of the old Drill Hall where Illinois used to play, it was realized soon after construction that the building was too small to hold all the Illinois fans.

In 1925 a writer for the Illinois Alumni News stated "It seems high time that the Stadium (referring to Memorial Stadium) be roofed over for basketball. We can't imagine any other way to get in all the customers". The Illinois basketball team played to raucous capacity crowds for nearly 40 years while at Huff Hall, forcing some fans to wait several years to obtain tickets.

The gymnasium in Huff Hall has hosted its fair share of championships at the collegiate and high school levels over the years. In 1940 and 1947 the Fighting Illini hosted the NCAA National Wrestling Championships at Huff Hall. In 1930, 1933, 1946, 1948, and 1958 the Big Ten Wrestling Championships came to Huff. Not to be outdone, the IHSA used the gymnasium at Huff Hall for nine of its state wrestling tournaments in the 1940's, 1950's and 1960's, prior to the championships moving down Fourth Street to the Assembly Hall.

Huff Hall also served as host for the 1991, 1995 and 2003 Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championships; the 1992, 1995 and 2004 Big Ten Men's Gymnastics Championships, in addition to being the site of the 1993 and 1999 NCAA Men's Gymnastics East Regional.

In 1992, Huff Hall hosted the NCAA's first-round and regional volleyball matches, in 1994

an NCAA's first-round volleyball match, a 1995 NCAA second-round volleyball match, and the first and second rounds of the 1998, 2001, 2003, 2008, 2009, 2010 & 2011 NCAA Volleyball Tournaments. The first and second rounds of the 1997 NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament were also played in the gymnasium at Huff Hall.

Huff Hall houses a training room, a weight room, equipment rooms, locker rooms (used by the softball, men's and women's track & field, volleyball and wrestling teams), and one squash court, in the basement; as well as many academic offices and classrooms on the first, second and third floors. Additionally, athletes can access the 200-meter indoor track at the Armory via an underground tunnel that connects the two buildings.

In 2002, the women's locker and squad rooms were completely renovated. While two years later the men's locker and squad rooms along with the training and weight rooms were fully renovated.

Prior to the renovations in the basement of Huff Hall the gymnasium was remodeled with a new scoreboard, a new sound system and new bleachers as well as improved lighting.

Huff Hall's gymnasium, located on the first floor, contains enough space for two volleyball practice courts and the volleyball game facility or four basketball courts and a competition court. The gymnasium has a capacity of 3,800 for gymnastics meets, 4,000 for basketball games, and 4,500 for volleyball and wrestling matches.

Creating an intimidating home court advantage for the Fighting Illini, collapsible bleacher seats circle the floor of the gymnasium while permanent balcony seats ring the north, east and west sides of the gymnasium.

Huff Hall's volleyball seating capacity is 4,050.

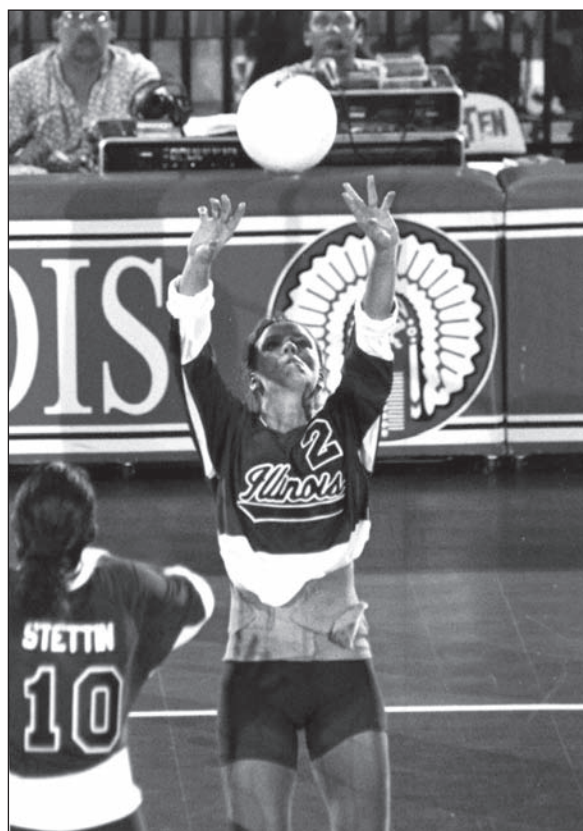

STATE FARM ILLINI CLASSIC

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE ILLINI CLASSIC

The four-team Illini Classic began in 1984, featuring Missouri, Northern Illinois, Notre Dame and the host Fighting Illini. Missouri won the inaugural round-robin tournament with a perfect 6-0 record.

In 1985, Illinois defeated New Mexico State, 3-0, to win its first Classic title. In 1986, No. 4 San Jose State ended a 15-match home winning streak for the Illini, winning 3-1.

In 1987, No. 4 Brigham Young defeated No. 6 Illinois, 3-1, in the title match featuring two of the nation’s top returning teams.

The Fighting Illini captured the 1988 and 1989 Classic titles, defeating Nebraska and Pittsburgh. In 1990, No. 6 Stanford pulled off a stunning comeback to defeat the Illini in the title match. In 1991, Illinois scored the last six points in the decisive fifth game, stunning No. 19 Georgia to win the championship.

In 1992, the Classic featured the “Big Eight-Big Ten Challenge” pitting No. 12 Illinois and No. 14 Ohio State against No. 5 Nebraska and No. 16 Colorado. Illinois captured the 1995 title by defeating the Louisville Cardinals in the championship match. That began a winning streak of consecutive tournament titles for the Illini, which stood at six until Florida ended the streak by claiming the 2001 title.

In one of the biggest regular season victories in school history, the Illini defeated #1 USC, ending the Women of Troy’s then NCAA record 52-game winning streak in the 2004 finals. The Illini rallied from 2-1 down to claim the victory in front of more than 3,000 fans at Huff Hall. The “Stuff Huff” promotion produced 3,219 fans for the 2006 tournament and season opener between Illinois and Illinois State. The Illini claimed their 18th championship with a victory over No. 11 Oregon in dramatic fashion in 2008 and went 3-0 for the titles in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

Illinois has won 21 of the 28 titles.

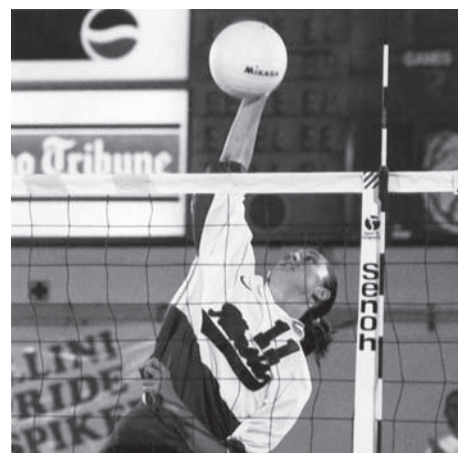

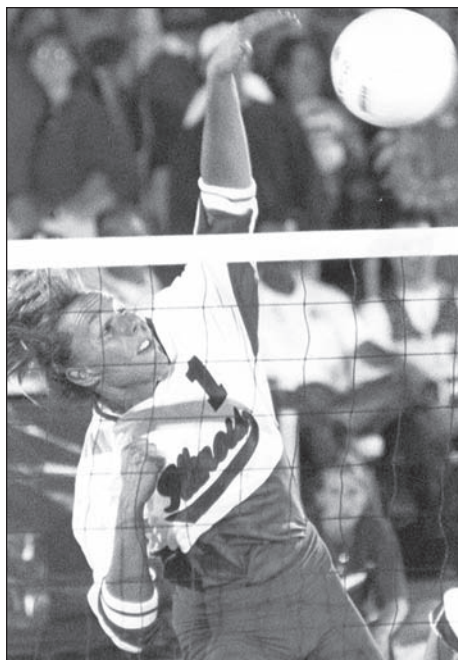

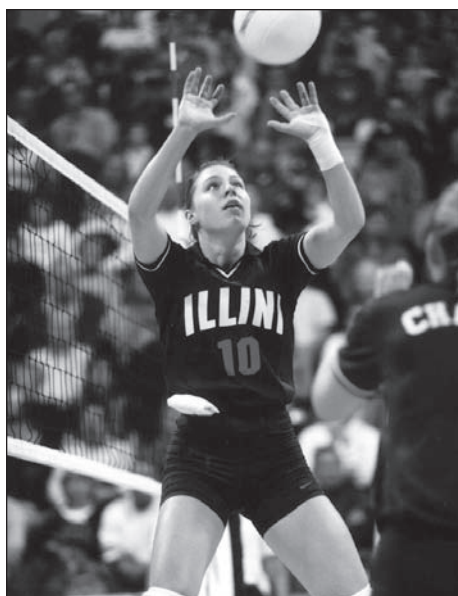

In 13 seasons, Mike Hebert turned a program around from one that had six consecutive losing seasons to one that reached the NCAA National Semifinals and was consistently ranked among the top in the nation. Hebert became the winningest coach in school history and reached a milestone of 500 career wins while with the Illini.

Hebert's squads won

four Big Ten titles (1986, 1987, 1988, 1992) went to 11 consecutive NCAA tournaments and reached the national semifinals in 1987 and 1988. During Hebert's tenure, Illinois established itself as a leader in volleyball and won the national attendance title in 1992 and 1993. Prior to coming to Illinois, Hebert served as head coach at New Mexico State and at Pittsburgh.

DON HARDIN

After guiding the University of Louisville for eight successful seasons, including six NCAA appearances, Don Hardin was named the sixth head coach in Fighting Illini history, Jan. 19, 1996. A former assistant at Illinois for the 1987 Final Four team, Hardin led Illinois to six NCAA appearances (1998, 1999, 2001, 2003, 2004 & 2008), including three trips to the Sweet 16

in 1998, 2003, & 2008. Hardin was named Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2001 after leading the Illini to a 21-9 record, the second round of the NCAA Tournament and a final national ranking of 20th. Illinois finished the 2003 season ranked 15th nationally and had its best season since 1992, earning Hardin his second Big Ten Coach of the Year honor. In 2008, the Illini earned a No. 9 national seed and finished the year ranked 11th in the final poll. He had only one player transfer in 13 seasons while his players posted a near perfect graduation rate.

The Illini swept the season series from four-time defending national champion Penn State for the first time in school history and earned the No. 3 national seed in the NCAA Tournament.

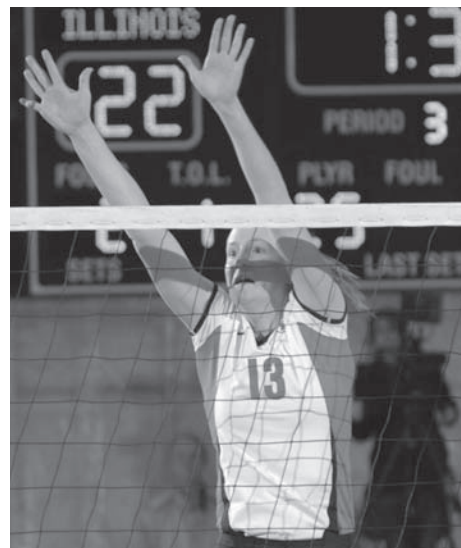

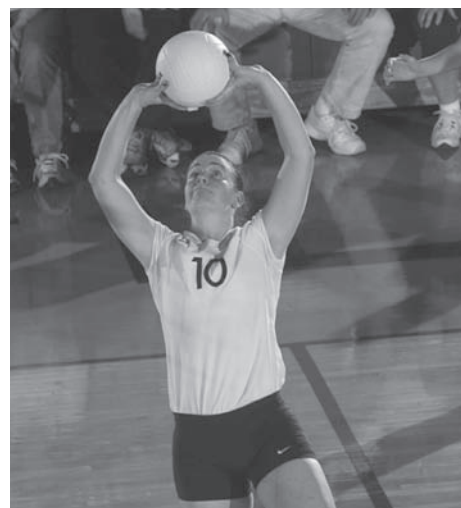

Lisa Argabright will be remembered for thunderous kills that brought down the house at Huff Hall in 2003. The student section would chant from across both sides of the court, "Jack-Hammer, Jack-Hammer" every time Argabright had a putaway.

The lanky, long-armed 6-5 middle blocker redefined the position at Illinois, hitting .376 for the year and averaging 1.28 blocks per game in 2003. Argabright registered double figures in kills in 26 of 33 matches and recorded a hitting percentage of .400 or better in 15 matches.

Illinois suffered through an injury-plagued 2002 with Argabright missing a portion of the season with mononucleosis and also battling an elbow injury. The Illini finished 13-16 and were overlooked coming into 2003.

As the 2003 season progressed, however, it became obvious that Illinois was a team that could contend for the Big Ten title. Then, in mid-October, the Illini swept Penn State and Ohio State in a weekend for the first time in eight seasons. Argabright hit .429 and had 16 kills vs. No. 11 Penn State and hit .417 with 17 kills vs. Ohio State to earn Big Ten Player of the Week honors. Earlier in the year she earned MVP honors at the University of Connecticut and Illini Classic Tournaments as the Illini won nine straight, the best streak under Coach Don Hardin. With Argabright swinging away, the Illini had their best season in 11 years, going 26-7 with a trip to the Sweet 16.

Argabright led Illinois in kills and blocks for three straight years. She ranks third in attack percentage in a match with 15 kills in 16 swings for a .938 clip vs. Manhattan on Sept. 12, 2003. The two-time All-Big Ten selection finished her career with a .352 attack percentage, fifth in school history while amassing 1,111 career kills and 404 career blocks.



JOHANNAH BANGERT

2009 // HONORABLE MENTION

Johannah Bangert holds the record for the triple and long jumps at Washington High School in Missouri. It's that leaping ability that has transformed Bangert into one of the top blockers in the country.

In fact, Bangert led the nation in blocks in back-to-back seasons, averaging 1.60 and 1.58 blocks per set in 2008 and 2009, respectively.

Bangert etched her name in the Illini record books, setting the career mark for blocks with 653, breaking the old record held by Illini great Mary Eggers. She also holds the Big Ten record for career block assists with 613 as well as the second and third best single-season blocks marks by an Illini with 202 and 179 as a sophomore and junior, respectively. Bangert tied the school's single-match block assists record with 13 vs. both Purdue and Wisconsin and now has five of the top nine on that list.

A three-year starter from a recruiting class ranked No. 6 in the nation, Bangert helped the Illini to three straight Sweet 16 appearances. She was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week five times during her career while also earning two Academic All-Big Ten honors and in 2009 and 2010 being named *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-District. Bangert covers a lot of ground at the net all the while hitting .27 for her career.

Bangert has had some of her best matches against some of the nation's best, which included teaming with Michelle Bartsch for the match-tying kill vs. Michigan in 2009.

Bangert has the personality to go along with her play on the floor with many rituals and traditions, including wearing purple on Thursdays.

**MICHELLE BARTSCH****2010, 2011 -- THIRD TEAM // 2009 -- HM**

Michelle Bartsch was one of the most well rounded player in Illinois history.

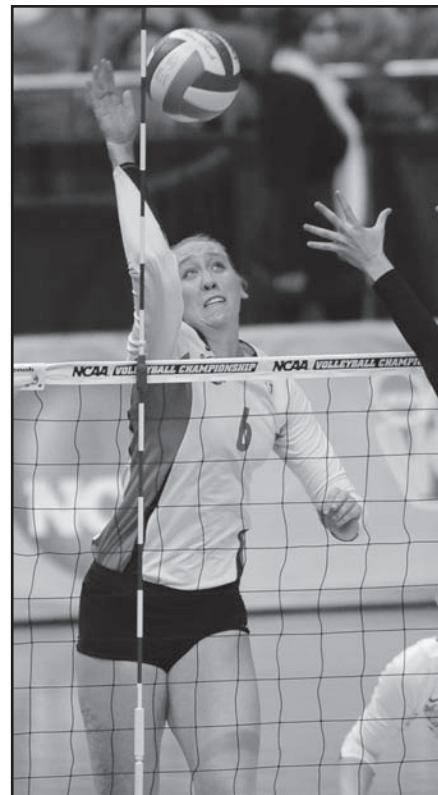
As a freshman, Bartsch played just three front row rotations, working with Johannah Bangert to become a lethal "Killer B" block combination while stopping many of the top left-side hitters on the schedule. As a sophomore, however, Bartsch played every rotation, becoming an effective pass-hitter while also increasing her kill total from 295 to 344. Bartsch averaged 2.24 digs per set as well.

As a junior, Bartsch moved past the 1,000-kill mark after a career-best 448 and earned MVP of the Time Warner Cable Invitational, a tournament that saw the Illini sweep No. 2 Texas in its own arena.

Along with teammate Colleen Ward, Bartsch was one of the top "pin" players in the Big Ten in 2011. She was named First Team All-American by *Volleyball Magazine*, an All-Big Ten performer and third-team AVCA All-American. She also earned MVP honors for three tournaments. Bartsch became just the sixth Illinois player with multiple 20-20 performances when she did so on consecutive days (vs. Tennessee and Dayton) then added a third 20-20 match with 22 kills and 22 digs vs. USC.

Bartsch was also named the top server at the NORCECA games while playing for the U.S. Junior National team in the summer of 2008. She was also invited to participate on the United States National A2 team multiple times during her college career.

Bartsch ends her career ranked second in attack attempts (4,776), fourth in block assists (422), seventh in kills (1,644), eighth in total blocks (451), and 10th in digs (1,035) and on Illinois' career list. Her 466 digs in 2011 are the seventh most by an Illinois player in a single-season. She led Illinois in kills with 557 in 2011, the fifth-most in a single-season in school history.

**JESSICA BELTER****2004 // HONORABLE MENTION**

Jessica Belter is one of the top opposite side hitters to play at Illinois. Hitting alongside the likes of Melissa Vandrey and Lisa Argabright, Belter played on three NCAA qualifiers, including the 2003 Sweet 16 Team.

Belter was named AVCA National Player of the Week on Oct. 20, 2003. She erupted for 16 kills in 19 swings for a .737 hitting percentage vs. Michigan State, then registered 12 kills and 11 digs, hitting a match-high .417 with two errors in 24 swings, in the 3-1 victory over Michigan. Belter just missed a triple-double in the win over the Wolverines as she tied her career best in blocks with eight. For the week, she hit .558 with 14.0 kills, 1.7 blocks, and

2.0 digs per game. Belter also had the game-winning kill in game four of a five-game victory over Minnesota at Huff that year.

Having to wear a special wrap on her hand to prevent injury, her success and popularity led to many student fans in the crowd wearing socks over their hands in honor of Belter.

In 2004, Belter ranked eighth in the Big Ten in attack percentage (.324) during all matches, but third in the league (.351) during the 20-match Big Ten season. She was named Big Ten Player of the Week for having monster matches again vs. Michigan State and Michigan, totaling 43 kills and hitting a combined .567 in home victories. She ended her career with 917 kills, including 380 in 2004. She added 108 digs and 90 blocks in her senior season as well.

A first team All-Big Ten performer, Belter was named to four all-tournament teams in her career.

ERIN BORSKE

1995 // FIRST TEAM

44 -- that's the number of kills Erin Borske had in a five-game match against No. 6 Penn State. Those who saw Borske play were impressed, but not surprised. In fact, after that Nittany Lion match, Penn State coach Russ Rose said, "We held Erin to only 44 kills, that's pretty good."

Such were the sentiments of most who saw Borske. She was head and shoulders above the rest on most nights. Even after the alumni match as a freshman, her first competition at Huff Hall, one alum said, "When I saw her, I thought another Mary Eggers."

In just two years at Illinois, Borske had 28 20-plus kills matches, which was the Illinois record until 2005, when Rachel VanMeter recorded her 29th. Her 44 kills vs. Penn State are second in Big Ten history and her 714 kills in 1995 are an Illini record. But Borske was more than a strong offensive player. On Nov. 17, Borske added 26 digs to go with her 41 kills in a five-game victory over Minnesota.

Borske and Mary Eggers are the only two sophomores from Illinois to earn first-team All-America status. At the end of her career, she owned six Big Ten single-match or single-season records, currently holding 13 Illinois marks. She finished the year with 396 digs (second in Illinois history) to go along with her 714 kills in 1995. At the time, Borske had shattered the Big Ten records for kills in a season by 80 and averaged 6.17 kills per game in Big Ten play. She also earned MVP honors in all three tournaments in which the Illini participated in 1995. The Illini defeated Georgia 3-1 to advance to the NCAA Sweet 16. Borske had 35 kills and hit .373 to pace Illinois in that match.

Borske was the Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1994 after amassing 478 kills and 355 digs. Playing just two seasons, Borske totaled 1,192 kills and 751 digs.



NANCY BROOKHART

1987, 1988, 1989 // SECOND TEAM

Nancy Brookhart and teammate Mary Eggers made for an intimidating combination along the front line during Illinois' back-to-back Final Four seasons of 1987 and 1988.

Brookhart ranked 17th nationally with a .373 clip hitting percentage in 1988 and set a Big Ten single-match record with a .941 clip (16 kills in 17 attempts) vs. Michigan in 1987.

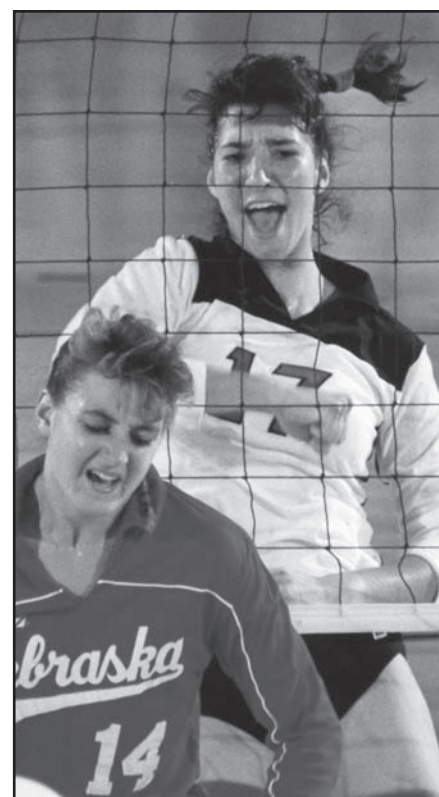
In 1987, Brookhart shared Big Ten Most Valuable Player honors with Eggers and was named to the NCAA Mideast Regional All-Tournament Team in '87 as well.

Brookhart's 1,669 kills rank fourth all-time at Illinois, while her 540 kills in 1987 set an Illini record, which was eventually broken by Erin Borske in 1995.

Brookhart exploded on to the scene as a freshman in 1985. Beyond Illinois, she played on a United States traveling team, was invited to the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1987, and played at the World University Games during the summer of 1986.

Noted for her excitement and passion for the game on the court, Brookhart once told a reporter, "I've never had so much fun in my life. I come out for every match and find a way to have a good time."

A first team All-American at Glenbard West High School in Glen Ellyn, Ill., Brookhart missed the 1986 NCAA Tournament after coming down with mononucleosis, but rebounded the following year to not only be named one of the Top 50 players in the country, but earn All-Regional accolades as Illinois advanced to its first Final Four.

LAURA BUSH

1989 // SECOND TEAM

By the time 1989 rolled around, Illinois had established itself as a national power, and like most good baseball teams, the strength of the volleyball team could be found up the middle. Bush became Illinois' fourth superstar middle blocker and third All-American under Mike Hebert, who had quickly gained a reputation in producing strong players at the position.

Ironically, Bush moved from outside hitter to the middle after Mary Eggers sustained an injury during a match early in the 1988 season. Even at the outside, Bush developed into one of the Illini's top blockers.

Bush, who led Illinois with 449 kills in 1989, also garnered first team Academic All-America honors by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). A native of one of the small-school powers in Illinois, Stewardson-Strasburg, Bush earned a perfect 5.0 grade-point average during her first semester on campus.

Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner helped coin the phrase "The '80s Belong the Illini" and with Bush, Eggers, Brookhart and others, the Illini not only advanced to the Final Four in volleyball during the 1988-89 season, but the "Flying Illini" did so in basketball as well. The following year, Bush and one of the stars of the basketball team, Kendall Gill, shared the spotlight as the Illini's Female and Male Athletes of the Year.

In that 1989 All-America season, Bush led Illinois to the Regional Final and a no. 7 national ranking while not only leading the Illini in kills, but blocks (116) and digs (308) as well. She also became the third player in team history to win the Sandy Scholtens Award.



LAURA DEBRULER

2009 -- FIRST TEAM // 2008 -- SECOND TEAM

Laura DeBruler helped represent a rebirth of Illinois volleyball during the 2008 and 2009 seasons.

The hard-hitting precision swings of the 5-10 player made her an instant fan favorite, even as a freshman in 2007. That year DeBruler led all freshmen nationally in kills per game en route to All-Big Ten Honorable Mention accolades. She had 28 kills in her collegiate debut against Bowling Green in 2007 and finished with 577 for the season.

Over the next two seasons, DeBruler earned two All-America honors all while leading the Illini to back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances. She became one of the more popular players on campus, not only because of her skill and athleticism, but also because of her energy and humility.

The 2010 season was one of high expectations for DeBruler and the Illini. Early in the season, she helped the Illini to victories over No. 2 Texas, ending the Longhorns 25-match home court winning streak, and No. 2 Penn State in front of a sold out Huff Hall, ending the Lions record 65-match Big Ten win streak. She became Illinois' all-time leader in kills (1,883) and attacks (4,806) vs. Wisconsin before suffering a season-ending ACL tear a week later.

Over her career, DeBruler earned eight Big Ten Player of the Week honors, two unanimous choice selections as first team All-Big Ten, and became just the fourth player in Illinois history to be named First Team All-America. During her career, DeBruler was named to 12 all-tournament teams, including being named MVP of three. In 2009, DeBruler ranked 15th nationally in kills per set (4.46) and 14th in the nation in points per set (4.96 pps) while being named MVP of two tournaments.

MARY EGGERS/ 1989 HONDA AWARD 1986, 1987, 1988 // FIRST TEAM

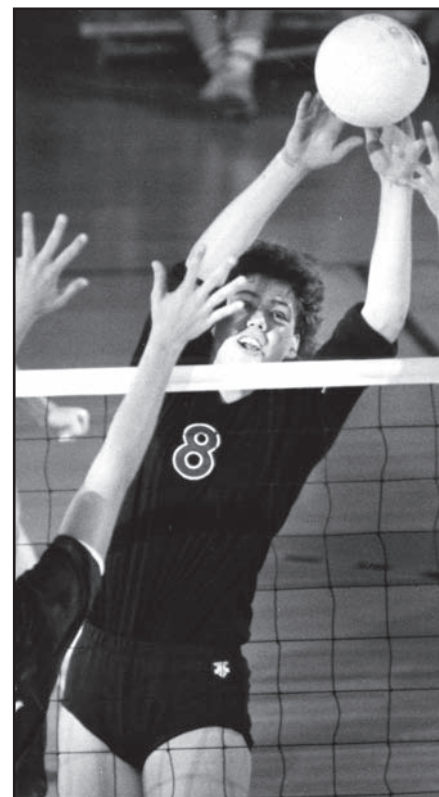
In a golden era of Illinois volleyball full of great players, one stood out from the rest. At 5-11, she wasn't the tallest player on the floor, but as the *News-Gazette* sportswriter Joe Milas described, "While others can jump higher, perhaps hit the ball harder, no one gets more out of each attack attempt than Eggers. Her ability to hang in the air, a la Michael Jordan, lets her see where to place the ball over, around, or through an opponent's block. Her intense expression freezes the other team, and, just when they're expecting a hard-hit ball, Eggers softly taps it over for a winner."

A perhaps unassuming player off the court, no one was more competitive on it. A record-setting runner and talented basketball player in high school, Eggers chose to pursue her favorite sport, volleyball, in college. Once when a tornado warning halted play during a match, head coach Mike Hebert found Eggers and a teammate diving to the floor while playing handball in the hallway.

Not only did Eggers earn three first team All-America awards, she earned the Honda Player of the year award in 1988-89. She was the Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1985 and earned four first team All-Big Ten selections and the league's Most Valuable Player in 1986, 1987, and 1988. Eggers led the nation in hitting percentage in 1986 and 1988, setting an NCAA record with her .455 mark in 1986. Her career hitting percentage of .420 stood as the NCAA record until 1993 and currently ranks third all time.

Eggers was the driving force behind two Final Four appearances for Illinois -- in 1987 and 1988. She holds Illinois records for most kills in a career (1,761) and has the top-three seasons in terms of hitting percentage (.455 in 1986, .436 in 1987 and .433 in 1988) in school history.

She played with the USA National Team, competed professionally in Europe and currently is the head coach at Elon University.



KIRSTEN GLEIS 1992 // FIRST TEAM

Kirsten Gleis made the most of her one year at Illinois, getting the Illini back to the Elite Eight for the first time in four years. Gleis, a Dutch citizen, transferred to Illinois to complete her degree in economic geography. She had started for the National Team of Holland in the 1992 Olympic games in Barcelona.

At the time called perhaps the best player in Big Ten history, Gleis helped the Illini to a share of the conference championship. Her play and that of her teammates were instrumental in Illinois averaging over 3,000 fans per match in 1992. The Illini hosted both the NCAA first and second rounds and NCAA Regional,

falling to No. 2 Stanford, 3-1, in the Regional Final.

Illinois head coach Mike Hebert discovered Gleis while scouting for venues for the team's European trip, and she became the second All-American at Illinois from Holland, joining Petra Laverman, the third team All-American in 1990.

Gleis was named to every all-tournament, all-regional, and All-America team possible, including earning MVP honors at the Reebok Challenge and the Illini Classic. She totaled 456 kills, 45 aces, 106 blocks and 236 digs in her only season in Champaign as the primary offensive and defensive player. She was named Big Ten Player of the Week three times.

Her influence went beyond the stat sheet. Posting a near perfect grade-point average, Gleis was the one the Illini went to when "we needed a steady influence on the floor, in team timeouts, or when the team needed a boost" according to Hebert.

HILLARY HAEN

2010 -- THIRD TEAM // 2009 -- HM

Like a starting quarterback of a football team, Hillary Haen was the engineer behind a team which reached as high as No. 5 in the nation in 2009 and emerged a legitimate Final Four contender in 2010 moving up to No. 3 and finishing the year No. 9.

Haen was regarded as one of the top setters in the country in '09 and '10 and the accolades reflect that. She was two-time all-Big Ten selection, an all-Mideast Region choice, and became just the second setter in Illinois history to be named an All-American, joining Erin Virtue.

Haen was 16th in the nation in assists in 2009 and 17th nationally in that department in 2010. She moved into fourth on Illinois' all-time career assists list at 3,956 and her 1,471 assists during her senior season rank eighth best.

Haen earned four All-Tournament accolades in her final two seasons, and was named MVP of the 2010 State Farm Illini Classic after posting 134 assists combined in three Illinois victories.

As a sophomore, Haen was a right side hitter during her front row rotations and totaled 162 blocks for her career. In addition, she tallied 910 digs and 53 service aces.

Illinois' success in the late 2000s coincided with the recruiting class of 2007, which was ranked No. 6 nationally. Haen was considered one of the top three setters of that class. In her four years, Illinois advanced to three Sweet 16s; won 92 matches, including 20 over ranked opponents; and posted three straight 20-win seasons. In 2010, Illinois ended Texas' 25-match home court winning streak, defeating the No. 2 Longhorns in three sets; and won a thrilling match over No. 2 Penn State, halting the Nittany Lions' record 65-match Big Ten win streak.

The Crystal Lake, Ill., native was as accomplished off the court. The accounting major earned three straight Academic All-Big Ten honors.



TINA ROGERS

1992 // SECOND TEAM

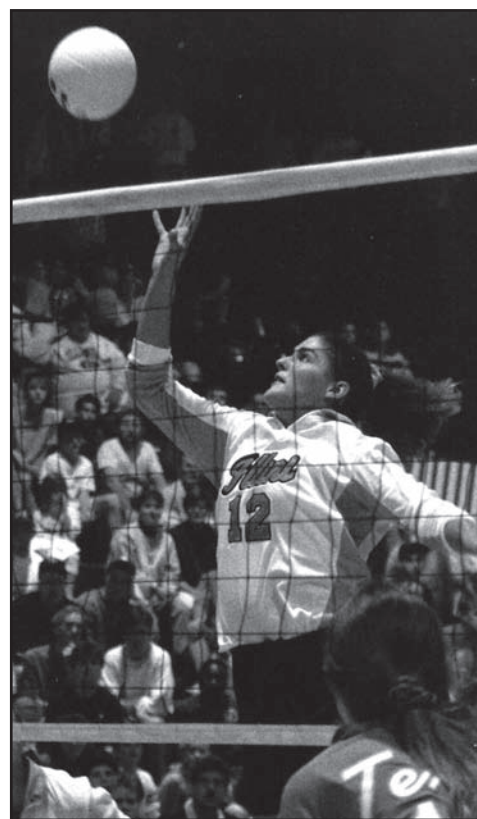
One of the most popular players in Illinois history, Tina Rogers came to Illinois from one of the state's small-school giants, Mt. Pulaski, leading the Hilltoppers to the 1989 state title and earning *News-Gazette* Player of the Year honors.

Andrew Bagnato of the *Chicago Tribune* wrote "On a campus whose sports spotlight is dominated by men's basketball and football, she is the lone female athlete big enough to need only a first name. At Illinois there is Jason (Verduzco), there is Deon (Thomas), and there is Tina."

After missing part of the 1991 season following arthroscopic knee surgery, Rogers didn't emerge as a force until the 1992 season. Nicknamed "The Big Hurt" after White Sox slugger Frank Thomas, Rogers ranked third in the Big Ten in hitting percentage (.385), one of four Illini in the top five. Her 67 aces in 1992 led the conference and are still an Illinois record, and her 143 career aces are fifth all-time.

Rogers played in one of the best eras of Illini volleyball. Illinois led the nation in attendance in both 1992 and 1993 and qualified for the NCAA Tournament in each of Rogers' four years. A four-time Big Ten Player of the Week, Rogers led the Illini to a 90-39 mark in her four years.

After the graduation of Lorna Henderson from the 1992 team and Kirsten Gleis' decision to return to Holland, Rogers was the focal point of the 1993 offense, setting an Illinois record with seven 20-kills matches, a mark which is currently seventh-most in Illinois history. Her 32 kills vs. Southwest Missouri set an Illinois record for kills in a three-game match. She was honored with the 1993-94 Dike Eddleman Award, given to Illinois' top male and female athletes.

ERIN VIRTUE

2003 // HONORABLE MENTION

Erin Virtue helped signal a revival in Illinois volleyball. A major reason for the Illini's first Sweet 16 appearance in five years, Virtue had 1,627 assists in 2003, fifth most in Illinois history. A first team All-Big Ten honoree, she was second in the league in assists per game (13.56) and was named to three All-Tournament teams.

Virtue helped engineer home victories over No. 11 Penn State and a come-from behind victory over nationally-ranked Minnesota at Huff Hall. A victory over No. 19 Louisville sent the Illini into the NCAA Sweet 16 in Hawaii.

Virtue made her presence felt in all areas, leading the team and ranking seventh in the Big Ten in service aces (40), while ranking second on the team and 18th in the conference in digs (2.68). She also totaled 15 double-doubles on the season. A native of St. Charles, Ill., Virtue helped guide her high school, St. Francis, to second in the state as a senior.

Virtue and the Illini looked forward to another strong season in 2004. She was named a Preseason All-American that year, and Illinois was ranked in the preseason Top 25. The senior helped the Illini to one of the program's most memorable wins in school history -- a comeback three games to two win over No. 1 USC, the two-time defending national champion who entered the match with the longest win streak in NCAA history, 52 matches. With the win, Illinois moved to No. 9 in the polls. Unfortunately, Virtue suffered a career-ending ACL tear the following weekend.

"Erin helped to transform the direction of this program," her coach Don Hardin said.



COLLEEN WARD

2010 -- SECOND TEAM // 2011 -- FIRST TEAM

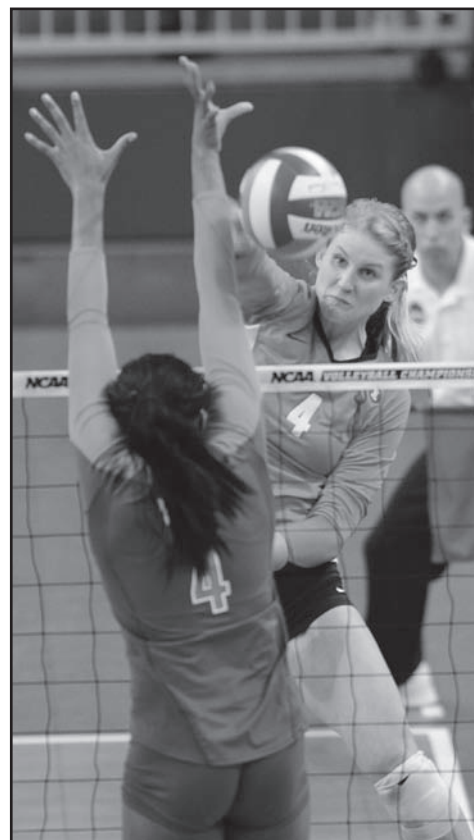
When Colleen Ward elected to transfer to Illinois from Florida for the 2010 season, coach Kevin Hambly said that put Illinois in the discussion for the Final Four and national championship. Ward, the No. 7 ranked player in her class coming out of high school, did just for the Fighting Illini. In two years, the Naperville, Ill., native had 1,051 kills and 714 digs and propped the Illini to the Sweet 16 in 2010 and all the way to the national championship match in 2011, the first in the history of the program.

Nicknamed "Ace Ward" by longtime play-by-play man Dave Loane, Ward had an impressive debut setting the Illinois record for aces in a match with nine vs. BYU. Ward served eight straight points to the help the Illini pull away from No. 2 Texas early in the season in Austin. With Laura DeBruler missing most of the 2010 season due to injury, Ward stepped in as Illinois' top scoring threat.

In 2011, Ward was named to two All-Tournament teams and had a combined 29 kills in road victories over Ohio St. and Penn St., helping the Illini to their first win in State College in 16 years.

But Ward saved her best for the NCAA Tournament. In an interesting twist of fate, she returned to Gainesville, her college home for two years, for the NCAA Regional. Ward was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Regional, posting 38 kills and 20 digs while hitting .319 in wins over Ohio State and Florida. The last point saw Ward hit high hands off the Gator block and the ball sailed all the way past the base line. She served four straight points in the critical fifth set in a 3-2 victory over No. 1 USC in the national semifinal and was named to the all-NCAA Tournament Team after combining for 44 kills and 35 digs in matches against USC and UCLA.

Ward led Illinois with 101 kills in the NCAA Tourney and was named First Team All-American.
