The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: S. E. Grantham, President, Albert L. Ridgely and I. H. Taylor, Commissioners and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. The minutes of the preceding meetings were read and approved.

The Superintendent informed the Board that the deeds for the sale of the Washington Street lot to the Savage Manufacturing Company and the Guilford Road lot to the Board of Education had been signed and that a check for \$3,000.00 had been given to the Savage Manufacturing Co. and a check for \$300.00 had been given by the Savage Manufacturing Company to the Board of Education.

Deed for Savage Lot

A contract had been signed by Borough Storch and the Board of Education for the tearing down and removal of the Guilford Road building and Mr. Storch had paid the balance of \$175.00 on the purchase of this building. Contracts had been signed with the Carlstrand Engineering Co. and it was expected they would start work on the new building by January 24, or sooner if the building were removed from the lot by Storch.

Mr. Borough Storch appeared before the Board and offered to buy the present brick school building on Washington Street for \$200.00. Mr. Granthan requested that Mr. Storch leave his offer before the Board until January 15, at which time an answer would be given. Mr. Grantham informed the Board that he was in touch with a possible buyer who expected to make an offer for the building on this date.

Wrecking and removal of Savage Sch. bldg.

The Superintendent brought before the Board the request of Mr. Rausch who lives on the New Cut Road and requested bus service for his children to the Ellicott City High School. The Superintendent informed the Board that he could arrange for one of the Miller busses to go out New Cut Road on its second trip to Pfeiffers' Corner, returning by its usual route over the Montgomery and Clarksville Roads to Ellicott City. The Board approved this arrangement if it could be arranged with Mr. Miller without additional cost to the Board.

Bus Service for Mr. Rausch' children

The Superintendent informed the Board that a second purchase of coal would be necessary sometime in January or early February for the West Friendship, Lisbon, Clarksville and Elkridge schools and requested authority to ask for bids in accordance with the specifications adopted by the Board. The request was approved.

Approval of Negro pupils to attend High School in P. G. County

The Secretary stated to the Board that the Board had approved the principle of Negro high school education in its establishment of a four-year high school at Cooksville. Four students living in the southeast end of the county - Hilda Moore, James Carter, Mary Snell and Anna Brogden - were attending the Prince George's High School at Lakeland and request had been made to the Board to approve the payment of their tuition. The Board was informed that tuition charges for these four students would be but \$60.00 per year. Inasmuch as Prince George's County was an equalization county and capital outlay charges only had to be paid, the Board approved the payment by the county of the tuition charges for these four students.

Monitors on School Busses The Superintendent reported that he had received a letter of resignation from Miss Gertrude Warfield, who had been granted a year's leave of absence for 1936 which had expired. The Superintendent also reported the resignation of Miss Mary McBride, colored teacher of the Mount View School. On recommendation of the Superintendent, the Board voted to accept both resignations. The Superintendent recommended the appointment of Martha Louise Dorsey to the Mount View Colored School and Mrs. Mary H. Wilder, primary teacher at the High Ridge School, and the Board approved these appointments.

The Superintendent explained to the Board that the Savage Manufacturing Company had reported they had made a mistake in advising the Board of Education that the sewer line existed on Guilford Road opposite the new school lot and that the nearest sewer would be on Baltimore Street near the Community Hall. The Board was informed that in all probability a line would have to be laid from the school property to the neighborhood of the Community Hall, a distance of approximately six to eight hundred feet. The Board was advised that a conference would be had with the architect and an estimate of the cost for laying the sewer obtained.

The Superintendent advised the Board that the contracts with Gilbert E. Harman for the operation of the busses on the Washington Boulevard had not been signed. The Board took under consideration the request of Harman for an increase in compensation for operating the busses inasmuch as Harman claimed that at the time he presented his bid he did not know that two trips were required for each bus. The Superintendent informed the Board that he would consult with the counsel and get legal opinion as to whether the Board justly owed Harman any additional compensation. The Board was also advised that at the next meeting the counsel, Mr. Loughran, and Mr. Harman would be invited to confer with the Board so that the matter might be finally settled.

The Superintendent recommended that the Board approve in principle the use of monitors on school busses, the monitors to be selected from the older boys who had written approval of their parents to act in this capacity. The Board requested the Superintendent to confer with the counsel to get his opinion as to whether the boys acting as monitors would be protected in our public liability insurance contract. On motion the Board approved the use of these monitors, provided they were covered by insuranced.

March 3, 1938.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present - S. E. Grantham, President, I. H. Taylor, Commissioner and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. Mr. Ridgely was absent due to a business engagement. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

New bus Insurance Harman's services were satisfactory at the completion of the three-year term of his contract, an extension could be granted of three additional years in consideration of the fact that Mr. Harman was placing in service extra heavy equipment and he was further agreeing to transport the pupils and teachers to the Annual Track and Field Meet. The Board informed Mr. Harman, upon advice from Mr. Loughran, that additional compensation for this contract could not be allowed, in view of the fact that this was a public bid, and asked Mr. Harman if he would be satisfied to sign his contract if he were given a three-year extension as outlined by Mr. Loughran. Mr. Harman agreed to sign his contract in consideration of the additional time granted and the Board instructed the secretary to

prepare the contract with this paragraph inserted.

The Superintendent brought before the Board the matter of the payment for the new public liability and property damage insurance for school busses, which contract had been entered into as a result of the failure of the Chicago Lloyds, writer of bus insurance, in effect till February 15. The Board voted to pay the premium for the new policy out of its own funds and to reimburse itself with funds obtained from the Chicago Lloyds after liquidation proceedings were completed.

The Superintendent informed the Board that the time had come when it was necessary to place a builder's risk fire insurance policy on the new Savage School and requested information as to what firms the Board desired this insurance placed with. After consideration, the Board voted to place half of this new insurance with W. Emil Thompson and half with Herrmann & Carr, these policies to be written as necessity requires in the opinion of the Superintendent.

fire Insurance Policy for new Savage School The Superintendent informed the Board that the Ellicott City elementary school now had an enrollment in excess of forty-seven pupils per teacher and he considered it necessary to recommend the employment of one or more additional teachers at that school for the next scholastic year. The Board approved the recommendation and authorized the inclusion of the necessary funds in the budget for the construction of an additional building to house these teachers. The Board approved the moving of the present Pfeiffers' Corner building to Ellicott City for this purpose if no other more practicable method of housing these classes could be adopted.

The Superintendent brought before the Board the matter of the agitation on the part of colored teachers in several counties to obtain the same minimum salaries as paid to white teachers. He informed the Board the colored teachers of Howard County might be expected to petition for an increase in salary for the next school year. The cost of raising the present Negro salaries to the minimum white salary basis would require \$7,500.00 next year, and this increase, it was considered, the County Commissioners would certainly not allow. The Superintendent agreed to work out a plan, giving the Negro teachers as large an increase as possible next year and which the County Commissioners would not be expected to veto. The Board was informed that it was expected the Legislature of 1939 would be obliged to reconsider white and colored teachers' salaries and adjust them on a uniform basis. Howard County, being an equalization county, would not then have to carry through the county tax rate the burden of the cost of adjusting the Negro salaries upward.

The Superintendent presented a request from Congressman Gambrill that the tuition of Hiltrude Duvall, who resies at Savage, should be paid by the Board of Education while this student attends the Laurel High School. The Board voted that this request was inconsistent with its established policy of requiring all students residing in the Savage locality to attend Elkridge High School or provide for their own tuition if they desire to attend another school.

Mr. and Mrs. Saumenig of Simpsonville appeared before the Board requesting permission to have their grandson, Billy Wilson, transferred to the Clarksville High School. The Superintendent disapproved of the request. The Board voted to allow the transfer.

Negro Delegation A delegation of Negro patrons appeared before the Board from the Daisy, Cooksville, Highland, Ellicott City and Atholton neighborhoods, requesting bus service to the Cooksville High School the coming year. The Board, after consideration, informed the delegation that they approved the principle of transportation and would do everything possible to work out satisfactory bus service for these communities.

Additional Room at Highland The delegation from Highland complained that an additional teacher was needed at that school because of an excessive enrollment. The Board authorized the Superintendent to proceed with plans to enlarge the school to two-teacher capacity if the enlargement was found necessary next year.

Carlstrand Co.

The Board approved the payment of \$8,897.40 to the Carlstrand Engineering Company for work done and material delivered at the Savage School building during February.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: - S. E. Grantham, President, Albert L. Ridgely, Vice President, I. H. Taylor, Commissioner and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

In accordance with the direction of the Board given at a previous meeting, the Superintendent explained that a survey had been made of the possibility concerning Negro bus service to Cooksville School. The Superintendent recomended the following: -

That a bus be placed in service to start at Ellicott City, run over St. John's Iane and the Old Frederick Road, past the Alpha Colored School, to Slack's Corner, thence to West Friendship and thence to Cooksville High School, by way of the National Pike.

That enother bus start from Atholton, run to Clarksville, thence over the Dayton Road to Five Oaks Nursery, thence over the gravel road from this point past John W. Brown's and the Dayton Colored School, thence past the Glenelg White School, thence on the gravel road to the Glenwood School; thence to the Cooksville Colored School. This bus would accomodate all students desiring to attend the Cooksville Colored School from the Atholton, Clarksville, Highland, Dayton and Glenelg communities. It would likewise pick up the elementary children who regularly attend the Highland School and transport them to the Dayton School. It would likewise transport approximately. twelve children who regularly attend the Dayton School to the Cooksville School. This bus would thereby serve to decrease the enrollment of the Highland School down to approximately forty pupils and by transporting a certain additional pupils into Dayton School and taking certain other pupils away from Dayton School, make the enrollment of this school about forty. It would make it unnecessary to place a second teacher at Highland and would probably make the enrollment at Dayton such that it would not be necessary to place an additional teacher at this school. If it were later found necessary to place an additional teacher at Dayton, it could be done at less expense than at Highland because the Dayton School is large and would require only the addition of partition across the center to form two fair size rooms.

The bus travelling past Alpha and Mount View would close these two schools, transporting these children to the number of about twenty-eight to Cooksville. The probable enrollment of elementary children at Cooksville as a result of the establishment of these two bus routes would be one hundred and twenty-five, which number could be taken care of by the present three teachers.

The Superintendent explained that the cost of these two husses would be largely borne by the State because of our sharing in the Equalization Fund. The Board approved the establishment of these two bus routes.

The Board again considered the matter of the use of patrol boys on school busses and approved the recommendation of the Superintendent that these patrols be used, providing the parents signfiy their willingness in writing to allow the boys to serve, with the understanding that there is a certain amount of danger involved in this service.

Bus Patrol Boys

The Superintendent redommended that a third bus be placed in service at the Elkridge School, this bus being used to shorten the trips of the present two busses, thereby allowing them to start at a later time in the morning and return the pupils to their homes at an earlier time in the evening. In addition, this bus would include the following roads to those already served: - Levering Avenue Road and the Lawyers Hill Road, incorporating these with the trip up the Montgomery Road to the Landing Road. The Board approved the placing of this new bus in service.

Additienat bus at Elkridge

The Superintendent explained that the cesspool at Lisbon had filled up to such an extent that its leeching properties had greatly diminished, with the result it had to be pumped out weekly. A new leeching well had been built to connect the present cesspool at a cost of \$75.60. The Board approved this expenditure.

Cesspool at Lisbon

The Superintendent recommended the employment of a teacher for a special class of retarded students at Ellicott City and at Savage, if arrangements could be made to provide room for them. The Superintendent cited the need for these two teachers and the Board approved their employment.

Addition al teachers

Authority was requested to rent the Forty Acre Field at a cost of \$25.00 for use on April 26 and May 24, on account of the Negro and White County Field Meets. The Board approved the request.

Forty Acres

The Superintendent informed the Board that among the repairs and improvements to be made during the next school year the following should be done:

1. Painting 12 to 16 classrooms on the inside

2. Replacing rotten window sills and window frames at Ellicott City

4. Connecting the Elkridge elementary building for city water

- 10. Replacing the roof at the Florence School and installing Celotex at one or more small schools about the county

The cost of these repairs and improvements, along with various other small repairs at various schools was recommended to be provided for in the school budget for the next school year. The Board approved these repairs and improvements.

Payments to Friz & Carlstrand Co. Authority to pay Mr. Friz, Architect, \$501.72 on account and the Carlstrand Engineering Company, \$10,572.30 for work done during March, both at the new Savage School, was requested. The Board approved the request.

Proposed Sale of Preiffers' Cor. Sch. The Board reconsidered its decision to move the Pfeiffers' Corner School to Ellicott City and decided to offer this building and lot for sale, inasmuch as Mr. Grantham informed the Board he was sure this building would bring a price of \$650.00.

Complaints against Miss Kolb Mrs. Shillinger of Highland appeared before the Board to make a complaint against the continued employment of Miss Leota Kolb as teacher of history and English at the Clarksville High School. Mrs. Shillinger complained that the discipline was very bad and certain improper actions had taken place in this teacher's classroom. The Board directed the Superintendent to make an investigation and call a special meeting of the Board to examine the charges if found necessary.

Change in Janitors' Wages The Board reconsidered the schedule of janitors' wages fixed at the last meeting and decided to change this schedule and have provided in the budget payments of \$55.00 per month to the West Friendship, Clarksville, Lisbon and Savage janitors.

Reorganization of the School Board The Superintendent informed the Board that the yearly reorganization was due at this meeting and, on motion of Mr. Ridgely, seconded by Mr. Taylor, the officers for 1937-1938 were reelected for the next year.

Boarding children disapproved for placement near Ridgeville The Superintendent brought to the attention of the Board the request of the Henry Watson Children's Aid Society for permission to place three boarding children in the home of Wilson Day, who lives on the Damascus Road, south from Ridgeville. The children from this area attend the Mount Airy School in Carroll County. The Board considered that it would be setting an undesirable precedent to approve the placement of boarding children in a home where the Board would have to pay tuition for their attendance at school in another county. The Board disapproved the request.

Closing of the Marriottsville School The Superintendent informed the Board that the enrollment of the Marriottsville School had been very low for several years and that the present enrollment was ten. The probable enrollment next year would be not greater than this number and might be one or two less. The Superintendent recommended that the school be closed and the pupils transported by bus to West Friendship. The Board was informed that, according to the contract of Russell M. Shipley, this could be done for an addition to his contract of \$300.00. The Board, after consideration of the matter, unanimously approved the recommendation, and authorized the Superintendent to make arrangements with Mr. Shipley for the transportation.

School Trustees The Superintendent informed the Board that this was the proper time for the appointment of school trustees for the expired terms. On motion of Mr. Ridgely, seconded by Mr. Taylor, Mr. Grantham and Mr. Brown were appointed a committee to designate the trustees for all vacancies.

PWA Projects

The Superintendent informed the Board that the State Superintendent, Mr. Cook, had requested a list of public school PWA projects in case the bill now before Congress would be approved. The Board was informed that the Superintendent had submitted three possible projects, one for a consolidated six-room school at Scaggsville, estimated cost, \$50,000.00; one for an additional primary building at Ellicott City, estimated cost, \$50,000.00; and for an addition to the Lisbon High School, estimated cost, \$50,000.00. The Board, after consideration, decided that all of these projects were needed and approved them as part of our project to be submitted in case the PWA grant legislation should be approved.

The Board was presented with a request from Mr. Jenkins, Cashier of the Commercial & Farmers Bank, for a larger share of the deposits of the Board of Education's funds. Mr. Taylor recommended that a division of the School Board's funds be made among the three Howard County banks, approximately in accordance with the size of the banks. After some discussion, it was decided to defer decision in this matter until a later meeting.

The Board, after hearing Mr. Pope, decided to defer further consideration of the matter until the next meeting.

Cox had done a satisfactory job in levelling and filling the Savage School lot from which he had recently salvaged the brick building. Negro Delegation from Highland The Superintendent brought to the attention of the Board the matter of the resignation of Miss Leota V. Kelb, teacher of English and history at the Clarksville High School. A majority of the Board considered that Mrs. Shillinger of Highland should be requested to present any charges she wished to prefer against Miss Kelb in writing so that Miss Kelb could have an opportunity to defend herself. Mr. Granthem and Mr. Ridgely considered that Miss Kelb should be kept in her present position until the end of the year, unless charges of misconduct were proved against her.

The Superintendent presented a request from Mr. Robert C. Owens, who lives next to the elementary school lot at Elkridge, for the erection of a fence around his plot of ground, 154 ft. X 76 ft. the cost of materials for this fence would be approximately \$35.00. The lot in question is located on the rear of the present playground and occupies a corner of this playground. Mr. Owens, it is understood, offered to sell this lot to the School Board for \$125.00. The Superintendent recommended the purchase of the property inasmuch as it projects out into the natural playground of the school and, as the school lot is small, this addition to the school playground would be a great help and the cost was considered very reasonable. The Board authorized the Superintendent to purchase the ground in question after a survey had proved the title and advised him to offer the owner \$100.00 with the privilege of raising the price somewhat if it could not be purchased at this figure.

Charles E. Miller appeared before the Board and requested that the deduction to his Atholton and Guilford bus route of 50 cents per day be reduced to a total of \$5.00 per month. Mr. Miller's contract price had been reduced by the former figure when the new school route was organized in November, inasmuch as there had been a reduction of ten miles perday in his route. The Board considered that Mr. Miller had been of considerable service to the Board at no additional expense when he added the New Cut Road to his Pfeiffers' Corner route in order to accompdate the Rausch children. Because of this, the Board voted unanimously to grant this request.

A delegation of four Negroes, headed by the Rev. Hammond, appeared before the Board to object to the use of a new colored school bus in transporting certain elementary children who now attend the Highland Colored School to the Dayton Colored School. This delegation stated that a promise had been made some years ago by the Board to build a two-teacher school at Highland and they objected to the transportation of children from Highland to Dayton. The Board, after hearing this delegation for sometime, informed them that they could give them no encouragement that any change would be made in the present plans inasmuch as it would endanger the approval for the establishment of the bus which would accommodate high school pupils of the Atholton, Clarksville, Highland, Dayton and Glenelg communities who wished to attend the Cooksville Colored High School.

The Superintendent presented the annual school budget to the Board and explained the various items contained therein. Special attention was called to any differences between the budget for the coming school year and that of the present. The Board was informed that provision had been made for an addition to the teaching staff of the elementary school at Ellicott City of two teachers and the addition of one teacher to the staff at Savage, the addition of one-half high school teacher at Ellicott City and one-half high school teacher at Elkridge; that provision had been made for payment to the colored teachers of salary for nine months instead of present eight months; that increases, amounting to \$790.00, had been provided for in janitors' salaries to carry out the provisions of the Board recently voted. Increases had been provided for \$200.00 for fuel, \$150.00 for water, light and power, \$200.00 for school libraries, \$100.00 for physical education, \$5,000 for school bus transportation and \$1,300 for payments to adjoining counties on account of tuition. The latter increase was made necessary by Howard County sharing in the Equalization Fund as Baltimore County, with the largest list of students attending in Howard County schools, is no longer required to pay current expense charges. This budget requests a total of \$199,810.00, State and Federal government contributing \$101,370.00 and the county being requested to furnish \$98,445.00, this calling for an additional \$3,440.00 over that requested from the county in last year's budget. The Board unanimously approved the presentation of this budget to the County Commissioners, with the request that it be granted in its entirety inasmuch as all the funds requested were needed.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: - S. E. Grantham, President, Albert L. Ridgely, Vice-President, Isaac H. Taylor and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

Delegation from Lisbon Fifteen patrons of the Lisbon School appeared before the Board to request a substantial addition to the present school building. The delegation informed the Board that the present building was too small to accommodate the number of pupils enrolled; that the present building was in an unsafe condition with respect to the east wall; that the sanitary conditions were bad; that there were no facilities for a principal's office, library, assembly room or storeroom; that the basement was unfit for classrooms because of its dampness. The Board, on recommendation of the Superintendent, voted to approve an application for \$60,000 from the county commissioners to erect a substantial addition to this building, application to be made through the Public Works Administration for a 45% grant.

Delegation from Clarksville Twenty-four patrons from the Clarksville School appeared before the Board to ask for a new school in addition to the old building at Clarksville. These patrons informed the Board that the present building was too small to accommodate the enrollment, sanitary conditions were bad, classes were being held in portions of the building that are not fit for classroom use and the building was a serious fire hazard. The Board approved the application of the county commissioners for the sum of \$60,000 to build a new unit to this building, application to be made to the Public Works Administration for a grant of 45% of the cost.

Delegation from Ellicott City

Fifteen patrons and citizens of Ellicott City appeared before the Board to ask for a new high school building at Ellicott City. The delegation informed the Board that one wooden detached building had already been built and that another one would have to be built during the present summer and the third would have to be built a year from this time to accomodate the pupils who could not be taken care of inside of the main building. The delegation informed the Board that the enrollment at Ellicott City was growing steadily and the Board could not expect to put off the construction of this building more than two or three years at the most. The Board voted to approve application of the county commissioners for \$100,000 to construct a new high school building, the present building to be used as an elementary school as soon as the new high school building is completed. This approval carried the provisions that application would be made to the Public Works Administration for a 45% grant of the total cost.

rovision for caggsville & he Highland olored Schools

The Board considered that the project to build the Scaggsville School should also be provided for and Mr. Grantham and Mr. Ridgely voted to include the sum of \$4,000 in the application to the county commissioners to build a two-room frame school at Highland for Negro pupils.

Also to advertise for bids on two new bus routes, one from Ellicott City to Cooksville and one from Hodges Corner to Lawyers' Hill Road and Elkridge. The Board approved this request as also the request of the Superintendent that these bids be returned on June 28 and that the regular July meeting be held on this date.

Authority to ask for bids on all supplies. etc.

Mr. John Hines appeared before the Board and requested a threeyear extension on his bus contract which expires in 1938 for an additional three years. The Board, after consideration, decided that it could not do this as it felt that this would not be legal. They informed Mr. Hines it would be necessary to advertise this route for new bids, bids to be opened on June 28.

A bill from Frank E. Glenn for \$2.50 for use of Rock Hill water for four days by the Ellicott City High School was presented to the Board and approved for payment.

The Superintendent recommended that the size of the new Elkridge bus should not be less then twenty-three feet in length and that of the Ellicott City-Cooksville bus not less than nineteen feet in length. Board decided to leave the matter with the Superintendent for decision.

Authority was requested to hold the Washington College Senatorial scholarship examination and the Charlotte Hall School examination on June 23, the results to be given to the Board on June 28. The Board approved this request.

Scholarship Examination

The Board was informed of the dates of the high school and elementary commencements and invited to attend the commencements and participate in the program.

Commencements

Appointment of Clerk

The Superintendent recommended the appointment of Mrs. Irene Johnson as clerk to the Board for the school year of 1938-1939. The appointment was approved.

Additional mileage on Russell Shipley's route The Superintendent informed the Board that he had measured the distance which the bus driven by Russell M. Shipley would have to make in order to transport the Marriottsville pupils from Marriottsville Station to West Friendship School. This mileage would be 22 2/10 miles per day and remuneration in accordance with Mr. Shipley's contract would be \$380.00 per year. The Board approved the addition of an addendum to Mr. Shipley's contract providing for these additional miles and the additional remuneration.

Casualty insurance companies approved

The Superintendent presented to the Board a list of casualty insurance companies approved by the State Department of Insurance as first class risks. The Board, after examination of the list, approved it as a list to be submitted to the various bidders from which bids would be accepted.

Program clocks for CHS & LHS The Superintendent informed the Board that Lisbon and Clarksville were the only two high schools in the county which did not have program clocks and requested authority to purchase one at an approximate cost of \$185.00 each for each of these two schools, if the present application for funds to build new buildings at these two places should not be approved. The Board approved the request.

Employment of Mr. Moore to repair schools

The Superintendent informed the Board that money was available to hire a carpenter to begin repairs and improvements at the various schools. The Board approved the amployment of William Moore at \$35.00 a week, Mr. Moore to furnish transportation for himself and building materials.

Highland Col. Sch.

The motion of Mr. Ridgely to reconsider the matter of placing a bus on the Atholton, Dayton, Cooksville route was approved and the Board voted not to ask for bids on this bus route at the present time but to ask for funds to build a two-room elementary school at Highland.

John Wall to furnish gas, etc. to Sch. Bd. Cars

Mr. John Wall appeared before the Board and offered to furnish gas to the School Board at 2 cents discount from the regular rates, furnish oil at a discount of 5 cents per quart from the regular rate and grease cars for 75 cents per car. The Board, after consideration, voted to give this business to Mr. Wall and cancel the agreement with the Miller Chevrolet Sales garage for the same service.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: - S. E. Grantham, President, Albert L. Ridgely, Vice-President, Isaac H. Taylor, Member, and H. C. Brown, Secretary.

A letter from the Secretary of the Howard County Fire Department requesting the use of the Ellicott City High School grounds for the Annual Firemen's Carnival was read to the Board. The Board approved the request with the understanding that the Carnival Committee see that proper care was taken of the school property.

Use of grounds for Carnival

The Superintendent presented the latest drawing of the proposed Scaggsville Consolidated School as prepared by Mr. Friz. After careful examination of the plans, upon the recommendation of the Superintendent, the plans were adopted and Mr. Friz was directed to prepare the detailed plans.

Plans for Scaggsville School

The Superintendent suggested that a committee of the Board visit the Scaggsville neighborhood and proceed with the selection of the lot. The time was left to the Superintendent who was to consult with the individual members.

Selection of lot for Scaggsville School

The Superintendent requested authority to pay to the four high schools an amount equal to approximately \$1.00 per high school pupil, the money to be spent for the high school libraries. This request conforms to that of the State Superintendent of Schools inasmuch as the payment from the State Equalization Fund included an additional \$3,000 on account of a 100% payment of high school transportation. The Board approved the recommendation.

The Superintendent presented bids from four contractors to install a $1\frac{1}{6}$ " wrought iron water line and a $1\frac{1}{4}$ " Mueller Reducing Valve from the street to the water connection at the present storage tank in the Elkridge Elementary School. The bids were as follows:

The Supt. presented a statement from Joseph W. Blakemore, President of the Young Men's Pleasure Club of the Community Hall, Savage, stating that to put the hall in as good shape as when the Board of Education began its use for school purposes would require the side walls of the hall be painted, library floor a cost of \$37.50 and that three grate bars be replaced at a cost of approximately etc. \$30.00. The Board and Superintendent considered that this demand was exorbitant inasmuch as the use of the building as a school had not caused this amount of damage and it was felt that the Club was making this an excuse to have the furnace fixed and the side walls of the building repaired. The Board, however, voted to

furnish the grate bars and have the painting done in order that the matter might be closed up without further unpleasant feeling.

Board of Education left the County Commissioners' room and in private conference agreed to modify their original request and ask that the county commissioners furnish the sum of \$100,000.00 with which, and the grant which might be secured from the PWA, the Board proposed to build a new school at Clarksville, an addition to the Lisbon School, a two-room frame Negro school at Highland, and a six-room primary building at Ellicott City. The Board left this request with the County Commissioners with the understanding that a decision would be reached at an early date as possible. The following resolution was adopted and copies of the resolution were to be sent to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, after having been signed by the members of the Board.

That the offer of the United States of America to the Board of County Commissioners of Howard County and the Board of Education of Howard County to aid by way of grant in financing the construction of a consolidated elementary school at Scaggsville, Howard County, Maryland, a copy of which offer reads as follows:

Subject to the Terms and Conditions (PWA Form No. 230, as amended to the date of this Offer) which are made a part hereof, the United States of America hereby offers to aid in financing the construction of a school building, including necessary equipment and the acquisition of necessary land (herein called the "Project"), by making a grant to the County Commissioners of Howard County (herein called the "Applicant") in the amount of 45 percent of the cost of the Project upon completion, as determined by the Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works, but not to exceed, in any event, the sum of \$24,750.

This offer is made subject to the condition that the County Commissioners of Howard County shall pay any and all grant funds received hereunder over to the Board of Education of Howard County to be used for the purpose of constructing the Project, and the Board of Education of Howard County shall agree to the acceptance of this Offer by the Board of County Commissioners of Howard County, shall accept and use said funds to construct the Project and shall comply with said Terms and Conditions in the construction thereof.
- 3. By acceptance of this Offer the Applicant covenants that work on this Project will begin as early as possible but in no event later than 8 weeks from the date of this Offer and will be completed with all practicable dispatch, and in any event within 6 months from the commencement of construction.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works be and the same is hereby in all respects accepted.

Section 2. That said Board of County Commissioners of Howard County and the Board of Education of Howard County agrees to abide by all the Terms and Conditions of said offer, including the Terms and Conditions annexed thereto and made a part thereof.

Section 3. That the Secretary to the Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed forthwith to send to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works three certified copies of the proceedings of the Board of Education of Howard County in connection with the adoption of this Resolution, setting forth this Resolution in full, and such further documents or proofs in connection with the acceptance of said offer as may be requested by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works.

The Board of Education met today in special session for the purpose of considering the matter of the revision of the plans and specifications for the proposed Scaggsville School and the selection of a site upon which the school should be built. The Board visited the Scaggsville neighborhood and examined Scaggsville four proposed sites, asking the owners thereof to submit prices which would School be considered at a later meeting.

The Board of Education of Howard County held a special meeting at 10 A. M. Present: - S. E. Grantham, President, Albert L. Ridgely, Vice-President, Isaac H. Taylor, Commissioner, and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary.

The Board met to consider the selection of a school lot upon which to build the proposed new Scaggsville School. A delegation of about forty-five citizens from Scaggsville and High Ridge neighborhood appeared before the Board with their representative, Mr. Daniel Murray. The delegation, through their spokesman, presented the advantages of building the building on a lot at Harding's Corner and protested against the location of the new building at Scaggsville Corner. The Board heard the spokesman for the delegation as well as other members and informed them that consideration would be given to their plea.

Mr. Lawrence Welsh presented a bid for the sale of six and one-half acres of ground adjoining the present school lot at Harding's Corner at a price of \$1,950.00.

A bid was presented by Mr. George Renn for the sale of five acres at \$350.00 per acre at Scaggsville Corner.

Mr. Arthur Leizear presented a bid for the sale of five acres of land on the road between High Ridge and Scaggsville.

Mr. Malcolm Disney presented the bid of the Brown heirs for the sale of a five-acre lot west of the Brown residence for \$2,500.00 and also a bid for the sale of a lot, consisting of five acres, located on the Columbia Road near their barn.

The Board, after consideration, agreed to offer the Brown heirs \$2,000.00 for the purchase of five acres of land fronting on the High Ridge-Fulton Road and west of the Brown residence. Mr. Disney was called in and he indicated that the heirs would accept the offer. After consulting with the heirs, the Board office was informed that the offer was accepted. The Board voted to build the school on this lot and directed the Superintendent to arrange to have the lot surveyed.

The Superintendent informed the Board that the County Commissioners had approved the plan to finance the building of a six-room primary school at Ellicott City, a new high and elementary building at Clarksville, an addition to the Lisbon School, and a two-room frame Negro school at Highland, the county's share of this building program to be not in excess of the sale price of the bonds amounting to \$104,000. The estimated yield of this sale was \$107,250.00. It was understood that the Public Works Administration would be petitioned for a grant of \$87,750.00 and the agreement of the County Commissioners to furnish this money was conditioned upon this grant.

It was explained to the Board that a requirement of the PWA made it necessary for theBoard to consider the lowest bid after the first alternate was subtracted in case the base bid exceeded the advertised amount of available funds, which in this case was \$50,000. The lowest base bid was that of the Bickerton Construction Company. The lowest bid, with the alternate subtracted, was that of Julius A. Kinlein for \$45,400.00. The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: ~ Stanley E. Grantham, President, Albert L. Ridgely, Vice-President, Isaac H. Taylor, Commissioner and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. The minutes of the meetings of July 26, July 29, August 10, August 17 and August 19 were read and approved.

Mr. and Mrs. Cissel Simpson

Mr. and Mrs. Cissel Simpson appeared before the Board and requested the privilege of sending their son, George Simpson, a student in the fifth grade, to the Clarksville School. These patrons objected to sending their son to the Scaggsville School, complaining that there would be too rough an element in the school. The Board listened to these patrons for some time but advised them that inasmuch as the Scaggsville School could not be opened before spring the matter should be postponed until a later date.

Mr. Sanner's request to send children to Clarksville

The Superintendent presented the petition of W. M. Sanner, who lives near Simpsonville and requested that he be allowed to send his three children, ages seven, eleven and thirteen, to the Clarksville School. Mr. Sanner agreed to transport his children to Clarksville and on this promise the Board agreed to allow these children to attend the Clarksville School inasmuch as this is their nearest school, provided the parents transport them to school. However, the request would not be allowed in case these children rode the regular school bus, for in this case they would be transported past the Elioak School where they would be regularly expected to attend.

Use of ECHS grounds -St. Faul's Cath. Church

The Superintendent presented the request of Mr. Loughran that the congregation of St. Paul's Catholic Church be allowed the use of the Ellicott City school grounds and cafeteria for an anniversary celebration on Sunday, October 9. The Board approved the request with the understanding that the school grounds and building would be left in a clean and satisfactory condition after the celebration was over.

Henryton Road Extension to Bus Contract

The Board considered the request of several Negro patrons who live along the Henryton Road for an extension of Brown Cissel's bus to the Henryton Station so that these school children might get transportation to Cooksville. The Superintendent reported that he had measured the distance and at the regular contract rate of 8 cents per mile for additional mileage Brown Cissel's the added compensation would be \$145.00 per year. The Board voted to approve this bus route extension at the additional cost.

Jacob S. Brown

The Board heard the resignation of Jacob S. Brown as trustee of the Glenelt School and voted to accept it.

Sale of Toilet

The Board considered the matter of selling one of the old type toilets at the Mount View School to Albert Dorsey for \$5.00. They unanimously agreed to sell the toilet at this price.

Request for Fremium on Bonds

The Board considered the recommendation of the Superintendent that the County Commissioners be requested to furnish the Board with the premium on \$30,000 of Scaggsville School bonds, said premium amounting to about \$900.00, which would materially assist in rectoring the auditorium to the Scaggsville School and which had to be taken out for lack of funds when

the contract was let to Julius A. Kinlein. The Board directed the Superintendent to write the County Commissioners, requesting that they turn over this money.

The Superintendent informed the Board that an additional teacher was being placed at Ellicott City and the school was more than unusually crowded to accommodate this additional teacher. A large amount of furniture had accumulated for which there was no storage space and the Board was informed that Caplan's Garage on St. Paul's St. could be rented for the sum of \$6.00 per month. This furniture could be stored in this place until the overcrowded condition was relieved next summer when the new building would be built. The Board unanimously approved the renting of this garage for this purpose.

Rent of Caplan's Garage

The Superintendent presented the petition of several patrons who live along the Annapolis Rock Road for an extension of bus service as far as the Annapolis Rock School. It was explained that the County Commissioners were willing to gravel the road from the end of the present Florence hard road to the Annapolis Rock School and make a convenient turning point for the bus at the latter school. The Board voted unanimously to approve the extension of the bus service to the Annapolis Rock School if the road were improved and at the contract price of 10 cents per additional mile.

William Martin would accept a reasonable offer of the Board for the purchase of the lot on Columbia Road which the Board was considering for the site for the new Ellicott City Frimary School. The Board unanimously voted to approve the purchase of this site, limiting the purchase price at this time to \$4,000.00.

Martin Property

The Superintendent explained that since the award of the S. Brown Cissel bus contract, it had been discovered that approximately twelve Negro students lived along or near the Frederick Pike east of the Sixteen-Mile House. Inasmuch as no Negro students lived on the Old Frederick Road east of the Marriottsville Road, the Superintendent recommended that the route of this bus be changed to go directly wast of Ellicott City along the Frederick Pike to the Sixteen-Mile House, thence over the Marriottsville gravel road to the Old Frederick Road and thence continue on as previously specified. The Superintendent recommended that \$30.00 be added to the remuneration in the contract inasmuch as this involved one-half mile additional, plus travel over two miles of gravelled road. The Board unanimously approved the change of route and the additional amount of remuneration.

S. Brown Cissel's Bus Route

The Superintendent reported to the Board that thirteen high school students living on the Tridelphia Road, between Olsen's Store and Glenelg ordinarily attended the Lisbon High School but no provision was made for their transportation. He recommended that Edwin Cissel's bus be sent in as far as Mr. Thompson's place, a distance of about two and one-half miles from Olsen's Store, at an additional cost of \$215.00 per year. The Board approved this recommendation.

October 11, 1938.

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: - S. E. Grantham, Pres., Isaac H. Taylor, Commissioner and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. Mr. Ridgely was absent due to illness. The minutes of the preceding meetings of August 30, September 13, and October 7 were read and approved.

Mrs. Welsh appeared before the Board and made an offer of \$500 for the lot and permanent building at High Ridge, sale to be executed when the School Board abandons this school for school purposes. Mrs. Welsh explained that the land was given by her husband's family to the Board and she asked consideration for this reason when the lot was sold. The Board advised Mrs. Welsh that it would probably be necessary to publicly advertise the property in order to protect the interests of the county.

John L. Hines appeared before the Board and asked what plans the Board had for the sale of the schools which would be abandoned when the Scaggsville School was opened. The Board advised Mr. Hines that the properties would be advertised as soon as the School Board had no further use for them.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Hobbs appeared before the Board and requested the Board to appeal the decision of Judge Forsythe in the case of Addison Hodges versus the Board of Education. The Board, after deliberate consideration of the matter, voted to advise its attorney to make an appeal in this case. Attorney Loughran informed the Board that the cost would probably he in the neighborhood of \$300.00, which, however, would have to be borne by the Hodges' family in case Judge Forsythe's decision were reversed.

Appeal to HODGES* Case

Mr. John C. Easter appeared before the Board and received the final payment for the six acres of land purchased from him at Clarksville for the new Clarksville High School.

Purchase of Easter property

Edward Hilton appeared before the Board for the Ladies' Auxiliary of the local Volunteer Fireman's Department and requested that the Board decrease the amount of rental for the use of the "gym" by the Auxiliary on September 27, inasmuch as the auxiliary had a poor night. The Board considered that it was dangerous to decrease the rental because of a fixed scale of charges to all organizations, and voted to remit the entire rental for this night, with the understanding that at future times the Auxiliary would be expected to pay the full amount.

Ladies Fire Dept. Auxliary

The Superintendent presented the request of John U. Brown for a two-year extension of his bus contract from the final expiration date in consideration of his agreement to add a second trip to his bus route, going down the Sheppard Lane to Charles Linthicum's entrance. The Board agreed to pay Mr. Brown \$125.00 for the additional trip and voted to allow his request for a two-year extension of his contract from the date of expiration.

John U. Brown's Extension Electric Light Bills The Superintendent presented the matter of the payment by the Board of the electric light bills for the small schools of the county and explained that the light bills of the large schools had been paid for several years. The Board voted to pay these bills for the small schools from the beginning of this school year and the reafter.

Extension Negro bus route The Board approved the change in the routing of the Cooksville Negro bus so that the bus would run west on the Frederick Pike as far as the Marriottsville Road and thence north on the Marriottsville Road to the Old Frederick Road.

12-installment plan for tea. salaries

The Board considered the unanimous request of the Howard County Teachers' Association that in the future salaries be paid in twelve installments rather than in ten as has been the case in the past. The Board agreed unanimously to this request, leaving the details of payment to the office of the Superintendent.

Protest of Mr. Pierpont on Hall's Bus equipment The Board took under consideration the protest of E. B. H. Pperport over the matter of Herbert Hall's furnishing a school bus on the Clarksville route which had been used to some extent as a demonstrator before his purchase of the bus. The Board considers that this bus was substantially new and could offer no objection on the grounds that the bus would not meet the requirements of the specifications as outlined by the Board in its invitation to bid.

Extension Miller Bus The Superintendent informed the Board that at the beginning of the school year the Miller Ilchester bus was overcrowded and Mr. Miller had agreed to run his Columbia Road bus down as far as the New Cut Road to pick up students as far as this point so as to relieve the Ilchester bus. Mr. Miller agreed to the extra mileage without additional compensation.

Committee on Teachers' New Salary Scale A teachers' committee, composed of Charles Willis, Urith Routson, Max Smith and Chester Cissel, appeared before the Board and, through its spokesman, Mr. Willis, outlined a new teachers' minimum salary scale as worked out by a committee of county superintendents, which salary scale it was proposed to present to the Legislature at the next session to be enacted into law. The Board heard the committee and voted unanimously to recommend to the Legislature that this scale be written into the school statutes.

Resignation of Mr. Black as Trustee

The Board heard the reading of the resignation of J. Hubert Black as trustee of the Lisbon School and voted to accept the resignation.

Scholarship Award The Board unanimously voted to award the Maryland Institute of Arts Night School scholarship to Miss Margery R. Curtis.

W. I. Collier and Co. wrote to the Board, complaining that the Board's architect, Clyde N. Friz, did not reimburse his company for plans and specifications for the heating plants for the new Howard County schools, and asked the cooperation of the Board in securing remuneration for his company, stating that a 32% fee, based on the cost of heating

systems was a reasonable remuneration. The Board considered that it would be better to talk the matter over with Mr. Friz before coming to any final decision.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of Howard County was called to order at 10 A. M. Present: - S. E. Granthem, President, Albert L. Ridgely, Vice-President, Isaac H. Taylor, Commissioner, and Herbert C. Brown, Secretary. The minutes of the last meeting of the Board were read and approved.

The Superintendent presented to the Board the request of a number of Negro citizens from the Daisy neighborhood that bus service be given about eight or ten Negro pupils who desire to attend the Cooksville Colored High School. The Board instructed the Superintendent to confer with Mr. McCracken and Mr. Cissel relative to the cost of running a bus from Daisy Store to the Cooksville Colored School.

The matter of the sale of the Mount View Colored School was considered by the Board and it was agreed that this building should be advertised for sale by sealed bids during the last two weeks of November and bids be opened by the Board at its meeting December 6.

The Superintendent notified the members of the Board that sealed bids for the construction of the new Clarksville Elementary and High School would be publicly opened on Thursday, November 3, at 3 P. M.

The Superintendent advised the Board that the Ellicott City High School building now required painting of the exterior woodwork. The Board approved the motion that the building be painted and approved the method of painting by means of day labor hired by the Board using materials purchased by the Board. The matter was left with Mr. Grantham and Mr. Brown for arrangement.

The Superintendent explained that the load of students carried on the bus of Carroll Mullinix had become so great that about twenty were required to stand. The Superintendent, considering this dangerous, had arranged with Mr. Mullinix to return east as far as the Sixteen-Mile House for a second trip in order to pick up a second load which would reduce the first load down to the point where practically everyone was seated. The Board unanimously approved this arrangement.

The Superintendent reported that the primary playground at Ellicott City was badly washed several times a year by surface water running off the main playground and that a small retaining wall should be built between the present detached building and the main building of this school in order to cut off this run of surface water. The Superintendent also recommended that a small retaining wall be built at West Friendship next to the planting of California privet on the playground side in order to hold the embankment from washing at this point. The Board approved the construction of both these walls, leaving the matter in the hands of Mr. Grantham and Mr. Brown at Ellicott City and Mr. Ridgely and Mr. Brown at West Friendship.

The motion was unanimously approved that the Board of Education request the County Commissioners to grant the sum of \$600.00 to the Board of Education, \$200.00 to be paid to each member of the Board of Education for traveling expenses incurred in transacting the business of the Board. The members of the Board expressed their unanimous opinion that the \$100.00 allowance now made to each member was not sufficient to cover the actual expenses incurred in traveling to and from the meetings of the Board and the inspections necessary to be made into the schools in operation and the buildings under construction, and that the additional amount of money would be necessary to properly reimburse them for such expenses.

Board Members Allowance For Travel

A delegation of three Negro patrons of the Ellicott City Colored School appeared before the Board and requested that a new school be built at Ellicott City. They contended that the present building was overcrowded, poorly lighted, located on a poor lot, and that the access to it from the street was bad. The Board informed the delegation that it could do nothing at the present time toward building a new school but that the present building would be altered and repaired to improve the conditions so far as possible.

Mr. George Wehland, accompanied by Herbert Mellor, Attorney, appeared before the Board and explained that there was some question as to the validity of the title which the Board could give to Mr. Wehland in the sale of the Pfeiffers' Corner school property. Mr. Mellor explained that the original deed from Hetty Graham to three school commissioners in 1865 did not adequately entitle the present Board of Education to a full claim to the property inasmuch as the Board of Education was not then incorporated and there was no law in force at the time which transmitted school property continusously from one Board to another. He explained that it would probably be necessary for the Board to claim title to the property through adverse possession. The Board referred Mr. Mellor to its attorney, Mr. Loughran, and requested that these two attorneys work the matter out to the satisfaction of the Board and the purchaser, Mr. Wehland.

The Costanza Construction Company's base bid of \$82,933 was the lowest bid submitted, but inasmuch as this bid exceeded the advertised statement of cost of \$80,000, the Board was compelled to accept Alternate No. 1 in order to bring the bid price lower than the advertised cost. After the completion of the opening of the bids the bidders were informed they should retire while the Board considered the bids.
