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Selsey RNLI volunteer inshore lifeboat launches



.... to rescue two boys.

6 July Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat Betty and Thomas Moore launched at 6.04 pm at the request of Solent Coastguard to rescue two people cut off by the rising tide on the shingle island Kirkarrow on the west side of Selsey Bill.

When the ILB rounded the bill the two people were spotted by the lifeboat crew. The casualties were two teenage boys who were struggling to stay on their feet in the flooding tide. The lifeboat crew quickly took them aboard the lifeboat and started heading back to the shore.

Rob Archibald (Helmsman) said 'the boys were in a very precarious position and were very lucky not to be carried away in the flooding tide.'

The ILB Betty & Thomas Moore was crewed by Rob Archibald (Helmsman), Will Moir and Zoe Belcher.

It was a warm sunny day and the sea state was slight with a south-southeasterly force 2-3.

.... to rescue two persons.

8 July Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat ILB Betty and Thomas Moore was launched at 2.53pm at the request of Solent Coast-guard to rescue two persons reported in a blue rubber dinghy adrift off Bognor Regis pier.

The casualty, only one person was found at 3.20pm and landed on the beach and handed over to local Coastguard at 3.25pm

When the ILB was on route to Bognor Regis, it recovered an inflatable ring half a mile east of the mulberry near Church Norton.

The ILB Betty & Thomas Moore was crewed by Colin Pullenger (Helmsman), Andy Lee and trainee Dan Langford.

It was a warm sunny day and the sea state was slight with a north-northeasterly force $\, 3. \,$

.... to assist swimmer.

18 July Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat ILB Betty and Thomas Moore was launched at 2.55pm at the request of Solent Coast-guard to assist a swimmer after the man's wife reported losing sight of him swimming approximately half a mile offshore from Pagham Yacht Club

The lifeboat crew were on scene at 3.08pm and spotted the man approximately 30 metres from the beach and happily swimming. He confirmed his identity and the lifeboat stayed in close proximity until he had made his way ashore at 3.13pm.

The ILB Betty & Thomas Moore was crewed by Gary Pearce (Helmsman), Chris Harvey and Sam Troughton-Smith.

It was a hot sunny day and the sea state was smooth with a south south-easterly force 1.

Gary said: 'The swimmer was surprised to see us as he was unaware that his partner was worried about him. When we went alongside, he was quite happy to carry on swimming back to the heach'

It just goes to show that no matter how experienced you are or how well you may plan your journey. You never know when you will need the services of the RNLI. That's why the RNLI exists – to help people in difficulty like this.'

On a sweltering afternoon a depleted audience was welcomed to our July meeting by our President, Shirley Petitt. Shirley Balding, our Treasurer, gave the financial report and reminded members that we still require donations for our Tombola stall at this year's Lifeboat Day on Sunday, 11 August. She also encouraged as many members as possible to supply cakes for the stall and asked for volunteers to man the stall for a period of time on that day. Stella Crist, our Secretary, requested payment for our visit to Bignor Roman Villa which is taking place on 18 September, and also asked that team members taking part in the County Quiz on 13 August make payment for that. Joan Wills confirmed that our Spring outing (a visit to the Silver Vaults in London) would take place on 5 March 2014, with further details to follow.

Our speaker was Carolyn Couch, Liaison Officer for BIFFA in West Sussex. She gave a very interesting talk on waste disposal in the county, and told us about a new state-of-the-art waste sorting and treatment centre due to open later this year in Horsham. Much of the waste which can't be placed in our recycling bins will be sorted at the centre and recycled to make new items. Eventually rubbish going to landfill will drop to 11%, and treated waste will be turned into bio fuel

Margaret Goodman, our AGM delegate, gave her report of the AGM in Cardiff. As well as telling us about the many proposals and the resolution that were carried, she told us a little of the guest speakers, notably Griff Rhys Jones and John Humphrys from the 'Today' programme. Members were given a physical and vocal workout by our own Jonathan Willcocks, who is Director of Music with Chichester Singers. He is also assisting in the Singing for Joy competition - the winners of which will form the National Federation of Women's Institutes' Centenary Choir, which will perform at the AGM during WI's centenary in 2015.

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On a chilly July evening our President, Steph Pudney welcomed members and visitors to our meeting. Among the guests were several members of local WIs, Ann Parry a former Federation President and Judy Wilson our WI advisor. They had all come along to see and hear about our four legged visitors. These were three alpacas from Dunreyth Alpacas based at Funtington. After the business section of the meeting, Peta Ives gave a very interesting talk about these very gentle and friendly animals. Peta and her husband started keeping alpacas seven and a half years ago after being made redundant from their respective jobs. They started with two pregnant females and last year had 58 but have now downsized to 38. The idea was to sell the fleeces to the UK fibre bank instead they use the fleeces themselves. After shearing the fleeces are put in a cotton bag with the alpacas name on. It is then thoroughly cleaned by hand to pick out all the hay and other bits that get tangled in the fleece which is very time consuming. The fleece then goes to the mill and is processed into individual balls of wool still with the alpacas name on it. The wool is then knitted into lovely garments by local women and a picture of the alpaca is attached to the finished article. Alpacas are first mated at a year old and the pregnancy lasts between 11 and 13 months. The mother usually chooses a fine day to give birth in the morning so that by the evening the cria (baby alpaca) is on its feet and unlikely to catch the attention of predators. After an entertaining talk members were able to go outside and have a look at Gandalf the young alpaca and the other two boys Baron and Dragon. Understandably many members expressed the wish to take them home with them!

There is no meeting in August but we are still busy with the County Quiz on 13th August, our Plonk and Ploughmans Quiz on 15th August (tickets still available from The Crafty Patch, High Street Selsey) and a Garden Party on 31st August. 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

of heatstroke particularly in dogs. Taking your dog to the park or beach may sound like fun but with days of heat over 30 degrees are more increased risk of heatstroke.

Help your pet keep cool in hot weather

- Don't exercise your dog in the heat of the day - as your dog cannot sweat only by panting they can cool themselves down. Keep your walks and runs to first thing in the morning and evening when it's cooler.
- Don't ever leave your pet in a car even a parked car can quickly reach 50 - 60 degrees.
- When driving make sure it is well ventilated.
- Keep your pets area at home cool.
- Keep small animals quinea pigs, rabbits or birds shaded and provide water.
- Give your pet at least two water bowls back up supply if one gets knocked over or emptied.
- Put ice blocks into their water bowls.
- · Be prepared if you are planning to be out for the day- have arrangements made with friends, neighbours to check on your pet regularly.

What to do if you suspect heatstroke

Hose down your pet thoroughly to prevent their body temperature

Ring your vet – tell them you're on your way, do not wait and see. Severe cases can have high risk of death so please act quickly. In the car, keep your air conditioning on and windows down to keep

August is **Immunisation Awareness Month**

Why should we immunise ourselves and our children? There are two very compelling reasons.

- You help to protect your child from some quite serious diseases which may leave a child disabled.
- When a large proportion of the community is protected from disease, it helps protect other vulnerable people from also contracting the disease.

There are probably only a minority of people who can remember the devastation of polio, leaving children very disabled until the introduction of a safe way of preventing the disease. Likewise many of the childhood illnesses our grandparents and greatgrandparents had to contend with are mostly a thing of the past. However, there are outbreaks of these diseases occurring because childhood immunisations have not been taken up, leaving communities vulnerable.

There are a lot of misunderstandings about immunisation and whether or not it is safe to immunise your child.

You should postpone your child's jabs if he/she is ill and has a high fever. This is because the immunisation may make the fever worse, and the illness may be linked incorrectly to the immunisation.

You may also want to postpone if your child had a bad reaction to a previous jab. It does not rule out the next one, but speak to your GP, practice nurse or health visitor. Your child should not have a vaccine if they have had a confirmed anaphylactic reaction to a previous dose of the vaccine or component of it.

Your child should not have BCG (tuberculosis immunisation) or MMR as these are both live (the virus/bacterium is alive but has been altered to make it not capable of causing disease) vaccines if Your child is on high dose steroids or lower dose over a long time check with your GP

Your child is being treated for cancer with chemotherapy or radiotherapy or has had these treatments within the last 6 months Your child has had an organ transplant and is on immunosuppressive drugs

Your child has had a bone marrow transplant and finished immunosuppressive therapy within the last 12 months

Your child has a lowered immune system - again check with your

Myths

You do not need to avoid or delay your child's immunisations if he

Has a minor infection without a fever, such as a cough or cold

Has a family history of bad reactions to immunisations

Has already had diseases such as whooping cough, measles, german measles or mumps

Was born prematurely

Has a stable neurological condition such as cerebral palsy

Has been in contact with an infectious disease

Has asthma, hay fever, eczema or "snuffles"

Is taking antibiotics or locally acting steroids such as inhalers or creams

Is being breastfed

Lives with someone who is pregnant

Had jaundice after birth

Is underweight

Is above the recommended age for immunisation

Has a history of allergy

Has a history of febrile convulsions or epilepsy of a family history of

Is a close contact or sibling of someone who is immunosuppressed Has a personal or family history of inflammatory bowel disease

Has a personal or family history of autism and related disorders Has had a recent operation or is about to have one

It is a dangerous myth that homeopathy can be used as an alternative to immunisation to protect children against these diseases. There is no evidence that homeopathy can protect children against

It is a myth that it is unsafe to take your child swimming around the time of immunisation. You can go swimming any time before and

Children are invited to attend for their routine vaccinations at set times in their lives.





In addition to our monthly meetings in the Town Hall when there is always a good attendance for the demonstrations by professional artists, some of our members also enjoy meeting together on Tuesdays and Thursdays to draw and paint and share ideas with like minded friends in the Church Hall in Church Road.

Some of the Tuesday Group's meetings are skills - based, giving members an opportunity to try something new and experiment with different mediums, but everyone is free to do their own work at all times. The importance of drawing plays a large part in many of the meetings and a still life may be set up or a member of the Society will come and sit for us or weather permitting, go out sketching within the local area.

# VERE PATRICK WILLS-RUST

1906 - 1975

While researching the Pavilion last month, you will remember I mentioned the lessees, one of whom was H C Wills-Rust. This intrigued me as all the others included their Christian names. Upon investigation, H C Wills-Rust proved to be a woman, Henrietta Clara. The 'History of Selsey' by Frances Mee mentioned a Pat Wills-Rust so the chase was on! Pat turned out to be one of Henrietta Clara's sons. Apparently he was known for his earring and tattoos. I thought that wasn't much by which to remember a man and, indeed, it wasn't. He deserves to be remembered for much more than that.


Various records show him as Vere Patrick and even Patrick Vere and the Wills-Rust is sometimes hyphenated and sometimes not. In actual fact, Wills was his grandmother's maiden name so is used as a Christian name following Victorian tradition to perpetuate the wife's family name. As far as I know it is nothing to do with W D and H O Wills, the tobacco people. The ancestors were Worsted Spinners – but they did own the factory!

Pat was born on 27 July 1906 at Staines, Middlesex and baptised on 3 November 1906 at St Peters, Staines. His father was Arthur Bernard Wills Rust, a dental surgeon with the Indian Army, and their home address was Ferncot, Laleham Road, Staines.

In 1911 Pat was living with his grandmother, Henrietta Sanders, at Bay Cottage, Smallfield, Nr. Horley, Surrey and he is aged 4 years 6 months.

In April 1924 the British Postal Service Appointment Book records that he had become a certified wireless watcher.

Pat joined the Merchant Navy, and records show he was a cadet on Training Ship Makalla in 1926. He served on a variety of old sailing vessels including SV Southern Pearl, SV Leander, SV Passat, SV Lady of Avenel, SV Navahs and SV Lawhill but I can find no details of them.



In 1930 Pat, aged 24, was a Seaman living at 10 Lower North Street, Poplar, E14.

On 24 April 1931 he sailed from Southampton to Lisbon on the 'Alcantara' belonging to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. On this voyage he appears to have been a passenger rather than crew.

On 18 September 1931, aged 25, still living at 10 Lower North Street, he is described as a sailor arriving, in Plymouth, from Cartagena in the West Indies aboard 'Costa Rica' a ship of the Royal Netherlands Steamship Company.

Pat was engaged as a 2nd Mate aboard the ship 'Myriam' on 18 June 1937. He was 31 years old with 16 years of service. He departed Ertvelde, Ghent Belgium and, on 11 July 1937, he arrived in New Orleans. The 'List or Manifest of Aliens Employed on theVessel as Members of Crew' records him as 5 ft 10 inches tall, weight 160 lbs (11 stone 6 lbs) with a tattoo.

The London Gazette of 11 June 1940 announced that V P Wills-Rust would become a Temporary Sub-Lieutenant with seniority from 10 October 1939.

In 1940, aged 34, he was Second Officer on the 'SS Abukir' (Ministry of Shipping and General Steam Navigation Company Ltd. London).

At 4 a .m. on the 28th May, the Belgian Army capitulated on the order of King Leopold and the evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force troops was ordered. Pat Wills-Rust was part of that evacuation.

The London Gazette of 23 August 1940, issue 34930 reported that he was 'commended' and described the reason as follows:

'SS Abukir' took Army stores to Ostend. On her way back to England she embarked over 200 passengers including 40 to 50 women, some children and 6 priests. She was crowded to capacity. Her best speed was 8 knots. She carried one Lewis Gun. For an hour and a half she was bombed incessantly from the air but was not hit. At 1.15 am the next day she was attacked by a T-boat, one torpedo passing just ahead and another just astern of her. She zigzagged but after 20 minutes the enemy was seen on her port bow. Her master tried to ram the submarine. Abukir, however, was too slow and the second of two torpedoes then fired her amidships. She burst into flames, broke in two and sank in less than a minute.

The Second Officer was on the bridge. He was pinned down by concrete slabs (set up to protect the bridge from machine gun fire). He went down with the ship which settled on the bottom heeling over. This heel dislodged the slabs and he managed to reach the surface. The Germans were then machine gunning with the aid of a searchlight beam the mass of survivors in the water. Very many were killed including the Chief Officer. A British Destroyer picked up the few survivors some six hours later.

Both the Captain and the Second Officer, undismayed by bombing when in Ostend and on the way back, showed the utmost courage and resolute offensive spirit against the submarine'.

Other reports of the action tell us that aboard the 'SS Abukir' was the Needham Mission. After Belgium was attacked, a British Military Mission at Belgian Army Headquarters under Major-General H. Needham was appointed to keep the War Office informed of the Belgian situation and intentions and to repeat information acquired to the British Commander-in-Chief. Major-General Needham attended the conference and left to report the decisions taken to the Belgian Command. On his way he was seriously hurt in a car accident and some time elapsed before either British or Belgian Headquarters was informed of it. Only then did Belgian HQ learn of the steps being taken by the BEF that night in compliance with General Billotte's order to withdraw.

The 'SS Abukir' sank 50 miles N.E. of N. Foreland and only 33 survivors were picked up by destroyers.

In 1939 Lloyd's of London formed a committee to find means of honouring seafarers who performed acts of exceptional courage at sea, and this resulted in the announcement on 27 December 1940 18

of the Lloyd's War Medal for Bravery at Sea. The first awards were announced in March 1941, and the last in October 1948 with a total of 541 Lloyd's War Medals for Bravery at Sea during WWII being



The description of the design of the new medal was as follows: Obverse – a heroic figure symbolising courage and endurance is seated looking out over the sea, on which is seen in the distance a vessel of the Mercantile Marine. In his right hand the figures holds a wreath. The inscription is 'Awarded by Lloyd's'. Reverse – A trident, symbolising sea power, is surrounded by an endless wreath of oak leaves and acorns. On a ribbon across the centre of the design is the single word – Bravery'.

Captain Rowland Morris Woolfenden, Master of the SS Abukir, was the first recipient of the medal and Pat Wills-Rust was the second.

'The Lookout' of September 1941 Vol XXX11, no. 9, published by the Seaman's Church Institute of New York, reprinted an article from the Merchant Navy Journal of May 1941 part of which read:


'We announce below the award of the new medal to, amongst others, Masters and Officers of the Merchant Navy. The records of the deeds which have earned the distinction are not less moving for their brevity. These are men who have done well for their country. The opportunity found them ready, and their example is one to be followed by every one of us to the extent that occasion may demand and our strength allow.'

On 18 April 1941, The London Gazette announced that Pat would become a Temporary Sub-Lieutenant effective 8 April 1941. Five months later, The London Gazette of 12 September 1941 (which is a correction of that of 26 August 1941) announced that V P Wills-Rust, currently a Temporary Sub-Lieutenant, would become a Temporary Lieutenant in the Royal Naval Reserve with seniority from 8 July 1941. (The first announcement had his initials the wrong way round).

The remainder of Pat's service was as Chief Officer on a variety of tugs – Saucy, Prosperous, Encore and Warden - in the 1950's and 1960's. These were ocean-going tugs concerned with rescue and salvage.

In recognition of his war service, Pat was awarded the 1939-45 Star, The Atlantic Star and clasp as well as the British War Medal and Oak Leaf.

On 22 March 1951, aged 44 with the address c/o U6, London and no occupation he sailed from Southampton to Capetown on 'Carnaryon Castle' of the Union Castle Line.



Pat Wills-Rust appears to have been a meticulous man despite his scruffy appearance in later life – he has been described as looking like a pirate. He is reputed to have 'rolled his own' and to drink in 'The Crown' public house. His handwriting is small and well-shaped. His text books are beautifully bound in red leather and all have the title and his name embossed on them.

There are copious notes hand-written in them such as:

'The Devil's Hole, North Atlantic – a radius of 300' miles from a pos. in Lat 30N Long 50W. Most of the area is very deep 3000 Fathoms and over to be definitely avoided in heavy weather owing to a very high steep sea in area.'

Even his bookmarks are interesting –a lottery ticket and several coupons for units of motor fuel.





At some point Pat Wills-Rust lived at Greystones, Warsash, Hants according to the inscription in one of his text books. This was his parents' house. He worked at Hamble Coastal Towing and Salvage Co. Ltd. (but not necessarily at the same time although Warsash is on the Hamble).

Pat was living at 16 Peachey Road in 1969 through to his death on 8 May 1975. He was 68 and the London Gazette of 22 May 1975 describes him as a retired Master Mariner.

So, there was much more to Vere Patrick Wills-Rust than meets the eye.

#### The Manhood Wildlife & Heritage Group - A Chronology of the East Beach Pond

Some things are taken for granted. They seem to have been around forever and don't need constant publicity. The East Beach Pond is a typical example of this phenonenon. If there hadn't been a few very courageous individuals who put themselves 'on the line' this site would be a large muddy waterhole. And so here follows the remarkable history of the East Beach Pond:

1945: There were two small ponds in the area, one of which was known as Coy Pond and reported to be very deep, the other was called Pintney Pond;

1949: An outflow system was built, so that all ditches were combined, allowing surface and flood water to be drained into the sea at low tide:

1955/57: The first Sea Wall was constructed, which stopped the flooding and the once worthless fields became desirable building plots. As roads, footpaths and houses replaced fields, the existing drainage system became overloaded;

1972: The system was again updated. The most obvious solution was to direct all surface water drains to a low-lying area and discharge the water into the sea;

1997: The first drawing and outline to manage the pond as a wildlife sanctuary was submitted to Selsey Town Council, as a Millennium project;

2001: A second attempt was made, with the help of the local press. But a planning application to build an estate of houses in north Selsey was granted;

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2002: Selsey Gate housing estate, meant that the existing drainage system was totally inadequate. The developer combined the two existing ponds into one leaving a central island.

A committee was formed to manage the pond as a wildlife park;

2003: Chichester District Council donated 300 wild flowers but due to a mixup mowing contractors destroyed most of them shortly afterwards.

The houses are where caravans once stood.

A grant of £500 from Selsey Town Council and an award of £3,000 from the Seagull project helped;

2004: Using Seagull project money, 13 trees were bought and planted around the pond site. A Weeping Willow was donated and planted by the Selsey Model Boat Club, who use the pond for their activities;

2004: It became apparent that irregular working parties would not be enough to keep the pond and surrounding area in a satisfactory state. An enthusiastic group of volunteers was, therefore, formed into a multi-disciplined working party which would meet every Tuesday afternoon to carry out maintenance work;

2013: Since 2004 the Pond has been blessed with a number of awards, acknowledging the hard work put in by the happy band of volunteers. Among them the prestigious Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, the Green Flag award and Gold at South & South-East in Bloom competitions.

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## A Tale of Two Doves

by Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

This is the tale of two doves, the collared dove and the turtle dove - one doing really well and one doing really badly. The rise of the population of the former since the 1970s has been completely mirrored by the decline of the latter in the same period.

So, let's start with the collared dove, a species probably very familiar to many of you, commonly seen in gardens, parks, towns and cities. Much sleeker than the abundant wood pigeon and fairly inconspicuous in its behaviour, its monotonous three note call can become quite wearing after a while. Up until 1955 there were only four collared doves in the whole of the UK; within 15 years the number had risen to about 20,000 pairs, now it's estimated that they are getting on for one million pairs (British Trust for Ornithology - Bird Trends). A highly successful bird whose population has expanded enormously in the last 50 years from its core base in South-east Europe and is now found right across

It's not totally clear why this huge expansion of its range has taken place in such a short time; the bird has adapted to new conditions to which a run of milder winters since the 1970s may have helped plus the availability of seeds as well as exploiting the food we put out in our gardens. In any event they are here and seemed to have found an ecological niche in the UK fauna without upsetting any

Central and Northern Europe.

Not so for the poor turtle dove. This beautiful summer visitor with its soft, cat-like purring call is the quintessential sound of summer, up there with buzzing bees and chirruping grasshoppers. Slightly smaller than the collared dove, this is a much more beautiful bird with a very delicate brown, scalloped back, pink breast with blue-grey colouring on the wings. Once common, the numbers of turtle doves have declined to such an extent that they are now classified as a red data species, signifying a reduction in population of 50% or more over a period of about 30 years.

The problem is that we are uncertain as to why this has happened, but undoubtedly changes in farming methods is a crucial factor,



particularly in the South-east. Increase in the use of herbicide, the reduction in available arable weed seeds and the loss of tall hedgerows vital for breeding requirements have all contributed significantly to their reduction. In addition, it is not known how they

are faring on their wintering grounds in Africa and we know that there are some problems occurring for some of our summer migrants as development accelerates on that continent.

> To cap it all, turtle doves are still subject to hunters as they make their way up through Europe, though for the life of me I can't see why anyone would want to shoot a turtle dove. Hunting is not necessarily a cause for its decline, but once numbers start to get dangerously low it can then begin to have an impact.

There you have it; two very similar species with great contrasting fortunes. One able to adapt to new conditions while the other struggling to survive in an ever changing world that

proves increasingly hostile to it. Research is currently going on to see if there are ways the alarming fortunes can be reversed. I hope they succeed; a summer

without hearing the lovely sound of the turtle dove is a difficult thought to contemplate.

#### Graham's Wildlife Wanderings Being a 'wanderer', as my title suggests, means I can go from one

place to another with my observations! This month, I will be in the UK, Italy, the USA and who knows where else??

I am going to start with my promised quote from the late American environmentalist author Henry Beston. In his book,' The Outermost House,' he wrote: "For the animal shall not be measured by man. In a world older and more complete than ours, they move finished and complete, gifted with extensions of the senses we have lost or never attained, living by voices we shall never hear. They are not brethren; they are not underlings; they are other nations, caught with ourselves in the net of life and time, fellow prisoners of the splendour and travail of the Earth".

I will, with some difficulty, try to 'follow that'. In my opinion, the matter is one of respect - for the creatures that share this planet with us, an Earth which is grossly over-populated by man, and where wildlife is fighting a (generally losing) battle for habitat and survival.

Why can't we just enjoy the creatures around us without 'using' them for so-called 'sport'? Mercifully, in the UK, I think we can be comparatively self-satisfied with the way we treat our wildlife -'blood-sports' (ghastly term) are now illegal, primarily as a result of public opinion, and there is clearly considerable disquiet over badger-culling, though that is not being done for 'amusement', and is a different issue beyond the scope of this piece. I personally cannot understand how someone can acquire pleasure in pursuing a terrified animal, in fear of its life, if that pursuit is not to obtain food, but merely for 'fun'.

Exactly the same argument applies to the practice in some Mediterranean countries of blasting away at migratory birds - the result being a considerable reduction in the number of those birds that reach their intended destinations - and for what? To get a 'higher score' than the next guy? I call it rather pathetic, if that's the way you have to posture to demonstrate how 'macho' you are.. Though there has been pressure from more enlightened EU nations to stop the practice, it still goes on – the home governments no doubt being afraid that they will lose votes if they enforce the rules – you will note my cynicism..

I while ago, I was visiting some people in Wisconsin, in the Northern USA. They were charming, as I have found during all my trips to that nation. My host then showed me his firearms cabinet - no less than 4 high-powered rifles and a shot-gun. When I asked him what they were all for, he said they were for hunting, primarily deer 'in season,' but also other creatures at the times when deer-hunting was not allowed. There are strict guotas in respect of the numbers of deer that can be shot, and they are largely used for food, but the other creatures? Skunks, wolverines, various birds and other wildlife?.. I did not pursue the matter any further..

I was recently in Rome, and of course one of the iconic locations in that beautiful city is the Colosseum. Many of you will know its extraordinary size and the engineering marvels it contained, but its function made me shudder - during one 3-month long festival, 9000 gladiators and 10000 wild animals were slaughtered in an orgy of death before thousands of baying, bloodthirsty spectators - all in the name of 'entertainment'. Thank Goodness such spectacles are now history.


Let's eniov our wild creatures for the beauty and grace they possess - put away the gun and trap, and get out the binoculars and camera instead!

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#### Persistent pest removed

The Parrot's Feather is not a bird but a pesky type of water plant from South America which can grow very quickly thus smothering any water surface. In turn, this can stop animals and other helpful



plants from growing. The plant spreads easily as even the slightest bit can re-grow. It can thus spread quickly along ditches that are home to threatened and important species, such as the Water Vole. Despite this charismatic mammal eating 227 different

types of plant, it is not keen on the waxy leaves of the Parrot's Feather so that the plant is not readily eaten it and continues growing. While the Environment Agency (EA) is in charge of tracking invasive species such as this they do not

have enough staff to tackle the problem

A local Bracklesham householder found his pond covered by the plant and the Manhood Wildlife and Heritage Group (MWHG) sprang to his aid. Seven volunteers working together with the owner started a removal programme. The plant is a bit like an iceberg in as much as more of it was growing beneath the surface of the water than on top so that pulling it out carefully by hand in thigh deep water and mud was a tricky operation and one which required careful supervision. While a large amount of the plant was successfully removed there is at least as much work to do again so another work party will be repeating the exercise and, in the course of it, getting rather muddy!

This particular persistent plant needs lots of muscle power and a long term commitment which is too much for one householder to take on. We had lots of fun on a sunny day and look forward to the satisfaction of seeing a completely clear pond in the future and to knowing that we will have stopped it spreading further into adjacent water courses on the peninsula.

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#### Why Insurance Premiums are So High

explains Louise Addams

Motor insurance premiums continue to rise because insurers are being forced to pay repairers more for their work! If you actually believe this twaddle you should not be behind the steering wheel.

Insurance – any form of insurance – is a gamble. The insurance companies gamble that the total they receive from their insured in premiums will be more than they pay out in claims. Therefore, any disaster – flood or fire – is good for business because it reminds the uninsured of the risks they run by not paying premiums. This is also why insurance companies like to pay large bills for insurance claims - these *apparently* justify non stop premium escalation.

Insurers have also developed an incestuous relationship with *approved repairers* – who charge astronomical sums for sorting out any automotive damage.

My friend Patricia recently hooked her Vauxhall Astra Estate on to a concrete bollard in one of the Chichester car parks. She scraped the front and rear nearside panels, and put a deep scar —which did not break the metal — into both the front and rear nearside doors.

She was **encouraged** by her insurance company to use one of their **approved repairers** who supplied a courtesy car and charged the insurance company £3,600 to repair a five years old car, worth not more than £5,000. According to my friend it was touch and go as to whether the insurance company wrote her car off or not.

I considered the cost of these repairs to be outrageous and described the damage to my friend's car to George Wheatley, who runs *Chichester Bodyworks* in Chandler Road, Chichester - 01243 788 855.

The first question George asked was whether the driver was going to pay for the repairs or her insurance company. I wanted to know why the answer was important. "If the insurance company is paying, the repairer cannot afford any comeback – repairers are forced to use manufacturers' parts which puts up the price of any claim."

George told me that my friend's repairers would have charged for two new doors and maybe front and rear panels as well – which naturally inflates the price. "I would have repaired the doors and the panels and colour matched the paintwork. Your friend would not have been able to tell that her car had been repaired!"

And the cost of George's work? Between about £600.00 – and this figure includes a profit George would have been happy with! More to the point the amount George charges is often less than the excess drivers have to pay when they make a claim.

Motor insurers pretend that drivers *have to* use repairers approved by them. This is not so. Drivers can stipulate whoever they like to repair their cars and providing the total cost makes economical sense, the insurance company is obliged to pay.

So next time you're wondering why motor insurance premiums are so high, you might like to reflect that *approved repairers* can be charging six times the actual cost of a satisfactory repair.

Is it any wonder that the cost of insuring cars and the heath of ourselves and pets have soared to the point where some motorists are driving uninsured... why many people cannot afford private health insurance... and why pensioners have to think twice about insuring their pets?
